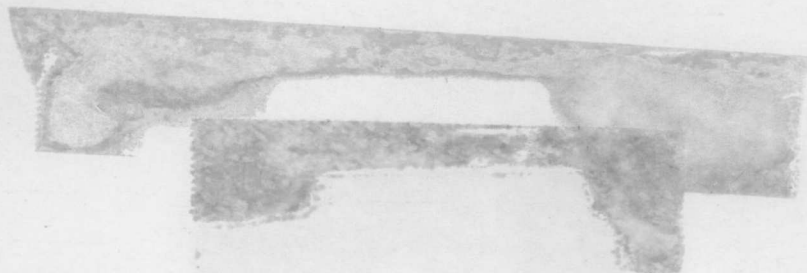

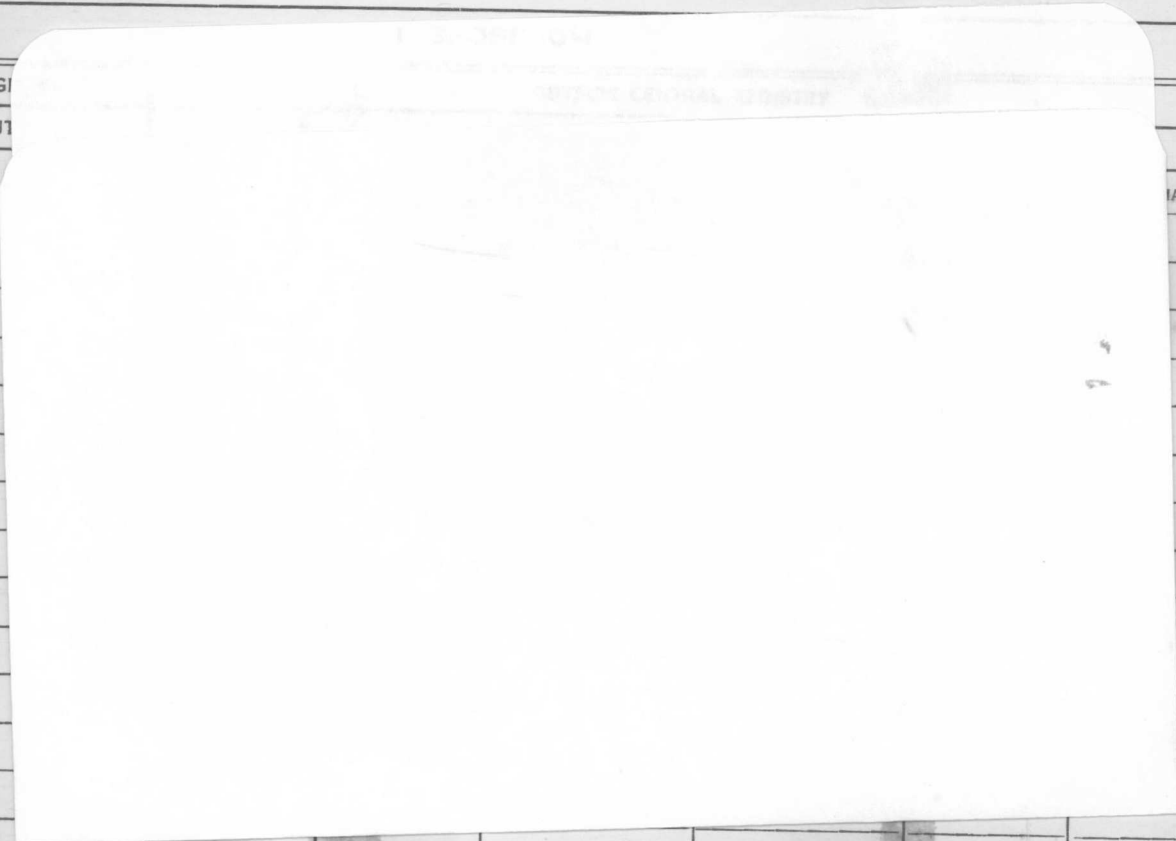



"The badge of the Force shall be a bison's head facing frontwise, in natural colours, on a blue background, surrounded by a blue band, with a gold border, inscribed with the motto 'Maintiens Le Droit', in gold, surrounded by twelve green maple leaves. Under the device, a gold-edged blue scroll bearing the legend: Royal Canadian Mounted Police, in gold. Above the device, the St. Edward's Crown in the proper colours and metals. Under the crown, on a blue scroll, the name Canada."

Complying with Section 30(1) of the Trade Marks Rules, attached are four black and white likenesses of the correct dimensions for reprinting in the Journal and three likenesses in colour, as requested for your file record, together with Treasury cheque G1400,140,994, dated July 16, 1956, in the amount of \$15.00 and payable to the Receiver General.

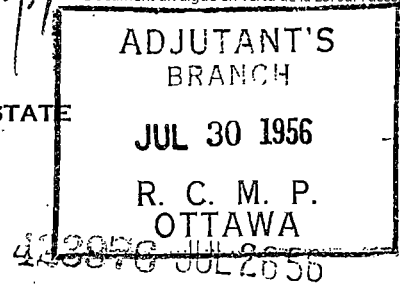





Started With 300 Men

Mounties Have Played Vital Role In Canadian Life for 84 Years

By Alfred Avis

On May 23, 1873, under Royal assent, an act was passed authorizing the formation of the North West Mounted Police. The commanding officer of the new force was given authority to appoint officers and constables not exceeding 300 men.

* * *

It was not long afterwards that fighting broke out in the Cypress hills of Alberta, and an appeal was sent for aid. The first commissioner of the new force, Lieutenant Colonel French, a fine soldier, started a program of rigorous training and discipline, which would help them face the danger and hardships they would find on their arrival in the West. Several troops were soon on their way to the West and had to journey via the United States as there was no railroads to the prairies in Canada at that time.

It was decided that the N. W. M. P. wear red-coated uniforms, as did the British militiamen formerly stationed across the prairies. Through the years the Mounted Police gained the respect and friendship of the Indians by fair play and just dealings, and the Indians soon learned that the red-coated Mountie was as good as his word.

* * *

The history of the Mounted Police proudly records the famous march of 1874 which brought law and order and saved the West for Canada. It was King Edward VII who added the word "Royal" in 1904 and the force became known as the Royal North West Mounted Police, in recognition of its brilliant record.

One new policy adopted by the government was to have a far-reaching effect on law en-

forcement in Canada in years to come. There was to be only one Federal police force, and it would exercise jurisdiction in all parts of the Dominion. Legislation to inaugurate this development had been approved in November, 1919, when four important amendments to the Royal North West Mounted Police Act were passed.

* * *

On January 27, 1920, an order in council was passed which (a) changed the force's name to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (b) made provision for the establishing of headquarters — then at Regina — at any point in Canada (c) absorbed members of the old Dominion Police force into the mounted police (d) granted

the commissioner full control and management of the force under the Minister of Justice.

The change became effective on February 1, and the following day a further order-in-council was passed authorizing the transfer of headquarters from Regina, the "cradle of the Force", to Ottawa.

With the new setup, the RCMP acquired an elaborate fingerprint system and records built up by the old Dominion Police.

* * *

Today the Mounties' duties are nation-wide and there are many divisions across Canada. Although the RCMP is equipped with cars, boats and aeroplanes to track down all types of law breakers, they still use horses in some parts and recruits still get rigorous training in horsemanship.

The force is responsible for enforcing more than 50 Federal acts, including smuggling, narcotic drugs and the Indian Act. It also protects government property, buildings and dockyards.

Since the early days the Mounties have attracted much attention at Coronations and other notable events, and never fail to draw applause at their appearance. Many members of this famous force have had distinguished careers in the armed forces and served in South Africa and both World Wars. Many awards for gallantry have been won, including three Victoria Crosses.

* * *

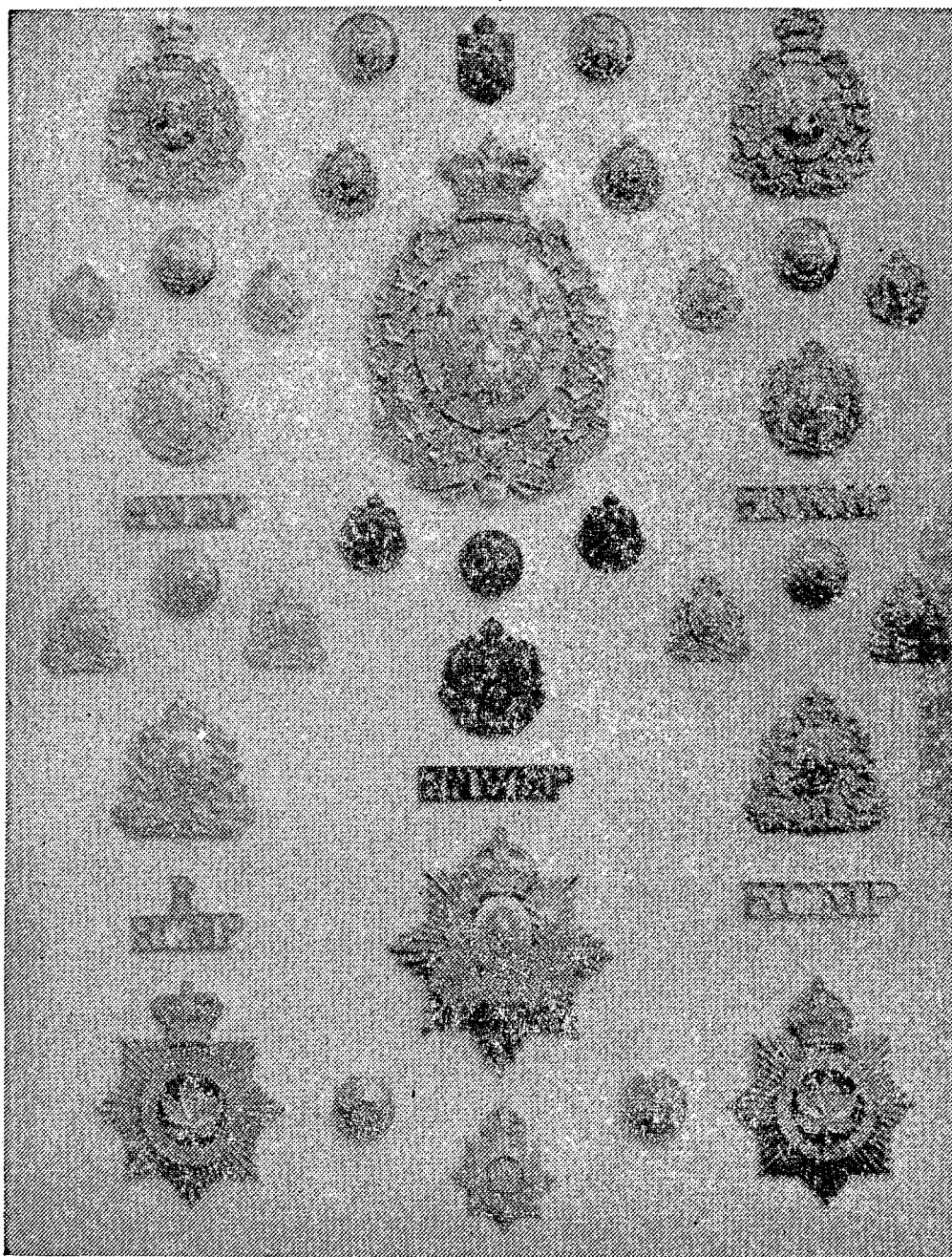
The RCMP's tradition and achievements have become world-famous and its motto "Maintien Le Droit" has become synonymous with law, order and impartial justice. It is a force that Canada can be proud of.

Re: Mounted Badge of the Force

1. Last year the N.C.O. i/c "A" Division Carpenter Shop, in co-operation with Cst. Cederberg of "S" Directorate, supplied several badges of the Force cut out in wood, mounted on a shield after the badge had been appropriately coloured. It is desired that two more of these be made up and completed -- one to be completed by the end of June and the second one, by the end of August.
2. Previously and in addition, the N.C.O. i/c "A" Division Carpenter Shop prepared a frame which contained a crest of the Force. The outer frame was made up from New Brunswick bird's-eye maple and all other parts were Canadian woods. The crest contained in the frame was a blazer crest. It is desired that two more of these framed crests be made available, their arrival to coincide with those mentioned above for the badges.
3. Kindly issue the necessary instructions so that the date lines can be met, and raise the appropriate Forms S-222. It might be mentioned that Cpl. Barker and Cst. Cederberg are fully aware of what is required. In the matter of getting New Brunswick bird's-eye maple, the writer can obtain this from the usual source in New Brunswick, which is kiln-dried if desired, upon contact by the Officer Commanding "A" Division.
4. When these articles are completed, they are to be delivered to the D.A.O. who will hold them as against requirements by the Commissioner. It would be as well to mention that as these articles are distributed to sources outside the Force, the quantities held on hand are to be kept up from time to time as directed from this office.

Badges, Cap and Collar.

1. Referring to the above, files have been searched with negative results as to how crests on the badges first appeared from the time the Force was inaugurated. The N.C.O.'s and Constables had no collar badges until about the year 1900 and these bore the full crest of the Force.
2. Metal cap badges were first issued to N.C.O.'s and Constables about the end of the year 1901 and these resemble the collar badges very closely in design.
3. The Force used the same badges up until 1904. The badges showed crest, motto, and the letters N.W.M.P. After 1904, the letter "R" was added to the badges as the name of the Force was then changed to the Royal Northwest Mounted Police. This remained the same until Sept. 1, 1920, when the name of the Force was again changed from that of Royal Northwest Mounted Police to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.
4. The new badge of the Force came into official use on February 25, 1954, by Order-in-Council P.C.1954-27/256 and may be described as follows:

"The badge of the Force shall be a bison's head facing frontwise, in natural colours, on a blue background, surrounded by a blue band, with a gold border, inscribed with the motto "Maintiens Le Droit" in gold, surrounded by twelve green maple leaves. Under the devices, a gold-edged blue scroll bearing the legend: Royal Canadian Mounted Police, in gold. Above the device, the St. Edward's Crown in the proper colours and metals. Under the crown, on a blue scroll, the name "Canada."

5. The main changes from the old badges are as follows:

The Crown: The representation of the St. Edward's Crown replaced the Tudor Crown by request of Her Majesty Elizabeth II.

The Bison: The bison was re-drawn to provide a better looking head.

Scrollwork: The scroll surrounding "Maintiens Le Droit" replaced the buckled Garter, because it is not right or proper to use the Garter in such things.

Maple Leaves: The maple leaves were redesigned and brought closer together.





The New Badge of the RCMP

QUARTER Principal King of Arms, College of Arms, London, has granted a new badge to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, and it has been duly registered in the records of that institution, founded so long ago as Mar. 2, 1483. The badge, beautifully painted on vellum, is reproduced, on a slightly reduced scale, as a frontispiece in this issue of *The Quarterly*.

Other badges of the Force, from that used in its early days to recently (all of which have been merely variations), were not of sound heraldic design, according to authorities. For example, the buckled garter (surrounding the buffalo) formerly part of the badge, belongs solely to the Most Noble Order of the Garter. An article entitled "The Crest and Motto of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police", by G. T. Hann, Esq., M.C., in *The Quarterly*, July 1939, gives a history of the badge through many years. The device, however, is a badge and not a crest.

Heraldry has quaint language of its own and is universal in its application. In ordinary everyday language, the badge may be described as follows: on a blue background, a bison's head facing frontwise, in natural colors, surrounded by a blue band, with a gold border, in-

scribed with the motto—*Maintiens Le Droit*, in gold, surrounded by 12 green maple leaves. Under the device, a gold-edged blue scroll bearing the legend: Royal Canadian Mounted Police, in gold. Above the device, the St. Edward's Crown in the proper colors and metals. Under the crown, on a blue scroll, the name Canada.

Regarding the meaning of the various figures incorporated in the badge: the Canadian bison is an animal which has long been a symbol of Canada since the early days when they roamed the western plains by the hundreds of thousands; the 12 maple leaves represent one for each of the ten provinces, and the North-West Territories and the Yukon; the St. Edward's crown is the new type of crown adopted by a decree of Her Majesty, Elizabeth II, for use on all badges, coins and so forth and was the crown which for a moment touched the head of Her Majesty at her coronation on June 2, 1953, never to be worn by her again; the motto, as is well known, means "Uphold The Right". The new badge will gradually be placed into use throughout the Force, on buttons, as collar badges, on stationery, on automobiles and other property. ○○○
