Referring to your letter dated December 1, I am sending you the following information.

We expect that the 75 actually in first, second and third year Vocational students will return to Churchill Vocational Centre for 1972-73.

In the passed years, the number of additional students going to Churchill was determined in January, after consultation with the parents. It is too early to give a just evaluation of that number, out of a possibility of 15 students, according to the fact that the consultation with the parents has not yet taken place. As soon as we will have the information from the parents, we will let you know. Mesures are taken to have it as soon as possible; it would be in January.

A preliminary evaluation made by the district School Superintendent gives 25 to 30 additional students for 1972-73.

Churchill Vocational Centre

As you are aware, the Churchill Vocational Centre and the student residence operated by this Branch at Fort Churchill, Manitoba will close in June 1973. In order to be in a position to arrange our manpower requirements in respect to teachers and child care workers for the 1972-73 school year, I would appreciate information in respect to the spaces that will be required in the fall of 1972 for students from Arctic Quebec at Churchill.

At the present time there are about 200 students in the residence at Fort Churchill. The Arctic Quebec totals are as follows:

Full time academic students	- 19
First and Second Year vocational students	- 56
Third Year vocational students	- <u>21</u>
	<u>96</u>

The 21 Third Year Arctic Quebec students will complete their training at Churchill in June 1972. I anticipate that the remaining 75 students from Arctic Quebec will return to Churchill in the fall of 1972. Would you please confirm that these 75 students will return and let me know if the Arctic Quebec District will be requesting any additional student spaces at Churchill for the fall of 1972.

Your co-operation in providing this information would be appreciated.

RE: Arctic Quebec Students attending school  
at Churchill, Manitoba

Reference is made to the letter of May 28th, 1971 addressed to Mr. J.B. Bergevin from Mr. A.D. Hunt, Assistant Deputy Minister (Northern Development) on the above-mentioned subject.

Of the 114 students who will be in Churchill next year, approximately 14 will be in the Academic stream and the remaining in the Vocational. Most of the 14 academic students are returnees or/and should graduate by June 1973. Should there be any academic students yet to graduate by 1973, they could easily transfer to Winnipeg to complete their high school education as was the case in the past. Starting this fall, most of the new academic students will be starting in Ottawa or Winnipeg.

The Vocational students present a different story, however, but the problem is not very difficult to solve. At the present time there are occupational high schools in Ottawa and Winnipeg which offer a two-year terminal course quite similar to the vocational course offered in Churchill. Mr. Ralph Ritcey has advised me that the students would have no problem to adjust to this program in the event they were required to transfer to such an occupational high school due to the closure of Churchill schools.

Briefly, I would say that there should not be any major problem for the Arctic Quebec students provided there is a new high school built somewhere in northern Quebec by 1973 or even as late as 1974.

I should mention that during my short stay in this district, the message has been coming through loud and clear that the Eskimo parents prefer to send their children to Churchill, Winnipeg, or Ottawa rather than have them attend schools in southern Quebec.

I personally believe we should not force them to attend a southern Quebec school for the sake of one or two years in view of the fact that a new high school should be built for them within the near future.

Arctic Quebec Students Attending  
School at Churchill, Manitoba.

The selection of students for the Churchill Vocational Centre for the fall term has been completed. The Arctic Quebec District will be sending 114 students to Churchill in September. Sixty-seven of these students are returning for their second and third year of a three year course and will graduate by June 1973. There are 47 new students going to Churchill. It will not be possible for these students to complete a three year course at Churchill as the facilities will be phased out at Fort Churchill in June 1973. This situation was discussed and explained to Mr. Neville by Mr. Davidson at a meeting in Ottawa in February. Mr. Neville stated that at the present time there was no other facility available for these students.

This memorandum is to remind you that with the closing of Fort Churchill, it will not be possible to conduct an education program at Churchill after June 1973. May we please have your comments.
