
I refer to your letter of the 28th instant on this subject.

On 20 Jun 57, I was detailed by Capt DC MARTIN, Commanding Officer, Quebec Command Provost Company, to carry out enquiries in accordance report SIB/G-3-1001 (PM) dated 18 Jun 57 which contained a news report which appeared in the Toronto Globe and Mail on 17 May 57; the following is a copy of that news item:-

(a) Mother Drowns UNEF Man's Son

Montreal, May 17 (CP).

Police said today that a 20 year old mother drowned her 2½ year-old son in a bath tub because she was penniless and distraught over neighbor's suggestions she place the child for adoption.

Police said the woman was taken into custody after she had telephoned and asked that police be sent to her address.

Police said the woman told them she decided this morning to carry out a plan she had been considering for several weeks. She adored the boy but has been without money and has not received a cent from the child's father, stationed in Egypt with the United Nations Emergency Force.

2. It was requested that enquiries be carried out to ascertain whether this news report was correct, and if basically true, to establish the identity of the child's father.

3. On 21 Jun 57, I visited Montreal Municipal Police Station No.1 where I saw Det/Sgt's BEDARD and VADEBONCOER, Homicide Squad, I told them the nature of my enquiries, and was informed that on 17 May 57, police had been called to 7232 St Denis Street, MONTREAL P.Q., where they had found Michel BEAUCHAMP, aged 2½ yrs, drowned in the bath-tub. The mother Miss Pauline BEAUCHAMP, aged 22 yrs, was taken into custody, and at the Coroner's Inquest held on 18 May 57, she was found criminally responsible for the child's death. On 18 May 57, BEAUCHAMP appeared for preliminary hearing on a charge of murder (Case No.60100 refers). She was remanded in custody until the Fall Assizes of the Queens Bench Division.

4. I later visited counsel for the defence; Mr Raymond DAOUST, 1569 St Hubert Street, MONTREAL, P.Q., and told him the nature of my enquiries, and he told me that BEAUCHAMP had alleged that a soldier was the father of the dead child, who he understood was now stationed in Egypt, he was not aware of service particulars of this soldier, and suggested that I interview Miss BEAUCHAMP at the prison.

5. On 25 Jun 57, I visited Fullum Street Womens Prison, MONTREAL, P.Q., where I interviewed Miss BEAUCHAMP. I questioned her concerning the father of the dead child, and she stated that his name was [REDACTED], a soldier, age about 23 yrs, who had joined the Army in 1954, and had been stationed at CAMP VALCARTIER, P.Q. She said that she had received a post-card

from him whilst he was serving in Egypt about six months ago. I later established that this soldier's regimental particulars were as follows:-

[REDACTED], RCAMC, formerly attached to CATS, CAMP VALCARTIER, P.Q. Further questioning of Miss BEAUCHAMP revealed that no official claim for support of the child had been made against [REDACTED] neither had he ever supported the child in any way, and apart from the word of Miss BEAUCHAMP, there does not appear to be any evidence that [REDACTED] is in fact the father of the dead child. Army Regulations do not recognize common law marriage relationships. With respect to allowances, entitlement to Marriage Allowance is dependent upon the member of the Canadian Army being married or if he is not married upon his having at least one dependent child. A "dependent child" for the purposes of Regulations means a legitimate child, stepchild or an adopted child. In addition, the amount of Subsistence Allowance payable to a member of the Army who does not reside in Government quarters, is higher if the member is in receipt of Marriage Allowance than if he is not.

A member of the Canadian Army who has established a common law marriage relationship is not permitted to reside in Married Quarters, nor is he entitled to move his family from one place of duty to another at public expense.
