I know the Minister would want to have your views before approving the final list to be forwarded by Hopper. *concern is much along prefiring lines. He how has*

Hopper suggests that we move as quickly as possible to sound out the following people, all of whom Hopper would like to see on the non-Canadian side of the Board: *names of candidates from Caribbean & will send them to us. h. 2/5*

Dr. Hopper also made the following comments. While Maurice Strong continues to want Mr. Herman Kahn of the United States, Dr. Hopper prefers Dr. John Gardner or Dr. René Dubos. Hopper would prefer to have two Board members from Asia and two from Africa (Senegal and Nigeria). Yet to be decided is the distribution of Board seats to Latin America, the Caribbean and Eastern Europe and which particular individuals should be invited to represent these parts of the world. I have a thick file of biographical material on most of the Canadian and non-Canadian candidates should you wish some additional background information.

We were very interested to learn of your plan to appoint ten international personalities to positions on the Board of Governors of the International Development Research Centre. We also agree that it would be very useful to have a Ghanaian of appropriate standing on the Board.

[redacted] He is a strong personality and a charming and delightful guy, and his relations with this office are extremely good. [redacted] chief concern is to do everything he can to build up the University of Ghana at Legon, to which he is wholeheartedly devoted. [redacted]

3. I also doubt if his background covers as wide a field as you have in mind, "competence and experience of highest international standard in physical or social science, with particular application to problems of underdevelopment". As you can see from the attached biography, Dr. Kwabong is a classicist with several Cambridge degrees and his experience is largely confined to university affairs, in which of course he is highly regarded. At the same time there is criticism in this country that the University of Ghana has been slow to change its model from a classic British academic institute to an institution which will give leadership in solving the economic and social problems of a developing country.

4. Another Ghanaian possibility, who I would recommend much more highly, is Mr. E. N. Omaboe, the former Commissioner for Economic Affairs. Mr. Omaboe is, of course, well known to you as he was the Commissioner responsible for most aid matters throughout the NLC regime. He is an extremely competent and brilliant man and was one of the most valuable members of the former government. His experience as Commissioner for Economic Affairs, the chief planning organization in Ghana, and his frequent attendances at World Bank, United Nations and other international meetings would qualify him as an international

personality. He is at present on a year's lectureship at Howard University in the United States. I attach a short biography. He has set up a firm of business investment and economic consultants in Accra, E.N. Ombaoe Associates Limited, to which he will presumably return next summer. He has also been made a Director of Barclays Bank, DCO, Ghana. I do not know of any reason why Mr. Ombaoe's candidature would not be acceptable to the Ghana Government, but this would have to be explored.

5. I assume that you have thought of Mr. A.L. Adu, Deputy Secretary General of the Commonwealth Secretariat in London. Mr. Adu is still very highly thought of in Ghana and his wide international experience, including his present post, might make him an excellent candidate, but perhaps the nature of his present position would exclude him.

6. If you will also be looking for staff members of the Centre, you might do well to consider Mr. H.A. (Harry) Nelson, the former Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of Economic Affairs, under Mr. Ombaoe, who is highly intelligent and has wide experience in problems of development. He is at present taking a year off for studies at Harvard and will presumably be looking for some international position as he is probably regarded by the present Ghana Government as having been too close to the Nkrumah regime, although he survived successfully under the NLC.

BIOGRAPHY OF PROFESSOR A.A. KWAPONG

Appointed a member of the Political Committee and chairman of the Education Review Committee to advise the new regime after the 1966 coup, Professor Alex Kwapong, then aged 39, is Vice-Chancellor of the University of Ghana.

A much respected academic, he received his early education at the Presbyterian junior and middle schools at Akropong and at Achimota College.

He took a BA degree in classics at King's College, Cambridge, with Summa cum Laude, 1948-53. He took his MA and PhD degrees externally from the same university. He became a visiting professor at Princeton University 1962-62. Before being appointed Vice-Chancellor at the University of Ghana he was Pro Vice-Chancellor and head of the Classics department.

BIOGRAPHY OF MR. E. N. OMABOE

Emanuel N. Omaboe was 35, and the youngest member of the team, when appointed chairman of the seven-man National Economic Committee immediately after the 1966 coup. (The oldest member of this task force charged with the responsibility of leading Ghana back to solvency was only 41.)

Mr. Omaboe was the Government statistician under Dr. Nkrumah. His annual economic reviews were illuminating and also very blunt and critical. He regularly drew attention to their disastrous economic policy, especially high expenditures and the inefficient and illogical operation of import currency controls.

After the coup he said that all the facts in 'the chaotic situation' in the Ghana economy were made known to the old regime. An independent observer commented on one occasion 'Nobody in the Nkrumah Government took any notice of Mr. Omaboe's reviews. The surprising thing is that they were ever published.'

It was said that many men had been detained for lesser 'offences' than Mr. Omaboe had committed. The National Liberation Council gave him almost carte blanche to put into operation the advice which had for so long fallen on deaf ears.

When appointed to the National Economic Committee, Mr. Omaboe estimated that Ghana, with a national debt of over £400 m sterling,

needed £15 m short-term aid to help overcome her economic difficulties. His immediate problem was to work out a payment schedule by which Ghana hoped to wipe out the great external debt left by the former regime.

Born the son of an Accra goldsmith, he was educated at Legon University before going to the London School of Economics to take a first. He returned to the University of Ghana for a brief period of research and joined the Civil Service in 1959. Besides his statistical work he is also responsible for Ghana's census.

I AM HANDICAPPED IN COMMENTING ON YOUR REFTL BY LACK OF KNOWLEDGE OF ROLE OF BOARD OF GOVERNORS IN PROJECTED CENTRE. BUT NO/NO MATTER WHAT ROLE IT IS INTENDED TO PLAY PRESENCE OF SOVIET GOVT OFFICIALS ON IT SEEMS AT VERY LEAST SOMEWHAT ODD.

2. RUSSIANS HAVE SELDOM IF EVER SUPPORTED IDEA OF INNATL APPROACH TO AID, DEVELOPMENT OR RESEARCH AND NOTHING IN LAST YEAR HAS POINTED TO ANY ALTERATION IN THEIR ATTITUDE. WHAT SOVIET MEMBER OF BOARD OF GOVERNORS COULD CONTRIBUTE THEREFORE REMAINS HIGHLY SPECULATIVE. WHAT THEY WOULD ALMOST CERTAINLY DO IS ATTEMPT TO NEGATE ANY WORK OF CENTRE WHICH RAN CONTRARY TO ACCEPTED SOVIET GOVT POLICIES.

3. IF NEVERTHELESS YOU PROPOSE TO INCLUDE A RUSSIAN IN GROUP TO BE CONSIDERED FOR BOARD OF GOVERNORS TWO YOU MENTION ARE ABLE AND QUALIFIED. I WOULD PREFER GVISHIANI BECAUSE OF HIS GREATER FLEXIBILITY AND MORE MODERN APPROACH TO ECONOMIC AND SOCIAL PROBLEMS. MILLIONSHIKOV IS MORE A POLICEMAN AND HIS RANGE OF INTERESTS LIMITED.

3. A corporation is hereby established to be called the International Development Research Centre consisting of a Board of Governors that is composed of a Chairman, President and not more than nineteen other governors to be appointed as provided in section 5.

(a) to enlist the talents of natural and social scientists and technologists of Canada and other countries;

(b) to assist the developing regions to build up the research capabilities, the innovative skills and the institutions required to solve their problems;

(c) to encourage generally the coordination of international development research; and

(d) to foster cooperation in research on development problems between the developed and developing regions for their mutual benefit.

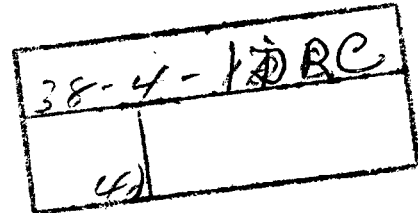

Dr. Odhiambo is known to this office partly through social contact, and partly by reputation. We have not had occasion to do business with him.

2. There is no doubt that Dr. Odhiambo, both intellectually and academically, is of the highest international standard. This would place him in a mere handful of such people from East Africa, and we can think of only one other person in Nairobi whom we would rate equal. This would be Professor Bethwell A. Ogot, a historian at University College, Nairobi. The latter is a good friend of Odhiambo's - both are Luo - and both were close friends of Tom Mboya.

3. Dr. Odhiambo was born near Kisumu in Western Kenya about 1933 and received his early education at local schools. He took his first degree at Makerere College, Kampala, where he obtained his B.A. in 1953. He went to Cambridge where he did his M.A. and Ph.D. in Zoology. Professor G.R. Lowther, another Cambridge graduate who has served here under your auspices, has quoted Odhiambo's Cambridge teachers as saying that his degree was one of the best they had ever granted in his field, Entomology. Dr. Odhiambo is now serving as Reader in the Department of Zoology at University College, Nairobi. In addition to his teaching, he is currently engaging in basic research on the tsetse fly. We are not qualified to assess the value of his work, but we hear favourable opinions of it, and the fly has considerable relevance to development in East Africa. We are attaching a complete academic curriculum vitae which is up-to-date since it has been prepared for his consideration for the post of full Professor at an Academic Board meeting January 10. It is a rather impressive record.

4. Dr. Odhiambo is engaged in a number of areas outside the University. The East African Academy is one of them, and his association with this organization is outlined on page 5 of his curriculum vitae. In addition, he is intimately involved in the planning now going on to establish an international research centre for entomology in Kenya. This is to be established under "Foundation" auspices, and will be separate from the University. On a more popular level, Dr. Odhiambo is editing a new scientific periodical "African Scientist", which seems to us a promising and valuable publication. We are attaching the first issue of this periodical since we think his foreword gives some measure of the man and his thoughts, and shows clearly that his interests go well beyond bugs. Apart from his abilities, achievements and activities,

5. We see no reason why the Kenya Government would have any objection to your asking Dr. Odhiambo to serve on the Board of Governors of the Development Research Centre. While he was a friend of Mboya's, he has never, to our knowledge, been visibly or actively involved in politics.

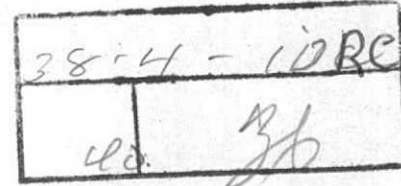

We made a brief report earlier on the establishment of the above institute, and the appointment of Professor Thorkil Kristensen as its Director-General.

2. We called informally at the institute in its new premises this week and, as expected, we found that it is just getting settled into its new quarters and therefore their operations are really only in the formative stages. Nonetheless, our informal visit seemed to be welcome and we propose to repeat the call at a later date in case there is any documentation etc. we could usefully forward to you. In the meantime we were given the enclosed "Information Sheet" which is the only printed material on their establishment and organization which they have available so far.

3. The Director of Research is absent in Africa and it was suggested that we could make contact with him on return, or direct with Mr. Kristensen if we so wished. As we did not have anything specific to discuss with Mr. Kristensen, we decided not to seek an appointment at this stage.

4. Incidentally, Professor Kristensen has also been named President of the Academy for Future Research, which does not share the same offices as the Development Research Institute, but is close by. We called at their new address but they are not even at the stage of moving in to their new quarters.

The Institute for Development Research was established in 1969 to undertake, promote and publish research into the economic and social development of the developing countries, including investigation and evaluation of the development assistance of Denmark and other countries.

The Institute is an independent institution governed by a research council of 20 members representing the universities, other academic institutions in Denmark and the Board and Secretariat of Technical Co-operation with Developing Countries. The Research Council of the Institute met for the first time in March, 1969.

The Institute receives an annual grant from the Danish Government of approx. 1.4 mill. Danish kroner allowing for a staff of 1 director, 6 full-time and 4 part-time research workers, 1 librarian, research assistants and other supporting staff. Of the annual grant approx. 70,000 Danish kroner is allocated to acquisitions to the research library of the Institute.

The Institute has taken the first steps to formulate its research programme. The programme will be of a multidisciplinary character relating mainly to the five countries in Eastern Africa (Uganda, Kenya, Tanzania, Zambia, Malawi), and to Ghana, India, Pakistan, and Thailand.

Work has started on the following projects:

- an investigation of livestock problems in the tropics in relation to Danish assistance in this field;

- an analysis of the interrelationships between private business enterprises in Denmark and the developing countries;

- a study of development planning in East Africa;

- The construction of a national research programme in Tanzania (jointly with the Ministry of Economic Affairs and Development Planning, Tanzania);

- a survey of the economic and social development of Thailand;

- an analysis of the cultural development and cultural policy in one or more African states.

The following projects are under consideration:

- an overall study of the co-operative development project in Comilla in East Pakistan;

- a survey of the development problems of a subnational region in Eastern Africa;

- participation in research related to the rural development policy of Tanzania.

The Institute conducts shorter courses and seminars on the problems of the developing countries.

The Institute intends to publish its research papers and studies in English and to publish a quarterly journal in Danish.

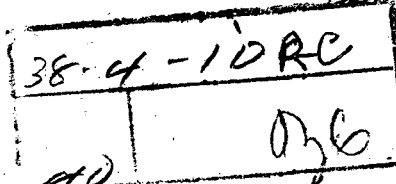

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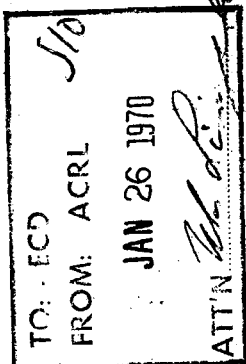

In your telegramme under reference you told us that you were considering Mr. Kemal Kurdaş former rector of the Middle East Technical university (not, incidentally, the University of Ankara) as a candidate for one of the positions on the Board of Governors of the projected centre. We attach a curriculum vitae of Mr. Kurdaş. To compile such information without generating too much curiosity we have had to ask the American Embassy for help. They gave us a biography dating from the 1960 revolution when Mr. Kurdaş was made Minister of Finance in an essentially technocratic government by the National Unity Committee, the army officers who unseated the Menderes regime. We have added bits and pieces of our own information but, as enquiries were necessarily proscribed, we unfortunately could not provide full details.

2. We checked our impressions of Mr. Kurdaş against those of the American AID office here. The Americans have a very high regard for him. He has had international experience with the Monetary Fund. He is bright and dynamic. He showed himself to be very competent at fund-raising for his university. Despite the problems he encountered, particularly in the last year or two of his tenure, from radical student groups, he can take credit for having presided over and advanced the standing of a first-rate institution.

3. There is no doubt that Kurdaş springs immediately to mind as the leading prospect when one considers which Turks might qualify for the Board of Governors of the projected centre. That would certainly be the American view. We would not seriously dissent from their judgment and we knew him a good deal less well than they do.

4. The only other man whom we would suggest, with equal confidence, is Mr. Bulent Yazici. He enjoys a very good reputation as a banker. He was formerly the Director-General of Turkey's largest bank and is now Chairman of the Turkish Industrial Development Bank. The latter position puts him at the confluence of private initiative and governmental policy in the development of Turkish industry. He takes many policy decisions which have wide relevance to the expansion of the Turkish economy. He is very highly regarded in Turkey as an economist and he knows the problems and pitfalls of development. He speaks very good English. We believe that he would probably find time to sit on the Board of Governors of the proposed centre if he were selected.

KEMAL KURDAS

Mr. Kurdaş resigned from the Rectorship of the Middle East Technical University on November 30, 1969. He had held that position since 1961. Prior to that he had been Minister of Finance in the National Unity Committee government. From 1956 until 1960 he had served as an economist with the International Monetary Fund. He worked in Washington, Indonesia, and Paraguay for the IMF. He had previously resigned his position of Assistant Director-General of the Treasury of the Ministry of Finance in 1955 because of differences of opinion with the Menderes government on economic policy.

Mr. Kurdaş was born in Bursa May 2, 1920. He graduated from the Political Science Faculty of Ankara University in 1943. He joined the Ministry of Finance the following year and remained there until he resigned in 1955, except for a short period when he completed his mandatory military service.

Although not a trained economist he acquired a knowledge of the subject by study and practice and is generally highly regarded in this field. IMF officials are said to have considered that he had an expert knowledge of foreign exchange systems and of the practical operation of the monetary system of a country.

Mr. Kurdaş is married with children. He speaks English well and has studied Spanish. Mrs. Kurdaş has a fair knowledge of English.

We note that our Ambassador in Tokyo has endorsed CIDA's suggestion that Dr. Saburo Okita, Director of the Japan Economic Research Centre in Tokyo, be considered as a possible candidate for the Board of Governors of the International Development Research Centre. In view of Dr. Okita's earlier service on the Pearson Commission he would appear to be a logical candidate. It is clearly desirable for Japan as the only developed non-Western country and a major economic power in its own right to be represented on the Board, despite the fact that it has not produced many internationally known development economists. There is in Japan a sharp division between academic economists and those associated with government and business and Dr. Okita, who is a former government official, falls very definitely into the second category; in addition the Japan Economic Research Centre has very close ties with Japanese industry which provides much of its financial support.

2. It is rather striking that CIDA's list contains no less than five Africans, three Latin Americans and three representatives of the Commonwealth Caribbean while Dr. Okita appears to be the only Asian being considered for the Board of Governors. Without striving for exact geographic balance it does strike us that some additional representation should be considered from Asia, a continent whose development problems are surely unique. In particular consideration might be given to a nominee from one of the economically more successful countries of Southeast Asia, i.e. Singapore, Malaysia or Thailand. The first two are not our responsibility but in the case of Thailand one name which comes to mind is that of Dr. Puey Ungphakorn.

3. Another possibility which might be considered would be of someone connected with the Asian Development Bank, though it is unfortunate that the President of ADB, Dr. Hatanabe, happens also to be Japanese. A possible alternative might be U Hyun, Executive Secretary of ECAFE.

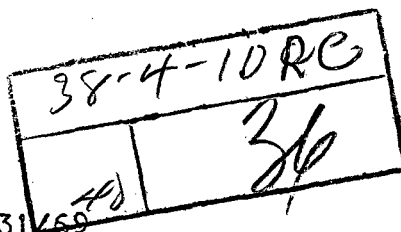

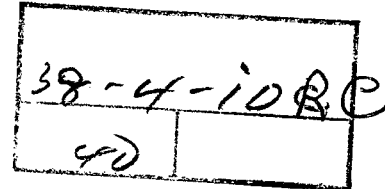

As you know from our telephone conversation earlier this week, this Division was surprised to note that CIDA had not sent their telegram PRI5001 of December 31 to any Canadian missions in South or Southeast Asia apart from Tokyo or proposed any possible candidates from this area for the Board of Governors of the IDRC. It is my understanding, from our conversations, that the list of possible candidates named to date by CIDA is not exhaustive and that they will be putting forward more names and consulting the appropriate posts.

2. An adequate geographical distribution of representatives from foreign countries, who will sit on the Board of the IDRA, is highly desirable if the Centre is to have relatively quick acceptance by the developing countries for whom it is presumably meant to serve. Otherwise the acceptance the Centre receives will come more slowly as a result of actual performance assuming that it will be successful. As well over half of the present Canadian development assistance is directed to South and Southeast Asia (Pakistan, India, Ceylon, Malaysia, Thailand, Singapore, Vietnam, Indonesia, Phillipines to name some) it is reasonable to expect that one or perhaps two representatives from this area should be on the Board to give it proper balance in terms of area needs and Canadian assistance. Should CIDA not have specific Candidates in mind it would be useful to ask our missions in the area, for suggestions.

3. We hope that there will be further consultations with the political divisions before the final selection of Board members is made. This Division would be pleased to send a representative to a meeting to discuss this subject should one be organized.

4. Of those individuals suggested from areas of interest to this Division, we think Lady Jackson from Britain and Sir Arthur Lewis from the Caribbean would be most suitable.

We appreciate the opportunity to comment on the question of foreign candidates for the Board of Governors of the IDRC. Apart from the obvious comment that there should be some geographical balance among the foreign members, we should like to suggest attention to the concept of balancing French- and English-speaking members so far as African representation might be concerned. We note that there are three candidates on the initial list from English-speaking Africa and only one from Francophone Africa. Since the number of foreign members of the Board will presumably not be large, it might be sufficient to have one from each of these areas.

2. The candidate listed for Dakar is competent and highly regarded amongst francophone African leaders and business circles. The East African candidate is not known to members of this Division. We have noted Mr. Hicks' comments on the Ghanaian candidate (his letter CIDA-7 of January 8) and would support his suggestion that serious consideration be given to the selection of Mr. E.N. Gmaboe, in preference to Mr. Kwabong. As to the other candidates themselves, we have no specific comments to offer.

Pursuant to the discussion at the meeting with Dr. Peters in your office on February 6 and in anticipation of the further conversation you expect to have with him, we are now responding to the request in your memorandum of January 7 for comments on the names of candidates for the Board of Governors of the IDRC, other possible candidates and general political considerations.

2. CIDA will have received the comments of our Embassies in Argentina, Chile and Mexico on the four possible candidates about whom these missions were consulted. These were A. Deulafeu, a distinguished Argentine chemist; J. Sabato, Director of Technology in the Argentine National Commission for Atomic Energy; Raoul Saez, recently Minister of Finance in the Government of Chile and now head of the Electric Corporation of Chile; and Victor Urquidí, a distinguished economist and President of the Colegio de Mexico. (In the case of Mr. Saez the Embassy sent a brief telegram but also referred to a telegram and letter about Mr. Saez which had been sent in February, 1968; we assume that ECD is ensuring that CIDA has copies of these communications.)

3. The only one of the four possible candidates mentioned above of whom we have direct knowledge is Mr. Urquidí. While we have no reason to think that the others would not be eminently suitable, we can certainly recommend Mr. Urquidí as an enlightened economist who should be quite well attuned to the objectives of the IDRC. While we do not think he would be unsympathetic to original thinking about the development problems of Latin America, we believe that he would be disposed to appraise possible projects very much in terms of their economic practicability.

4. The only additional name that we would like seriously to advance at this stage is that of Raul Prebisch, the distinguished Argentine economist who for many years has played a prominent part not only in studies of Latin American economic development problems but also in the work of UNCTAD. He is now Director General of the Latin American Institute of Economic and Social Planning. His name was mentioned by our Embassy in Buenos Aires.

5. At some stage in the IDRC's evolution we think it would be desirable for a Latin American member of the Board of Governors to be drawn from the Brazilian academic or administrative stream. Names which come to mind are Roberto Campos, a former Finance Minister who was responsible for the "tough line" economic policies of the Castello-Branco government but who is no longer in government service and who was a member of the Commission on International Development; and Celso Furtado, perhaps the best known Brazilian economist but who is out of favour with the present regime and who, we understand, has been teaching at Harvard since 1964. (Mr. Furtado would probably be a little "too rich" for the present government of Brazil.) Perhaps, when the first rotation in the Board takes place, consideration could be given to nomination of a Brazilian.
6. Apart from a certain inclination to favour Mr. Urquidí (which may simply reflect the fact that we know him and have confidence in him), we have no very strong preferences among the possible candidates mentioned above. The main political consideration which we think requires some attention is somewhat complex. On the one hand (especially since it is the Governor-in-Council who appoints the members of the Board of Governors), it would clearly be undesirable to appoint an individual who was really a persona non grata to the government of his own country or who, for some other reason, was not well regarded by the governments of several Latin American countries. On the other hand, if the Centre is to be truly scientific in its research into the development needs of Latin America and the appropriate techniques for dealing with them, it should not be seriously harmed by political considerations. In concrete terms this might mean that it should establish a dialogue not only with established universities in Latin America or with institutions sponsored by the OAS but also with other research institutions with an established and legitimate interest in Latin American development problems. The one which most readily comes to mind and which would not create any political difficulties is ECIA. On the other hand, there might be a good deal to be learned from consultation with such institutions as the Centre for Documentation (CIDOC) in Cuernavaca, Mexico, headed by Monsenor Ivan Illich; DESAL, situated in Santiago, Chile, and headed by the equally controversial Father Vekemans (a Belgian priest); and the International Development Research Centre in Paris, which is headed by the exiled Brazilian Josué de Castro. In this connection you might like to look at Chapter 1 of Part II of the draft Report of the Latin American Task Force, which indicates the task force's thinking about the kind of research in the Latin American field which the IDRC might carry out. The operative part of this chapter is being revised to take account of CIDA's comment that the IDRC itself would have in due course to establish its own priorities and decide whether or not to give some precedence to research in the Latin American area; nevertheless the draft chapter may be of some relevance to the point discussed in this paragraph.

You will no doubt recall that our telegram under reference, contained a brief biography of Lord P.M.S. Blackett who we understand you are considering as a possible overseas member of the Board of Governors of the new I.D.R.C.

2. As a further indication of Lord Blackett's deep interest in and commitment to overseas aid and development, we thought you might be interested in the attached text of his maiden speech in the House of Lords on March 4 during a debate especially arranged to discuss the Pearson and Jackson Reports. Perhaps the most significant aspect of this intervention was the fact that Lord Blackett deliberately chose this occasion to make his maiden speech in the House of Lords, when he might well have been expected to choose a debate on a primarily scientific subject for this purpose. While Lord Blackett naturally touched on the role of science and technology in the development process, his brief remarks dealt with much broader aspects of the subject, drawing particularly on his long-standing and close acquaintance with Indian problems. It remains only to add that this speech was generally considered by Lord Blackett's colleagues in the Lords to have been the high point of what was generally a very impressive and informed debate, a view eloquently expressed by Lord Fulton in his summing-up when he referred to the opportunity this provided "to see a rare but very moving phenomenon - a scientific mind of the highest quality at work in the service of a merciful heart".

[The Bishop of Chichester.] inspired by some imaginative lead; but at the same time there is a general public which is probably indifferent, and certainly very often irritated by what it hears or reads, by thoughts of waste or of ingratitude, and the like. It is greatly to be hoped that this kind of situation will not ever be aggravated by becoming a Party issue.

There is certainly a strong moral aspect—the sheer fact of human need and inequality. I hope that this will be stated strongly, and as strongly as needed for us to face its consequences. It is a question of will. But it would be unwise to promise too much, either in results or in response to our own results. It is true that neglect, or inadequate response, will lead to a further disparity between nations which will be ultimately disastrous—if not for us, for our successors. It is also true that increased aid will no doubt redound, in a process of exchange, to the prosperity both of donor and of recipient. But it would be unwise to suggest, as some people do, that development will automatically bring peace. It may, in fact, bring a sword, or at least disturbance. The growth to maturity in any nation will be accompanied by some turbulence, and all the more so if that material improvement is not properly passed on or transferred equitably to the mass of people in the country.

Do we not need at this juncture, in the beginning of a new decade, to stress particularly the creative aspect of this subject, as the noble Lord, Lord Fulton, so rightly did at the beginning? What is really meant by development? It implies much more than material advance. It means helping nations to grow up and to become themselves. It requires greater sensitivity to national traditions, to their own particular circumstances, their educational needs, their inter-racial relationships and so on. It means, in fact, a new kind of world in the making. Therefore, the question is whether our individual nations have really begun yet to shape our thinking towards the world which I suppose our sons will have to inherit. This perhaps is one of the most important aspects of both Reports: their common emphasis on the international framework of development. We must take to heart the criticism of the present organisation; its haphazard growth. Perhaps it is good

that the Jackson Report should comment so caustically on the cumbersome machine “becoming slower and more unwieldy like some prehistoric monster”.

This raises the critical question: is development genuinely a world concern, genuinely the responsibility of the nations together, rather than a by-product of the *raison d'être* of the United Nations? If I understand the Jackson Report correctly, it sees the United Nations system itself at the cross-roads. Let it reorganise itself to lead in development strategy, or else it will phase itself out and the World Bank, or something else, will take over. If that is true, then indeed I think it is not the United Nations only at the cross-roads, it is something more: the relationships of nations themselves, the kind of structure which the world is going to have in the future, that, too, is at stake. Ultimately, there would be a danger that we should lose through this an opportunity to unite nations collectively in their own mutual welfare.

This could, as I stressed, be a creative moment—not for the better development of the third world, but for the future of the United Nations and the nations who are its members. As the Jackson Report says, it will depend upon the determination of heads of Government, with their Ministers of Foreign Affairs and Finance. I hope we may hear more from the Minister who will reply of the response of our Government to this, and how far they are prepared to take initiatives in this second decade to make it a stage of positive fulfilment.

LORD BLACKETT: My Lords, I ought to start by asking the indulgence of your Lordships' House for this my maiden speech. I, like all of your Lordships, am very indebted to my noble friend Lord Fulton for initiating this debate. Among other things, it has given me the chance to make my maiden speech on a subject that is not only of great importance in the world but one which I am sincere and committed about.

Since many noble Lords have spoken and covered many aspects of the various reports—the *Pearson Report*, the *Jackson Report*, and the *Second Development Decade*—it is left to me to make only a few comments on a few subjects that are of special interest to me. May I say that

my country with the Third World was in 1947. When I went to a scientific conference in India. Since then I have been many times, and to many other developing countries, and this has given me some appreciation of the problems of countries where the personal income per head is only about 90 dollars a year, compared with 1,800 dollars in Great Britain—20 to one. It is difficult to visualise that, but the figures are very important. Moreover, both developed countries and undeveloped countries are increasing fairly fast, about 5 per cent. a year, and this means that the increase of income and wealth of a Briton—any of us here to-day—is more than the actual income per annum of an Indian. Our yearly increase in wealth is as much as their wealth altogether, and this is a devastating fact.

I am completely convinced that this problem of the widening gap—and it is widening—is the second most important problem in the world. The first, of course, is to ensure that the developed industrialised nations do not destroy themselves, and perhaps the rest of the world, by nuclear war. But if, as I believe, it is reasonable to assume that mankind is sensible and sane enough to avoid that catastrophe, then I think the gap between the rich and the poor countries becomes problem number one in the world to-day. Because of this, I welcome very sincerely the Lester Pearson Report. I share the great enthusiasm expressed for it, and I agree that for lucidity, comprehensiveness and moral force it stands very high. Its publication was well-timed and it admirably takes account of political realities at the present time.

There is one aspect of this subject about which I am not going to talk in detail, because several noble Lords have already discussed it, but I would refer to it. That is the controversy over the British contribution to the Lester Pearson target of 1 per cent. of G.N.P. by 1975. I want to add to the views expressed by many others and to say that I regret that Her Majesty's Government have not yet found it possible to commit themselves quite firmly to the Lester Pearson target. However, there is plenty of time for that target to be reached; and if the will of the people and the Government is strong enough, it can be done. I venture to hope that to-day's debate will

help to produce—perhaps in a small yet still appreciable way—a climate of opinion which will ease the Government's task of finding the resources to commit themselves fully to the Lester Pearson plan.

Apart from that, I hope, short period issue, I am proud of the British record for aid. Moreover, I believe that the Ministry of Overseas Development—the only one in the world, as we have heard to-day—is a very efficient organisation, and distributes both wisely and efficiently the financial resources that are made available to it. Having said that, I must emphasise that the vital problem of the economic development of the underdeveloped countries can only be solved over decades. As the Report emphasised, there is no such thing as “instant development”. In the world of development politics a decade is a short time.

In 1967 there were 15 main donor countries, with a population of 600 million and an average income per head of 2,500 dollars a year. Then there were 28 main recipient countries—these are the D.A.C. specifications—with a population of 1,600 million and an average income per head of 150 dollars a year. The total income of the 15 donor countries was thus six times that of the 28 recipient countries. It follows that the Pearson target, of 1 per cent. of G.N.P. for the total transfer of resources from the 15 donor countries, amounts to 6 per cent. of the G.N.P. of the 28 recipient countries. It is this far greater average income per head of the developed, compared with the developing countries, which makes it possible for the donor countries to aid decisively the economic and social development of the recipient countries at a relatively small real cost to themselves. Two years ago the annual flow of external resources from the donor countries amounted to 12 billion dollars, which gives an average of 7 dollars a head in the recipient countries. So that this wonderful aid programme succeeded in getting only 7 dollars per head to the developing countries.

It is pointed out in the Lester Pearson Report, that this flow of resources is very unevenly distributed among the recipient countries, with no coherent pattern. For instance, it points out that the total flow of resources to India is the biggest to

any one country, but because of her large population of 500 million the amount of aid per head is among the smallest; in fact, only 4 dollars per year per head. The Report also points out that India would get five times as much aid as she does now, if she received the same amount per head as Chile. It adds that there seems to be some sort of objection to taking fully into account the population of a country in the distribution of aid, and calls this attitude one of the least sensible and defensible aspects of the present aid policy.

The Report contains a valuable section on the prospects of economic growth in India, and ends with the following important paragraph:

"If, however, India could be assured of a steady flow of resources at twice the present annual *net* flow (i.e. \$2 billion instead of the present \$1 billion . . .) it would mean: (1) an increase in the growth rate of about 1 per cent a year; . . . If one concedes that development of low-income countries is important and that India is a major test, it is hard to imagine a more important and rewarding investment."

For many reasons this seems to me a very important statement. It emphasises that India is in a position to absorb a much larger flow of external resources than she is now getting. Then it implies that an extra investment of 2 per cent. of the G.N.P. of India should produce an extra economic growth rate of about 1 per cent. a year.

The Report does not give any details of how this calculation was made, but if this result—that an extra 2 per cent. of the G.N.P. invested should produce an extra 1 per cent. of growth—is of general application to sophisticated developing countries, then a very important conclusion follows. That is that aid to the amount of 1 per cent. of the G.N.P. of the rich donor countries—that is 6 per cent. of the G.N.P. of the poor countries—should allow an extra 3 per cent. a year growth rate in the recipient countries. This would really begin to touch the problem of the relative wealth gap. If these figures given by the Lester Pearson Report are correct and generally valid, it is clear that additional aid to developing countries with sophisticated administration really pays handsomely in promoting economic growth.

One must not forget that India, together with most other experienced developing

countries, finances far the greatest part of its investment out of its own internal sources. At the moment, aid usually does not contribute much more than 10 per cent. of total investment, so they are doing a great deal internally. When one remembers also that India is much the largest country in the world operating a Parliamentary system, and has already made important steps in economic development, then one feels that the main aid-giving nations should give higher priority for aid to India than they have done in the past.

It is clear that economic growth in a less developed country is dependent on investment, just as it is in a developed country. It is very important to remember this when one is concerned with science and technology. For there is always a danger that the enthusiastic scientist or technologist may give the impression that modern science and technology can be waved like a magic wand over a poor country to make it into a rich one. Of course no one believes this, but there are quite a number of people who seem to act as if it were true.

Modern science and technology can add to wealth only when they are incorporated in better or cheaper material goods or services. Merely knowing how to do something does not add to wealth. Only when something useful is done is wealth created, and for this to occur capital must be invested. In fact, in a very direct way the application of modern science and technology to a developing country is limited by the amount of available investment capital, and therefore to a large extent by the amount of aid. Thus scientists and technologists who want to see their wonderful achievements used for the benefit of humanity must concern themselves with social, economic and financial matters, including the problem of investment and the flow of resources from the rich to the poor countries.

To see the intimate connection between economic growth and unemployment on the one hand, and science and technology on the other, consider, my Lords, one of the many countries with an income per head around 100 dollars—Kenya, India and many others. A reasonable maximum amount of investment which could be made available for manufacturing industry in such a country might be 5 per

cent income per head ; that is, 5 dollars per year per head. One cannot buy a great deal of modern production equipment embodying modern science and technology for an investment of 5 dollars per year per head.

In the industry of an advanced country like our own there will be found a big range in the cost of capital equipment per man employed, from a few dollars for the tools of a jobbing gardener to the 100,000 dollars per man in a modern chemical plant. An average figure might be 5,000 dollars of capital for one work place. The figure is not so very different in the developed or developing countries, because most of the equipment has to come from the developed countries. Investment in technologically advanced production goods tends to increase productivity, but it also provides little employment. So, for a given available investment, the need to create adequate employment sets a sharp limit to the use of modern, advanced technology. The Report emphasises that what is required is a spectrum of investment projects, ranging from very labour-intensive to very capital-intensive. The more aid that is available, the more use can be made of advanced technology.

I want now to say a word about the "green revolution". The noble Lord, Lord Fulton, has already mentioned it, and, of course, it is at the back of everybody's mind in this context. One of the most striking examples of research and development applied to developing countries is the breeding of new high-yield varieties of wheat and rice. These have been developed mainly in Mexico and the Philippines by the Ford and Rockefeller Foundations over a decade or so. The resulting big increases of yield, when they are used in large quantities in India, Pakistan, Turkey and other countries, are very striking indeed, and have led to this phrase, the "green revolution".

At first sight, this "green revolution" should allow for a rapid increase in the speed of general economic advance at a very low cost in investment. However, this is only partially true, because of the need for water, fertilisers, pesticides, electric power, transport, storage facilities, education and monetary credit—all of which must be provided. So this agricultural revolution demands an industrial one as well, including profound internal social changes, and so demands a great

deal of capital investment. So even the "green revolution" does not provide instant development.

At present, India consumes annually some 2 million tons of nutrient fertilisers, and the eventual need will certainly be much higher—more like 10 million tons. If the fertiliser is imported, then they use a very large amount of foreign exchange. But if it is produced in India, it requires a very heavy expenditure of capital. Both methods are largely dependant on aid, rather than on more research and development. The technological developments have been done in the advanced countries. The fertiliser plants are there to be bought or to be erected. What is wanted is not science and development: what is wanted is capital and investment. This is true of very large fields of modern technology. When one comes down to it, the limitation is the shortage of investment. Even in this country that is true, too.

Returning to the wider aspects of the Report, it seems to me that the real difficulty is that it appears to aim only at the objective of stopping the present widening of the relative gap of 20 to 1, rather than at the objective of starting to reduce the ratio. At present, the economic growth rates of the G.N.P. of both developed and developing countries are nearly the same, at 5 per cent. This is a great achievement of the part of the developing countries, and much credit is due to the developed countries in the aid they have given. So this is a great achievement on the part of both the poor and the rich countries. The population rise of the developing countries is about 1 per cent. higher than that of the developed countries, so making the growth of the income 1 per cent. lower.

The Pearson target envisages an increase in the growth rate of the poor countries of 1 per cent.—that is, from 5 per cent. to 6 per cent.—during the 1970s. This would be just sufficient to bring the rate of increase of the G.N.P., *per capita* of the less developed countries, into line with that of the developed countries, thus preventing the present 20 to 1 ratio of relative income per head from widening. But the stated target is not enough to start reducing the present ratio.

Looking ahead, it seems desirable that another study should be made in a few years' time, with the explicit object of

inquiring how one can envisage beginning to close the relative income gap. Admittedly, the task will be a formidable one. For instance, to close the relative gap from the present 20 to 1 to 10 to 1 in, say, 40 years, implies that the *per capita* growth rate of the G.N.P. of the less developed countries must be 2 per cent. higher than that of the developed countries. Unless something like this rate of growth is achieved in the developing countries, the gap will widen and we shall bequeath to future generations a still more divided and still more dangerous world. I thank your Lordships for your attention.

LORD GLADWYN: My Lords, I am indeed happy that it falls to me to congratulate the noble Lord, Lord Blackett, on an excellent maiden speech which I am sure all your Lordships will agree is worthy of the President of the Royal Society, a Nobel Prize Winner and a holder of the American Medal for Merit, but which also possessed, I feel, a human quality which I know this House will be the first to appreciate. Now that the noble Lord has, as it were, taken the plunge and has, so to speak, joined the club, I hope that we shall increasingly hear from him, and that he will increasingly intervene not only in specialised debates but also in great matters of policy, on which again we shall very much look forward to hearing his opinions.

I propose to intervene for only a very few minutes to call attention to a form of aid which I believe has to some extent been neglected in this country. This is perhaps all the more surprising because it is a form of aid which involves no strain on our balance of payments. I refer to the position of overseas students, on whose behalf, as your Lordships will perhaps recollect, I took up the cudgels over three years ago in this House when, as I thought quite misguidedly, the Government increased the fees which these students pay, which resulted, I fear, in a substantial decrease in the number of unsubsidised students from many of the developing countries and, of course, more especially from countries of the Commonwealth. I know that the noble Lord, Lord Fulton, dealt at some length with the general problem of education in its relation to aid, and I know that the right

reverend Prelate the Bishop of Chichester also mentioned one aspect of overseas students' affairs, but I propose, if I may, to dwell on a rather specialised aspect of this great question.

Before I do so, perhaps I might say that, as your Lordships are aware, nobody could be keener on creating some kind of new political entity or community, call it what you will, in Western Europe than I am, but that does not mean that I am concerned solely with the position of European students in the United Kingdom. Of course not. On the contrary, I believe that if we ever succeed in extending the present European Economic Community of the Six so as to include this country and the other candidates, we have an excellent chance, and perhaps the only real chance, of developing a common European policy as regards students from the developing countries, which would be part and parcel of some major and streamlined European form of aid as a whole.

To come, then, to details as regards the present position, as we all know since 1945 there has been a steady flow of young people to this country for the purposes of study. They have come from the developed countries of Europe, chiefly to learn that modern *lingua franca*, which is the English language; but they have come from the developing world, and chiefly from the Commonwealth countries, to acquire, if they can, our expertise and our techniques in order, as it were, to be able to stand on their own feet and help their own countries to become really independent. It is a remarkable fact, recently revealed by the British Council of Churches Working Party on Overseas Students that no less than one-tenth of the entire overseas student population of the world is now congregated here in Britain. Yet (and this is the point to which I should like to draw your Lordships' attention), in spite of tremendous efforts on the part of the British Council, the Churches, the charities and all the other internationally minded bodies, the British response to this challenge has been sadly inadequate. The students concerned naturally wish to acquire the necessary techniques in order to achieve real independence; but the great majority of them have not yet got anything like the necessary facilities at home for doing this, so those who

Aid Board - Membership of President of IDRC

The Aid Board meeting on May 13 has two agenda items, the 1970/71 aid allocations, and the membership of the President of the IDRC on the Aid Board. Since you will be away, we shall be seeking your guidance shortly on the proposed aid allocations. With respect to the membership of the President of the IDRC on the Board, you will recall that you wrote to Mr. Strong on April 9 suggesting a discussion at the meeting of the Board.

2. There seems no doubt but that Mr. Hopper should be invited to attend Board meetings and that he would be able to make both a useful contribution to discussions there and to benefit from the views of Board members. The question is whether he should be made a full voting member of the Board. The IDRC is being portrayed publicly as a completely independent institute which, while financed by the Government, will have freedom to act as it sees fit. Recently the Centre has approached this Department to enquire about the possibility of making the Centre into an international organization, along the lines of ICAO in Montreal with "diplomatic status" and tax and duty privileges for senior members. It seems to want not only international standing but to create the image of a multilateral institution. Regardless of how practical or realistic this ideal may be, it is still the objective which Mr. Hopper and Mr. Strong seem to be trying to pursue. Against this background, we simply wonder whether Mr. Hopper should, or would want to, be associated in possible formal recommendations by the Aid Board on difficult or contentious items involving decisions by the Canadian Government. The other members of the Board can be seen as servants of the Government of Canada pursuing national interests; and if you agree, our representative at the Board meeting could question the advisability of making Mr. Hopper a Board member.

3. If this item should lead into broader discussion in the Board you should be aware that we have not recently been able to follow very closely the planning for the Centre. Up until a few months ago we had a very close and informal working relationship with Dr. Peters who was masterminding the planning. We offered whatever departmental assistance we could provide and more specifically on two issues: the selection of the foreign members of the Board of Governors, and the setting up of channels for the provision of our own experience which might be of use to the Centre in its functioning. As a result of this offer Dr. Peters came to us with possible names of persons who might be selected for the foreign membership of the Board. Posts in the field as well as area divisions were consulted and certain views were fed back. Dr. Peters had then promised to come back with a short list of names and to give us an opportunity to give views on regional balance or political issues in the countries concerned. This has now all been stopped, and at least so far as this Division is concerned it would seem that Mr. Hopper and Mr. Strong would prefer to make direct recommendations on Board membership without prior inter-departmental consultation. I have not attempted to pursue this very actively, keeping the posture that we are simply available to help in any way which the Centre might want. However there may well be a series of political problems arising from the establishment and work of the Centre which this Department will not in the long run be able to escape. If you agree, and if a suitable opportunity arises, our representative could make this point discreetly at the Aid Board.

I wish to thank you for your letter of May 13th and for the attached material on the ACAST meeting.

In the letter you raised the question as to whether I wish to receive other relevant material that might come your way. This poses a difficult problem for me. The problem breaks into two difficulties. First, I am reluctant to have on our files any classified material from any governmental department. I think the reasons are obvious. The IDRC will be employing persons of non-Canadian nationality and I do not wish to deny access to any part of our files to Centre employees. Certain classified documents which you feel would be important to the work of the Centre can be sent to me for my personal custody, to be read and returned. Anything of this nature should, I think, be passed to me under a personal and confidential label.

The second problem involves the sheer weight of material, classified or unclassified, which crosses your desk and which would inundate the small administrative staff I expect to have at the Centre. On this issue, your assistance in screening the material that will be relevant to the Centre's program would be greatly appreciated.

At this time, I cannot give you any indication as to what the program areas of the Centre are likely to be. These will have to be selected by the Governors during the course of the next several months. Perhaps it would be desirable that we meet as early as possible to give me an opportunity to outline for you the course of action I am now pursuing to initiate the work of the Centre.



INDONESIAN COASTAL SHIPPING

PROBLEMS AND PROSPECTS

1. The Republic of Indonesia, formerly The Netherlands East Indies is an archipelago of several thousand islands extending about 3,000 miles east of Malaya Peninsula and about 1,200 miles south. Indonesia is the largest and also the most populous country in Southeast Asia, a population of about 110 million. The country is rich in natural resources, brought on the verge of bankruptcy by the previous regime. The present regime is dedicated to economic rehabilitation and are opening business opportunities for foreign countries to do business in that market.

2. Utilities of all kinds are largely underdeveloped. The most glaring example of this is found in inter-island shipping - of cardinal importance to a huge island economy. Prior to 1957, inter-island shipping had been managed by highly skilled Dutch shipping interests. Since it has been taken over by the Indonesian government, service has deteriorated badly. The problem is not a matter of tonnage but of inexperience of everyone involved in the industry. In 1965 as much as half the entire fleet of inter-coastal vessels was tied up awaiting repairs - often with no spare parts available. But even when in service, poor communications, inadequate harbours, long unloading delays, inefficient stevedoring, and congested ports made for extremely slow and costly operation.

3. The compounded result is that inter-coastal service is carried out by small boats, which again is hampered by climatic conditions. Indonesia's climate is Tropical and the rainy season extends from November through March - rainfall ranging from about 75 inches to 125 inches in the lowland areas, and in the mountain areas rising to as much as 144 inches. Humidity is usually high, the annual average being 82.7% rising to between 83% and 84% in the rainy season.

4. In order to overcome the problem of humidity and provide cheap means of inter-coastal and inland water transport, it is in the opinion of the writer, that Canada could assist Indonesia by building aluminum boats and trading them with natural rubber or other raw materials from Indonesia.

5. There is no doubt that Indonesia has its own bauxite deposits but according to the information available no attempt has been made to build aluminum boats in the country.

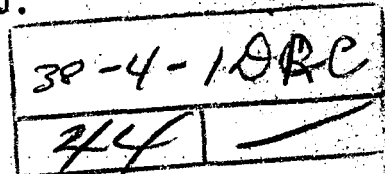

MEMORANDUM TO THE PRIME MINISTER



The purpose of this memorandum is to bring you up-to-date on the appointment of the Board of Governors for the International Development Research Centre and to seek your views on the remaining vacancies to be filled.

It is my understanding that you were prepared to have me decide which non-Canadians should be approached to determine their willingness to fill the ten positions on the Board. The following people have been approached informally to determine their availability:

(1)	Sir John Crawford	- Australia	available
(2)	Barbara Ward	- U.K.	available
(3)	Puey Ungphakorn	Thailand	as yet no reply
(4)	A.L. Dias	India	as yet no reply
(5)	H.A. Oluwasanmi	Nigeria	as yet no reply

(7)	John Gardner	- USA	as yet no reply
(8)	Roberto Campos	Brazil	as yet no reply

You will notice that M. Pierre Bauchet has been invited to sit on the Board as you requested. I am not satisfied that we have yet found the right candidate from Francophone Africa and I have asked my staff to provide me with further suggestions for this tenth and last position.

You had suggested that consideration be given to having a non-Canadian as Vice Chairman of the Board. The legislation establishing the Centre stipulates that both the Chairman and the Vice Chairman must be Canadian citizens. It would be my intention to have a French-speaking Canadian serve as Vice Chairman.

In seeking to fill the eleven positions for Canadians on the Board the following people have been approached to determine their availability:

It is proposed to invite the new President of CIDA to sit on the Board as well. There are a number of factors to be considered before filling the remaining four positions on the Board with persons from Quebec and Ontario. I would hope that we could find someone capable of serving as Vice Chairman of the Board and that we could select at least one woman.

I understand that from Quebec you have suggested:

- (1) Irving Brecher
- (2) Jacques Léger
- (3) Louis Berlinguet
- (4) Alice Desjardins

Dr. Brecher has already had a number of discussions with Dr. Hopper of the IDRC about the programme of the Centre. As well, the Centre is prepared to meet his request for financial assistance for his upcoming sabbatical leave. However, to do so might well produce a conflict of interest if Brecher is appointed to the Board of Governors. It would seem, therefore, that Brecher's interests both in the Centre's activities and in financial support from the Centre are being well looked after. I would suggest, therefore, that Dr. Léger and Dr. Berlinguet be invited to sit on the Board.

I had earlier suggested that the following people be considered from Ontario:

Prof. Pratt is in a position somewhat similar to Brecher. (Working closely with Centre and it is expected his institution will receive financial assistance.) Jane Banfield Haynes is quite capable but we probably already have enough social scientists on the Board. For these reasons, I would suggest the Ontario Governors be selected from the remaining four names on the list.

I would suggest that special consideration be given to Plumptre. Mr. Pearson, Mr. Strong and Dr. Hopper have all recommended his appointment as the result of his efforts in support of the Centre. I would recommend that he be asked to serve on the Board for a period of two years. If Plumptre is unacceptable to you, Prof. Simpson would be an excellent choice.

Both nutritionists are well regarded in international development circles and of course would provide us with a second lady governor to go with Barbara Ward. Engberg (40's) is considerably younger than Harrington (62) and would be my first choice.

In conclusion, I would recommend that:

- (1) Dr. Jacques Léger
- (2) Dr. Louis Berlinguet
- (3) A.F.W. Plumptre
- (4) Prof. Lila Engberg (if her connection with CIDA raises doubts in your mind, Dr. Harrington, although much older, would be quite acceptable)

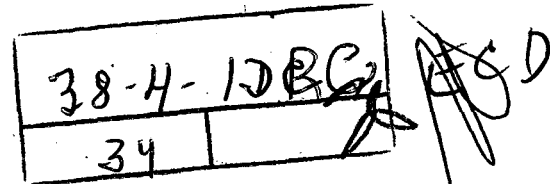

Background

The International Development Research Centre Act received Royal Assent on May 13, 1970. The Act specifies that there shall be "a Board of Governors that is composed of a Chairman, President and not more than nineteen other governors" (sect. 3)

The Governor in Council shall appoint the Chairman and the President for terms not exceeding five years and each of the other governors for terms not exceeding four years, with their terms so arranged that fewer than half will expire in any one year (section 5).

Section 10 specifies that "The Chairman, the Vice Chairman and nine other governors must be Canadian citizens".

"The Chairman, President and other governors shall be paid such remuneration and expenses as are fixed by the Governor in Council" (section 9).

Finally, Section 15 specifies that "the head office of the Centre shall be at such place in Canada as may be designated by the Governor in Council".

Objective

The objective of this memorandum is to seek Cabinet approval that:

- (a) the persons listed below be appointed governors of the IDRC for the terms indicated;
- (b) the IDRC be authorized to pay to the governors the remuneration and expenses outlined below; and
- (c) the National Capital Region be designated as the place at which the head office of the IDRC shall be located.

Proposal

The President, Dr. W.D. Hopper, a Canadian, was appointed by Order-in-Council on May 21, 1970. After consultation with the Prime Minister's office and other Ministers concerned, other individuals have been approached informally to determine their willingness to serve on the Board.

Of the list that follows, all except Messrs. Campos of Brazil, Dubos of the U.S.A., and Sankale of Senegal have indicated their willingness to serve on the Board. Mr. Campos has given his personal acceptance of the invitation but because of his associations and duties, he requires also the approval of his government. Due to business commitments and holiday travel, Messrs. Dubos and Sankale have not been able to respond yet to the informal enquiries about their willingness to serve.

Since some time has elapsed since the Act received Royal Assent, it is desirable to hold the inaugural meeting as soon as possible and plans have been made for October 26th to 28th.

As mentioned above, the Act requires the Governor in Council to determine the amount of the remuneration and expenses to be paid to the governors. It is proposed that when the governors are attending meetings or are engaged in other business of the IDRC, their actual and reasonable expenses should be met from the funds of the Centre. In addition it is proposed that the remuneration to be paid to each Governor while he is attending meetings or is on the business of the IDRC be set at a rate of \$100.00 per day. The practice of paying honoraria is common in all major foundations and many international organizations and such Canadian Institutions as the National Arts Council, the IDB and the NCC.

Finally, the Act requires the Governor in Council to establish the location of the head office. While several alternative locations are possible, there are clear advantages in locating the Centre in the National Capital region. Members of the House of Commons Committee on External Affairs and Defence have expressed great interest in the IDRC and are anxious to maintain close contact with its development. It is expected that the IDRC will be in close and frequent contact with CIDA, providing that agency and other departments with advice and guidance on questions involving science and technology in the Canadian development assistance program.

The IDRC head office is presently located in leased quarters on Riverside Drive. In a few years time, as the Centre's program develops and expands, it is likely that a more permanent headquarters will be required and informal discussions have already begun with the Department of Public Works to identify suitable sites within the National Capital Region. The merits of these sites will be contrasted with the advantages of headquarter locations elsewhere in Canada before a recommendation on the final location of the Centre is made to the Governor in Council. It is anticipated that the present interim arrangements for the Centre's operation in the Capital Region will suffice for the next two to four years.

Recommendations

In summary, I recommend:

- (a) That the persons listed above be appointed Governors of the IDRC for the terms indicated, it being understood that the appointment of Messrs Campos, Dubos and Sankale is conditional upon the prior receipt from them of an indication that they will serve if appointed; and further that the Secretary of State for External Affairs be permitted to select other persons from the same geographic areas for the approval of the Governor in Council should any one or all of the three persons whose acceptance of an appointment remains uncertain be unwilling or unable to serve;
- (b) That the IDRC be authorized to pay from the funds of the Centre, the actual and reasonable expenses of each Governor and an honorarium of \$100.00 per day while they are engaged on the business of the Centre;
- (c) That the National Capital Region be designated as place at which the head office of the IDRC is to be located.

As soon as Cabinet approves, appropriate Orders will be submitted to the Governor in Council.

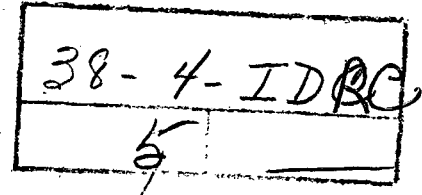

Tuesday's meeting of the Cabinet Committee on External Policy and Defence will examine your memorandum recommending the appointment of the Governors to the International Development Research Centre. As a Department we have not been involved in the selection of the individuals, which has been largely the concern of Dr. Hopper. However, at one stage we were asked to suggest possible candidates, and our advice was sought on the regional distribution of the Governors, including the ratio between Canadian and non-Canadian members. We have no comment to make on the individuals selected. We can confirm that the regional distribution is in accordance with our thinking - i.e. with four representatives from advanced countries and six from the developing world, and with the six developing country members in turn being drawn equally from the Asian, African and Caribbean-Latin American regions.

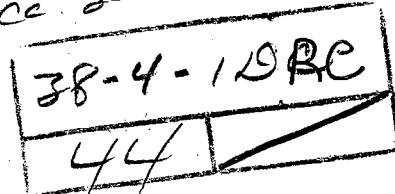

The Pearson Report

The Third World wants a development strategy, but such a strategy is yet to be invented and elaborated. We are still at the trial stage, engaged in experiments which, although they may occasionally be successful, often end up in clamorous failure. It must also be said that the first timid attempt at prompting the conscience of governments and people to act towards a solution of underdevelopment problems dates back to early post-war years only. That is little more than twenty years in which to redress damages caused by centuries of exploitation and indifference.

However, the experience of these two decades brings out useful elements for an objective and critical analysis of achievements so far and, above all, to lay down valid guidelines for future action.

The special Commission, under the chairmanship of the former Prime Minister of Canada, Mr. Lester B. Pearson, supplied the first careful, documented report on the first, pioneering stage of this experiment. In the late sixties, Mr. Pearson, Nobel Peace Prize winner, was asked by Mr. Robert MacNamara, World Bank President, to undertake a study of results so far obtained through assistance to developing countries and of prospects for the future.

The Commission, using material provided by more than seventy Governments and by numerous private institutions, has issued a detailed report, which has also been published in Italy by Abete Editions under the title: "Associati nello sviluppo" (Associated in Development).

The first element emerging from the Pearson report offers very little encouragement. During the most recent years the bulk of public assistance has remained static, and has lagged behind in relation to the GNP growth rate of donor countries, which were probably disappointed in coming short of their overambitious hopes for an immediate development of those countries for which it is in fact more realistic to plan development on a long-term basis.

Moreover, let us say that development has too frequently been viewed as the result of high-level decisions, thus disregarding too often the essential need to involve and mobilize the population of each country concerned in this growth process. "No foreign aid can suffice where there is no national will that makes it possible to bring about the required basic changes". In short, something more than a mere transfer of funds is required. Actually, the remaining basic problem is how to help the poorer countries to walk with their own legs, so as to reduce and gradually eliminate the need for any outside help, which, to speak realistically, would at any rate be inadequate to bridge every gap and remove every inequality.

Pursuing its inquiries, the Pearson Report dwells upon one of the most frequent objections to the policy of assistance. Many people ask themselves why advanced countries should help other nations when even the richest donors are harassed by their own pressing social and economic problems. The simplest answer is of a moral nature: the haves must share with the have-nots. On the other hand, the hastening of historical processes, under the ever-increasing and conditioning pressure of technological achievements, now imposes on modern man a new concept of national interest and a mature realisation that his own city limits are those of the world.

Development policy therefore needs a fresh approach. Also, in the judgement of the Pearson Commission, the technical basis should be the integration of business, aid and investment policies into a single strategy resting soundly on efforts of growing countries and the renewed pledge of richer nations.

The report probes very carefully into the many aspects of the problem, with supporting statistics accurately collected and compiled, thus supplying, in the whole, an indispensable document for those wishing to have a close and deep view of the problems of the Third World.

The main merit of the report lies in the effort made in producing synthesis and documentation. Nor should one underestimate the effort made in suggesting concrete, and sometimes essential, changes in the development policy followed so far. But all this is an attempt to rationalize, towards greater efficiency, the present system of assisting Third World countries.

Those seeking, in the report, the radically new solutions advocated by many, will probably be disappointed.

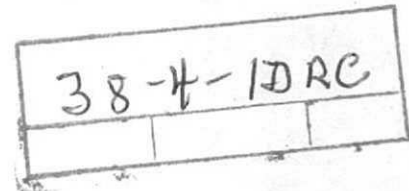


- (a) He will send to us copies of papers describing possible IDRC projects after they have gone through the IDRC screening process, but before they are submitted for final approval to its Board or other authority depending on the magnitude of the project.
- (b) Our comments would be welcome at that stage. He is not expecting detailed views on the technical worth of a project but rather views on whether we foresee any political difficulties. He said frankly that scientists are often not attuned to political sensitivities and he was fully aware that the government role in developing countries was different than in more sophisticated economies.
- (c) It will be up to this Department to decide whether we wish to seek the views of missions at this stage. There would be a time factor. Certainly, however, Mr. Hopper wanted Canadian posts abroad informed about projects to be carried out in their territories.

- (d) In response to my offer of assistance in arranging appointments, accommodation, etc. through posts abroad for IDRC officials, Mr. Hopper said that IDRC would normally arrange these themselves. In special circumstances he might ask for the help of posts. He agreed that posts should be informed in advance if IDRC officials were visiting their territories.
- (e) He saw advantages in maintaining a central channel of communications and co-ordination with this Department and I agreed that this Division would try to assume this role.

3. On the above basis, whenever this Division receives material from the IDRC we will arrange to send it to the appropriate area divisions and we hope that they in turn will be as helpful and prompt as possible in taking any follow-up action to assist the IDRC.

Dear Larry,

A meeting took place two weeks ago of the Mekong Committee, the purpose of which was to discuss the Amplified Basin Plan. Because of our interest in the work of the Committee, I arranged to attend as Canadian Observer. To my surprise I noted among the list of participants a Mr. Ellis Hatt, a consultant of water management from the International Development Research Centre in Ottawa. As I did not attend all the sessions it took several days to get in touch with Mr. Hatt. When I mentioned to him that we had not been told he would be attending, he said that he assumed CIDA would let us know.

There is, of course, nothing new in posts finding out about the visiting firemen only after they have arrived. It appears from IDRC's telegram RC 43 of November 18, a copy of which was referred to you, that this may be the rule rather than the exception in the case of the Centre. While there may be very good reasons why posts cannot be informed in advance of visits by consultants to the Centre I would hope that they would at least be asked to keep in touch with posts upon arrival, if only to let posts concerned know that they are there. This, I realize, is a small matter but as you no doubt have learned when abroad, it can sometimes cause considerable embarrassment.

Needless to say I am finding Bangkok somewhat different from Bonn. Still, it is just as interesting and challenging, especially on the aid side and I am enjoying it thoroughly.

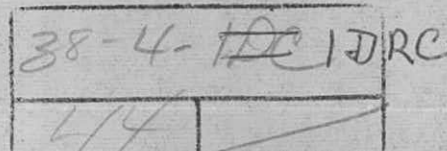

Dear Larry,

Thanks very much for your letter of November 10 about the Presidency of the Development Centre. We felt obliged to bring this vacancy to your attention but the result is pretty much as I expected and I agree with the general line the Department decided to take.

As a matter of fact, events have rather overtaken all this. In the Executive Committee discussion of the 1971 Work Programme last week, the Americans made a formal proposal to dispense with what they considered the inflated titles of President and Vice President, and proposed that the Centre be headed by a simple Director. Van Lennep asked for some time to think about this and will make proposals to the Council by around the end of the year, but my guess is that some down-grading of the rank and status of the top people will likely be proposed. Surprisingly, the French have not yet objected very much to the American proposal although it may have taken them by surprise and I suppose they may be heard from again. If there is a down-grading, the local expectation is that Yudelman would get the Director's position. I see no reason why we should resist letting matters take their course in this way, if that is what the French and Americans can agree to, although if you have any other ideas or comments, please let us know. In any event, these developments seem to alter the picture as far as putting up a Canadian is concerned.
