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FORMER YUGOSLAVIA: REFUGEES, DISPLACED VULNERABLE GROUPS

Enclosed you will find a revised list of contents for the Federation's Hygienic Parcels (1 family for 1 month) and Baby Parcels (0-3 years for 3 months) as developed in the field on the basis of our experience to date. National Societies are encouraged to adhere to this list as closely as possible.

We have also included 3 types of medical kits the Federation intends to distribute in Serbia and Montenegro under this Appeal. The kits are based on WHO Recommendations modified by the Federation's medical advisors.

The Balkan Box: The kit has been enhanced with additional medicines for the management of more chronic disease (the "Balkan Box") and to take account of specific needs requested by Bosnia and Herzegovina. Kits will be distributed in 10'000 person units and allocation will be based on current population size, based on a regularly updated WHO Medical Planning Matrix. Federation will coordinate with WHO on this.

Kits for the Treatment of Pneumonia: This is a kit designed for the clinical management of respiratory infection in children in hospital and is based on standard recommendations of the WHO Programme on the Prevention of Acute Respiratory Infections (ARI). The kits are designed for a hospital paediatric unit of thirty beds.

Transfusion Kits: This is based on a kit developed for local circumstances by WHO together with Medecins Sans Frontiers.

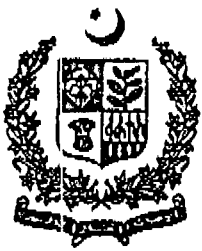

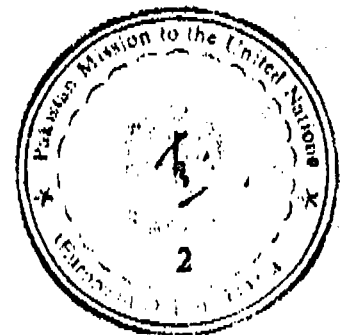

The Permanent Mission of Pakistan to the United Nations and other International Organizations in Geneva presents its compliments to the Permanent Missions in Geneva and has the honour to inform that on the request of the Bosnian Government, the Government of Pakistan has decided to accept some of the Bosnian muslim refugees who are being expelled by the Croatian authorities. As of today a total number of 379 Bosnian muslim refugees have already been flown in to Pakistan.

The Government of Pakistan has taken this decision in full awareness of the difficulties which the refugees would face in acclimatizing themselves to the conditions in Pakistan. However, this emergency decision, despite Pakistan's resource constraints, has been taken purely on humanitarian grounds as the lives of these refugees were under imminent threat if they would have remained in Croatia. Pakistan, however, continues to consider that the primary responsibility to provide shelter to the Bosnian refugees is that of the neighbouring countries.

The Permanent Mission of Pakistan avails itself of this opportunity to renew to the Permanent Missions in Geneva the assurances of its highest consideration.



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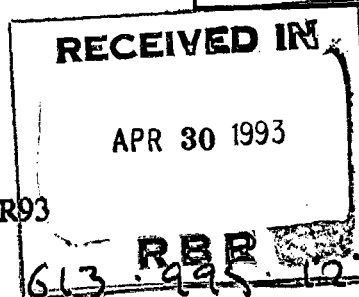

2. Current humanitarian aid

Total funds of humanitarian aid appropriated for victims of the conflict in the former Yugoslavia (humanitarian aid of the Foreign Office, Chapter 0502, item 686 12) since August 1991 amount to DM 47.6 million.

Main focus of our aid: refugees in Croatia and the distressed civilian population in Bosnia-Herzegovina; in addition, aid to refugees in Hungary, Serbia and Slovenia (as a result of the civil war about 3 million people are currently fleeing). Relief measures are usually granted in the form of food supplies and medical care. The aid is implemented with the help of private German and international relief organizations and our liaison office in Zagreb.

Extensive non-cash contributions from stocks of the GMOD to the value of approx. DM 10 million must be added to the funds appropriated by the Foreign Office. These include above all ambulances, beds, food and medication.

Apart from the Federal Government, the federal states also made considerable contributions by appropriating their own funds, e.g. Bavaria appropriated DM 5 million and Baden-Württemberg DM 1.2 million, as well as measures in the field of food supplies aid and medical care.

3. German participation in the air bridge to Sarajevo

The air bridge which was suspended because an Italian aircraft was shot down by a missile on 3 September was resumed on 3 October 1992.

[REDACTED], we have been participating in the air bridge since 10 October, initially with one aircraft and from mid-October on with two aircraft of the Federal Air Force (C 160 Transall) which are stationed in Zagreb. The main goods to be transported are food, hygiene articles and medical supplies. So far 208 German flights have taken place, transporting about 1,984 tonnes of relief goods to Sarajevo and Split (flight costs about DM 6.4 million).

We anticipate an improvement of the supply situation of the Bosnian population, particularly in the surrounded cities and areas, as a result of the resolution taken by the Security Council to step up the UN peace-keeping troops in Bosnia-Herzegovina by 6,000 soldiers (UNPROFOR) to protect relief transports. Due to the forthcoming winter, stocks must be built up in crisis areas to meet the increased demand.

4. Construction of accommodation for refugees in Croatia

Pursuant to the cabinet resolution of 21 July 1992, the Federal Government will appropriate DM 50.0 million for the construction and maintenance of winter-resistant dwellings for 20,000 people in Croatia. There are plans to build 3 refugee villages for 8,000 people and to restore existing buildings such as schools, holiday camps, barracks and other similar buildings for 12,000 people. This will be implemented by the German Society for Technical Co-operation (GTZ) in close co-operation with the UNHCR and the Croatian Government.

5. Redevelopment of refugee dwellings in Slovenia

The heating and sanitary facilities of refugees' dwellings are to be equipped for winter in Slovenia from funds appropriated by the Foreign Office for humanitarian aid. The measures (totalling DM 1 million) are being implemented in conjunction with projects of the UNHCR and with advice provided by experts of the THW (Technical Emergency Service).

6. German share in EC aid

The EC has so far provided relief services to the value of DM 578 million, including a recent decision to step up the funds by ECU 120 million. These services are implemented by the United Nations and non-governmental organizations. If the German share in this aid to the amount of approx. DM 161.9 (28 per cent) is taken into consideration, the aid provided directly and indirectly by the Federal Government amounts to DM 275.3 million.

7. Resolutions of the EC summit in Birmingham of 16 October 1992

At the special summit in Birmingham, it was resolved that an EC task force would be used in close co-operation with the UN (UNHCR) with respect to the implementation of winter aid in the former Yugoslavia. Financial requirements until the end of 1992: DM 900 million, of which the EC Commission has already raised DM 450 million and the remaining G-24 states are to raise DM 126 million. For the first quarter of 1993, it was determined that DM 750 million would be required, of which the EC Commission is to provide 50 per cent, the EC member states and the other G-24 states are to provide 25 per cent respectively.

8. Acceptance of refugees in Germany

Although humanitarian aid is preferably to be rendered on the spot, 10,000 refugees from Bosnia-Herzegovina were brought to Germany due to 2 resolutions of the Interior Ministers' Conference since it was not possible to provide accommodation for them there. The refugees, who had already been turned away by most European partners, were allowed to enter Germany in anticipation of the urgently required European contingent solution. Of the approximately 540,000 refugees from the former Yugoslavia who have fled to other countries, about 230,000 are currently in Germany.

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Turkey: Genscher Meets Ozal, Flies to Border

[Text] Kemer (A.A) -- President Turgut Ozal said here on Friday that Turkey was doing and would continue to do everything it could to relieve the plight of hundreds of thousands of Iraqi refugees who have massed on both sides of Turkish-Iraqi border.

Ozal was speaking to reporters after a meeting with German Foreign Minister Hans Dietrich Genscher, on a brief visit to Turkey, to discuss relief efforts to the refugees.

Ozal said, "the optimum solution is their safe return to their homes."

The president, currently in this Mediterranean village on holiday, earlier received Genscher at a one-hour meeting also attended by Prime Minister Yildirim Akbulut, Foreign Minister Ahmet Kurtcebe Alptemocin and the German ambassador to Ankara, Ekkehard Eickhoff.

Genscher arrived in Ankara earlier on Friday and immediately held talks with his counterpart, Alptemocin, who met him at Ankara airport.

After leaving Kemer, Genscher left for the southeastern regional center Diyarbakir to see for himself the relief action organized at the border.

Three tons of relief supplies are being carried aboard Genscher's plane. The goods will be immediately lifted by German Air Force helicopters to refugees around the Isikveren region.

Genscher told reporters earlier that Bonn was aware that the refugee tragedy is presenting Turkey with enormous problems and that was why Germany had decided to help Turkey. He said Bonn valued Turkey's efforts on the refugees and that Ankara could depend upon German solidarity.

He added however that humanitarian measures alone could not provide a lasting solution to the Kurdish problem in Iraq. "The important thing is a political solution", he said.

Genscher added that it was important to ease the suffering of the refugees while at the same time ensuring with the United Nations that the refugees in northern Iraq can move into the protective zones without fear of repression or discrimination.

Turkey: Official Praises Buffer Zone for Iraqi Refugees

TA0904145991 Ankara ANATOLIA in Turkish 1425 GMT 9 Apr 91

[Text] Ankara (AA) -- Bulent Akarcali, chairman of the Turkey-EC joint parliamentary committee, has sent a report to Metten, the German cochairman of the committee, in which he indicated that the situation of refugees from northern Iraq is one that Turkey cannot deal with alone.

Speaking at a news conference at the parliament today, Akarcali disclosed the report he sent Metten. In his report, Akarcali points out that he went to the Turkish-Iraqi border on 5 April to examine personally the situation of the Iraqi refugees.

The report charges that racial policies have been implemented by Iraq and blatant violations of human rights have been committed. It calls for humanitarian aid to be extended to those people as soon as possible and adds that \$500,000 of aid is needed urgently to erect tent cities for them and another \$100,000 a month to maintain them.

Pointing out that, in the long run, pressure should be exerted on Saddam Husayn to settle this problem, the report continues: The settling of the refugees under UN protection in a 10- to 30-km-wide buffer zone in Iraqi territory along the border seems to be the most rational solution. This solution is the most suitable to the topographic conditions, as well as to the psychological state of the refugees. Turkey is ready to do its best for the realization of that project.

Akarcali concluded his news conference by saying that the report has been sent to the European Democratic Union's headquarters in Vienna for distribution to political leaders in various countries, as well as to some 30 political parties.

[Text] President Turgut Ozal has called on the international community to act quickly to end the human tragedy in northern Iraq. Ozal made this call during a news conference he held in Amsterdam, where he is attending an international conference.

Serdar Dimli reports the details from Amsterdam:

[Begin Dimli recording] Well-known personalities have met in Amsterdam to discuss various world issues and economic and political expectations for the coming years. The Bulgarian President Zhelyu Zhelev, Netherlands Foreign Minister Hans van den Broek, former FRG Chancellor Helmut Schmidt, and former U.S. Secretary of State Henry Kissinger are among those personalities.

Ozal addressed the conference today on the subject of new global tendencies at the beginning of a new era. Ozal dealt mostly with the situation in northern Iraq and the Middle East. He recalled that the Gulf war solved some problems but brought up others. Recalling that almost the entire population of northern Iraq is deserting its homes in great desperation and misery, Ozal called for the establishment of a region in northern Iraq for the settlement of those refugees and for all kinds of help to be extended there. Ozal said that this region should not be transformed into camps that -- like some Palestinian camps -- nurture terrorist activities in the region.

Ozal said that the first condition put forward by the northern Iraqis for returning to their homes is the toppling of the present regime in their country. He added that Iraq needs a democratic regime that will protect the rights and liberties of the various ethnic and religious groups living there. Until that is achieved, Ozal said, the feelings of revenge will continue to escalate, resulting in a new dictatorship.

Pointing out that the Gulf war has brought to light the differences among Arabs, Ozal said that those differences must be settled through a regional peace agreement. He added that this situation made the solution of the Arab-Israeli conflict more difficult. He reiterated his proposal for Turkey to host an international conference on the issue.

Ozal stressed the need for security measures in the region to be complemented by economic cooperation among the countries, and he added that economic developments will have a lasting effect on regional peace. He noted that Turkey, which is the neighbor of two great Gulf countries, Iran and Iraq, is closely interested in the security arrangements to be established in the region.

We must try to solve existing problems without religious discrimination, or any other type. Ozal said that Turkey is a country that harmoniously brings together the western values and Islam, thereby bridging the Islamic and Christian worlds.

The last topic taken up by Ozal was Turkey's application in 1987 to the EC for full membership. Pointing out that after the recent developments in East Europe, the EC has become the center of interest for those countries, Ozal said it is clear that much time is needed until they will be integrated into the EC. He said that Turkey, on the other hand, is much closer to the European standards and has reached an economic level much higher than other Islamic countries.

Ozal continued: Some time is needed, nevertheless, for improvements in the field of human rights. Our country is trying to reach in a short time the goals reached by other countries in longer periods during their history. He stressed that Turkey's membership in the EC will help improve relations between the Community and the Islamic world. Pointing out that he rejects claims that the EC is a Christian club and that the Islamic countries should also establish their own clubs, Ozal said: Such stands serve only to increase polarizations in the world.

Ozal concluded his address as follows: Turkey is a country that, which though located in the most unstable region of the world, exerts efforts to reach European economic standards. By opening its arms to Turkey, the EC will prove to the more conservative sectors of the Islamic world that it is not an illusion for a Muslim country to achieve industrialization and modernization without losing its cultural values. Turkey must definitely know within the next 10 years whether it will become an EC member or not. The world is undergoing rapid change, and Turkey has not much time to wait.

Ozal also held bilateral talks in Amsterdam today and met with Dutch Prime Minister Lubbers at noon at the office of the Prime Ministry. Later Ozal held a news conference.

[Text] Most of the explanations given by Ozal during the news conference and most of the questions asked by journalists centered on the situation in northern Iraq. Ozal said that the tragedy in northern Iraq cannot be viewed as only a domestic affair and that those incidents have been happening in Iraq for the last 20 to 25 years. He added that those incidents never reached the latest proportions. Pointing out that most of the people in northern Iraq have deserted their homes, Ozal said that Turkey offered food and other facilities to those who are now stranded on the two sides of the Turkish-Iraqi border.

Noting that the Turkish side of the border is mountainous and not suitable for settlement, Ozal said: That is why I have proposed the establishment of a region on the Iraqi side of the border to settle these people until they can return to their homes. Our aim is not to create something similar to a Palestinian camp on the Turkish-Iraqi border.

We need the support of the UN Security Council for the realization of this project. A UN peacekeeping force can also be established to protect those people from an eventual attack. If necessary, Turkey is ready to provide logistic aid to this region.

Ozal said: I am calling once more on all leaders and the international community to act immediately to fulfill their obligations and end this human tragedy.

In response to questions by journalists, Ozal said that the provisional region he proposed would have to be on the Iraqi side of the border, as it was more suitable for settlement. Explaining that the region could cover an area of 20 to 30 km, beginning at the Turkish border, he said that this land is the land of those who will be settled there.

Pointing out that the refugees say they want neither to return to their homes nor to go abroad, Ozal said: These people say that they want to return to their homes when the administration in their country is changed.

In reply to a question on whether northern Iraq would be given autonomy, Ozal said that this is a question to be settled among the concerned countries. Noting that 4 million Kurds live in Iraq, 5 million others in Iran, and 8 to 9 million in Turkey, Ozal said that those living in Turkey were not massed in one specific region but were spread all over the country. He added that this population has all the rights of the rest of the population in the country and that they share the religion and beliefs of the majority. He pointed out that the situation is quite different in Iraq and Iran.

Replying to another question, Ozal explained that according to the Lausanne Treaty, Kurds in Turkey are not considered a minority, adding that they are free to speak their language.

Answering another question, Ozal said that he met with Israeli Labor Party Chairman Shim'on Peres and conferred on the Middle East

situation. He said that he will not give any more details of that meeting.

Ozal received U.S. Secretary of State James Baker in Ankara yesterday and gave a dinner in his honor. Prime Minister Yildirim Akbulut; Chief of Staff General Dogan Gures; Defense Minister Mehmet Yazar; Foreign Minister Ahmet Kurtcebe Alptemocin; Interior Minister Abdulkadir Aksu; General Nezihi Cakar, National Security Council secretary general; and other officials were also present at the dinner.

This is the statement issued by Ambassador Kaya Toperi, the presidential spokesman, on the subject: During the reception, views were exchanged on the plight of the northern Iraqis who have taken refuge in Turkey and on regional developments. Pointing out the great number of refugees who have come from northern Iraq, the president said that Turkey cannot deal with this issue alone and stressed the need for the international community's close cooperation and support. Ozal said that as was the case in similar situations in the past, Turkey will continue to extend various forms of aid to those who take refuge in our country, reiterating that various services will be provided to refugees from northern Iraq on both sides of the Turkish-Iraqi border.

[Text] Diyarbakir (A.A) -- Turkey and the United States on Monday denounced what they described as the Iraqi Government's atrocious attacks on the citizens of northern Iraq.

Both countries said they would tolerate no interference in efforts to send aid to relieve the suffering of the hundreds of thousands of Iraqis who have fled to the Turkish-Iraqi border in the last week.

A joint statement released shortly after a visit by U.S. Secretary of State James Baker to the frontier said the relentless attacks by Iraqi troops on the people of northern Iraq forcing them to flee the country showed once again a lack of foresight on the part of the Baghdad Government.

The statement said: "A U.N. Security Council resolution (number 688) taken on Friday condemned Iraq and called on the world to set up an international aid program to relieve those suffering.

"Turkey and the United States will cooperate closely to render this resolution effective.

"We are not considering a military intervention to prevent a civil war (in Iraq) but we will tolerate no interference in humanitarian aid to the sufferers."

The statement added that the international community has so far accumulated 67 million U.S. dollars in Turkey and the other affected countries to help them cope with the influx of refugees.

[Text] Cukurca (A.A) -- U.S. Secretary of State James Baker on Monday met representatives of thousands of northern Iraqis, mainly Kurds, stranded on both sides of the Turkish-Iraqi border after fleeing atrocious attacks by troops loyal to the Baghdad administration.

Baker, accompanied by Foreign Minister Ahmet Kurtcebe Alptemecin, Health Minister Halil Sivgin and a number of other senior officials, was briefed by a Turkish military official after arriving in Cukurca township, in Hakkari Province, where he flew from the southeastern city of Diyarbakir.

Turkish Brigadier General Kamil Basar said at the briefing that 280,000 Iraqis have arrived in Turkish territory just near the border and that this figure could go up to 600,000 in the next few days.

Basar also gave information about relief efforts.

Baker later met a number of representatives of the refugees who demanded urgent aid.

The U.S. secretary of state later returned to Diyarbakir where he was scheduled to leave Turkey for Israel later in the day.

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Turkey threatens war if Iraq shoots refugees

CIZRE, Turkey — Iraqi forces fired artillery barrages on Kurdish refugees fleeing to Turkey, witnesses said Friday, and Turkish officials suggested that the continued attacks on refugee Kurds could lead to a Turkish military strike against Iraq.

In the meeting with parliamentary deputies Thursday, Turkish President Turgut Ozal reportedly had not ruled out attacking Iraq if it continued firing on the Kurds.

"Since we cannot stop these people from trying to escape the attacks, we shall try to stop the other side," he reportedly said.

The daily newspaper Milliyet said Ozal warned Iraq: "If you do not cease fire, we will be forced to intervene."

The warnings signalled growing tensions between Turkey and Iraq in the disarray after Iraq's defeat in the Persian Gulf war and its suppression of the Kurdish rebellion.

Turkey, which has a security problem with its own Kurdish separatists,

hardly appears eager to welcome hundreds of thousands of Iraqi Kurds.

Deputy Foreign Minister Tugay Ozceri said Friday that Iraq's assault on an estimated half million Kurdish refugees making for the Turkish border "constitutes a threat to our own security."

While the Turkish warnings may spare the Kurds further bloodshed from Iraqi forces, Turkish soldiers continued to fire above and around the refugees in an effort to prevent them from flooding into Turkey, witnesses returning from the Iraqi-Turkish

frontier said Friday.

Kurdish journalists returning after two days in the border town of Isikzeren said they heard artillery barrages being fired on the Iraqi side of the mountain border Thursday, where masses of Kurdish refugees denied entry to Turkey had gathered.

From the Turkish side of the border, refugees were receiving some food, though medical attention appeared nonexistent, witnesses said. The people of Cizre, not a particularly wealthy town, had loaded up 12 trucks with blankets, food, clothing and plastic sheeting that they had delivered to the refugees.

"The people are between two fires," said Abdullah Arisoy, Ulke's Cizre bureau chief. "Iraq is pushing them, and Turkey is pushing."

Friday, the emergency rule governor for southeast Turkey, Hayri Kozakcioglu, said Turkey's borders to Iraq were effectively open.

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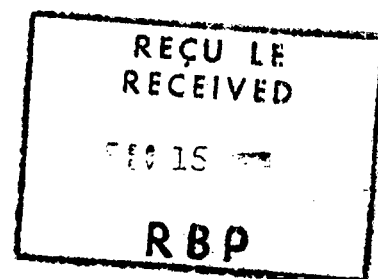

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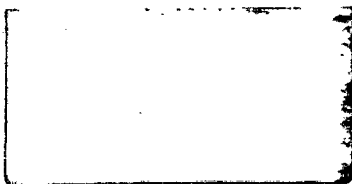

WITH PROVIDING TRADITIONAL HOSPITALITY WEARING THIN AS SOVIETS
ARRIVE IN GREATER NUMBERS AND STAY FOR LONGER PERIODS.AS AUSTERITY
MEASURE USRP HAVE CUT BACK ON CARE AND MAINTENANCE FUNDING.
MEANWHILE RENTS IN SEASIDE RESORTS WHERE SOVIETS HOUSED ARE ABOUT TO
SKYROCKET AS PEAK SUMMER SEASON APPROACHES.PRESSURE MOUNTING ON USA
TO RELAX SELECTION CRITERIA AND INCREASE NUMBERS.LACK OF FUNDING
FOR CARE AND MAINTENANCE OF CDA-BOUND CASES IN ITALY HAS LED TO
VOLAG DECISION TO FORWARD ONLY SPONSORED APPLICATIONS TO CDA.WE

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VIEW THIS AS UNFORTUNATE BUT DO NOT RECOMMEND ANY EXTRAORDINARY MEASURES TO INCREASE SOVIET CASELOAD. IN THIS TELETYPE WE WILL PROVIDE OVERVIEW OF CURRENT SITUATION WHILE SUBSEQUENT REPORT WILL OUTLINE STEP BY STEP PROCESSING PROCEDURES FOR SOVIETS SEEKING RESETTLEMENT FROM ROME. THIS WILL ALL BE PUT IN THE CONTEXT OF THE CANADIAN INVOLVEMENT.

2. REPORT: SOVIET CITIZENS DEPARTING USSR IN RECORD NUMBERS UNDER NEW PERESTROIKA INSPIRED EXIT POLICY. MOST ARE JEWS ALTHOUGH EVER INCREASING NUMBERS OF NON JEWS ARE JUMPING ON BANDWAGON BY POSING AS JEWS WHEN APPLYING FOR EXIT PERMISSION. VAST MAJORITY OF SOVIET EMIGRES, JEWS AND NON JEWS ALIKE, EVENTUALLY PROCEED TO ROME VIA VIENNA FOR ONWARD PROCESSING TO USA. ONLY A TINY FRACTION WITH RELATIVES ELSEWHERE PROCEED TO OTHER RESETTLEMENT COUNTRIES.

3. THIS SCENARIO WAS ENACTED MORE OR LESS SMOOTHLY UNTIL AUTUMN 1988 WHEN THREE RELATED CHANGES TOOK PLACE.

4. FIRSTLY, NUMBERS BEGAN TO INCREASE DRASTICALLY. ACCORDING TO AMERICAN JOINT DISTRIBUTION COMMITTEE, WHICH IS RESPONSIBLE FOR LOGISTICS AND FUNDS FOR JEWS DURING ITALIAN SOJOURN, THEIR CASELOAD HAS INCREASED 172 PERCENT SINCE SEPT 1988, WHEN THEY ADMINISTERED TO FEWER THAN 3000 PERSONS. IN OCT 1988 SOVIET JEWS ARRIVED,

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2161 IN NOV, 2197 IN DEC, 3478 IN JAN, AND 2138 IN FEB. ACTIVE
CASELOAD AT BEGINNING APRIL WAS 8298.

5. THE SECOND PHENOMENON IS THAT OF NON-JEWS WHO ARE BEGINNING TO
DEPART USSR, WHO ACCORDING TO OUR SOURCES NOW MAKE UP APPROX 20 PER
CENT OF SOVIET EMIGRES NOW ARRIVING IN ITALY. UNLIKE THE JEWS THESE
PERSONS DO NOT HAVE FINANCIAL SUPPORT FROM USA ORGANIZATIONS AND
ONCE 30 DAY USRP MAINTENANCE FUNDS EXHAUSTED THEY MUST DEPEND ON
HANDOUTS FM RELIGIOUS CHARITIES AND/OR FEND FOR THEMSELVES ON LOCAL
ECONOMY.

6. THIRD, AND MOST CONTROVERSIAL PHENOMENON IS THAT OF USA
REFUSALS, WHICH AFFECT MOSTLY SOVIET JEWS. REFUSAL RATES VARY FROM
MONTH TO MONTH BUT HAVE BEEN AS HIGH AS 40 PER CENT. SOME DECISIONS
ARE OVERTURNED ON APPEAL (OR TO BE MORE ACCURATE, POSITIVE DECISION
IS REACHED AFTER VOLAG PRESENTS NEW INFO REGARDING REFUGEE CLAIM ON
BEHALF OF APPLICANT) AND REMAINDER ARE OFFERED ADMISSION TO USA AS
PAROLEES. LATTER SOLUTION HOWEVER IS REJECTED BY MANY BECAUSE OF
LACK OF USA GOVERNMENT FUNDING UPON ARRIVAL AND DIFFICULTY IN
SUBSEQUENTLY OBTAINING PR STATUS AND EVENTUALLY CITIZENSHIP IN USA.

7. A FOURTH PHENOMENON FURTHER COMPLICATING MATTERS IS THE DECISION

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BY USA IN JUNE 88 TO LIMIT CARE AND MAINTENANCE FUNDING TO EXCLUSIVE USE OF USA BOUND CASES. THE MOMENT A REFUGEE DECLARES HIS INTENTION TO APPLY TO CDA OR ANOTHER COUNTRY FOR RESETTLEMENT HIS FINANCIAL SUPPORT CEASES. AT SAME TIME DECISION WAS MADE TO LIMIT USRP SUPPORT TO 30 DAYS ONLY. THIS 30 DAY LIMIT IS OF LITTLE IMPORTANCE TO JEWS, AS AMERICAN JOINT FUNDING KICKS IN WHEN USRP RUNS OUT. HOWEVER OTHER SOVIET EMIGRES, ESPECIALLY USA REFUSENIKS, RUN INTO SERIOUS FINANCIAL TROUBLE.

8. UPSHOT OF ALL THESE CHANGES IS THAT MORE SOVIETS ARE ARRIVING IN ITALY, AND THEY ARE REMAINING FOR A LONGER TIME. RECENT PRESS REPORTS DISCUSS POLEMICS WHICH HAVE ERUPTED AS MAYOR OF ONE OF THE RESORT TOWNS HOSTING SOVIETS THREATENED TO RESTRICT NUMBERS OF SOVIETS HE ALLOWS TO ENTER TOWN. MUNICIPALITIES OF THE RESORTS (MAINLY LADISPOLI, BUT ALSO SANTA MARINELLA AND CIVITAVECCHIA) COMPLAIN THAT THEY ARE PROVIDING SERVICES SUCH AS WATER SUPPLY, GARBAGE COLLECTION, SEWAGE DISPOSAL, ETC TO CLIENTS WHO ARE NOT TAXPAYERS. FURTHERMORE THESE SERVICES NORMALLY PROVIDED AT REDUCED LEVEL DURING WINTER MONTHS WHEN POPULATION SHRINKS AS TOURISTS DEPART. SHOPKEEPERS COMPLAINING BECAUSE THROGS OF SOVIETS WHO THEMSELVES LACK FUNDS TO PATRONIZE SHOPS ARE DRIVING AWAY REGULAR ...5

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CLIENTELE. ANOTHER FACTOR IS RENTS, WHICH ARE LOW IN WINTER BUT WHICH SKYROCKET DURING SUMMER MONTHS WHEN TOURISTS FLOCK TO SPASIDE. AGAIN, SOVIETS CANNOT AFFORD THESE HIGHER RENTS AND YET IT IS FEARED THEIR PRESENCE IN SUCH SWOLLEN NUMBERS WILL DRIVE AWAY ITALIAN AND GERMAN CLIENTS.

9. PROBLEMS FURTHER EXACERBATED BY FACT THAT SOVIETS, THOUGH TECHNICALLY PROHIBITED FROM ACCEPTING EMPLOYMENT DO IN FACT SEEK WORK IN ITALY AND ITALIAN TOWN RESIDENTS ARE CHOOSING TO EMPLOY SOVIET CARPENTERS, PAINTERS, ELECTRICIANS, MAIDS, ETC AT FRACTION OF COST OF HIRING ITALIANS, TO GREAT DISGRUNTLEMENT OF LATTER.

10. PLIGHT OF PENTECOSTALS IN ALL LIKHOOD CAUSING GREATEST DISTURBANCE, THOUGH THIS HAS NOT BEEN WIDELY COVERED BY PRESS. WE HAVE BEEN ADVISED IN CONFIDENCE BY ONE VOLAG THAT MANY PENTECOSTALS WHOSE FUNDING HAS RUN OUT OR WHO HAVE BEEN REFUSED BY USA ARE RESIDING IN UNHEATED GARAGES. THIS SITUATION CREATING SANITARY PROBLEM AS GARAGES DO NOT HAVE PLUMBING THUS INHABITANTS RESORT NOT ONLY TO PUBLIC WASHROOMS (VIRTUALLY NONEXISTANT IN ITALY) BUT TO ELEVATORS, DITCHES AND BEACHES. NUMBER OF PERSONS IN THIS PREDICAMENT VERY SMALL BUT UNDER CIRCUMSTANCES THEIR PRESENCE CAUSES DISPROPORTIONATE DIFFICULTY FOR MUNICIPAL AUTHORITIES.

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11. THESE PROBLEMS REACHED CRISIS POINT AT END MARCH THIS YEAR WHEN MAYOR OF SANTA MARINELLA THREATENED TO REFUSE FURTHER ADMISSION OF SOVIETS TO TOWN. AT SAME TIME PREFECT OF ROME SUGGESTED THAT SOVIET REFUGEES BE REFUSED ENTRY TO ITALY. THIS SPARKED RESPONSE FM PROVINCIAL OFFICIAL WHO DECLARED THAT ALL REFUGEES MUST RECEIVE ASSISTANCE FROM ITALIAN AUTHORITIES. CLOSED DOOR MEETINGS BETWEEN INTERESTED COMMUNITY LEADERS AND VOLAGS APPEARS TO HAVE DEFUSED SITU AND WE HAVE BEEN ADVISED THAT AN AGREEMENT HAS BEEN MADE TO SPREAD REFUGEES OVER WIDER AREAS. VOLAGS HAVE MADE WRY COMMENTS TO US TO EFFECT THAT RESORTS WANT TO HAVE CAKE AND EAT IT TOO, IE LANDLORDS WELCOME PROFIT FROM RENTS DURING WINTER MONTHS, WHEN APTS NORMALLY VACANT, BUT ALSO WANT TO ENJOY INCOME FM ASTRONOMIC SUMMER RENTS. BUSINESSES FEAR LOSS OF USUAL SUMMER CLIENTS DURING PROFITABLE TOURIST SEASON.

12. VOLAGS HAVE THEREFORE COME UNDER GREAT DEAL OF PRESSURE FM ITALIANS AND REFUGEES ALIKE, AND THEY IN TURN ARE RAFFLED AND ANGRY WITH SUDDEN ABOUT FACE IN US POLICY VIS A VIS SOVIETS AND PARTICULARLY SOVIET JEWS (PENTECOSTALS AND OTHER NON-JEWS ARE EXPERIENCING LOWER REFUSAL RATES).

13. SOVIET JEWS: MIAS AND AMERICAN JOINT OFFICIALS DESCRIBE DEPRESSION
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AND BEWILDERMENT EXPERIENCED BY USA QUOTE REFUSENIKS UNQUOTE. THESE
PEOPLE HAVE OFTEN BEEN WAITING TEN YEARS OR LONGER FOR PERMISSION TO
EXIT USSR, AND DURING THIS TIME HAVE BEEN DEMOTED OR FIRED AND
HAVE SUFFERED CONTINUOUS HARASSMENT FM SOVIET AUTHORITIES. TO HAVE
FINALLY SUCCEEDED IN DEPARTING USSR ONLY TO FIND ENTRY TO USA BARRED
HAS COME AS RUDE SHOCK TO MOST, WHO BASED ON HISTORICAL ACCEPTANCE
RATES HAVE HAD REASONABLE EXPECTATION OF AUTOMATIC ACCEPTANCE FOR
RESETTLEMENT IN USA.

14. FOR MOST REFUSED CASES HIAS PRESENTS SO CALLED APPEAL IF NEW
INFO CAN BE MADE AVAILABLE BUT IF THIS IS NOT SUCCESSFUL REFUGEES
MUST BE COUNSELLED RE PROCEDURE TO USA ON PAROLE OR URGED TO PROCEED
TO ISRAEL. THIS COUNSELLING OBVIOUSLY VERY TIME AND LABOUR
INTENSIVE. AT SAME TIME THEIR COUNTERPART AGENCY AMERICAN JOINT IS
FACED WITH DRAMATICALLY INCREASED COSTS AS REFUGEES REMAINING FOR
MUCH LONGER TIME, DURING WHICH THEY MUST BE PROVIDED WITH ALLOWANCES,
MEDICAL SERVICES, ETC.

15. HIAS OFFICIALS WE HAVE SPOKEN TO ADMIT THEY ARE UNABLE TO
COMPREHEND RATIONALE FOR INS DECISIONS, AND OFTEN FIND THAT
IDENTICAL CLAIMS TO REFUGEE STATUS MEET WITH DIVERGENT DECISIONS.

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REFUGEES COMPLAIN THAT THEY ARE GIVEN ONLY TEN MINUTES TO PRESENT THEIR CLAIM WHICH THEY FEEL IS NOT SUFFICIENT TIME TO DESCRIBE ALL DETAILS OF ALLEGED PERSUCUTION. IN ATTEMPT TO BREAK DEADLOCK MIAS HAVE HIRED A TEAM OF LAWYERS AND AT SAME TIME SEVERAL PROMINENT JEWISH CONGRESSMEN AND OTHER PUBLIC FIGURES ARE PRESSURING USA GOVT TO ACCEPT MORE SOVIETS FM ROME.

16. WE VISITED LOCAL HEAD OF US INS, ROBERT EDDY, TO REQUEST FURTHER INFO REGARDING ABOUT FACE IN USA POLICY. WE HAD IMAGINED THAT PROBLEM WAS EITHER FINANCIAL (NOT ENOUGH SETTLEMENT FUNDS FOR SO MANY REFUGEES) OR POLITICAL (ATTEMPT TO STEM THE FLOW). WE WERE SURPRISED TO DISCOVER THAT HIGH REFUSALS DUE MORE TO PERSONAL OPINION OF EDDY THAN TO EITHER OF THESE THEORIES. HAVING JUST COMPLETED ASSIGNMENT IN SOUTH EAST ASIA, EDDY FOUND UPON ARRIVAL ROME THAT REFUGEE SELECTION CRITERIA APPLIED IN ROME MUCH MORE LENIENTLY AND THAT INS WERE RUBBER STAMPING ACCEPTANCE OF MOST APPLICATIONS. IN DESCRIBING HISTORY OF SOVIET JEWISH EMIGRE MOVEMENT HE INDICATED THAT, WHEREAS IN PAST EMIGRES HAD BEEN INVOLVED IN DISSIDENT ACTIVITIES AND HAD OFTEN SUFFERED INCARCERATION AS A RESULT, CURRENT APPLICANTS CLAIM MORE GENERAL DISCRIMINATION IN LOCAL COMMUNITIES, CITING INABILITY TO OBTAIN CERTAIN JOBS, INABILITY TO PRACTICE

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RELIGION ETC..EDDY FOUND HIMSELF UNCOMFORTABLE WITH BLANKET
ACCEPTANCE POLICY WHICH HAD HITHERTO BEEN APPLIED AND THUS SOUGHT
FURTHER GUIDANCE FM STATE DEPARTMENT.THIS RESULTED IN WRITTEN
COMMUNICATION FM FORMER US ATTORNEY GENERAL MESSE TO THEN NATIONAL
SECURITY ADVISOR POWELL CONFIRMING THAT LAWS ON REFUGEE SELECTION
SHOULD BE APPLIED.EDDY TOOK THIS AS GO AHEAD TO REFUSE APPLICANTS
WHO COULD NOT PRESENT CLEAR EVIDENCE OF PERSECUTION ON RELIGIOUS OR
OTHER GROUNDS.AS CONCESSION TO PROTESTS THAT INTERVIEWS WERE TOO
SHORT HE HAS INCREASED THESE TO HALF HOUR FROM TEN MINUTES.THIS
HAS DECREASED NUMBER OF CASES PROCESSED PER DAY AND INCREASED
WAITING TIME UNTIL RESETTLEMENT.

18.WSHDC REFTTEL DESCRIBING INCREASE IN USA FUNDING/REFUGEE
ADMISSIONS CEILING ARRIVED DURING DRAFTING OF THIS REPORT AND WE
NOTE CONCERNS EXPRESSED BY JONATHAN MOORE USA CO-ORD FOR REFUGEES
THAT ROME INS REFUSAL RATE OF SOVIET JEWS TOO HIGH.THERE CERTAINLY
IS ANOMALY IN USA URGING SOVIETS TO RELAX EXIT CRITERIA ON ONE HAND
AND THEN SUDDENLY REFUSING ENTRY VISAS WHEN SOVIET OUTFLOW DOES
BEGIN TO INCREASE.

19.ETHICAL PROBLEMS FACED BY EDDY(IF PROBLEMS OF STRICTLY APPLYING
REFUGEE SELECTION CRITERIA TO SOVIETS)WILL LIKELY BE RESOLVED IF IN

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FACT NEW HUMANITARIAN CLASS CREATED AS INDICATED IN WS7DC REFTTEL.
SHOULD THIS NEW CATEGORY BE ADOPTED, REFUSAL OF REFUGEE STATUS
WILL BECOME MERE TECHNICALITY AS HUMANITARIAN VISAS WILL GUARANTEE
SAME FINANCIAL BENEFITS AND CONFER SAME PR STATUS AS THOSE ENJOYED
BY REFUGEES, REMOVING THE PAROLEE STIGMA.

19. NON-JEWISH EMIGRES: AS INDICATED ABOVE USA REFUSALS AFFECT MAINLY
SOVIET JEWS. WHILE NO FIGURES AVAILABLE AS TO EXACT BREAKDOWN,
APPROX RATION OF JEWS TO NON-JEWS ESTIMATED AT 4:1. MOST OF
THESE ARE PENTECOSTALS THOUGH THERE ARE ALSO SOME BAPTISTS, ORTHODOX
BELIEVERS AND QUOTE MIXED MARRIAGES UNQUOTE OF JEWISH MEN TO
GENTILE WOMEN, WHICH ARE NOT ASSISTED BY HIAS. PENTECOSTALS
CURRENTLY ARE ARRIVING AT RATE OF 500 PER MONTH. LOCAL DIRECTOR OF
MIGRANTES (VOLAG FOR MOST PENTECOSTALS) ESTIMATES THAT APPROX 170
TO 200 THOUSAND PENTECOSTALS RESIDE IN USSR, BUT CAN ONLY SPECULATE
ON NUMBERS WISHING TO LEAVE. THIS CLIENTELE DOES NOT DEMONSTRATE MUCH
INITIATIVE AS PENTECOSTALS HAVE HAD TO MAINTAIN LOW PROFILE IN USSR
AND HAVE BEEN FORCED TO WORSHIP IN SECRET BECAUSE OF RELIGIOUS
BELIEFS (CONSIDERED ANTI-COMMUNIST). THEY HAVE BEEN DENIED ACCESS TO
HIGHER EDUCATION THUS MAJORITY ARE SKILLED WORKERS OR FARMERS. WHILE
USA REFUSAL RATE HAS BEEN COMPARATIVELY LOW (APPROX .7 PERCENT

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ACCORDING TO ONE SOURCE) REFUSALS HAVE GREATER IMPACT AS
PENTECOSTALS TEND TO HAVE VERY LARGE FAMILIES.

20. THIS GROUP HAS ALSO BEEN HARD HIT BY RECENT DECISION TO CLOSE WCC
(WORLD COUNCIL OF CHURCHES) OFFICE EFFECTIVE AUGUST 89, DUE TO
DIMINISHING RESOURCES. PREVIOUSLY WCC HAD RESPONSIBILITY FOR
PENTECOSTALS ET AL. IN ANTICIPATION OF CLOSURE, WCC HAVE RETIRED
FILES FOR PENTECOSTALS WHO HAVE BEEN REFUSED BY USA, IF WCC HAVE NOT
LAUNCHED APPEALS, OR OTHERWISE PURSUED CASES. THESE PERSONS WHO NUMBER
APPROX 600 WERE NOT TRANSFERRED TO MIGRANTES AND ARE THEREFORE NOW
NOT REGISTERED WITH ANY VOLAG. AS 30 DAY PERIOD HAS ELAPSED THEY ARE
NO LONGER ENTITLED TO USRP FUNDING. MANY ARE CARED FOR BY NUNS BUT
SOME FAMILIES HAVE NO ASSISTANCE AT ALL, AND SOME HAVE REQUESTED
FUNDS FROM ITALIAN AUTHORITIES. WE UNDERSTAND THAT THESE CASES IN LIMBO
WILL SHORTLY BE REASSIGNED TO OTHER VOLAGS BY ICM.

21. EFFECT ON CDAS REFUGEE CASELOAD: DRAMATIC INFLUX OF SOVIETS AND
INCREASED USA REFUSALS HAVE NOT LED TO RUSH ON CDN VISAS, AND CUP
CASELOAD HAS INCREASED ONLY IN PROPORTION TO OVERALL INCREASE IN
ARRIVALS. THIS IS DUE TO TWO IMPORTANT FACTORS. FIRSTLY, FOR MAJORITY
OF SOVIETS DEPARTING USSR, USA APPEARS TO BE SYMBOL OF ALL THEY ARE
ESCAPING IN HOME COUNTRY: FREEDOM FROM RELIGIOUS PERSECUTION, LACK OF

CONTROL OVER PERSONAL POLITICAL AND ECONOMIC LIFE, AND CHANCE TO IMPROVE MATERIAL WELL BEING. CANADA IS AN UNKNOWN QUANTITY AND IS ATTRACTIVE ONLY TO MINORITY WHO HAVE RELATIVES OR FRIENDS ALREADY RESETTLED IN CDA.

22. SECOND AND MORE IMPORTANT FACTOR IS PURELY FINANCIAL. CANADA'S PROCESSING IS LONGER THAN USAS AND AT THE SAME TIME WE DO NOT/NOT PROVIDE FUNDING FOR CARE AND MAINTAINANCE. USRP AND AMERICAN JOINT FUNDING IS CUT OFF AS SOON AS AN APPLICANT STATES HIS INTENTION TO APPLY FOR RESETTLEMENT IN COUNTRY OTHER THAN USA. THUS MIAS REFUSES TO SUBMIT CASES TO CDA UNLESS REFUGEE CAN ORGANIZE JIAS OR PRIVATE SPONSORSHIP AND/OR CAN COME UP WITH CARE AND MAINTENANCE FUNDING FM CDN SOURCES, NORMALLY FAMILY MEMBERS. AS A RESULT CDA IS NOT VIABLE OPTION FOR USA REFUSENIKS. ONLY EXCEPTIONS HAVE BEEN HANDFUL OF PENTECOSTALS AND QUOTE MIXED MARRIAGES UNQUOTE. SPONSORSHIPS ARE EITHER ON FILE OR FORTHCOMING FOR MOST PENTECOSTALS, WHILE MIXED MARRIAGE CASES ARE SURVIVING ILLEGALLY ON LOCAL ECONOMY, AWAITING RESETTLEMENT UNDER OUR EXPECTED DC QUOTA FOR NEXT YEAR.

23. WE VIEW LACK OF SUBSTANTIAL GROWTH IN OUR SOVIET CASELOAD AS UNFORTUNATE BUT UNAVOIDABLE: UNFORTUNATE BECAUSE CDA IS MISSING OUT ON MANY TALENTED AND WELL QUALIFIED PERSONS WHO WOULD BE DEFINITE ASSET TO CDN SOCIETY. THIS IS CERTAINLY PERSPECTIVE TAKEN BY JIAS AND

OTHER CDN GROUPS WHICH SUPPORT INCREASED MOVEMENT OF SOVIETS TO CDA.
HOWEVER THIS LACK OF SUBSTANTIAL GROWTH IS ALSO UNAVOIDABLE.
UNAVOIDABLE BECAUSE SOVIETS ARE AFTER ALL ONLY ONE COMPONENT OF OUR
EASTERN EUROPEAN MOVEMENT. THIS IS AN IMPORTANT FACT WHICH CANNOT BE
OVEREMPHASIZED.

24. SOVIET MOVEMENT DOES RECEIVE A GOOD DEAL OF PRESS COVERAGE AND
HAS SYMPATHY OF MANY POWERFUL CDN INTEREST GROUPS. IT IS VERY EASY
TO ALLOW THE GLARE OF PUBLICITY FOR SOVIETS TO BLIND US TO PLIGHT OF

ON DECEMBER 9, 1988 THE SUPREME COURT RULED THAT THERE WAS NO/NO BASIS IN LAW FOR THE MINISTRY OF JUSTICE TO HOLD REFUGEE CLAIMANTS IN THE DETENTION CENTRE (HOTEL FACILITY) IN SCHIPHOL EAST. THIS LEFT JUSTICE WITH THE CHOICE OF RELEASING CLAIMANTS TO THE COUNTRY OF TRYING TO REMOVE PEOPLE ALMOST IMMEDIATELY. JUSTICE PREPARED A BILL TO GIVE SCHIPHOL EAST A LEGAL BASIS AND WITHIN THE WEEK TRIED TO RUSH BILL THROUGH PARLIAMENT. THE LOWER HOUSE RELUCTANTLY AGREED AND PASSED BILL BUT THE FIRST CHAMBER DECIDED IT WOULD NOT/NOT BE RUSHED AND DELAYED DEBATE ON BILL TILL 10 JAN 89. JUSTICE MINISTRY SUPPORTED THE RUSHING THROUGH OF THE BILL BECAUSE HOLDING PEOPLE IN TRANSIT HALL FOR UP TO 54 HRS FOR INITIAL CONSIDERATION OF REFUGEE REQUEST WAS CONSIDERED INHUMAN.

2. BETWEEN CHRISTMAS AND NEW YEAR THREE ASYLUM SEEKERS BEING HELD IN TRANSIT HALL APPEALED TO THE COURTS TO BE RELEASED INTO THE NETHERLANDS ON SAME GROUNDS USED IN SCHIPHOL EAST CASE. THE GOVERNMENT PROSECUTOR STATED THAT INF CONFINEMENT IN THE TRANSIT HALL WAS ALSO DECLARED TO BE UNLAWFUL DETENTION THEN BORDER CONTROL AT SCHIPHOL AIRPORT WOULD END.

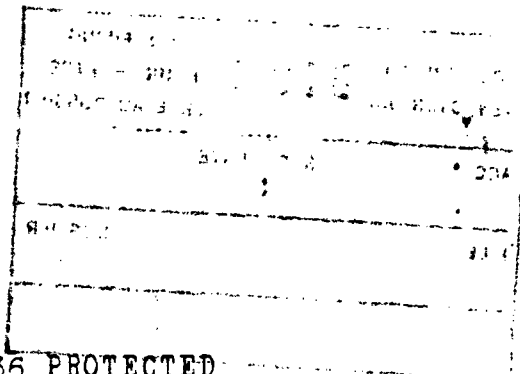

This refers to your letter of November 2, 1987. I regret the delay in response caused by the referral of your letter to our Embassy in Rome for their comments on the processing procedure required by the Italian authorities.

The Italian government, faced with an enormous financial and logistical burden due to the massive influx of Eastern Europeans over the summer months, has taken action to control the entry of asylum seekers. In the past, Eastern Europeans arriving in Italy could proceed directly to the Latina camp and register for asylum with the Questura (Police) office located at the camp. Latina was designed to accommodate 1200 persons. With over 12,000 asylum seekers entering this year, Italian authorities took a decision to close the Latina camp on August 4, 1987 and revised their legislative procedures. New arrivals must now register at local Questura offices and submit an application for political asylum there. Although applicants are not expected to stay permanently in Italy, this step is necessary in order for them to be granted permission to remain in Italy and to receive food and shelter, medical assistance etc.

The refugee claimants who have written you appear to have been granted food and lodging by the Italian government and are now waiting for their refugee ID card (Profugo) from the Italian Ministry of the Interior. Once the card is issued, the Ministry of the Interior provides a list of names of refugees seeking resettlement to the voluntary organizations who visit the camps and fill out application forms for various countries. At the moment the voluntary organizations have approximately 2000 applications on hand and will be submitting them gradually to the Embassy. The refugee claimants who have written appear to be well aware of the procedures and have in fact done all

that is possible to further their case. Their complaint would appear to be founded on the unrealistic expectation that once they arrived in Italy they would immediately be resettled in Canada. Given the numbers of Eastern Europeans applying all over Western Europe and not just in Rome this is unfortunately not possible.

The Embassy cannot accept more applications over the course of a year than it has government-sponsored places to fill. This year's allocation for Eastern Europeans to Rome is 1175. Direct contact with the Embassy in Rome would not speed up the process as there are approximately ten times more Eastern Europeans in Rome than there are resettlement places for Canada. Medical and background checks have expiry dates and it serves no purpose to have people undergo them if they have no hope of leaving before these checks expire. Other recently arrived Eastern Europeans are no better and no worse off, and must follow the same procedure as the persons who have written you. The embassy in Rome cannot provide favourable consideration for this group at the expense of others who have been waiting many months or even years for their turn.

It would not be of any use for the group to go elsewhere as all Western European posts are facing a similar situation. Furthermore, the claimants mentioned in the correspondence now have food and lodging in Italy and their cases will be presented in turn to the Embassy. We should point out that there is in fact no guarantee that applicants will meet admissibility criteria and that no assurances can be made that a visa will be issued until such time as all processing is completed.

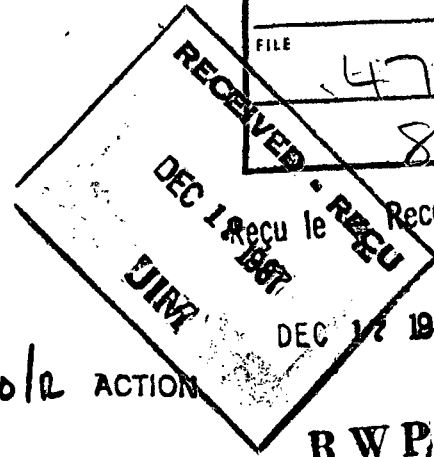
The only way this group could speed up the processing time would be if they were to get a sponsorship. With a sponsorship they would no longer have to wait their turn for government-sponsored places and would not be subject to the allocation of 1175 places to Rome.

I trust that this information will be of assistance and will help to clarify the situation.

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How the West blocks refugees' right of way

SEVERAL participants at the most recent meeting of the world's top forum on refugee issues could hardly believe their ears. The United States representative, Catherine Brown, a legal adviser in the State Department, calmly told the group in Geneva — officially known as the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees sub-committee on international protection — that a good way to deter refugees from coming might be to detain them as soon as they arrive.

She was supported by Michel den Hond, representing the Dutch government, who even attempted to argue that detention at an airport was not really the same as locking people up. A less emotive word should be found.

Both speakers were promptly challenged by African delegates who reminded them that to use detention for deterrence was contrary to international refugee conventions. "It was an amazing role reversal on human rights, and a clear illustration of how the climate in the Western world has changed," one participant at the meeting recalls.

The arrival of a few thousand extra refugees from the Third World in the past two years has led conservative and social-democratic European governments alike into a drastic tightening of their asylum laws. The year of Live Aid, with its charitable fistfuls of banknotes dropped safely from upstairs windows into the street below, has been accompanied by the sound of hastily slammed front doors.

Visa requirements have been slapped on. With the warning that they will be fined if they take passengers without the right documents, airlines have been told in effect to become policemen. "Governments are trying to make it as impossible as possible for refugees to set out from their countries in the first place," says Martin Barber, director of the British Refugee Council.

All the major countries of asylum have changed their practices. Denmark, which used to pride itself on never rejecting refugees at the border, revised its laws six weeks ago.

Without valid visas people are being turned away in a move which the Government hopes will reduce the number of arriving refugees by three-quarters. Britain has also imposed visa requirements on a string of Commonwealth countries in the Third World for the same reason.

Switzerland has passed a law which will set up four "reception centres" to which all asylum-seekers will be

sent for screening. If rejected, they will be expelled within days.

Even without the new legislation, European states have been narrowing the criteria for accepting people as refugees. In Switzerland, the acceptance rate has dropped from 80 per cent of all asylum-seekers in 1980 to 8 per cent in the first quarter of this year. In France the rate has dropped from 85 per cent in 1976 to 43 per cent last year. In Britain it went from 55 per cent in 1979 to 23 per cent last year. The Government's claim is that the change is due to the larger number of economic migrants posing as refugees but voluntary agencies dispute this.

Some countries do at least operate broad discretion in allowing rejected asylum-seekers to remain even though they do not have refugee status. Britain gives what is called "exceptional leave to remain," which can be renewed annually. West Germany has a system of "Duldung" or toleration, while Switzerland calls their system contradictorily "open internment." France is alone among the major recipient countries in not having an interim status. Rejected refugees are supposed to be deported, though many actually

remain in France underground. To deal with this issue in the case of Poles, Indo-Chinese and Lebanese, France has passed a special

decree allowing these nationalities to work. Voluntary agencies have pressed the government to make the same allowance for others.

Rules for refugees waiting for a decision on their applications as well as for the "tolerated" but officially rejected refugees vary widely

throughout Europe. In Britain they can work, and are free to travel within the country. In Switzerland, with its Federal system, they are obliged to stay in one particular canton. For the first six months they have to stay in a hostel or transit home. Living conditions are reasonably good, but asylum-seekers can only take jobs after six months in a restricted number of positions, such as unskilled work in agriculture, hotels and restaurants, and on building sites. Obviously these are jobs which Swiss are no longer willing to take. Holland which used to be liberal has been forcing Tamils who were already in private flats to move to hostels.

In parts of West Germany where responsibility is left to the various states, conditions are worst. Refugees have to live in collective accommodation, often camps with several hundred people, communal eating, and no initial right to work. West Germany already has enough Turkish and southern European "gastarbeiter" to do its dirty work, without needing refugees. New legislation, which has just passed the Bundestag in deference to the prejudice that most refugees are economic migrants, extends

the work-ban from two to five years. (East European) asylum-seekers, even when rejected, can work after one year.

The United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, Jean-Pierre Hocke, has warned that the way European governments have responded to the refugee issue "based on purely national interest and domestic considerations only deflects the problem from one country to another. This may serve short-term political goals but is no solution to the underlying humanitarian problem. What is needed is a co-ordinated global approach."

The UNHCR has convened two working groups of European governments on Tamils and Iranians in the hope of getting them to understand the problem better. But there are critics who believe the UNHCR could and should be doing more. Mr Hocke's experience has been with refugees in the Third World, and they wonder whether, in the interest of keeping European government money flowing into the organisation's camps in Asia, Africa, and Latin America, he may not be soft-peddling the scandal of Europe's handling of refugees in Europe itself.

Is the UNHCR doing too little, too late? As the doors slam shut in Europe, there may be little point soon in working out a co-ordinated approach. The next step — increased deportation — has already begun. "Tolerated" refugees face a growing threat of being sent back. People who have been five years or more in Europe, with children who know no other place, are being asked to leave. So far most European countries have at least refrained from sending Tamils and Iranians back. That is changing. Britain is considering whether to fly a group of more than a hundred Iranians back. In Switzerland 30 Tamils have been given until the end of the year to return to Colombo.

In reaction to that, ten church congregations have decided on an unusually bold initiative. They are secretly harbouring the refugees in parishioners' homes in defiance of the authorities. "We could face prison sentences of up to six months," says Jacob Schaedelin, pastor of the Bethlehem church in Bern. "I consider that it is not our action but what the government is doing which is illegal, and a violation of human rights. During the Nazi period we think Swiss churches did very little. Although we were neutral, they allowed Jews to be deported although they knew what would happen to them. The churches betrayed their duty then. The situation is similar today."

Restricted land of the free

THE NEW debate in Europe over restrictive asylum policies is an old affair in the United States, according to "Calculated Kindness," a well-documented study of American policy since 1945.

Its two authors, who are non-political academics, point out that in the land of the Statue of Liberty refugee protection has been more a tool of foreign policy than an act of humanitarian generosity.

Administrations of both parties have wanted to show that people leave Communist countries as refugees but leave capitalist ones, if they are allowed into the United States at all, for other reasons. Governments have been more keen to present a negative image of Communist rule than to help the starving. "It is not accidental that over 90 per cent of all the special admissions permitted between 1945 and the present have involved individuals fleeing Marxist regimes. Nor

is it accidental that many of those we have turned away, Chileans, Salvadorans, Korean dissidents, have been labelled as leftwing trouble-makers," the book's authors write.

Jimmy Carter, who became famous for stressing human rights, was little different from his predecessors. He ordered the authorities to turn away, detain, or deport thousands of Haitian boat-people, until thousands of Cubans also started to arrive in Florida. Then under pressure, he agreed to allow in both groups.

The book's enormously detailed history of US asylum practices does not spare the former United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees, Poul Hartling. He is accused of being slow to criticise the harshness of the Reagan Administration's treatment of Salvadorans and Haitians. "Dependent on the United States for a large percentage of its annual operating bud-

get, the UNHCR lacked the financial independence and institutional strength to challenge its largest benefactor effectively," they write.

Another former UNHCR, Sadruddin Aga Khan, along with Crown Prince Hassan bin Talal of Jordan, is chairman of the Independent Commission on International Humanitarian Issues, which has just produced the clearest summary currently available of refugee issues. Edited by Jeffery Crisp of the British Refugee Council, the book explains why refugees come and cogently criticises governments and publics for their short-sighted and narrow-minded policies.

Bonn seeks tougher rules on immigrants

COMMON Market leaders meeting in London today are likely to back a West German request for EEC-wide restrictions on political asylum to end covert immigration by bogus asylum-seekers.

They are also expected to renew the Community's commitment to joint action against terrorism, and issue a statement condemning countries which support terror groups. But Mrs Thatcher, who chairs the summit at the Queen Elizabeth Conference Centre in Westminster, will have difficulty persuading her colleagues to promise specific action against state sponsors of terror.

The summit will discuss Europe's record levels of unemployment, the best strategy for the creation of jobs, and how to push forward with plans to remove all barriers to free movement of people and goods within the EEC by 1992. The heads of state or government will also call for increased European co-operation in the medical and public information campaigns against both Aids and cancer.

Mrs Thatcher, who becomes one of a select band of politicians to chair two EEC summits, is expected to portray the two-day meeting as a concerted attempt by the Common Market to address problems of concern to ordinary people.

The eclectic summit agenda is a departure from the recent tradition of hard-bargaining summits which tackled head-on the most contentious EEC issue of the day. By tacit consent, and to the great relief of the other EEC leaders, Mrs Thatcher has decided to avoid a detailed negotiation on

the linked crises of agricultural over-production and financial insolvency which face the Common Market next year.

With an election in West Germany next month and negotiations still dragging on at official and ministerial level, the Government believes there is no point in a full-scale summit row on agriculture and the budget. But the European Commission President, Jacques Delors, will be invited to present provisional Brussels proposals for solving the crises after Mrs Thatcher hosts a dinner for the EEC leaders at Downing Street tonight. It is understood that Mr Delors will suggest that the Community's creaking finances should be radically reformed, including the transfer of a small proportion of national income or corporation taxes to Brussels.

Chancellor Kohl of West Germany wrote to Mrs Thatcher last week, asking for a summit declaration promising EEC action to prevent asylum rights from being abused as a form of back-door immigration. The summit is expected to urge that this issue should be tackled urgently as part of existing negotiations on the harmonisation of visa and immigration policy.

■ ATHENS — Greece has granted political asylum to 98 Iranians who entered the country illegally to escape military service or political persecution, Kieran Cooke writes.

Nearly 200 Iranians have arrived in Greece in recent weeks after paying \$3,000 (£2,000) to \$6,000 to middlemen to arrange passages through Turkey. Greece has accused Turkish officials of helping the Iranians to cross the border illicitly. Turkey denied it.

Free Iranian Refugees in Turkey!

One o'clock in the morning of March 2, 1991, the Turkish police arrested 10 Iranian refugees at their homes in Ankara. Following these arrests, there was a consequent raid on the residence of other Iranian refugees, by the Turkish police. The only apparent reason for these arrests was that these refugees were political activists opposing the Islamic Republic of Iran. There have been no other grounds for these illegal arrests.

The Turkish government's human rights record is almost as bad as that of the Iranian regime. There have been many reports published indicating the existence of widespread torture in Turkish prisons. We have been informed by our sources in Turkey that the Iranian refugees—now political prisoners of the repressive regime of Turkey—have been brutally tortured and beaten. Two of these prisoners have been transferred to a hospital in Ankara. The government of Turkey has refused to allow relatives or friends of these prisoners—including U.N. representatives—into the prison or the hospital. This is an obvious breach of human rights.

Moreover, the government of Turkey—now a trade companion of the Islamic regime of Iran—is planning to deport these prisoners to Iran where they will be awaiting the death chambers or prisons of the Islamic regime. And all this only for their struggle for *freedom* and *democracy*, for practicing their right to *free speech*. We emphasize that **THERE ARE NO GROUNDS FOR THESE ARRESTS**. This is an obvious act of disregard for human rights.

We the participants in this demonstration, all other members of our society, and many political organizations and human right activists in Vancouver condemn the arrest of Iranian refugees in Turkey and demand:

1. The immediate release of the detained refugees.
2. An immediate and active intervention of the United Nations' high commission for refugees in Geneva and its offices in Turkey to free these political refugees.
3. Immediate intervention of the United Nations' office in Vancouver to accelerate this process.
4. An immediate stop to deportation of Iranian political refugees from Turkey—or any other country including Canada—to Iran.
5. Passing of a resolution to condemn the recent imprisonment and torture of political refugees and other prisoners in Turkey.
6. Facilitation of immigration of the prisoners (should they choose to do so) to a third country where human rights are respected and recognized—since the lives of refugees are in danger in Turkey.

We finally demand Immigration Canada to facilitate the process of accepting refugees into our country—especially those in immediate and imminent danger of prosecution.
