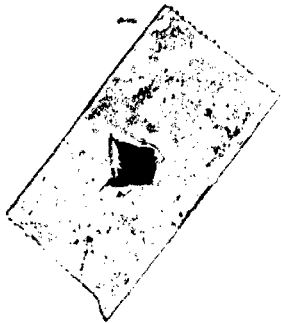

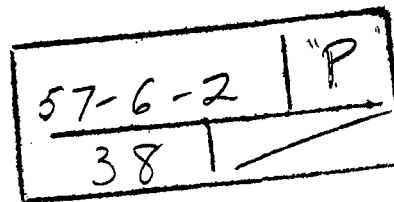

I was pleased to receive word from CFHQ that you have consented to visit the RCAF Staff College to speak to our staff and students on the subject of "Arms Control".

Your lecture will form a part of our study of Contemporary Strategy, in which we attempt to familiarize officers with the strategic concepts currently followed by major powers and alliances, and to acquaint them with the strengths and weaknesses of contemporary strategy. Concerning terms of reference for your talk, I would be no more specific than to ask that you explain the effect of arms control on military strategy and discuss some of the problems and proposals associated with disarmament. As you may have been advised, your talk is scheduled for 1.45 p.m. on Tuesday, 18 January, 1966.

I am enclosing a brochure which should answer most of the questions that you may have about our College, and will acquaint you with our organization, lecture procedures and facilities. You will note that our usual lecture period is of 40-50 minutes' duration and is traditionally followed by a question period of about 30 minutes. As the date for your talk approaches, one of my staff will contact your office to assist with the administrative details of your visit. In the meantime, we would appreciate receiving a short biography of yourself for the information of your audience.

Thank you for accepting this speaking engagement; we look forward to your visit to the College. Please let me know if the proposed arrangements are suitable to you.

## RCAF STAFF COLLEGE

### GENERAL INFORMATION FOR LECTURERS

#### History

1 The College opened under the name "RCAF War Staff College" in October, 1943. The first seven courses were of ten weeks' duration; in July, 1945, however, the course was extended to six months. Shortly after the end of the Second World War, the College was established on a permanent basis and the name was altered to "RCAF Staff College". The present duration of the course is ten months.

#### Aim

- 2 The aim of the Staff College course is to:
- (a) further develop the skills and knowledge of officers to prepare them for Wing Commander and Group Captain rank; and
  - (b) provide an additional measurement of achievement as an aid in selection for career progression.

#### Composition of Course

3 There are seventy-two officers on this course, of whom fifty-four are from the Royal Canadian Air Force, two are from the United States Air Force, two are from the Canadian Army, two are from the Royal Air Force, and twelve are from the Royal Canadian Navy. The students are mainly of squadron leader rank or equivalent although some flight lieutenants do attend.

#### Staff

4 The Commandant of the Air Force College is Air Commodore D.B. Biggs, CD. The staff of the RCAF Staff College consists of the Director, Group Captain D.P. Hall, CD, a tutorial staff, and a programming staff. The tutorial staff includes one member from the RAF, and one from the RCN.

#### Scope of the Course

5 Instruction at the RCAF Staff College falls into two main fields; staff training studies and air warfare studies. To fulfil the aim, the College course of instruction is designed to assist the student:

- (a) to think logically and to express his ideas effectively, concisely, and exactly, whether orally or in writing;
- (b) to have a thorough knowledge of the forms of service writing;
- (c) to know his Service;
- (d) to understand the employment of air forces, whether alone or in conjunction with other Services;

- (e) to keep abreast of scientific and technical developments that may affect the employment of air forces;
- (f) to gain a perspective on national and international problems.

6 To give the student an opportunity to broaden his scope and extend his experience, visits are made during the academic year to the USAF Air Command and Staff College, Air University, Montgomery, Alabama; the Canadian Army Staff College, Kingston, Ontario; and to Canadian Naval and Air Force units on the Atlantic Coast. In addition, visits are made to several service establishments and industrial organizations such as General Motors of Canada, Steel Company of Canada, Canadair, and others.

#### Method of Instruction

7 Instruction at the College follows the tutorial system with ten members of the staff directing syndicates, each syndicate consisting of seven students. The syndicate director works closely with each of his students; thus the student has his work fully examined and is given advice on an individual basis. The course is divided into four syndicate periods. At the end of each period, the syndicate director and the composition of the syndicate are changed so that the student may derive the maximum benefit from the wide variety of views and experience of his fellow students.

#### Lecture Routine

8 Although some lectures are given by members of the directing staff, the majority are delivered by guest speakers. The lectures range over a variety of subjects selected to cover the scope of the course.

9 A lecture period generally consists of a fifty-minute talk, a ten-minute break, and concludes with a thirty-minute discussion period. During the discussion period, students and staff ask questions of the lecturer and air opinions. Experience has shown that this period is extremely productive.

#### Aids to Lectures

10 The Staff College is equipped with a drafting room, a wide variety of maps, projection equipment, and a well equipped library. Lecturers are welcome to make use of these facilities to illustrate their lectures. Ten days is the desired time for the reproduction of charts or preparation of maps by the draftsmen; hence, lecturers are requested to inform the College of their requirements for lecture aids as early as possible. The projection equipment that is available is as follows:

##### (a) Vu-graph:

- (i) Transparencies up to 10" x 10".
- (ii) Cellophane rolls 10" wide.

(NOTE: Printing on Vu-Graph transparencies should be at least 3/16" high.)

(b) Slide Projector Projects slides 3½" x 4",  
2" x 2", and 35 mm.

(c) Movie Projectors

(i) Two Bell and Howell 16 mm film sound  
projectors

(ii) One Bell and Howell 16mm portable pro-  
jector.

11 Facilities are available also for mounting charts and maps  
of up to 8 ft by 16 ft. Most convenient size is up to 8 ft by 8 ft.  
If charts are used as a lecture aid, printing on the charts should be  
at least 1½" high. The College also has equipment to produce slides  
3¼" x 4" in size.

#### Security

12 It is a basic principle of the Staff College that speakers  
are free to express personal opinions and discuss classified material  
without fear of disclosure or compromise. Students are cleared to  
TOP SECRET, are fully aware of the need for security of classified  
information, and the record of confidence placed in them in the past  
has been unsullied.

#### Accommodation

13 All lecturers are invited to take any meals at the Staff  
College that would be convenient to them.

14 There is accommodation at the College for guest speakers.  
However, if hotel accommodation is desired, the College is glad to  
make reservations. Transportation is supplied for lecturers to and  
from the station, airport, home or hotel and the College is happy  
to extend any further conveniences within its resources while  
lecturers are in Toronto.

#### Reimbursement of Visiting Lecturers

15 Government regulations authorize the payment of a small  
honorarium and expenses to any non-government employee who visits  
the College to deliver a lecture. The required documentation is  
normally completed at the time of the visit.

#### Confirmation of Arrangements

16 Lecturers are contacted a week to two weeks before the date  
of the scheduled lecture to confirm previous arrangements and to cover  
final administrative details. If lecturers reply in writing, they are  
requested to advise method and time of arrival, accommodation and  
transportation required, lecture aids to be used, and any other  
pertinent details or instructions considered desirable.

#### Location and Address

17 The RCAF Staff College is situated approximately midway  
between Yonge Street and Avenue Road at the corner of Wilson Avenue  
and Yonge Boulevard (about one-half mile north of Toronto's city  
limits.) The Union Station is about seven miles south of the College,



and Toronto International Airport is about twelve miles west by road,  
in each case about a half hour's driving. The postal address of the

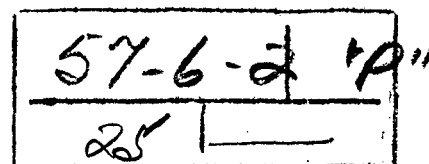

I have just returned from a CIIA lecture tour of Quebec and the Maritimes in which I spoke on the subject of "North Vietnam Today". Considering that the subject might be regarded as a fairly contentious one, the tour proved to be a surprisingly quiet and uneventful affair. I encountered no excitable or provocative audiences; in fact, they were for the most part rather dull and uninspired groups, apparently little moved or stimulated by the subject. Few questions were put on North Vietnamese affairs as such, most being directed, often inexpertly, to more general aspects of the Vietnam situation. The most interested and, from my point of view, the most stimulating were the essentially university audiences in Fredericton and Wolfville.

2. I was somewhat taken<sup>4</sup>back by the presence of the press on one or two occasions before the lecture in response to an invitation from the local branch of the CIIA. Being enlisted apparently more with the idea of rustling up publicity for the branch than reporting on the substance of the lecture, however, it did not in any way make itself awkward.

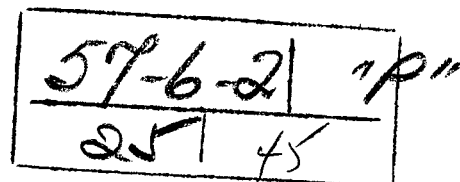

Attached is a letter dated October 15 received from the chairman of the 7th Annual Seminar on International Affairs sponsored by the Students Undergraduate Societies of Sir George Williams University. The letter invites me to participate in a panel discussion at the seminar on "Neutralism - the Answer in South East Asia?" to be held on November 4. I would think that the invitation has been sent to me because of personal contacts with the university.

As I have little competence to participate in a seminar on South East Asia and none to discuss the inevitable question of Vietnam, I must decline the invitation. However, before doing so, I should be grateful if Far Eastern Division would consider the usefulness of sending an officer to the seminar who has knowledge and experience of Indochina and other areas of South East Asia such as, for example, Mr. Ross Francis.

I appreciate that the subject suggested by the Seminar is politically difficult for an officer of this Department to deal with. However, I have just come from a visit to Sir George Williams University and McGill University where I sensed that there was an acute lack of appreciation of the realities facing the Canadian Government's attitudes and policies towards South East Asia, among professors as well as students. At the same time I felt that the Department lacked appreciation of the strength of feeling about the moral implications of U. S. military activity in Vietnam. I think it would be useful, both to the academic community and to us to have more frequent contact with the universities.

Whether or not the Sir George Williams Seminar is an important enough occasion to warrant us sending an officer I do not know, although being in Montreal attendance would not require more than a day's absence from Ottawa. The seminar would seem to have had important speakers at other sessions and this year's speaker is Professor Bernard Fall, the author of "Two Vietnams."

While the meeting will no doubt be attended by politically committed participants it is suppose to be an academic seminar. With a registration fee of \$40.00 it presumably will attract the serious - and affluent - student.

I should be grateful to learn whether Far Eastern Division has any interest in sending an officer to the seminar. I am, of course, anxious to send a reply as soon as possible.


Mr. Hardy, Personnel Division, has told me of your recent return from duty in India and I am writing to enquire if you would like to speak to some of our branches about recent developments in India.

## A Guide for Speakers

Revised August, 1965

### 1. The history, aims and organization of the C.I.I.A.

The Canadian Institute of International Affairs was founded on January 30, 1928, by a distinguished group of private citizens who felt the need for a Canadian institution specifically devoted to the study of external policies and developments and to providing sound information concerning International affairs.

The Institute was modelled on the Royal Institute of International Affairs, with which it is affiliated. Its organization now embraces twenty-four branches in the principal centres in Canada from St. John's to Victoria and a branch for Canadians residing in New York City.

The Institute has as its objective the promotion of interest and understanding on the part of Canadians of international questions and their bearing on Canada's national interests and welfare. It seeks to create an informed opinion about Canada's role as a member of the community of nations. It maintains particularly close relations with similar institutes in the Commonwealth, and other countries.

The Institute is completely unofficial. To assure the maintenance of its objective and non-partisan character, the Institute as such is precluded by its charter from the formal expression of opinions on public questions but it seeks to bring together, and to provide opportunity for the expression of, all shades of responsible opinion in its field.

### 2. Nature of its Membership

The members of the Institute represent a cross-section of the informed Canadian public, for the most part business, university, and professional men and women. Although the branches include members with expert knowledge and those with general knowledge, the speaker may assume that his audience is aware of the basic facts of international affairs. Unless his subject is abstruse, he may dwell on the factual background briefly and concentrate on contemporary developments or on his interpretation of events and policies. In short, extensive background details are not usually necessary although a brief introductory summary may be useful.

### 3. Meetings

Meetings are held by each branch once or twice a month, from September to May inclusive.

All Institute meetings are private and confidential, unless otherwise arranged between the branch and the speaker. This character of the meetings is intended to permit frank discussion of the issues without attributing to a speaker or members of his audience remarks that are made. Proceedings of meetings are not reported in the press. Frequently journalists ask to interview

2.

3. a visiting speaker. In such cases speakers are requested to ask the reporter to make it clear that he is reporting an interview and not what is said at the meeting.

The format of each meeting is normally as follows. After being introduced by the branch chairman or the chairman's representative, the speaker discusses the topic for approximately forty-five minutes. The audience is then invited by the chairman to question the speaker. The discussion period usually lasts for up to a half-hour but there is no laid-down time limit.

Institute meetings are normally held in the evening although from time to time (and depending on the tour itinerary) a speaker is requested to address a luncheon or late afternoon meeting. Some branches hold dinner meetings and others hold meetings in club or lecture rooms at eight or 8.30 o'clock. Audiences vary from about 25 to 100 persons, and the average would be about 50 persons. The atmosphere is informal.

#### 4. Tour Arrangements

##### A. The planning of a tour

The following steps are observed in planning a speaker's visits to Institute branches:

- (i) The Director General or the National Secretary of the C.I.I.A. is normally responsible for issuing invitations to persons to make a tour of Institute branches. (Individual branches themselves may, of course, invite a speaker to address them). National Office proposals for tours must be submitted to branches for consideration. On occasion, after a speaker has been invited to undertake a tour of Institute branches, it is found that the speaker's available dates cannot be fitted into a branch programme and some rearrangement of schedule is frequently required at this stage.
- (ii) The responsibility for the detailed planning of a tour belongs to the National Secretary. After a speaker has agreed to make a tour, the National Secretary sends a suggested itinerary listing dates and places to him for approval. A speaker is requested to make as few changes as possible at this stage because itineraries are based on the speaker's suggestions in his reply to the original invitation and on the Institute's own programme.

With many speakers visiting the 24 branches of the Institute throughout each season, it will be appreciated that the speakers' programme is complex. While the programme is flexible enough to permit some changes in proposed itineraries, it is usually difficult to consider major changes once an itinerary has been agreed to.

- (iii) In his reply to the National Secretary's suggested itinerary, a speaker is requested to include a biographical note and one or more topics for his proposed talk so that branch secretaries may mail notices of meetings to members 2-3 weeks in advance of a speaker's arrival if at all possible

3.

- (iv) Once an itinerary has been agreed upon, the National Secretary contacts the branches concerned and prepares the details of each visit. This having been done, the National Secretary draws up a detailed programme for the speaker and the branches.
- (v) This programme contains the following information:
  - (a) dates and places of each engagement,
  - (b) times of departure and arrival of each flight, rail or bus trip,
  - (c) details of each meeting, e.g., time, place, and any special arrangements,
  - (d) names and telephone numbers of branch chairmen and/or secretaries who are requested to contact the speaker shortly after his arrival. If, by chance, no such contact is made, the speaker is requested to call the chairman and/or secretary to notify him of his arrival,
  - (e) hotel accommodation.

N.B. The National Secretary sends to each speaker a copy of the above programme, air, rail and/or bus tickets, and a cheque to cover per diem expenses. Speakers are requested to acknowledge receipt of these items, if time permits.

#### B. Expenses

The C.I.I.A. is not able to provide fees to its speakers. However, the Institute pays travel expenses within Canada and from an agreed point of departure in the United States as well as a per diem of \$20.00. The latter is intended to cover hotel costs and incidental expenses. An additional sum is included to cover costs of airport transportation.

#### 5. Notes for speakers on tour

- (A) Economy class air travel is the normal mode of transportation provided for speakers. However, between certain points travel by rail or bus is either the only means of transportation or is more convenient than air. Wherever possible all rail travel reservations are first-class.
- (B) Speakers are reminded that luggage limits by air within Canada are 44 pounds (Economy class).
- (C) It is suggested that speakers coming from points outside Canada wait until they arrive in Canada before cashing their expense cheques so that exchange problems may be avoided.
- (D) While nothing varies as much as the climate, speakers unfamiliar with Canada might find the following general advice helpful (the months given are those covering the time when the Institute branches are active). From September to early November a light overcoat and/or raincoat should be satisfactory. From November through to March a heavier winter coat is advisable. From April to June a light overcoat again would be found sufficient.

4.

5. (E) Institute meetings and functions rarely require formal dress, and, unless especially noted or unless a speaker has private social engagements apart from his Institute visits, a business suit will be satisfactory while on tour.
- (F) The matter of local hospitality to a visiting speaker is left to the discretion of each branch. Normally, speakers are entertained at dinner before the meeting.

Because of the difficulties of establishing contact with a stranger in a crowded place, branches do not normally arrange for their guest to be met on his arrival at the airport, station or bus depot. A speaker who is not paged or met shortly after his arrival is requested to go direct to his hotel where he will be called by the branch chairman and/or secretary. In case of a misunderstanding a speaker is advised to call the chairman and/or secretary (telephone numbers on programme) should he not be called an hour or so after he arrives at the hotel.

It is of help to the branches to know in advance a speaker's interests. This makes planning for any local hospitality easier. If a speaker would like to see the local university, an industrial site or some place of historic or scenic interest, this Office would be glad to pass on any such request to the branches. Some speakers, on the other hand, prefer a minimum of "outside" hospitality and in such cases the branches could be so advised.

Accommodation in most cities where Institute branches are situated is in hotels, but some branches put their guests up at private clubs. Speakers are advised that when such club accommodation is provided it is permissible to pay the club steward for accommodation, meals and any incidental expenses before leaving.

#### VI. Special requests to speakers on tour

- (A) Speakers are asked to inform the National Secretary by collect wire should either of the following situations arise:

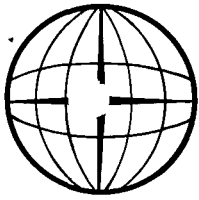

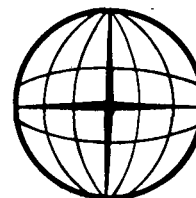

I have discussed the CIIA's proposal with Miss McDougall. I understand the CIIA itself does not have worries about your qualifications to speak to their branches on the grounds that a more senior officer might be preferable. Attached is a letter I <sup>have</sup> just received from Mr. Bradley M. Webb of the CIIA asking if I would be prepared to make a lecture tour of certain CIIA branches in December. You will note that Mr. Webb refers to a conversation with you.

2. I think it would be an interesting and worthwhile experience for me and might conceivably be of use to the Department and the CIIA. I have discussed the matter with Mr. Cornett, Head of this Division, who sees no great difficulty in letting me ~~go~~ away for a couple of weeks in December, and with Mr. Delworth of Far Eastern Division, who believes that I could give a useful first-hand exposition of the North Vietnamese situation.

3. I am however dissuaded by two arguments, which have been echoed by both Mr. Cornett and Mr. Delworth. The first is that it is perhaps not good form or a good practice to have a junior FSO with limited experience in the Department make a tour of the type normally undertaken by senior members of the Department. I understand, moreover, that Mr. Seaborn is due back from Vietnam at the end of the year and might therefore be available himself for such a tour. The second argument is that Vietnam is a highly controversial topic at the moment and, although CIIA meetings are not usually reported in the press, there is no guarantee that anything I said would not leak out to the press. It would of course be extremely difficult to avoid controversial aspects of the situation in a talk that would presumably be followed up by questions from

the floor.

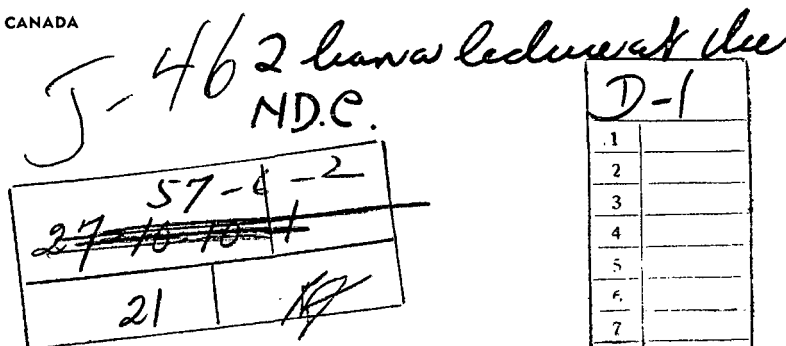

May I first of all thank you warmly for having found the time under rather difficult circumstances to see me and to give me a chance to talk to you about Wilton Park. I am delighted to know that, in principle, you feel it would be useful for members of your Department to join our conferences.

I am sending you by airmail under separate cover copies in English and French of our material. The handbook will provide the basic details on what Wilton Park is aiming at. The conference programmes will show how we are trying to achieve our aims, and the Plans of Work will tell you when we are in session. French is one of the official languages of our conferences: we work here with simultaneous translation in English, French and German. I also include one set of our statistics which will show you participation by countries and by professions over the years.

With regard to the choice of conference, may I draw your attention to the two paragraphs printed on the front page of each conference programme. Since it is our primary aim to discuss world problems as a whole, it is almost more important to choose a convenient time rather than to pay too much attention to the "Special Subject" of each conference.

As for the type of participant, you may like to know that most countries choose people at Counsellor or First Secretary level. We have had some very brilliant juniors as well, and provided they are brilliant their juniority is no bar.

Since the essence of Wilton Park is a free exchange of views - everything here is off the record - it is important in choosing people to remember that they should be willing to make a contribution to the discussions. This is made easier

by our principle that nobody at Wilton Park speaks for anybody but himself.

Some participating countries have found it particularly useful to send Foreign Service officers who have been en poste behind the Iron Curtain, in Asia, Africa, or Latin America, since Wilton Park provides a quick way to sampling Atlantic public opinion. Some have also found Wilton Park particularly useful for staff members who have had a longish spell at their headquarters.

While I understand that you are mainly concerned with certain people from your Department, may I add that in many participating countries the Ministries of Foreign Affairs use their very good offices to interest people from the other sectors of public life here represented, e.g. both sides of industry, the armed forces, the information media and the universities. Some ministries have even found it possible to find funds from which to cover the transportation cost of such people!

As to cost: an invitation to Wilton Park is expressed in the form of a Wilton Park Fellowship. This means that we will cover a participant's board and lodging both at Wilton Park and during the extra-mural visits which are a range. We cannot cover the Wilton Park conference fee of £10 per week nor the transportation costs.

I hope I have given you all relevant information, but I am, of course, entirely at your disposal for any further details you may require.

May I end by saying that it would give me very real pleasure to welcome you at Wilton Park if during your visits to this country you can find the time to visit us.

We were somewhat distressed to receive copy of Bonn's letter concerning M. de Salaberry's participation in the Swiss television programme on the Commonwealth. Our disappointment stemmed mainly from the fact that we were worried that Mr. Starnes might have felt he had been "pushed" into lending one of his officers for this purpose, the result of which had obviously not been as productive as might have been hoped.

2. Subsequently we discussed participation in the programme with Mr. Peter Arengo-Jones, the Press Attaché at the British Embassy here in Bern. Mr. Arengo-Jones also took part in the programme, as did Mr. Sarma, the Press Attaché of the Indian Embassy here. (M. de Salaberry is mistaken in thinking that these officers were from Bonn.)

3. Mr. Jones informed us that he had taken part in a number of radio and television programmes in Alemannic Switzerland. He speaks high German fluently and has a working knowledge of "Schwyzer Dötsch". He told us that he had not in these programmes found it necessary to use "Schwyzer Dötsch" as high German is understood by the majority of educated listeners to radio and television viewers. He agreed with M. de Salaberry's criticisms of the way Herr Haller had handled the programme and said that unfortunately this particular gentleman has not as good a working control in his television programmes as might be desired.

4. However, looking to the future, Mr. Jones informed us that as of July 1, (a date subsequent to the programme under consideration) the Swiss Television in Zurich has a full-time "Head of International Actuality Programmes". This gentleman, whose name is Herr Hans O. Staub, was formerly the foreign editor of the Swiss newspaper "Tages Anzeiger" and before that, for a considerable period, the Swiss Broadcasting Corporation correspondent in Paris. Because of this new appointment the handling of such programmes was expected to improve. Jones indicated that in such information programmes they had experienced

similar disappointments and frustrations but he pointed out that out of the 300,000 television sets owned by viewers in Switzerland it is estimated that at least two thirds are in Alemanic Switzerland. Consequently we hope that our colleagues in Bonn will not be too distressed if some time in the future we again seek their cooperation for an information project in Alemanic Switzerland.

5. Contrary to what seems to happen in the Alemanic Swiss programmes, the French Swiss programmes broadcast by the Radio Romande are done in excellent French, a French which in the Ambassador's view is of the same quality and purity as the one spoken by the O.R.T.F. broadcasters in France.

Dear Ken:

This is in reply to your letter of July 24, which I am answering in Chris Hardy's absence. I hope this letter reaches you, mail strike notwithstanding, before you leave Stouffville to return to Ottawa.

I do not believe that Chris ever wrote you about your next assignment. This was because it had not been finally determined before he left to take leave in July. You are to be Klaus Goldschlag's replacement in the Minister's Office as Special Assistant. It will immediately be evident to you that this assignment, which is such an important one, affects what I can say to you about John Holmes' proposal that you undertake a CIAA tour. I have discussed the problem with Klaus. He recommends that you definitely decline the invitation to undertake a tour in September. He doubts whether it would be at all possible for you to be away in mid-September, considering the Minister's programme. So far as December is concerned, he thought there might be some possibility of your getting away between Christmas and New Year's, if this would be convenient for the CIAA. This too, of course, would have to be subject to the Minister's wishes at the time.

I do not know whether we had ever fixed your return to the day; from the file, it seems that nothing more precise than "early August" was ever indicated. I understand from Klaus that he will be going on leave at the beginning of the month, which means that you may not see him. To minimize the gap between his departure and your arrival, I am sure the Minister's Office would appreciate it if you could report August 9.

We agree with the proposal in paragraph 5 of your memorandum that you should draft a letter to Mr. Bartlett the Secretary of the Symposium, with a view to obtaining places for the Department in the 1966 programme. We should appreciate being kept informed of the progress of the arrangements. In particular, we will need to have from you an indication of how much departmental participation will be involved, so that we can estimate the cost and ensure that timely provision is made for funds. Miss Cowler of this Division will be interested in this aspect of the arrangements particularly.


2. On paragraph 6, we really have no views of substance to express. If the political divisions which would benefit from the programme you envisage are prepared to make recommendations as specific as those you have made about the Stanley House Symposium, we could consider them. Our real interest in this Division is not so much in passing judgment on the substance of proposals of this sort as it is to ensure that we are informed of them well in advance. Otherwise, we are faced with last-minute requests to find money for departmental participation in academic programmes which are undoubtedly worthwhile considered in isolation, but for which no provision was made for departmental participation in the estimates. Our real problem is the competition of equally plausible and justifiable requests for what is a relatively small vote. We can, of course, always ask for more money - but only if we know a long time in advance that money will be needed.

3. An additional consideration is that the Minister has the impression, so we are given to understand, that officials of this Department travel too much and make too many speeches. We have not interpreted this as an absolute prohibition on participation by departmental officers in meetings of academic and other societies in Canada; nevertheless we have taken it as a warning that we must look narrowly at requests to expand present programmes.

You will recall that the first such Symposium, organized by this Department in co-operation with the National Commission for UNESCO, was held on July 5-9, 1964 at the Canada Council residence in the Gaspé Peninsula. It was attended by seven professors of international law from Canadian universities and a team of three officials from this Department, headed by the Legal Adviser.

2. It was the unanimous feeling of participants in this new activity that it should be repeated at least every second year thus tying in with the biennial conference of the International Law Association where there is need for concerted action of the official and private sectors of international law "activists". The Symposium is a very much needed shot in the arm for a branch of law which is still striving for recognition in Canadian universities and it is of interest to the Canada Council because it helps in the planning of issues of the Canadian International Law Journal which they subsidize. From our point of view, it affords the best opportunity to meet a cross-section of the Canadian academic community from which we need on a fairly continual basis to draw for consultants.

3. Arrangements for the first Symposium went quite smoothly although we had started rather late in the day. Earlier arrangements would make it possible to attract a couple more professors, including a political scientist.

4. The Canadian National Commission for UNESCO seems most satisfied with this activity too. We have talked to the Secretary, Mr. Bartlett, who has encouraged us personally to apply for a place in their 1966 programme prior to the coming month of September when they would like to approve it well ahead of time. We were given to understand that we would not really be competing with any other group.

5. Do you agree that we may draft a letter in this sense to Mr. Bartlett for the USSEA's signature? During the autumn months we would develop a programme in the light of developments at the United Nations.

6. There appears to be another form of activity in which the Department might profitably engage through extending the Stanley House formula to political divisions and political scientists. These could be fairly frequent meetings of small groups perhaps every six months, in a place like the Seignior Club, which is already being used for the annual information abroad exercise. A suitable rotation of Departmental representatives and universities invited could provide a satisfactory coverage for all those concerned. However, since most benefits in this case would be for the universities, they should probably be asked to pay their own way. There are indications that the academic community would welcome a practice of this character.

7. We would be grateful for your views on paragraphs five and six.

Bill Martin tells me that he is not able to provide anyone for this occasion and Mr. Robinson had indicated that he would be glad if I could go. I myself welcome the opportunity to do some thinking outside the normal Minister's Office run of things.

Would you approve the Department's paying for my transportation by air to and from London? I would be looked after while there. If this is not possible, I think that the local U.N. Association would, as Professor Gwynne-Timothy's letter indicates, be able to find the money, but it seems to me that you might consider that the Department would be able to do so under its usual arrangements for such items by its officers.

DISTRIBUTION

Speaking engagements or attendance at conferences, seminars or study groups undertaken by Foreign Service Officers outside of Ottawa and Hull are divided roughly into classes:

- (1) Talks or briefings given to the National Defence College, Staff Colleges, the Senior Course in Public Administration, or groups of DID or External Aid personnel proceeding abroad. These account for about 30% of the trips of which we are aware. Presumably it would be difficult and probably undesirable to cut down our activities in these fields very much.
- (2) Talks to various CIIA branches and attendance at CIIA conferences or study groups. This represents a little less than 18% of our activity, and represents our policy of cooperating where possible with the CIIA in making our officers available. We would recommend that this policy be continued.
- (3) Recruiting. Talks to university groups of various kinds (not including participation in U.N. Seminars, Model General Assemblies etc.) accounted for at least 25% of our activities. This included three full-scale tours with representatives of the Civil Service Commission and one or two other Departments to Quebec and the Maritime Provinces, which were entirely directed towards recruiting. Other appearances, however, are certainly useful in this context. As far as we can tell, these recruiting tours are reflected in an increase of candidates from the centres visited in the annual competition. We would certainly not recommend any reduction of our efforts in this field. It should be remembered also that talks to student groups can often be combined with other commitments in the area. Mr. Gottlieb, for instance went to Vancouver to address

that branch of the International Law Society and the Vancouver branch of the CIIA and also talked to groups of law students at UBC and the University of Alberta.

- (4) Participation in United Nations seminars, model Assemblies, etc. This accounts for a little more than 15% of our activities. U.N. Division certainly believe that this is useful.
- (5) Miscellaneous. This accounts for the balance of our activities and ranges from attendance at conferences of the Canadian Historical Association by the Head and Deputy Head of our Historical Division (obviously valuable) to a talk to the University Women's Club in Galt.

2. Our records (which are inevitably deficient due to the fact that some officers now posted may have had speaking engagements during the fiscal year 1964-65) give a total of about 75 tours or individual engagements (CIIA tours are counted as a unit, as are the three recruiting tours; other engagements are listed separately). Finance Division calculate that expenditures for this purpose amounted to over \$7,500, of which \$4,400 was spent on recruiting trips and oral boards for all categories of staff.

3. I think that this is a reasonable scale of activity, although there is perhaps room for improvement in our control procedures, where travel expenses are being paid from public funds. At the moment, we are not aware of any agreed policy on the handling of invitations for speaking engagements. Many of them are dealt with by the recipients (particularly when they are senior officers) without reference to this Division. In the first of our five categories cited above, there is probably no reason for them to consult us. Nor, I suggest, is there any reason for prior consultation if the invitation corresponds to a clearly defined Departmental policy (cooperation with the CIIA might be one of these). It would be useful of course if this division was kept informed so that we could keep an eye on the movements of all departmental personnel. Where more coordination might be desirable is in the acceptance of miscellaneous invitations including invitations to speak to university groups. Here, I think, our chief interest is to keep the scale of our activities to a reasonable level, and to avoid needless duplication. If this Division were the coordinating agency, we would also be able to supply speakers with recruiting information where applicable.

4. As far as speaking engagements not involving any expense to the Department are concerned, I think that Heads of Division are in the best position to judge the desirability of accepting such invitations as may be received by them or by the officers in their Division. I suggest we should be kept informed however so that we could see that acceptance of such engagements do not result in reports for additional personnel.

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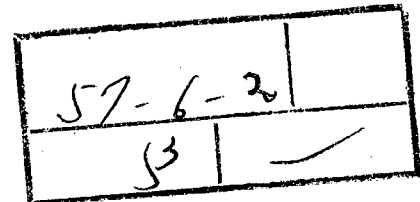

Speaking Engagements: Senior Officers

I think the problem Angus raises is partly one of seniority: senior officers come and go more or less as they wish, and it is a mistake to imagine that, in matters of this sort, we do more than rubber-stamp their arrangements — if indeed we even hear of them. So long as the subject has something to do with our business, and so long as they are not indiscreet — both being matters left to their discretion — my impression is that, in practice, heads of division and above do accept any invitation they feel like. If Angus believes this needs to be more closely controlled, it would require a directive from the NSSEA to be effective. Even then, I doubt whether we would ever use any power delegated to us by the NSSEA to tell heads of division and senior officers that they could not accept a speaking engagement. There may be a case for a circular from the NSSEA to all heads of division asking them to be sure Finance Division, Pers. Ops, & the NSSEA's office are kept informed. If we or Finance then considered some senior officer was abusing his freedom to accept invitations, we could draw this to the NSSEA's attention — although I would imagine any disciplinary action would have to be taken by BMW if not NSSEA himself.

For the past eleven years the World Affairs Council of Boston has been honored by distinguished statesmen who addressed its members in a special series of talks called "Diplomats Off the Record".

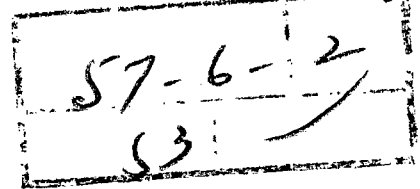

I am attaching for your information and disposition a letter of April 19, 1965, from the National Secretary of the CIIA to Mr. Cadieux extending an invitation to Mr. Cadieux or to one or more of his colleagues to attend the 32nd Annual Study Conference of the Institute. You will note that this study conference will be held in Vancouver on June 12 and 13 in conjunction with the Conference of Learned Societies at the University of British Columbia. The subject under discussion will be "Canada and the Asian World" and you will see from the draft agenda and study guide that a great variety of questions involving Canada's relations with Asian countries will be discussed.

2. Whether and to what extent this Department should co-operate with the CIIA in providing a participant or participants in these annual study groups is not, I think, a question on which this Division is in a position to make a recommendation. I would suggest therefore that your Division might wish to take responsibility for preparing a recommendation to the Under-Secretary on this invitation -- a recommendation which would be in line with general Departmental policy with regard to the CIIA and attendance at such conferences.

3. As far as the interests of this Division are concerned, I should like to make the following comments:

(1) As a general principle, this Division is in favour of Departmental officers attending seminars of this nature in their specialized fields in order to establish good working and personal relationships with non-Governmental Canadians with similar special interests. This provides not only a new and possibly different outlook for the officer concerned but also allows the fuller explanation and support of Canadian Government policy in circles where it may be particularly beneficial;

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- 2 -

(2) The problem of China and the Vietnam crisis have recently created a greater interest amongst Canadians in Asian questions and at the same time have tended to bring Canadian policy under strong criticism from various quarters of the Canadian public, especially in British Columbia. There are, therefore, particular arguments at the present juncture for ensuring as much as possible that an explanation of the Government's position does not go by default in what is a respectable and influential forum;

(3) If the Department were to be represented, it might be either at the Assistant Under-Secretary level or at the Divisional level. Presuming that the Under-Secretary would not plan to attend, Mr. Arnold Smith might be a possible participant. At the Divisional level, developments on the Indochina front would, I think, prevent me and possibly any other members of the Division from planning attendance. Miss McDougall might, however, be able to go and from her own point of view would, of course, welcome this opportunity for discussions at U.B.C., which is one of the main centres of academic studies on Asia in Canada. You will note that Mr. Chester Ronning is listed as the guest speaker at the annual dinner which will take place during the seminar. The Under-Secretary may therefore consider that the Department is represented in a way by Mr. Ronning; on the other hand his presence might be considered to be the greater reason why the Department should show an interest. My own view is that his presence should not be considered as a substitute for Departmental representation if the latter is considered to be in our interests.

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

DISTRIBUTION

We have given careful consideration to your letter under reference. We see some merit in having a list of prominent Canadians who would be willing, as the occasion offers, to make speeches in the United States.

2. The proposal, however, also has some disadvantages connected with the problem of selectivity. Once the existence of the list became known (and it would be difficult to keep its existence hidden) some people might be hurt for not being included on the list while we might be offered the services of others whom we might not really wish but whom it would be embarrassing for us to refuse.

3. Basically, however, our difficulty is an administrative one to draw up such a list, to approach the individuals concerned, to see if they would be prepared to let their name stand and to keep the list up-to-date, would put more of a strain on our resources than, in our judgment, the information benefits likely to result. When our information service increases in size and strength, this is the sort of proposal which we might usefully undertake. We thank you for submitting this useful suggestion.

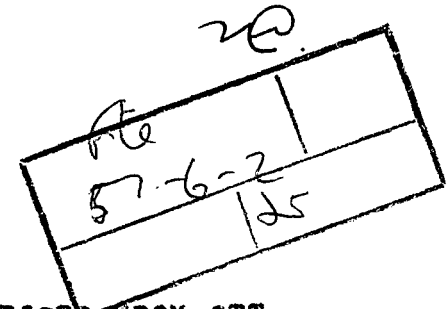

Dear Jim:

I thought you might be interested in learning how our plans for the June Conference on International Law are proceeding.

The program for the first day, which is aimed at legal practitioners, will commence with a discussion of International Law generally and recent trends as he sees them by Professor Percy Corbett. A second paper will deal with the application of International Law in Canadian courts and will tend to be a survey of judicial practice in this country for the benefit of lawyers who are not familiar with it.

June afternoons in Banff cannot be passed more profitably than by walking through the pine trees and viewing the scenery. This is the program for that part of the day.

In the evening, we hope to have Judge John Read with us. He has agreed to come subject to rearranging a medical appointment in Montreal which presently conflicts. We then plan two papers. One will be delivered by Ivan Feltham of Osgoode Hall Law School (who is leaving at the end of this term to enter private practice in Chicago) on some aspects of the laws of international legal transactions and how lawyers may earn fee income by being aware of the problems and law involved. Hopefully, you or someone from your Division will then be able to tell us about the lump sum ~~or~~ claim settlements and perhaps the procedures which the Department is working out for the submission of claims and which it wishes private practitioners to follow.

The second day deals with more public aspects of International Law and will include a panel on peacekeeping. John Holmes will be speaking direct to someone in the Department about representation on such a panel but I wanted you to be sure that this is a separate item from the Monday program

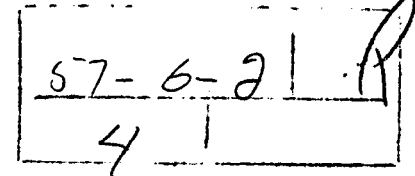
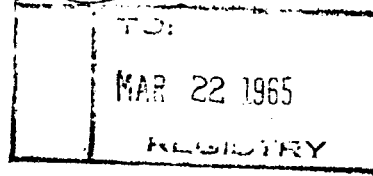

Dear Jim:

On June 7th and 8th of this year the Centre for International Studies at this University will be sponsoring a Conference on "Law and Order in the International Community" at Banff. We are doing so at the request of the Canadian Institute of International Affairs and the Canadian Foundation for Education in World Law. The dates of the Conference have been chosen to permit all persons travelling from Eastern Canada to the Learned Societies Meetings in Vancouver to stop over for two days in Banff en route. C.I.I.A., the Law Teachers, and Political Science teachers all gather in Vancouver commencing Thursday, June 10th.

We expect a good attendance, and we have planned a program by Canadians aimed at Canadians and in particular practising lawyers. The first day's program will serve to acquaint practitioners with some general problems of International Law and with information which will assist him in earning fee income in his day to day practice. The second day will swing over to the wider stage of public order and International Law in international relations.

We are in course of rounding up an all-star cast. Professor Percy Corbet, perhaps the outstanding Canadian in this field has already agreed to come and be the main speaker for the first day. A formal invitation has gone forward to the Honourable Paul Martin. John Holmes has suggested that if the Minister cannot come, then certainly the Under Secretary or the Legal Adviser will likely accept at his urging.

With respect to the first day's program, I am wondering whether the time is yet ripe to devote some time to the procedures which the Department will wish practitioners to follow in the processing of war claims. Would you find this a welcome opportunity to come out yourself, or to send one of your staff out to sketch the work of the Department in this area, and the procedures which you are laying down? I am sure that the lawyers in attendance would find this a valuable addition to our program, but I understand that it might yet be premature for the Department to speak out

on this subject in any detail.

In any event, could you give it some thought and let us know at your earliest convenience. I should like very much to see this kind of link forged between the Department and the private practitioner and this seems to be an ideal opportunity to do so if the time is ripe. SYMPOSIUM ON ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT IN BRAZIL  
AT THE UNIVERSITY OF WATERLOO.

The unusually heavy and prolonged fall of snow over southern Ontario on February 25 and 26 prevented some of the speakers and several of the principal participants from reaching the University of Waterloo to attend the Symposium on Economic Development in Brazil. For this reason the meeting was not as successful as its organizers had hoped.

2. Professor Donald Hilton, former Director of the Institute of Hispanic American and Luso-Brazilian Studies at Stanford University, addressed the meeting twice (because another speaker never arrived) on the geography, demography, and history of Brazil, and on the role of Brazil in the Latin American community. During the course of his rather general remarks, Professor Hilton indicated that he has certain reservations about the present government of Brazil. He does not, of course, like the way in which it came to power or the influence which the military exercises over it; he mistrusts its promises to hold elections and restore democratic and civilian government; and finally he seems to doubt its ability to bring about economic development and effective social reforms.

3. On the other hand, Professor Alexandre Kafka, a Brazilian economist who was formerly Director of the Brazilian Institute of Economics and is now a Professor of Economics at the University of Virginia, spoke in a very favourable way about the present Brazilian government and its economic programs. He said that, because of the ineptitude of President Goulart's administration, the military had to bring about a change of government to serve the interests of the nation as a whole. In doing so, it was responsibly fulfilling its traditional role of the "moderating power", similar to the part played by the Emperor in the 19th century. Professor Kafka outlined in detail the present government's stabilisation programs which he characterized as being "comprehensive and sound."

4. Mr. J. Grant Glasco, President of Brazilian Traction, Light and Power Company, agreed with Professor Kaffka's favourable analysis of the economic policy of the present government. In Mr. Glasco's view, the present Brazilian administration is the most honest, efficient, and intelligent one that Brazil has had in some time. He thinks that it offers the only hope for Brazil's development in liberty, and as such deserves full support from western nations.

5. The seminar did serve the useful purpose of bringing together a number of Canadian experts on Latin America. Among those whom I met, in addition to the speakers, were Professor Masling of Alberta, Professor McKegney and Dr. Miller of the University of Waterloo, Mr. Donald Wilson of the Bank of Canada, Mr. Angus Archer of the Overseas Institute of Canada, Mr. F. Lehner of the Ontario Department of Trade and Development, Mr. Jack Farquharson of Latin American Services in Toronto, and Mr. Manfred Notmann, a consultant for foreign engineering operations. There was also a fairly large number of students present for the discussions.

SUBJECT: ..... Canadian Council of Churches annual Ottawa seminar .....

The Canadian Council of Churches will conduct its annual seminar in Ottawa on Thursday and Friday Feb. 25 and 26. The theme of this year's meeting is "International Co-operation". Mr. Arnold Smith has accepted their invitation to speak to the 80-odd churchmen; the Prime Minister has also tentatively accepted. Other speakers they expect to have are the High Commissioner for India and the Apostolic Delegate.

2. Apart from these speakers, the Council request that this Department, in conjunction with the Department of Trade and Commerce, provide speakers for the afternoon of Friday the 26. Their letter to both Departments says in part: "We hope that you would be able to have a member of your staff speak to each group on 'Canada and International Co-operation' approaching the subject from your own Departmental involvement".

3. Mr. Smith has asked that Information Division co-ordinate the arrangements for this afternoon session. We are at present working on the administrative side of the problem, but would like to suggest that, in keeping with the theme of the seminar, U.N. Division would more easily be able to arrange for speakers and officers to take part.

4. In the Department of Trade and Commerce the speaking arrangements are being made by Mr. John H. Bailey, Assistant to the Assistant Deputy Minister (External Trade Promotion), telephone 2-1070. Mr. Bailey has told us that they are considering having four officers speak for about ten minutes each, followed by a question period.

5. The Council have expressed the hope that this afternoon session could take the form of two parallel and simultaneous sessions, one in each Department, with the churchmen divided into two groups which would exchange places. This would unfortunately mean that each speaker or group of officers would have to perform twice, and thus tie up the entire afternoon. We would favour a single session of all the churchmen, at which speakers from both Departments could speak and be questioned once and once only.


