Suite à des discussions avec votre personnel concernant le Rapport annuel 2000-2001 du Ministère de l'éducation de l'Ontario, nous avons apporté des changements à la version initiale du 15 janvier 2001. Vous trouverez en annexe de cette lettre les documents suivants:

- a) le rapport financier de la Province de l'Ontario, annexe 5.3, dûment signé par Monsieur Drew Nameth, Directeur, "Business Services Branch";
- b) la section 2 et la section 3 du rapport annuel en date du 15 janvier dernier ont été révisés pour indiquer les dépenses imputées aux fonds du fédéral, pour l'année 2000-2001;
- c) un tableau démontrant la répartition annuelle proposée des allocations de fonds, telle que contenue dans le plan d'affaires de l'Entente et la répartition annuelle suggérée par la Province de l'Ontario;
- d) un résumé en pourcentage des allocations contenues dans le plan d'affaires et les allocations suggérées par l'Ontario; a) tableau 1, Canada et l'Ontario. b) tableau 2, l'Ontario et c) tableau 3, Canada;
- e) l'annexe 1.2 modifiée du rapport annuel 2000-2001, suite aux discussions avec Madame Nicole Frenette.

Le tableau sommaire indique que dans les deux premières années (1998-1999 et 1999-2000), l'Ontario a dépensé 35M\$ plutôt que 21M\$ des fonds de l'Ontario. Cette dépense représente 39% plutôt que 23 % des fonds totaux (90M\$) des allocations prévues pour les projets de **démarrage**. Dans le domaine de **réseaux informatiques**, l'Ontario a dépensé 27M\$ plutôt que 23M\$ soit, 30 % plutôt que 26 % des fonds totaux. En conséquence, la contribution de l'Ontario, dans les autres catégories a diminué afin de compenser pour les dépenses additionnelles dans ces catégories. Ceci en réponse aux demandes et en consultation avec les 12 conseils scolaires de district de langue française. (Voir tableau 2, annexe 1).

Objet : Discussion avec Réjeanne Guay, Analyste politique principal, Unité de soutien en matière de politiques et programmes, Direction des politiques et des programmes relatifs à l'éducation en langue française

Suite à ma rencontre avec l'analyste financier Claude Péladeau, j'ai communiqué avec Réjeanne Guay du ministère de l'Éducation de l'Ontario. Je lui ai souligné que l'analyste avait identifié plusieurs lacunes au niveau de la présentation des dépenses encourues par le ministère.

Nous sommes conscients que le ministère de l'Éducation de l'Ontario a dépensé plus que prévu au cours des premières années de l'année comme le précise le tableau démontrant que l'allocation par catégorie avait changé. Par contre, les états financiers vérifiés et certifiés ne démontrent pas la même chose.

D'une part, l'annexe 5.4 démontre que les «disbursements» s'élèvent à 12 070 603 \$ en 1999-2000, qui est loin du 18 M \$ versé par le gouvernement du Canada ainsi que du 19,3 \$ identifié comme dépenses tel qu'indiqué par le tableau modifié des allocations. De plus, bien que le tableau prévoit des dépenses de 18,2 M \$ en 2000-2001. La province doit nous démontrer qu'ils ont encourues les dépenses.

Réjeanne Guay explique que les choses n'ont été payées qu'après avoir reçu l'argent du gouvernement du Canada. L'argent du gouvernement de l'Ontario ne provient pas de l'Unité de soutien en matière de politiques et de programmes, sauf pour la deuxième phase. Mais pour ce qui est du financement du gouvernement fédéral, il ne pouvait être déboursé qu'après que le ministère de l'Éducation l'avait reçu.

J'ai indiqué que nous comprenions cela mais ce que nous demandions de bien démontrer les

dépenses encourues au cours des années ainsi que les déboursés. J'ai expliqué l'exemple de la carte VISA - nous ne voulons pas savoir quand ils ont payé la facture mais quand les dépenses ont été encourues.

Je lui ai mentionné que l'analyste financier pouvait accepter une télécopie des dépenses certifiés vérifiés tel que demandé en attendant la version originale, et ce, dans le but de déclencher le paiement le plus rapidement possible.

J'ai reçu l'information. Quand j'additionne, je n'arrive toujours pas aux montants identifiés dans le tableau démontrant les changements proposés dans l'allocation des fonds dans l'entente, ni au 18 M \$ par année alloué par le fédéral.

Elle me dit qu'elle ne comprend pas la raison pour laquelle je ne comprends pas les chiffres.

Je lui ai dit que je dois voir au moins que les dépenses encourues reflètent au moins le montant versé par le gouvernement fédéral, et on ne voit pas cela dans les chiffres soumis. Elle estime que c'est moi qui ne comprends pas.

J'ai indiqué que j'allais communiquer avec notre analyste financier afin d'avoir ses commentaires. Je communiquerais ensuite avec elle.

Le réseau de conférences vidéo est en place dans les écoles

La distance qui sépare les communautés francophones de l'Ontario a été réduite, hier, grâce aux nouvelles technologies de l'information.

Les 12 conseils scolaires de langue française de l'Ontario ont coupé le ruban rouge de façon simultanée, hier soir, afin de souligner la mise en opération d'un système de conférence vidéo à la fine pointe de la technologie.

"De L'Orignal à Windsor, en passant par Toronto et Thunder Bay, c'est plus de 100 000 jeunes francophones de l'Ontario qui sont maintenant reliés les uns aux autres", a déclaré le sous-ministre adjoint à l'Éducation, Maurice Proulx, en direct de North Bay.

Le projet Technologie des communications, financé à hauteur de 9 millions \$ par les gouvernements fédéral et provincial, est désormais opérationnel dans toutes les écoles secondaires de langue française, les 10 conseils scolaires et le Centre franco-ontarien de ressources pédagogiques, reliant ainsi plus de 100 institutions de l'Ontario.

1. A three-year allocation process for 2000-2001/ 2001-2002/ 2002-2003 was put in place by the French Language Education Policy and Programs Branch of the Ontario Ministry of Education. 1. A three-year allocation process for 2000-2001/ 2001-2002/ 2002-2003 was put in place by the French Language Education Policy and Programs Branch of the Ontario Ministry of Education. In consultation with the C.O.D.E.L.F. (Conseil ontarien des directeurs et directrices de l'éducation en langue française), the three year allocation process was divided into two distinct phases: a) provincial projects to be submitted by September 2000 and b) regional and local projects to be submitted by October 2000. The submission process for provincial projects was initiated in Spring 2000 and completed in Fall 2000 with an allocation of 60 % of funds. In accordance with the Business Plan of the Canada-Ontario Special Agreement for the Implementation of French-language School Governance, funds were allocated under three categories - Operationalize the system and Promoting access , Improve the achievement of French-Language students.
2. Ministry personnel designed a computerized, interactive and personalized template for the submission of the provincial projects, as well as related progress reports which will have to include all necessary financial information for the next three years. The template was designed to be user friendly and to provide the necessary information on the planning or the rationale of the projects; it also includes all necessary financial information (Appendix 2.1). In keeping with the principles of partnership, efficiency and accountability, the form also clearly identifies evaluation criterions, expectations and performance indicators for each project submitted.
3. A joint evaluation framework plan and specific tools, such as surveys and databases, will be developed in cooperation with all partners, federal and provincial, as well as with the twelve French-language District School Boards. Once approved by all parties, the evaluation framework plan will guide the formative evaluation process required to report on progress.

Monsieur,

La présente fait suite à votre lettre reçue le 19 février dernier nous convoquant à une rencontre le 15 mars 2001 à Ottawa avec les représentants de l'Ontario, vous-même et M. A. Bill Ferguson, co-président de la partie fédérale du Comité national de développement des ressources humaines de la francophonie canadienne (CNDRHFC).

Nous désirons tout d'abord vous signaler une erreur technique qui s'est glissée dans votre dernière lettre. En effet, nos directions générales ont participé à une rencontre avec les députés libéraux francophones de l'Ontario à laquelle étaient présents, nous, les quatre présidents ainsi que quelques membres du RDÉE représentant les collèges franco-ontariens.

Nous avions espéré recevoir, en février, une réponse officielle écrite de la part du CNDRHFC à notre lettre du 12 janvier dernier et à notre document de proposition de restructuration du RDÉE de l'Ontario plutôt qu'un rapport verbal de votre part qui peut se prêter à toute sorte d'interprétation.

Nous avons été étonnés de recevoir du CNDRHFC cette dernière convocation considérant que vous aviez été catégorique à notre dernière rencontre lorsque vous avez affirmé et nous vous citons « que de toute façon il n'y a à peu près plus rien à négocier ». Nous en sommes donc venus à la conclusion, après avoir analysé la correspondance échangée et le résultat des rencontres des mois de juin, septembre, novembre, décembre, janvier et février, que vous n'avez pas démontré la volonté de négocier une solution avec nos organismes et les autres membres du RDÉE.

Toutefois, la participation de M. Bill A. Ferguson, à ce point crucial de nos discussions, nous laisse présager et espérer qu'une entente acceptable pour le RDÉE de l'Ontario pourrait être encore possible et ce, malgré, que cette rencontre a été préférée au processus de médiation offert par les députés francophones de l'Ontario. Par ailleurs, nous regrettons cette date tardive qui compromet l'engagement des fonds de l'Ontario pour l'année financière en cours.

Suite à une consultation auprès de nos députés, nous acceptons, dans un dernier effort de rapprochement, de nous rendre à la rencontre selon la date et l'heure fixées. Toutefois, voici les conditions que nous estimons essentielles au succès de cette rencontre :

- Que nous puissions inviter à participer toute personne que nous jugerons indispensable à l'arrivée d'une entente ;

- Que nous recevions l'ordre du jour au plus tard le 7 mars 2001 afin que nous puissions y réagir au besoin ;
- Que vous réserviez une salle de rencontre au Château Laurier pour accommoder les députés fédéraux francophones de l'Ontario qui pourraient manifester le désir d'être présents à la rencontre ;
- Que M. Bill Ferguson agisse, seul, à titre de président de la réunion.

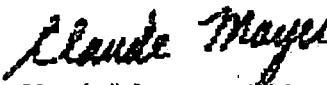
De plus, dans le souci d'assurer le succès de cette rencontre, nous vous serions gré de bien vouloir cesser les démarches que vous avez entreprises dans les régions du Sud et du Nord de l'Ontario pour mettre en œuvre votre modèle controversé.

Veuillez croire, Monsieur, que nos intentions ont toujours été de dénouer le plus rapidement possible cette situation coûteuse aux communautés franco-ontariennes qui perdure depuis trop longtemps. Nous avons gaspillé un temps précieux et nous voulons que toute notre énergie soit enfin canalisée vers le développement économique de la communauté francophone de l'Ontario. Les critiques naturelles des francophones hors Québec sont toujours aux aguets et il est important que l'utilisation des fonds publics qui leurs sont destinés se fasse de façon efficace et dans un climat d'harmonie.

Sésame, ouvre-toi... sur l'

Le Régional (RDÉE) : L'Ontario français pourrait recevoir jusqu'à 450 000 \$ par région (l'Est, le Nord et le Centre-Sud-Ouest) du Fonds d'appui pour le Comité national de développement des ressources humaines de la francophonie canadienne («Comité national»). Ces sommes pourraient être mises à la disposition des communautés pour valoriser la francophonie comme force économique. Mais pour cela, il faut que les francophones d'ici travaillent ensemble pour se donner des structures qui créeront des emplois. Ce nouveau financement se veut complémentaire aux fonds de programmes déjà existants au ministère du Développement des ressources humaines Canada ainsi que dans les autres ministères fédéraux.

Tels sont les faits saillants ressortis de la rencontre spéciale des intervenants communautaires du sud-ouest de l'Ontario et du Comité national. Cette réunion d'information, qui a eu lieu le mardi 13 février à Mississauga, a permis de regrouper entre autres des gens de Penetanguishene, Welland, Hamilton, London et Windsor. Les représentants des divers organismes présents voulaient en apprendre davantage sur cette nouvelle source de financement réservée

vée aux francophones et sur divers projets ayant déjà reçu de l'argent du Fonds d'appui dans d'autres provinces canadiennes.

Rappelons que le Comité national a été mis sur pied en 1996 pour amorcer un rapprochement entre les communautés francophones et acadienne et le gouvernement du Canada et ainsi favoriser le développement et l'épanouissement de la francophonie canadienne.

Le Comité national intervient auprès des décideurs à l'échelle nationale. Les organisations affiliées dans les provinces et les territoires, les regroupements de développement économique et d'employabilité (RDÉE), réunissent les protagonistes communautaires de ces domaines et agissent au sein même des communautés.

Quatre secteurs sont jugés prioritaires : l'économie du savoir, le tourisme, le développement rural et l'intégration de la jeunesse dans le développement économique.

Problèmes à l'horizon

En Ontario français, les membres composant le RDÉE ne répondent pas aux critères du Comité national. Dans la province, il y a quatre organismes francophones qui sont reconnus comme ayant une mission de développement économique : le Conseil de la Coopération de l'Ontario, l'Association francophone des municipalités de l'Ontario, la Chambre économique de l'Ontario et l'Union des cultivateurs. La planification proposée par l'ancien RDÉE ne répondait pas aux critères du Comité national.

Il fallait trouver une nouvelle formule car, contrairement aux autres provinces, l'Ontario français couvre un vaste territoire où les préoccupations économiques des francophones sont très différentes d'une région à l'autre. Le RDÉE provincial ne parvenait

pas à représenter toute la francophonie ontarienne.

Le Comité national a alors suggéré de créer des sous-RDÉE pour chacune des régions (le Nord, l'Est et le Centre-Sud-Ouest) et que deux représentants de ces sous-groupes fassent se joindre au RDÉE provincial (plutôt que de n'avoir que des représentants qui proviennent des organismes qui sont situés en majorité dans l'Est). À l'heure actuelle, on n'arrive toujours pas à s'entendre sur une composition du RDÉE qui fasse l'unanimité en Ontario et plusieurs ne veulent pas que tout le contrôle se retrouve entre les mains des quatre organismes provinciaux.

«Il faut que les régions sachent ce qui se passe», explique Lise Gagné, représentante de la région du Centre-Sud-Ouest au Comité national. Le but de la réunion d'aujourd'hui était d'informer, de s'assurer que tous les intervenants soient au courant. Ce n'est que la semaine dernière que le Comité a appris que les quatre partenaires à mission économique étaient allés rencontrer des députés pour se plaindre en disant que le Comité national leur imposait une nouvelle structure de travail. Je vois les problèmes avec l'Ontario. Cela fait un an et demi que je suis sur le Comité et ça fait au moins un an et demi que ça ne marche pas. Il n'y a pas encore de projet ontarien qui ait été approuvé parce que les projets soumis par l'ancien RDÉE ne rencontrent pas les critères établis par le Comité national.»

Selon Raymond Poirier, coprésident du Comité national, le Comité continuera à essayer de structurer quelque chose en Ontario. «Et si l'Ontario décide de monter des sous-RDÉE en région, il y a au moins une vingtaine de per-

Ce qui ressort, difficile, c'est l'importance de dire ce qu'on a à dire et de trouver le bon porte-parole. Trop souvent, on connaît les agences, les associations mais on n'exprime pas son opinion.»

De son côté, Raymond Desrochers, représentant de CALDECH de Penetanguishene, est très content des renseignements reçus. «L'information a été très bien présentée. Par contre, je me préoccupe beaucoup pour le fait

que jamais travailler ensemble s'il y a un conflit en Ontario français sur cette question-là et puis la façon qu'on est en train de le résoudre. La façon proposée ici aujourd'hui va créer encore plus de problèmes plutôt que de résoudre notre problème.»

Chose certaine, les organismes francophones de partout en province devront plus que jamais travailler ensemble s'ils veulent bénéficier du Fonds d'appui destiné à favoriser le développement économique en Ontario français et créer des emplois dans leurs communautés. Plus que jamais, c'est le temps d'agir!

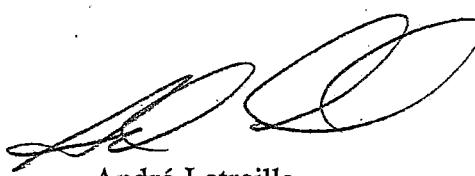

1. RESULTS ACHIEVED DURING 1999-2000

1. A two-year allocation process for 1998-1999/1999-2000 was put in place in the Spring of 1998 by the Ministry of Education to support through provincial funds costs related to the start-up/restructuring of the 12 French-language District School Boards. In accordance with the Business Plan of the Canada-Ontario Special Agreement for the Implementation of French-language School Governance, provincial funds were allocated under two categories - Operationalize the system and Promoting access.
2. A two-year allocation process was set up by the Ministry of Education in the Fall of 1998 to enable the 12 FLDSBs to access the federal contribution set out in the Business Plan. Following the approval of submitted projects, the Ministry of Education proceeded with an advance allocation 50 % of federal funds in March 1999. The Interim and Final reports were filed with the Ministry in the fall of 1999 and February of 2000 respectively. Once the Final Reports were approved, the final payments of 50 % were sent to the Boards.
3. As for the outcomes mentioned in this report, the Canada-Ontario Special Agreement's Evaluation Framework which has been jointly developed by staff from the Ministry of Education and Canadian Heritage, in consultation with the 12 FLDSBs, will enable the Ministry to measure the level of progress made through each of the activity areas. The results will be incorporated into the Ministry's subsequent Annual Report to the Federal Government.

2. ACTIVITY REPORT APRIL 1ST, 2000 - OCTOBER 31ST, 2000

1. A three-year allocation process for 2000-2001 2001-2002 2002-2003 was put in place by the French Language Education Policy and Programs Branch of the Ontario Ministry of Education. In consultation with the C.O.D.E.L.F. (Conseil ontarien des directeurs et directrices de l'éducation en langue française), the three year allocation process was divided into two distinct phases: a) provincial projects to be submitted by September 2000 and b) regional and local projects to be submitted by October 2000. The submission process for provincial projects was initiated in the Spring 2000 and completed in the Fall 2000 with an allocation of 60 % of funds. In accordance with the Business Plan of the Canada-Ontario Special Agreement for the Implementation of French-language School Governance, funds were allocated under three categories - Operationalize the system and Promoting access and Improve the achievement of French-Language students.
2. Ministry personnel designed a computerized, interactive and personalized template for the submission of the provincial projects, as well as the related progress reports which will have to include all necessary financial information, for the next three years. The template was designed to be user friendly and to provide the necessary information on the planning or the rationale of the projects; it also includes all necessary financial information (Appendix 2.1). In keeping with the principles of partnership, efficiency and accountability, the form also clearly identifies evaluation criterions, expectations and performance indicators for each project submitted.
3. A joint evaluation framework plan and specific tools, such as surveys and databases, will be developed in cooperation with all partners, federal and provincial, as well as with the twelve French-language District School Boards. Once approved by all parties, the evaluation framework plan will guide the formative evaluation process required to report on progress.

1. A three-year allocation process, 2000-2003, was also put in place by the French Language Education Policy and Programs Branch of the Ontario Ministry of Education for the submission of local and regional projects. These projects were submitted by October 2000. In accordance with the Business Plan of the Canada-Ontario Special Agreement for the Implementation of French-language School Governance, funds were allocated under three categories - Operationalize the system, Promoting access and Improve the achievement of French-Language students.
2. Ministry personnel designed a computerized, interactive and personalized format to submit the local and regional projects and local interim reports for the next three years. The template was designed to be user friendly and to provide the necessary information on the development of the projects; it also includes all necessary financial information. In keeping with the principles of partnership, efficiency and accountability, the form also clearly identifies evaluation criteria, expectations and performance indicators for each project submitted.
3. A plan and specific tools, such as surveys and databases, will be developed in cooperation with all partners, federal and provincial, as well as with the 12 French-language District School Boards, for the implementation of the Evaluation framework's formative and final evaluations .

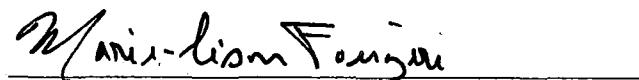

1. RESULTS ACHIEVED DURING 1999-2000

1. A two-year allocation process for 1998-1999/1999-2000 was put in place in the Spring of 1998 by the Ministry of Education to support through provincial funds costs related to the start-up/restructuring of the 12 French-language District School Boards. In accordance with the Business Plan of the Canada-Ontario Special Agreement for the Implementation of French-language School Governance, provincial funds were allocated under two categories - Operationalize the system and Promoting access.
2. A two-year allocation process was set up by the Ministry of Education in the Fall of 1998 to enable the 12 FLDSBs to access the federal contribution set out in the Business Plan. Following the approval of submitted projects, the Ministry of Education proceeded with an advance allocation 50 % of federal funds in March 1999. The Interim and Final reports were filed with the Ministry in Fall 1999 and February 2000 respectively. Once the Final Reports were approved, the final payments of 50 % were sent to the Boards.
3. As for the outcomes mentioned in this report, the Canada-Ontario Special Agreement's Evaluation Framework, which has been jointly developed by staff from the Ministry of Education and Canadian Heritage in consultation with the 12 FLDSBs, will enable the Ministry to measure the level of progress made through each of the activity areas. The results will be incorporated into the Ministry's subsequent Annual Report to the Federal Government.

2. ACTIVITY REPORT APRIL 1ST, 2000 - OCTOBER 31ST, 2000

1. A three-year allocation process for 2000-2001/ 2001-2002/ 2002-2003 was put in place by the French Language Education Policy and Programs Branch of the Ontario Ministry of Education. In consultation with the C.O.D.E.L.F. (Conseil ontarien des directeurs et directrices de l'éducation en langue française), the three year allocation process was divided into two distinct phases: a) provincial projects to be submitted by September 2000 and b) regional and local projects to be submitted by October 2000. The submission process for provincial projects was initiated in Spring 2000 and completed in Fall 2000 with an allocation of 60 % of funds. In accordance with the Business Plan of the Canada-Ontario Special Agreement for the Implementation of French-language School Governance, funds were allocated under three categories - Operationalize the system and Promoting access , Improve the achievement of French-Language students.
2. Ministry personnel designed a computerized, interactive and personalized template for the submission of the provincial projects, as well as related progress reports which will have to include all necessary financial information for the next three years. The template was designed to be user friendly and to provide the necessary information on the planning or the rationale of the projects; it also includes all necessary financial information (Appendix 2.1). In keeping with the principles of partnership, efficiency and accountability, the form also clearly identifies evaluation criterions, expectations and performance indicators for each project submitted.
3. A joint evaluation framework plan and specific tools, such as surveys and databases, will be developed in cooperation with all partners, federal and provincial, as well as with the twelve French-language District School Boards. Once approved by all parties, the evaluation framework plan will guide the formative evaluation process required to report on progress.

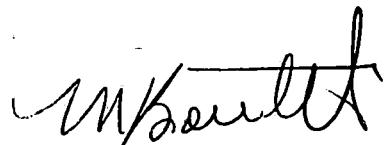

1. RESULTS ACHIEVED DURING 1999-2000

1. A two-year allocation process for 1998-1999/1999-2000 was put in place in the Spring of 1998 by the Ministry of Education to support through provincial funds costs related to the start-up/restructuring of the 12 French-language District School Boards. In accordance with the Business Plan of the Canada-Ontario Special Agreement for the Implementation of French-language School Governance, provincial funds were allocated under two categories - Operationalize the system and Promoting access.
2. A two-year allocation process was set up by the Ministry of Education in the Fall of 1998 to enable the 12 FLDSBs to access the federal contribution set out in the Business Plan. Following the approval of submitted projects, the Ministry of Education proceeded with an advance allocation 50 % of federal funds in March 1999. The Interim and Final reports were filed with the Ministry in Fall 1999 and February 2000 respectively. Once the Final Reports were approved, the final payments of 50 % were sent to the Boards.
3. As for the outcomes mentioned in this report, the Canada-Ontario Special Agreement's Evaluation Framework, which has been jointly developed by staff from the Ministry of Education and Canadian Heritage in consultation with the 12 FLDSBs, will enable the Ministry to measure the level of progress made through each of the activity areas. The results will be incorporated into the Ministry's subsequent Annual Report to the Federal Government.

1. A three-year allocation process for 2000-2001/ 2001-2002/ 2002-2003 was put in place by the French Language Education Policy and Programs Branch of the Ontario Ministry of Education. In consultation with the C.O.D.E.L.F. In keeping with the principles of partnership, efficiency and accountability, the form also clearly identifies evaluation criterions, expectations and performance indicators for each project submitted.
3. A joint evaluation framework plan and specific tools, such as surveys and databases, will be developed in cooperation with all partners, federal and provincial, as well as with the twelve French-language District School Boards. Once approved by all parties, the evaluation framework plan will guide the formative evaluation process required to report on progress.

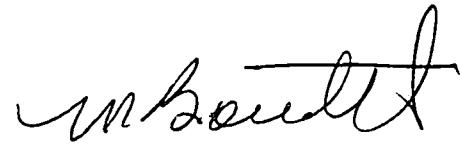
