I believe that this arrangement will permit you to proceed on a ten-year planning basis and at the same time it will open the way for discussions with us if the number of non-Catholic children numbering ten require education during that period.

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I understand you are prepared to provide hostel accommodation for twenty-five children in the existing building commencing April 15, 1954, and that as of that date you would arrange for the services of a second qualified teacher. (I understand further that during the summer of 1953 you would endeavour to commence the construction of the new hostel with plans approved in advance by this Department.) It would appear that you contemplate the completion of this building by April 15, 1956. I have previously indicated that there will be no contribution by the Department towards the cost of the construction of the hostel or its equipment and furnishings. By April 15, 1955, you would, therefore, be in a position to accommodate up to the full complement of fifty boarding children to be selected by you, with the approval of the Department, in the hostel and teach them as well as the children of the settlement in the school.

The question of maintenance of the hostel was mentioned in your discussions with Colonel Cunningham. This presents certain difficulties. In the first place regulations preclude government expenditure on work of this nature on property which is not owned by the government. In addition to that, moreover, I feel that such an arrangement would be difficult to administer and having regard to the grant per pupil would be most difficult to justify.

Dear Bishop Lacroix:

I wish to acknowledge your letter of the 13th of February regarding the school at Chesterfield Inlet and the proposed hostel. I have also before me Colonel Cunningham's report of the meeting of the 13th of February attended by yourself, Father Laviolette, and Messrs. Cunningham, Fraser, Cantley, Jacobson and Grantham.

In reviewing this matter further it is now apparent to me that some modifications are necessary to the arrangements outlined to you in my letter of the 2nd of February. Chief amongst these is the question of a reasonable period for you to amortize the initial cost of the hostel. Furthermore, there are other matters such as maintenance of the hostel, the school year, and the cost of bringing the children to Chesterfield Inlet and returning them at the end of the school year.

I have been quite aware that the limitation I imposed of five years was not a satisfactory one. When the decision was made, however, I felt I had to have due regard to the possibility of there being non-Catholic children in the Chesterfield Inlet school and the arrangements I made provided for a revision of the arrangements in the event that the contingency developed. I am now prepared, however, to modify my previous letter to the extent of considering a ten-year period. This will mean that the teaching staff at the Chesterfield Inlet school may comprise members of religious orders and that this will continue until the 1st of September, 1963, at which time the arrangement for continuation will be reviewed. I must stipulate, however, that if at any time during this ten-year period there are a



I am prepared to say at this time that the Department will pay the sum of \$2.00 per day per child, quarterly in arrears at the end of the first three quarters of each fiscal year on receipt of returns showing the number of children accommodated. At the end of the fourth quarter of each fiscal year, that is to say on March 31, suitable excerpts from the proper book of accounts kept by the hostel are to be submitted to us for determination of the actual cost of boarding the children. The payment by the Department at the end of the fourth quarter will be a sum which when added to the three previous quarterly grants will equal the cost of boarding the children for the school year.

Our estimates for the following fiscal year are compiled annually in October. It will, therefore, be essential for us to have a definite understanding by the first of October of each year of the total number of children who will be accommodated at the hostel during the term commencing the following 15th of April. This information as to numbers should also include the places from which they are to come and proposals regarding transportation.

In your discussion with Colonel Cunningham the responsibility for the financial cost of the transportation of the children to and from Chesterfield Inlet was reviewed. It has not been the policy of the Department in the past to defray this cost. However, I am prepared to leave it open at this time and review it further when we have some indication of the numbers involved and the distances they are to come.

I am pleased to learn of the very satisfactory discussion you have had with the Director. I would like to participate in these talks but I am quite sure you are aware that it is just not possible for me to do so. However, I do hope that on your next trip to Ottawa you will come in and see me.

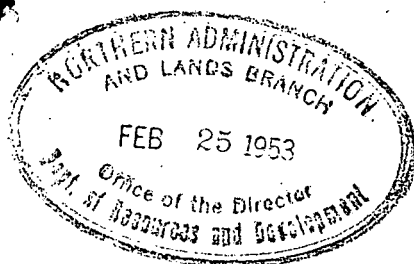

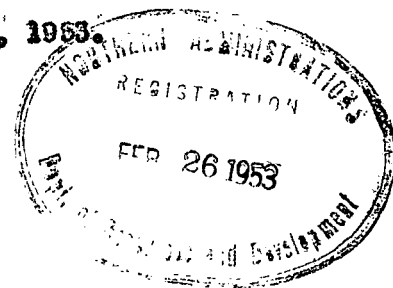

Dear General Young:

In acknowledging your letter dated February 2nd, 1953, re proposed hostel at Chesterfield Inlet, I wish to express my sincere appreciation for the interest you are showing in the education and welfare of the Eskimo population.

I am pleased to note your willingness in accepting teachers belonging to a religious order under the conditions mentioned in your letter.

You are aware, that since 1950, at which time we had made a serious attempt at providing hostel facilities at Chesterfield, in conjunction with the Federal Day School, conditions have changed to no small degree. In 1950, the Grey Nuns were ready to accept positions as school teachers and matrons at Chesterfield: in all, six or seven Sisters were to be assigned there. At the present time, I would have to make new demands from the Mother General of the Grey Nuns. This I am prepared to do as soon as possible.

Again in 1950 our Corporation was able to finance the erection of the hostel, according to the plans and specifications supplied by your Department. Since we had not come to a satisfactory agreement in 1950, the funds which would then have been available have been put to other use. With the result that, unless our current transactions with the view of selling our motor vessel the "Regina Polaris", meet with success, our Corporation will not be able to finance the construction of the proposed hostel in the immediate future.

While I appreciate your desire to give me reasonable assurance of continuity in this project, I feel that I cannot be justified in investing a minimum of \$150,000.00, and also in requesting the services of six or seven Nuns to secure

teaching and hostel service at Chesterfield, unless I have more definite assurance of continuity than that you seem to guarantee in your letter.

I have had this morning a very pleasant and constructive interview with Mr. F.J.G.Cunningham and other staff members of the Northern Administration Branch, according to your suggestion. While we may foresee the fullest cooperation between your Department and our Church in operational policies, the only question that raised serious doubts in our minds was the fact that unless we receive the assistance that the proposed agreement continues at least until 1963, the usual term for Nuns who are assigned to Northern work being ten years, I would find it very difficult to obtain the required personnel.

Furthermore, investing \$150,000.00 at one single mission point would not be sound, unless it could be spread over a reasonable number of years. Even though I appreciate your proposal in the light of our missionary effort, I am well aware that the contribution of the Church in constructing the hostel would be of no small value to implementing the educational program of your Department.

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

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DEPUTY MINISTER:

CHESTERFIELD INLET SCHOOL

In accordance with the request contained in your letter to him dated the 2nd of February, 1953, Bishop Lacroix, accompanied by Father Laviolette, has discussed with me and with Messrs. Fraser, Cantley, Jacobson and Grantham the various questions which, in your said letter, you asked him to see me about.

2. Bishop Lacroix confirms the facts as we had them about the religious characteristics of the children in the Chesterfield Inlet area. He tells me that there was last summer at Chesterfield an Anglican Eskimo, Tugak, who is a married man with two children of school age. He worked for the hospital but was only in Chesterfield Inlet temporarily and is no longer there. In addition, there is an aged Eskimo named Shiniktuk who works for the doctor at Chesterfield Inlet. Shiniktuk has two grown sons - one married to a Catholic woman and the other to a Protestant woman. The Protestant son has as yet no children, but it is possible that in five or six years' time he will have a child of school age who would be an Anglican. This factor bears on the 5-year term mentioned in your letter to Bishop Lacroix as it makes it appear that within at the most seven years there is likely to be an Anglican native child in Chesterfield Inlet. Bishop Lacroix is considering making representations to you for an extension of this term from 5 years to 10.

3. Subject to agreement between Bishop Lacroix and you as to the length of the guaranteed term or the establishment of some other reasonable safeguard, Bishop Lacroix accepts the suggestion in your letter as to the establishment of a hostel for Roman Catholic children at Chesterfield Inlet, to be operated in conjunction with the Federal Day School at that point. He does not think it possible to get the new building constructed by September 1953. He says that there are facilities in buildings now there to accommodate approximately 25 children from outside places as soon as arrangements can be made, and that he would be willing to construct the necessary hostel

DECEMBER, 1952 WELFARE REPORT - CHESTERFIELD INLET - R. Lariviere,
Welfare Teacher.

The visitors were very many during the month of December, Christmas, the Eskimos were some 215, including the children. Heads of the families came, but not the wives and children. The snow was very mild and three families arrived on Christmas day, after dinner.

A few families are still here. They should go out on the lands pretty soon.

In December I have been in contact with about all the families. The condition for the food is excellent, plenty of caribou.

Since the end of November, we had in the settlement, the German measles. Some 80 Eskimos got it in the settlement. A few got the same out on the lands at the same time. Now, it seems the ones that came for Christmas are getting it. There is nothing serious except the Doctor closed the school for the whole month of December.

During the measles, I visited some families, especially one where a child did not want to go to the hospital. (He was tired with it, because he has already spent a month in there). One Saturday morning an Eskimo came from the lands, I heard he has a sore leg, so I went to visit him. For these two cases, I was blamed, because I was interfering with the Doctor. Please, study for one minute the list of my duties like a Welfare Teacher, and you will soon find that all we can do out of the school is an interference with the Doctor, the policemen, the mission and the hospital. I would appreciate it if you could clarify the situation, since the same case can be foreseen at another time.

Except for the measles, there were no unusual disease to be noticed.

At Christmas, we had not a dance in the school. I thought it was not wise to have one, during the measles, so none could blame the school for having spread the disease. We have three families who stayed here for the winter, instead of going out on the lands. So, the police is rather inclined not to give family allowances to those families. Two of them lost some dogs. (2 out of 4, and 3 out of six) so the life is very hard on those people.

Is there anything in the law telling the Eskimo should get the family allowance if they are here or there?

Let us say it might be better for a family to live out on the lands providing they can; should the children be starving because their father lives in the settlement instead of living away, while there children see their own money kept by the police?

I would like to receive advice considering such a situation, since I receive the visit of some of these people and sometimes, I am in a very difficult position.

and the availability of local schools. We think that the children will in effect be drawn almost exclusively from the following points:

This being so, we could define our responsibility as limited to children whose homes are on the Keewatin Mainland, Melville Peninsula, and Boothia Peninsula.

8. It would be desirable, further, to have a definite understanding in October of each year (at which time all our estimates for the following year are made) of the total number of children who would be accommodated at the hostel during the term commencing the following 15th of April.

9. Bishop Macroix was present while I dictated this memorandum but I have not given him a copy of it. You will no doubt be hearing from him shortly.

approximately \$2 per day. Based on a 9-month term, the annual per capita cost would therefore be \$540. This should be paid to the Church authorities on receipt of quarterly returns showing the number of children accommodated. Payments would be made in arrears at the end of each quarter. Any disparity between the \$2 estimate of cost and the actual cost, as shown by the proper books kept by the hostel, would be adjusted at the end of the fourth quarter.

6. In addition, the Church authorities should be paid the actual cost of repair and maintenance of the hostel building, but should not be paid any portion of the capital cost or any amortization thereof. Since difficulties would arise if we tried to tie this payment to actual costs incurred, it is considered preferable to make a definite agreement for a term of years calling for a specified payment each year to cover this item. We think that in the case of the Chesterfield Inlet Hostel, the sum of \$3750 per year would be proper. This figure is arrived at by taking 2½% of the estimated cost of construction of the hostel, which is \$150,000. You may have some views of your own on this method of arriving at a reasonable maintenance estimate.

7. We also discussed the question of payment of transportation costs of children who will be lodged in the hostel. At the present time neither our Department nor the Indian Affairs Branch has a general overall policy calling for the payment of all or any definite share of the costs of transportation of children from their homes to residential schools. The problem seems to have been treated purely on an ad hoc basis, and payments have been made from time to time where it was considered desirable to provide transportation for the individual children to and from their homes, where there were no school facilities, to the residential schools. This policy, however, has been based upon the fact that transportation was easily and cheaply available at suitable times. In most cases the problem has not been of great importance because river transport was easily and cheaply available. However, the school at Chesterfield Inlet does present special problems as the only source of transport is chartered aircraft. One might think that transportation by dog team would be available, but in effect the distances from which students must be brought are so great as to render this impracticable. Bishop Lacroix strongly feels that the Church authorities should not be required to bear this cost, and I recommend that our Department assume it, subject to adequate safeguards. In order to provide adequate safeguards, it would be necessary for us to state definite areas to and from which we would accept the responsibility for transportation at the beginning of the school term from home to school and at the end of the term from school to home. We have considered in detail the centers of population which the hostel would draw upon, keeping in mind the reasonable limitations of distance

buildings to provide accommodation for a total of 50 children and would try to have the new building in operation by the fall of 1954. He suggests that the hostel be put in operation about the 15th of April, 1954. In the meantime the Federal Day School would commence its regular term for local children on the 1st of September, 1953. With a view to commencing the larger operation the following spring, Bishop Lacroix would arrange for the services of a nun as teacher for the Federal Day School commencing the 1st of September, 1953. She would be joined by another nun as teacher in time for the commencement of the larger operation on the 15th of April, 1954.

4. With regard to the length of the teaching year, it is suggested that the term for children who will live in the hostel should commence on the 15th of April and continue until the 15th of January in the following year. The 15th of April is shortly after Easter and is a time of good travelling weather. We recognize that it might be desirable to end the term before Christmas, but in the case of Chesterfield Inlet this is not possible because good travelling conditions do not occur until about the 15th of January, and it would not be possible to count on being able to return the children to their homes at an earlier date. This means a 9-month term which Mr. Jacobson thinks is eminently satisfactory from the educational standpoint. One result of adopting this term for children in the hostel is that it would be desirable to adopt the same term for the day students. As you know, our present term for day students commences the 1st of September and continues through to the end of June. With only two classrooms in operation it would be impracticable to have two terms of different length, one for day students and one for boarders. However, Mr. Jacobson sees no objection to the day students following the same term as the boarders, and Mr. Cantley feels that the proposed 9-month term is more suitable for Eskimo children than the existing 10-month term, even in the case of day students. His reason is that the three winter months are a better time than the two summer months for the day students to be with their parents with a view to their learning native skills.

5. We also discussed the amount to be paid to the Church authorities for boarding students in the hostel. In accordance with the usual practice followed by our Department and the Indian Affairs Branch, the rates should be reckoned on a per capita basis. The items covered should be the cost of food, clothing, lodging and normal care. While the cost of these items varies from place to place in the Arctic, Bishop Lacroix and Mr. Cantley are agreed that a reasonable estimate of the cost of so maintaining a pupil in the hostel will be

Dear Bishop Lacroix:

Mr. J. G. Wright has reported to me his discussion with you on the 12th of December, 1952, regarding education at Chesterfield Inlet.

I think that we can come to an arrangement regarding the school at Chesterfield Inlet which will be satisfactory to both of us.

If you will proceed with the construction of the hostel at your own expense in accordance with the arrangements made in 1950, I will concur in members of religious orders acting as teachers in the Federal Day School which the children living in the hostel will attend. On re-examining the situation I find that at present the native children in the Chesterfield Inlet area are all of parents who are adherents to the Roman Catholic Church. If at some time in the future the situation should change in this respect, and if there should then be native children attending the Federal Day School at Chesterfield Inlet whose parents are adherents of other denominations, it will be necessary for me to review the arrangements in which I now concur.

I recognize, however, that you must have some assurance of reasonable continuity and, therefore, the policy now contemplated for Chesterfield Inlet, namely, that the teaching staff may comprise members of religious orders, will continue until the 1st of September, 1958, at which time it will be reviewed.

I sent a copy to Dr. Larolette, so he could begin thinking about the matter discussed.

It must, however, be understood that living accommodation for teachers will be provided by you without any expense or charge to us, and that any teacher engaged for the Chesterfield Inlet school must be qualified as a teacher to the satisfaction of the Superintendent of Education of the Northwest Territories. I would suggest that the teaching qualifications of any persons whom you propose to engage, who are members of religious orders, should be submitted in advance of their appointment to the Superintendent of Education and that they be appointed only after he has approved of their teaching qualifications. If at any time during the five-year period mentioned you do not desire to have members of religious orders as teachers in the Federal Day School at Chesterfield Inlet, we will secure lay teachers in our usual fashion, in which event we would expect you to provide them with living accommodation at a reasonable rate to be agreed.


I concur generally in the suggestion which you made to Mr. Wright as to the length of the teaching year. I think that the school year should be at least seven months and not more than nine months, and should not begin any earlier than Easter and continue not later than Christmas in each year. Instruction in the classrooms would adhere to the curriculum prescribed by us, and would be subject to inspection by our inspectors. If we require any teachers to perform welfare duties throughout the entire year, we would pay them on a 12-month basis. We would also pay board for the children living in the hostel on a per diem basis, the annual amount to be agreed after discussion between you and the Director of the Northern Administration and Lands Branch.

I would suggest also that you discuss with the Director the possibility of operating a shorter term summer school for native children who are unable to come to the hostel for the full school year. As you know, the Sub-Committee on Eskimo Education strongly recommended that such a school be operated at Chesterfield Inlet, and if you are agreeable and the details can be worked out with the Director I would like to institute summer schools on lines and on such terms as may be agreed between us. If you think that this suggestion has merit, I would appreciate it if you would discuss it also with the Director.

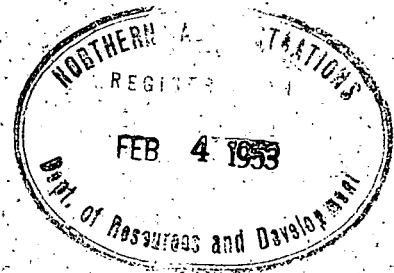

I would be grateful if you would let me know at your earliest convenience whether you are in agreement with the ideas I have outlined herein. I think it is highly desirable that the proposed hostel be built during the summer of 1953 and that it commence its work not later than September 1953. I set this date for the commencement of operations because, in addition to the children who will be staying at the hostel, the Federal Day School must also provide educational facilities for day students who live in or near the settlement of Chesterfield Inlet.

I would suggest that the teaching qualifications of any persons whom you propose to engage, who are members of religious orders, should be submitted in advance of their appointment to the Superintendent of Education and that they be appointed only after he has approved of their teaching qualifications. If at any time during the five-year period mentioned you do not desire to have members of religious orders as teachers in the Federal Day School at Chesterfield Inlet, we will secure lay teachers in our usual fashion, in which event we would expect you to provide them with living accommodation at a reasonable rate to be agreed.

I concur generally in the suggestion which you made to Mr. Wright as to the length of the teaching year. I think that the school year should be at least seven months and not more than nine months, and should not begin any earlier than Easter and continue not later than Christmas in each year. Instruction in the classrooms would adhere to the curriculum prescribed by us, and would be subject to inspection by our inspectors. If we require any teachers to perform welfare duties throughout the entire year, we would pay them on a 12-month basis. We would also pay board for the children living in the hostel on a per diem basis, the annual amount to be agreed after discussion between you and the Director of the Northern Administration and Lands Branch.

I would suggest also that you discuss with the Director the possibility of operating a shorter term summer school for native children who are unable to come to the hostel for the full school year. As you know, the Sub-Committee on Eskimo Education strongly recommended that such a school be operated at Chesterfield Inlet, and if you are agreeable and the details can be worked out with the Director I would

like to institute summer schools on lines and on such terms as may be agreed between us. If you think that this suggestion has merit, I would appreciate it if you would discuss it also with the Director.

I would be grateful if you would let me know at your earliest convenience whether you are in agreement with the ideas I have outlined herein. I think it is highly desirable that the proposed hostel be built during the summer of 1953 and that it commence its work not later than September 1953. I set this date for the commencement of operations because, in addition to the children who will be staying at the hostel, the Federal Day School must also provide educational facilities for day students who live in or near the settlement of Chesterfield Inlet.

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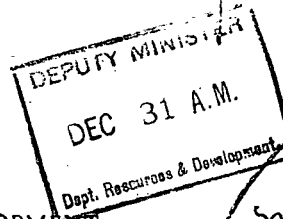

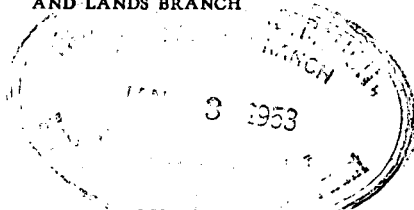

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DEPUTY MINISTER:

For your information I attach a copy of a memorandum from Mr. Wright to me dated the 29th of December, 1952.

2. The interview between Bishop Lacroix and Mr. Wright raises three matters -

1. The teacher for the Federal Day School at Chesterfield Inlet: whether he shall be single or married, lay or clerical, and what accommodation shall be provided.
2. The seasonal tent hostel and school for children not attending the Federal Day School: whether this shall be proceeded with as planned or the present intention modified in accordance with Bishop Lacroix's suggestion.
3. The mission hostel for children from areas outside Chesterfield Inlet to enable them to attend the Federal Day School: ~~or~~ whether we should now modify our original plan, which has not been carried out because of Bishop Lacroix's attitude.

3. I would suggest that as soon as possible after Mr. Jacobson arrives in Ottawa the policy to be followed in respect of these matters be discussed at a meeting in your office to be attended by yourself, Mr. Fraser, Mr. Jacobson, Mr. Wright and myself.

- (c) There would be serious difficulty in moving children from remote points to their homes at the end of August. Unless we were prepared to fly the children home the Bishop thought they would have to stay until Christmas and in such cases tents would not be warm enough. He doubted if tents would be warm enough at Easter as they have snow and cold weather on to early June. (It is our view that, at first, tent hostel children should be confined to those who can get home in the early fall.)

4. The Bishop suggested we seriously consider a modified form of the residential school idea. He maintains that Eskimo children do not begin to learn much of camp life until they are twelve years old. In his opinion the logical method is to bring in children from seven or eight years to twelve years old and teach them from Easter to Christmas. They would rejoin their parents from New Year's to Easter. At school native instructors could teach them to trap, shoot, and make fish nets and other native pursuits better than they could learn at home. He felt that in five years they could turn out children with a sound basic education and well equipped to take advantage of the native way of life. This, in the Bishop's view, could never be accomplished in tent hostels operating a few months each year.

5. The Bishop offered, by way of experiment in carrying out the above scheme, to make available his old mission house which was replaced by a new building last summer. In this he would house about fifteen girls and a caretaker and his wife as instructors. He feels that about ten boys could be housed in the school using bed-rolls which would be rolled up each morning before classes. The caretaker and his wife would look after both groups and prepare their meals. He would have to provide an extra teacher and living quarters for both teachers. He would also have to pay the mission a per diem rate for boarding and looking after the residential pupils outside school hours.

6. Finally, the Bishop said he was willing to go ahead with the original plan to erect a hostel provided it was used most of the year and provided we were prepared to engage teaching sisters instead of lay teachers. With this method we would not have to build a teacher's residence because the Sisters would live in the mission as, he said, was first intended, otherwise we would have built a teacherage!

7. You will agree that Bishop Levesque has given us a few things to think about. I would like to discuss the whole matter with Mr. Jacobson before we hold another meeting of the Sub-Committee on Education.



Dear Mr. Jacobson:

As you have been advised by wireless message today, conditions at the Chesterfield Inlet Federal School call for an early inspection. The teacher, Mr. Roland Lariviere, has reported to us that he has been experiencing difficulty with the heating of the school and in arranging for caretaking services apart from the professional aspects of his work and the physical requirements for the satisfactory operation of the school.

By way of acquainting you with the situation at Chesterfield Inlet, we should give you a short review of the circumstances leading up to the operation of the school.

On January 20, 1949, the Northwest Territories Council approved the erection of a day school and teacherage at Chesterfield Inlet. However, owing to representations from the Roman Catholic Mission, the Council on May 30, 1949, cancelled the project. In October, 1949, Bishop Lacroix, Vicar Apostolic of Hudson Bay, presented a submission in which he requested that the Administration assist the Church in the building of a residential school for fifty pupils at Chesterfield. In view of the cost to this Administration of such a project, Treasury Board ruled against government assistance.

In May, 1950, a proposal was submitted to the Minister to the effect that the Northwest Territories Council make a grant of \$50,000 in aid of the construction of a residential school with the Roman Catholic Mission assuming at least equal financial responsibility.

In June, 1950, the following recommendations were discussed with Bishop Lacroix:

- (a) The Federal Government should provide the funds for the erection of a two-classroom day school to be the property of the Northwest Territories Administration.
- (b) The Northwest Territories Administration would select and pay the teachers who would be of Roman Catholic faith.

Dear Mr. Jacobson:

Further to my letter of January 15 we are endeavouring to make plans with Arctic Wings, Churchill, to have Mr. H.L.G. Johnston of Arctic Services accompany you on your flight to Churchill. Mr. Johnston will be mainly concerned with administrative matters such as relief, family allowances and general departmental interests. We are endeavouring to arrange for a stop-over at Eskimo Point and a side trip from Chesterfield to Baker Lake to enable Mr. Johnston to look into administrative matters at these points which have not been inspected from this office for a long time. If the stop-over is made at Eskimo Point either going or coming, it would give you an opportunity to inspect the mission day school operated by the Roman Catholic Mission at that point. This school has never been inspected although it receives a small grant and school supplies.

Before you inspect any Roman Catholic mission day schools you should make the necessary arrangements with Bishop Lacroix at Churchill or, if he should be absent, with the mission authorities at the head office there so they can notify the missionaries in charge of your impending visit.

Regarding the side trip from Churchill to Baker Lake, we had planned this for Mr. Johnston during the time your plane would be held over at Chesterfield. It would, of course, be desirable if you could inspect the Anglican and Roman Catholic mission day schools at Baker Lake but I realise you will be very busy at Chesterfield. However, if suitable arrangements can be made at no great additional cost for idle time of the plane, it would be desirable for you to go. Both the mission schools at Baker Lake also receive small grants and school supplies from us. It is understood that the majority of the children attend the Anglican mission school but we have no first-hand information on school conditions at that point.

When you were in Ottawa you had an opportunity to review the minutes of the Sub-Committee on Education of the Northwest Territories Council on suggested policy regarding mission schools. We are very anxious that pending the inspection of other mission day schools in Eskimo territory you should give us the benefit of your impressions after you have visited such mission day schools as may be possible on this trip.

May I stress that it is most important that you endeavour to secure the fullest co-operation of the mission authorities at Churchill in all matters pertaining to schools in which they are interested. The mission headquarters at Churchill presumably have very full information in regard to supplies and all other matters pertaining to the schools under their direction.

- (c) The Roman Catholic Mission authorities should provide and operate the necessary hostel facilities for children whose homes are outside the settlement.
- (d) The Northwest Territories Administration should pay a suitable grant per year per child for such outside children who are required to live in the hostel.

Bishop Lacroix agreed with these recommendations in principle and said if he were given the contract for \$50,000, the Roman Catholic Church authorities would build and equip the school to departmental specifications on the understanding that the school would be the property of the Government when completed. It was also agreed that the heat and light for the school could be supplied by the Mission on a pro rate cost basis from their hostel building which the Church would erect.

On June 23, 1950, the Northwest Territories Council recommended that an agreement be entered into with the Roman Catholic Church. By this agreement the Roman Catholic Mission agreed to erect and equip a two-room school at Chesterfield Inlet for the sum of \$50,000, this amount to be provided by the Northwest Territories Council. The Roman Catholic Mission further agreed to build a hostel for the accommodation of not less than fifty pupils at no cost to the Department, this latter building to be the property of the Church. The Roman Catholic Mission agreed to have the hostel and school erected not later than September 1, 1951. The schoolhouse was completed by September 1, 1951. However, the Mission was unable to proceed with the construction of the hostel owing to the lack of funds. As it was found impracticable for the Mission to supply heat and light, space heaters were provided for the school and a small electric light plant was installed.

It was decided to open only one classroom for the 1951-52 school year and to place a fully qualified teacher of the Roman Catholic faith in charge. The policy of this Administration is to have this school staffed by a Roman Catholic lay teacher or teachers. Mr. Roland Lariviere, B.A., B.P., Superior Quebec Certificate, was appointed Welfare Teacher, Grade 3, and took charge of the school on September 20th last. He occupies a furnished room in the schoolhouse and obtains his board at the Mission.

The attached copies of correspondence dealing with this school will provide you with a background leading up to its opening and matters relating to its operation since that time. You will note references to caretaking and heating and the advice we have given Mr. Lariviere respecting these matters. Included with this correspondence is a plan for the schoolhouse upon which are indicated the locations of the space heaters. Two heaters, 51 thousand B.T.U. each, were provided for the classroom now in use, and one 32 thousand B.T.U. heater was provided for each of the teachers' rooms on either side

of the vestibule, and one for the diesel room. It was not our intention to provide heat for the whole building during the present school year. Should it be considered necessary to open the second classroom next fall, we would provide two additional 51 thousand B.T.U. heaters for the second classroom and four additional 32 thousand B.T.U. heaters, two for the corridor and one each for the boys' and girls' activity rooms. Would you kindly inquire fully into the heating situation on the basis of operating one classroom, as at present, and providing heat for the two teachers' rooms and the diesel room. Following a complete study of the situation, you are asked for your recommendations.

Similarly with respect to caretaking services for the school, you are asked to work out the best possible solution, keeping in mind the feasibility of our original plan to have the cleaning of the school done by inmates of the Industrial Home. However, if such is found to be impossible, it will be necessary to arrange for a full-time reliable caretaker on the basis of prevailing rates. In other settlements we have been paying \$750 per annum but this limit need not be adhered to in order to obtain the services of a satisfactory person. No caretaker position was provided for the Chesterfield School because of the arrangement with the Roman Catholic Church authorities. From the correspondence attached, you will glean the nature of this arrangement. In view of our wireless message of January 11, 1952, to Mr. Lariviere, it may be that he will already have made arrangements for a caretaker by the time of your arrival.

Limited quantities of school books and supplies were ordered for delivery last summer. It was difficult at the time to anticipate the eventual enrolment for the school. The teacher has copies of the lists of items requisitioned. It may be that some of the items are still awaiting shipment at Churchill having missed the last boat. The Church authorities, according to the terms of the agreement with this Administration, were responsible for supplying the school desks which are of the chair type manufactured by the Standard Tube Company. Mr. Lariviere has reported that he found it necessary to use the wood provided for manual training purposes to make tables and benches for the pupils. According to advice received from the Company, the desks were shipped to Churchill. It would appear that they arrived too late for shipment by the last boat in to Chesterfield last fall, and are being held at Churchill.

You are also asked to assist Mr. Lariviere in preparing his estimate of requirements for the 1952-53 school year of text books and supplies including fuel oil, noon lunch items (cocoa, biscuits, sugar, powdered milk and rolled oats), equipment and school furniture. Attached are requisition lists, in duplicate, for listing text books and ordinary school supplies. Should it be necessary to open the second classroom next fall, additional furniture must be considered.

We also wish to have a complete inventory taken of equipment, supplies and text books already at the school. Would you kindly advise Mr. Lariviere to prepare this inventory and to forward it to Ottawa as soon as possible.

Prior to the opening of the government school at Chesterfield Inlet last fall, the local Roman Catholic Mission had been conducting a day school. Supplies, text books, noon lunch items and some equipment were sent to the Mission during previous years. It was understood that upon the opening of the government school, the Mission would turn over to the new school any school supplies and text books it had on hand together with the equipment supplied which included a Viewlex slide and filmstrip projector, 30 filmstrips and 6 discs "L'Anglais rendu facile".

For your information you will find attached a list of the supplies sent to the Mission School in 1949 and 1950. We also attach a copy of our letter of August 4, 1949, to the Missionary in Charge advising him about school supplies as well as a copy of the last Quarterly Report from Fathers R. Courtemanche and C. Choque.

In his report of October 25th last Mr. Lariviere commented on the readers sent in and expressed the opinion that they are unsuitable for Eskimo children. You will readily appreciate this particular problem and should render him all possible professional service in the various phases of his English programme. While it is true readers with English characters are not available, the readers supplied have been carefully prepared and are cleverly illustrated. Children generally are able to get the humour of the various situations. An additional supply of readers has been forwarded to the school recently. Mr. Lariviere will welcome assistance with his time-table. There may be matters relating to the welfare aspects of his duties concerning which he desires assistance.

We are anxious to see that this school continues to be taught by a Roman Catholic lay teacher selected by this Administration. Mr. Lariviere seems to be doing very well judging from the reports received. If we were to lose his services, the Church authorities are likely to insist upon appointing nuns as teachers. This is something we wish to avoid in Territorial and Federal Schools so as to have complete control of the curriculum followed. We are most anxious to see that this school is operated in a satisfactory manner and that the teacher is made comfortable and contented on the job.

It is for the reasons outlined that we are asking you at this time to set aside your regular programme in the Mackenzie District long enough to enable you to make the return trip by air to Chesterfield Inlet and to make a thorough and comprehensive inspection of the school. You should

enquire fully into all aspects of its operation including the condition of the building, the heating, teaching, accommodation for the teacher, equipment, facilities, and matters generally that have a direct bearing upon the successful operation of the school. In addition, you are asked to ascertain the need for the opening of the second room next September 1st. You will note from Mr. Lariviere's report that he has suggested that this be done. Should a second teacher be considered necessary, your report should supply concrete evidence of the need together with a recommendation as to whether another male or a female teacher should be engaged. Also we should appreciate information obtained by discreet enquiry, concerning Mr. Lariviere's intention with respect to the next school year, that is, if such is available at this time. With what we are doing and will do, he may be encouraged to remain with the school for at least another year providing, of course, his work is proving to be satisfactory.

You are advised to call upon Bishop Lacroix at Churchill, Man., on your way in. He is familiar with the arrangements that were made with this Administration for the construction and equipping of the school and also regarding janitor service. You should ascertain from him or Father R. Ferron what equipment for the school is still at Churchill, having missed the last boat in to Chesterfield Inlet last fall.

Cheque No. A46-09351, dated January 15, 1952, in the amount of \$500, being an accountable advance towards your incidental expenses in making the trip to Chesterfield Inlet, will be delivered to you at Winnipeg by Mr. R.E.G. Johnston of this Administration who will meet you there. He will hand you the original of this letter together with a plan of the schoolhouse.

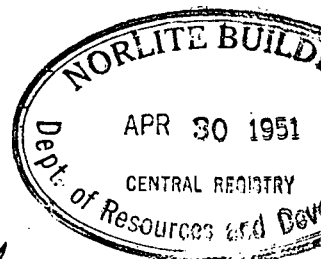

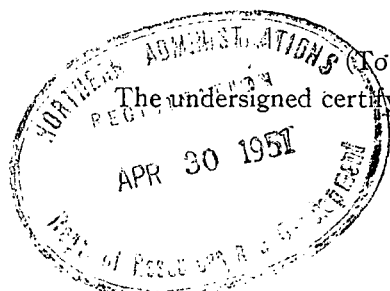

However, in view of the fact that a territorial day school will commence operation at this point next fall and that it is understood the Roman Catholic Mission at Chesterfield Inlet will turn over to the local territorial school any equipment and unused supplies which were furnished by this Administration, it will not be necessary to send supplies to this mission as the mission day school will no doubt be discontinued as soon as the territorial school commences operations.

Day Schools

Dear Mr. Sinclair:

No doubt your Administration is already planning the requisitions for the different day-schools of the N.W.T. As I have often specified in letters and otherwise these schools are the practical answer to the situation of the Eskimos as far as the Keewatin and Franklin districts are concerned where the Eskimos are fundamentally nomad.

It is unfortunate at several points of view but also regarding the question of education that your Administration is not able to make a real survey of these districts this Spring; the survey would show specially that a course of correspondence is in operation in most of the day-schools which come under our activities and which is surprisingly successful. Copybooks travel back and forth by occasional dog-teams sixty and eighty miles.

Lists of school requisitions have been sent to me from these different day-schools but I do not deem it necessary to send you them; the Administration has already reached an adequate medium in these supplies and as long as they are properly sent to each day-School everybody should be satisfied.

From the general trend though it appears that you should increase the number of cheap copy-books which are used for the course by correspondence; a second item which has been forgotten in the past would be to include in the shipment of the requisitions a sufficient amount of forms for the school returns - to your Administration.

Following is a list of the day-schools coming under our activities: Eskimo Point; Padlei; Chatterfield; Baker Lake; Garry Lake; Repulse Bay; Pelly Bay; Tom Bay; Igloodik; Pond Inlet; the material should be shipped for all these places as the following example:

It will be necessary to consider the selection of a teacher for the school in the near future, so that school activities can commence late this summer. From our point of view, there are two alternatives. The first is that we select a male teacher at the present time and add the second teacher if and when there is indication of need. The other alternative, which I favour, if there are sufficient children attending school to warrant the opening of a second room, would be the appointment of a man and wife, both qualified as teachers.

As I expressed previously, it is my hope that we might work together on the selection of the teacher or teachers. I think it is most important that the teacher be acceptable to you. From our point of view, we would be concerned chiefly with the educational requirements of the teacher.

I would appreciate very much having your views on the selection of the teachers and perhaps at the same time you might like to make some suggestions regarding any changes you feel desirable in the agreement we have with you for the construction of the school.

I understand that for a number of years we have been paying a small grant to your mission day school at Chesterfield Inlet, and that we have been supplying some teaching materials. It is assumed that when the new school is opened your mission school will no longer be operated and that we will not be called upon to pay the grant and furnish supplies.

Any equipment and unused supplies which we have furnished to your school should be turned over to the new territorial school when it is opened.

Dear Bishop Lacroix:

In my letter of the 31st of March I dealt with the financial aspects of the cost of the school being built by you at Chesterfield Inlet, but made no mention of the other problem relating to the selection of school teachers which has also been the subject of previous correspondence. In my letter to you of February 13th I informed you we would give your representations further study. Particular reference was made to procedure being followed in provinces where there is provision for separate schools.

The information I now have is not very helpful in providing any clear-cut proposal for the selection of teaching staff at the Chesterfield Inlet School. I find that the general trend is to provide one school in small outlying communities. While there are many variations in the application of the selection of teachers, there is a definite trend to protect minority rights. The background of this information would seem to indicate that in offering to have Roman Catholic teachers, but not teachers of a clerical order, we would be following pretty closely the trend in the provinces.

The latest information that I have is that there are some 4 white Protestant children and 20 native Protestant children in the Chesterfield Inlet region. This makes 24 out of a total child population in the region of 125 of whom probably 25 or 30 will attend the new school in the fall. The large Roman Catholic majority would indicate the desirability of a teacher of the Roman Catholic faith. I feel the Protestant minority is not large enough to warrant consideration of a teacher of the Protestant faith.

dated at Ottawa, 29-3-50

EDUCATION

I visited the Anglican Mission during school hours when thirteen children, whose ages range from 4 to 15 years, were being given instruction. Specimens of the written work of these children are attached. The three oldest pupils started on Basic English around January 1st and their reading was surprisingly good (3rd March). The transition from instruction in Eskimo with syllabic writing to instruction and writing in English would not take long, if the educational policy favoured such a change. With Mission schools it is policy to stick to syllabic as much as possible as most books are in this form of writing. These books have been read and in some cases memorized. This was demonstrated to me when a pupil (Ruth Tapati) age 15 recited a chapter from memory. This chapter was selected at random.

Unlike the coast settlements where the natives congregate mainly in spring and summer, Baker Lake has a small static native population. Most of the natives trading at Baker Lake remain at their own camps throughout the year and travel on short trading visits only during the winter. During the Christmas season, and possibly at Easter the children from outlying camps are taken on a visit to Baker Lake.

There is some doubt as to whether the parents would give up their children for several months to attend a residential school but men such as Thos. Tapati (Anglican Mission) and Louis Tapati (Ionospheric Station) have a great deal of influence with the people and might persuade them to do so. Incidentally, both of these men were brought up in close association with white men and owe their success to their training and association. Neither of them had an opportunity to spend much time in the hunting camps but they are reputedly good hunters.

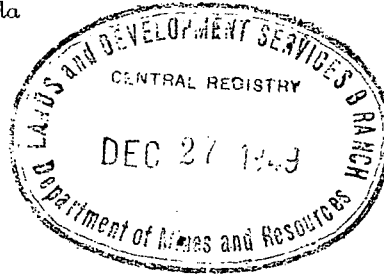

On October 6, 1948, Bishop Marc Lacroix and Reverend Father J.O. Flourdo submitted a joint letter asking that the Administration assist them in the building of a residential school at Chesterfield Inlet. They stated that if the Department would supply the building materials and forward them to Churchill, the Mission would undertake their transportation and supply the labour, both skilled and unskilled, necessary for the erection of the school. This matter was slated for discussion before the Sub-Committee on Education but unfortunately was lost sight of when Mr. Lambert left the Service.

Bishop Lacroix brought the matter up again recently in his letter of October 13, 1949, in which he offered the services of the Mission in training police victims at Chesterfield.

As you know, there are strong arguments, both for and against the operation of residential schools in the Eastern Arctic. The proposed institution would be the first of its kind in the Eastern Arctic, the only residential schools being the Roman Catholic and Anglican residential schools at Fort George, Quebec, which serve more Indians than Eskimos. We have already provided in the estimates for two new day schools with teacher's residence at \$25,000 each. At the last meeting of the Sub-Committee on Education it was decided to proceed with only one of these schools. If it is deemed desirable to assist in the construction of a Roman Catholic residential school at Chesterfield I suggest that the \$25,000, which will not be required for a day school, be earmarked to supply materials for the residential school as proposed by Father Plourde.

Nothing has been said about the size of the building proposed so that it is difficult to estimate costs of materials but I think the item of \$25,000 in question should be sufficient, either to provide the materials for a new prefabricated building or to provide additions to the existing hospital and Industrial Home, if such should be the better way to provide the accommodation required.

We propose to supply the complete structure for the sum of \$13,350.00 f.o.b. our plant Lachute, P.Q.

Dear Mr. Drury,

In my letter of the 19th instant I referred to the building program for the Yukon Territory during the year 1949-50 which the Department of National Defence (Army) will undertake, as agreed by the Advisory Committee on Northern Development.

In addition to the work to be undertaken in the Yukon, there are several buildings to be erected in the Northwest Territories this year by your department, provided the necessary funds are made available by Parliament.

It has been decided to build a two-room day school with teacher's quarters, and also quarters for the married officer, Royal Canadian Mounted Police, at Fort Resolution. We have placed an item of \$70,000 for the school building and \$9,500 for the police building in our 1949-50 estimates. Plans, bills of material, and specifications for the school building and police building are available and will be forwarded to Colonel H.W. Love, Director of Works and Accommodation of your Department.

At Chesterfield, N.W.T. we expect to build a prefabricated one-room day school. An amount of \$32,000 has been placed in our 1949-50 estimates. At the time this amount was fixed it was thought that we would be building a teacher's residence at Chesterfield, but it has since developed that the doctor may move from Chesterfield to Churchill. In this event, we may get the doctor's residence for the teacher.

We have also provided for the erection of a prefabricated house for married quarters for the the R.C.M.P. at Chesterfield, and a similar house at Baker Lake. Those two houses will be ordered shortly and will be paid for out of this year's vote. As they cannot be shipped until next summer, the

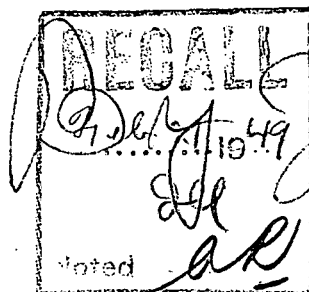

With reference to the Deputy Commissioner's memorandum of December 22nd, there has been no meeting of the Sub-committee on Education since November 16th because it was felt desirable that the appointment of a Superintendent of Education should be made before another meeting was held.

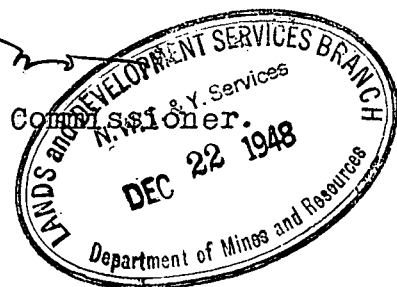

8. Education.

Every person that was interviewed mentioned the great need for some type of education for the natives, not only for the children, but some adult education. The main requirement is for the children however. At the present time the Mission is carrying on a very desultory type of program - one hour per day during the summer months when there are no boats in and when there is nothing else happening that would detract from the school. During this one hour the children are taught to read and write the syllabic characters, and are given some instructions in simple arithmetic and in drawing. It is believed that the whole program might be considered as almost negligible. In discussing this problem, everyone agrees that the establishment of a residential school is NOT the answer as these children must remain with their parents during the winter months. In May however, most of the families come to the coast, many setting up in their tents close to the settlement. They remain in this vicinity until about the middle of August when they leave to hunt caribou and to prepare for the winter's trapping. During the summer some caches are made of seal and if available of walrus. They should also catch fish and dry it but little of this seems to be done.

One suggestion that find favour with the residents of the settlement is that a small building should be erected to contain a classroom and living quarters for a teacher who should if possible be married, and both of whom should be employed. Those children whose parents are living in the immediate vicinity could attend the classes as day school pupils. When the parents move away for a few days at a time, as is the custom the children could remain with relatives, or if such an arrangement is not possible, they could remain in tents at the school specially set up for that purpose, and could be cared for there until the parents returned. When speaking with Bishop Lacroix this plan was given his approbation. He stated that it is most necessary that the Government should institute some type of educational program for these natives and he considered that such a program as this would be excellent. Father Fafard stated that if such were started he would be prepared to give it every assistance. Fathers from other settlements who were listening to this discussion were all in favour, although in some places where the natives

do not congregate during the summer some other plan would have to be evolved. This suggestion was arrived at mainly as a result of a lengthy discussion with Dr. Moody and Sgt. Hamilton. The latter suggested that the personnel of the school should relieve him of many of his administrative duties allowing him to devote more to such duties in outlying posts. He also considers that the teacher could undertake to visit the camps especially during the summer and encourage cleanliness, as well as instruct in the care of children, the proper preparation of white man's food, particularly pabulum, milk, etc., and also to urge the people to leave camp to set up caches, and to catch and dry fish. Their suggestion with regard to the teacher involved the selection of suitable individuals and to send them north for nine months to a year with no other duties than to learn to speak the Eskimo language. There seems to be agreement that by that time they would be in a position to teach in Eskimo. The subjects to be taught would be English, reading and writing, simple arithmetic and particularly, something about Citizenship, and the meaning of Government. Based around such an institution could be taught proper hygiene and care of children to the parents.

The subject of education will be discussed at each post visited to determine whether or not any reasonably satisfactory plan might be evolved. In the meantime, any advice as to whether the above might be given serious consideration would be appreciated as the people in this country are all seriously concerned in the question of education of the natives.

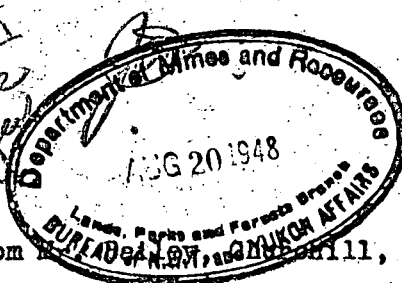

I have forwarded under separate cover reports concerning my findings at the three posts so far visited. The traders and Mounted Police seem particularly keen that some program should be instituted. I was speaking with both Mr. Sigurdson and Mr. Martin last night and both expressed great concern regarding the future of the natives and were enthusiastic with the idea of some simple education such as has been outlined, so long as the children can stay with their parents during the winter months. Neither of these men feel that the teacher should be proficient in the Eskimo language. They felt it would be a waste of time for the teacher to learn to speak Eskimo and that it would be far preferable to let the children learn the English language just as they had learned to speak the native tongue.

I gathered from what Father Plourde said that the Church would build the school and expected to bring in a sufficient number of children to make the pupilage around 25. He wanted to know whether we would support the school by giving a per capita grant. I suggested that he write me a very full letter explaining his plans and saying what support would be needed.

Incidentally, Father Plourde told me that the Roman Catholic Missions are keeping up a correspondence school arrangement with some pupils in the north and that the lessons are taken back and forth by dog team.

Dear Father Plourde,-

You telephoned the N.W.T. Division this morning to say that it was the intention to open a day school at Eskimo Point in addition to those mentioned previously by Reverend Father Ferron.

For your information I might add that during one of his recent visits to this office Father Ferron stated day schools would be opened this year at Tavane, Chesterfield, Repulse Bay, Pelly Bay, Arctic Bay, Igloolik, Ivuyivik and Wakeham Bay. He asked that the regular school supplies be forwarded to each of these points and that he be furnished with blank copies of our school return form in order to report the attendance and make application for a grant. Father Ferron was advised that returns should be submitted in duplicate copy at the close of each quarter, that is March 31, June 30, September 30 and December 31, giving all information asked for therein and that if the attendance averaged five or more a quarterly grant of \$62.50 or \$250.00 per annum would be paid.

A supply of school return forms was forwarded Father Ferron some time ago and we have ordered supplies for each of the schools. Some of these items were not immediately available but will be forwarded as soon as possible. There is a possibility that some of these may not be dispatched in time for delivery. This is to be regretted but is entirely unavoidable.

For your information I attach a list of the supplies ordered for each school. An order is being placed for the same items for the school to be opened at Eskimo Point.

A copy of this letter is being forwarded for the information of Reverend Father Ferron.

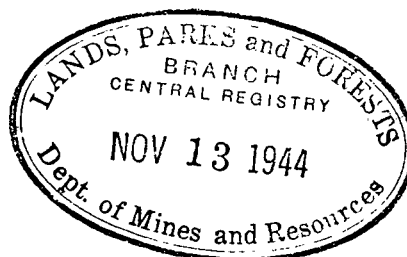

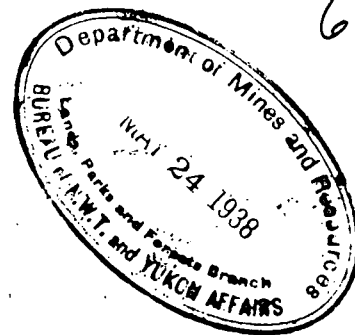

Dear Sir:

Following our conversation, in your office, on the 11th inst.
re. medecines to be sent to missionaries on behalf of Eskimos, I beg to
submit the following to your kind approval.

Medecines-invoives from last year should be repeated for each
Mission, viz: Ponds Inlet, Southampton Island, Baker Lake, Esqimo Point.
As regards the Mission at Chesterfield Inlet, seing that you will have
a doctor resident there, I leave it to you to know if medecines should
be sent to the Mission ~~at Chesterfield Inlet, seing that you will have~~
as usual, or not.

Please, note that such articles as tooth-forceps, hot-water bottles
etc, should not be repeated, as they last many years.

Also, besides the requisition of last year, please, send to each
Mission an abundant supply of small bottles, 2 and 3 ounces, with corks
and again send more vaseline and absorbent cotton and bandages,
it happens often that such articles are gretly needed, and they keep
well anyhow, but it is very hard to run short of these things.

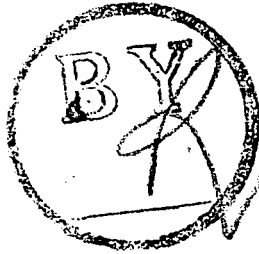

Dear Sir,

Enclosed please find the invoices of fishing implements bought on behalf of your Department, as per your letter 4839 of 26th June, from John Leckie as approved of in your telegram of the 3d inst. I had the invoices made in quadruplicate for you.

You will notice that I did not buy ice-chisels, because I could not find the right kind in Montreal, the ones used here are too heavy and so expensive, \$6.75 each.

Also, I did not buy any lumber as it was very doubtful if there would be room at all on board the ships. I know that I had to leave some of my own merchandise behind for next year.

I have divided these supplies between the 5 Missions, as agreed upon, viz: Chesterfield Inlet, Eskimo Point, Baker Lake, Southampton Island, and Ponds Inlet. This last place being called Chesterfield Reserve for better handling of the freight.

Would you kindly let me know if your Department will pay the freight, as it was done before for medicines, blankets, etc., also please let me know if you want these supplies to be insured. All our cargo is insured every year.

With further reference to your letter dated 5th June, I am now informed by the Purchasing Division of this Department that some of the items you asked for are not quite clear to the different firms as to what you require and, with the exception of the 100 yards of oak, chest, the Purchasing Division suggest that you call on the following firms, in Montreal, and explain to them what you require and after purchasing the goods have the accounts forwarded direct to this office. I am giving you a list hereunder, of the articles that the Department are willing that you should procure:-

- 50 High Hats, 30 yds. long, 4" wide, 24 inches deep, mounted, complete with 3 x 4 cedar floats spaced 8 feet apart and No. 9 lead under each float.
- 50 lbs. Reins No. 20/3
- 50 lbs. " No. 5 + 2
- 50 lbs. " No. 9
- 50 lbs. Cedar floats, 3 x 12, 7 to the pound
- 100 lbs. No. 9 lead sinkers
- 25 Ice Chisels
- 1000 Assorted fish hooks from 2 1/2 to 5"
- 10 Sump of hard wood - 3" x 6" x 16"
- 10 " spruce - 3" x 6" x 16"
- 1 doz. Cod Fish lines, No. 10.

The major portion of these supplies you would be able to procure from Birmingham Marine Supply Limited, 199 St. Paul Street West or Coryhill Lumber Co., Montreal, and the lumber required you will be able to, no doubt, procure from the following firms:-

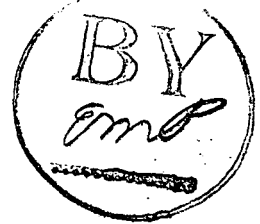

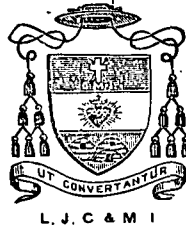

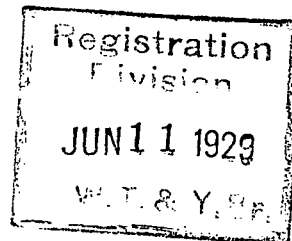

Medecines.

Dear Sir,

As agreed upon, last week, during our conversation on this subject, I am sending you the list of medecines to be shipped to our mission-posts, for the use and benefit of Eskimos.

I beg to advise you that the Hudson's Bay Co wants all cargo to be delivered at the wharf on the 25th of this month, so it would be best to have those medecines ready packed and addressed to each mission post as follows: R.C. Mission Chesterfield Inlet c/o R.C.M.P.

R.C. Mission Eskimo Point

R.C. Mission Southampton Island

R.C. Mission Baker Lake

R. C. Mission Chesterfield Reserve. Burrwell.

Re. the last address, I would submit that we have a whole outfit landed at Burrwell, last year, and marked Chesterfield Reserve. To avoid the multiplicity of addresses on cases which are to be landed at the same place, The Hudson's Bay Co advises me that any new article or case should be marked R.C. Mission Chesterfield reserve Burrwell. This new Mission post may be established in Baffin Land either North or South, or again in the Straits, as the opportunity and the need may be, but I shall let you know by the return of the ship the exact location of this new post.

To make this requisition, I use the list sent by the Fathers located at Chesterfield, Eskimo Point, Baker Lake, as regards the requisition for Southampton Island. There is no mail between that place and the outside world, all winter. So, I made a list, by using the inventory of medecines made by the Fathers of that place, which shows the kind of medecines mostly used, and whose shortage is expected now.

About the fifth requisition, for a new mission-post, I followed the list made out in 1927, and filled and sent by MMrs Leduc & Leduc 924 Notre Dame West, Montreal. That list had been approved of by the Indian Department, and I must say that we were highly satisfied with the packing, shipping, and also with the quality of the medecines.

Also, as per my own advise, MMrs Leduc & Leduc had written all direction for the use of the medecines, on each bottle or package, and this is very useful, as some druggist give only a chemical description of the drug, the name having sometimes no meaning at all.

Kindly, send the packages, that is, boxes, ready for transport on board the steamer, at Shed No 47. c/o H.B.Co. as soon as possible.
