

The Board recommend that M. Sanderson, a member of the Fairford band of Indians in the province of Manitoba, who has applied for enfranchisement and who has complied with the terms and provisions of Section 122A as added to the Indian Act, Chapter 81, R.S.C. 1906, by Section 6 of Chapter 26, 8-9 George V., be, together with his wife, Mary Ann Sanderson, his minor unmarried sons, Robert Machray Sanderson, Thomas Clifford Sanderson, William Leslie Sanderson, Harvey Aldous Sanderson and Maurice Alan Sanderson, and his minor unmarried daughter Mary Irene Sanderson, declared enfranchised, and that from the date hereof the provisions of the Indian Act or of any other Act making any distinction between the legal rights, privileges, disabilities and liabilities of Indians and those of His Majesty's other subjects shall cease to apply to the said M. Sanderson and his wife and minor unmarried children above referred to, and that he and they shall no longer be deemed Indians within the meaning of laws relating to Indians.

The Board further recommend that authority be given for the payment to the said M. Sanderson of the sum of \$826.40, from Fairford band funds, being total amount of the shares (at \$103.30 each) of the funds due in this case including the principal of the annuities at the credit of the band aforesaid, to which he belongs.

The undersigned begs to report that M. Sanderson, a member of the Fairford band of Indians in the province of Manitoba, has applied for enfranchisement under the terms of Section 122A as added to the Indian Act, Chap. 81, R.S.C. 1906, by Section 6 of Chap. 26, 8-9 George V.

The applicant has established the fact that he holds no land on any Indian reserve, that he does not reside on any Indian reserve, that he does not follow the Indian mode of life and that he is self-supporting and fit to be enfranchised.

He has agreed to accept his share of the funds, including the principal of the annuities, at the credit of the band to which he belongs and in consideration of this share, which amounts to \$826.40 - being at the rate of \$103.30 each for himself and his wife and six minor unmarried children - has surrendered all claims whatsoever to any interest in the lands or property of the band as provided by the said Section 122A.

The undersigned would therefore recommend that Your Excellency in Council be pleased to authorize that the said M. Sanderson and his wife, Mary Ann Sanderson, his minor unmarried sons, Robert Mackray Sanderson, Thomas Clifford Sanderson, William Leslie Sanderson, Harvey Aldous Sanderson, and Maurice Alan Sanderson, and his minor unmarried daughter Mary Irene Sanderson, be herewith declared enfranchised and that from the date of the Order in Council based on this recommendation the provisions of the Indian Act or of any other Act making any distinction between the legal rights, privileges, disabilities and liabilities of Indians and those of His Majesty's other subjects shall cease to apply to the said M. Sanderson and his wife and minor unmarried children above referred to, and that he and they shall no longer be deemed Indians within the meaning of laws relating to Indians.

The undersigned would further recommend that authority be given for the payment to the said M. Sanderson of the above mentioned sum of \$826.40, from Fairford band funds, on the terms herein stated.

Agent Ogletree, of Portage la Prairie, has forwarded the necessary papers, properly completed, in respect of the application for enfranchisement of Rev. A. M. Sanderson, an Anglican Clergyman and at present a member of the Fairford Band of Indians, Manitoba.

This application appears to be entirely in order and is accompanied by the necessary Certificate as to fitness for enfranchisement, signed by Mrs. Sarah E. Vaughan, wife of A. C. Vaughan, Police Magistrate of the Town of Sioux Lookout, in the District of Kenora. Rev. Mr. Sanderson is married, and in addition to his wife there are six minor unmarried children, each and all of whom would be entitled to receive the sum of \$103.30 as their per capita share of the funds of the Band, and in lieu of annuity.

The enfranchisement of this applicant is strongly recommended by Commissioner Graham, who states that Rev. Mr. Sanderson is a fine type of man, enjoying the confidence of his own Bishop and of Archbishop Matheson.

I would, therefore, recommend, subject to your approval, that the necessary memorandum to Council be prepared and submitted.

I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 9th ultimo, requesting information with respect to enfranchisement.

If it is your wish to become enfranchised under section 122A of the Indian Act, I may say that if your application were approved, you would be entitled to receive the sum of \$3.30 as your per capita share of the funds of the Fairford Band, and also the sum of \$100, being the per capita payment in lieu of annuity. If you are married and have any minor, unmarried children, your wife and each child would be entitled to receive the same amount.

If it is your intention to apply for enfranchisement, I would suggest that you do so through the local Indian Agent, to whom the necessary forms will be forwarded upon request.





Sir:—

Some time ago I wrote Mr. Ogletie,
Agent at Postage la Prairie, asking for in-
formation as to the steps I should take in the
matter of enfranchisement, but he wrote back
saying he was not familiar enough with the
Act dealing with enfranchisement, and that
I had better write directly to the Department.
As I understand it, I should be entitled to
a certain amount accruing from the Band
Funds. I should, however, explain first, that I am
a member of the Fairford Band, in the Province
of Manitoba, Band No. 86, I think. What I want
to know is, what amount of money would I be
entitled to of the Band's Funds, if any, and what
amount of land? There are eight in the family, 1 man,
1 woman, 5 boys and 1 girl, the eldest a boy who will
be 18 years of age next month. Will I have to
make application directly with the Agent, and in

presence, and will I have to get someone to
recommend me? I might say that I am a
clergyman of the Church of England, stationed
at Lac Seul, Ontario, in the Diocese of Keewatin.
Will you kindly give me full information
in this matter.
