MEMORANDUM FOR THE DEPUTY MINISTER:

Rayrock Mines School

In the Estimate Review we were criticized for permitting a teacher to go to Rayrock when no school facilities were available there for him. There was a story about this in the News of the North. At the time, Mr. Devitt refuted this statement, saying that to the best of his knowledge, in spite of the newspaper reports which said otherwise, the teacher did not go to Rayrock.

Mr. Jacobson has since written to the Chief Superintendent of Schools at Fort Smith asking for a full report of the incident. This report has now reached this office and a quotation from it follows:

"If the News of the North reported that Mr. Watsyk proceeded to Rayrock, that publication was most certainly in error.

Mr. Watsyk, who at one point, was considered for Rayrock did not leave Yellowknife but was utilized as a teacher in the Yellowknife Composite School pending the completion of the buildings and housing at Jean Marie River."

All this was discussed and arranged in co-operation with Mr. Devitt when Mr. Booth was in Ottawa. In his report Mr. Booth continues by saying that when he received advice that the school at Jean Marie River was ready for opening he had Mr. Watsyk return from Yellowknife to Fort Smith for two days' briefing prior to his going to Jean Marie River. He arrived there last Saturday, ready to open that school just one day after the school and teacherage were completed.

I am sure you will be happy to know that Mr. Watsyk did not go to Rayrock but was sent to Yellowknife since additional help, due to the opening of the new school, was required there.

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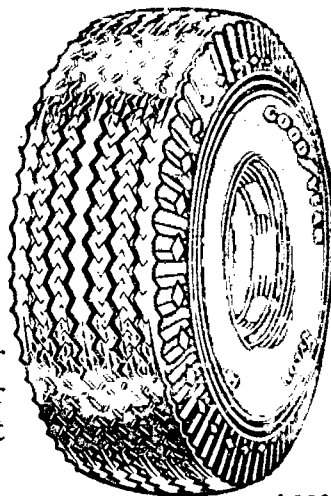

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Accidents in Childhood

According to a survey by Rodney S. Fowler, M.D., published in the Canadian Medical Journal of August 15th, received by Health League of Canada, accidents have become a very important cause of mortality and morbidity in all age groups, but especially in childhood. In Ontario, from 1951 to 1955, they were the leading cause of death in all age groups from one to thirty-five years.

Approximately 1500 children die annually from accidental causes.

More children die annually from accidents than from the ten leading infectious diseases combined. The decrease in mortality from infectious diseases has made accident mortality relatively more important in recent years.

In Canada from 1922 to 1926, in the age group 1 to 14 years, there were on an average 11,734 deaths yearly due to infectious diseases and an average of 5004 deaths yearly due to accidents.

In the years 1942-1946 deaths due to acute infections dropped to an average of 5,110 yearly, while those from accidents rose to an average of 7,315 yearly. During this 20 year period there was an

increase in the population of Canada from about 9,500,000 to over 12,000,000.

The article continues that these mortality figures show only a small part of the problem. It has been estimated that for every fatality due to accident there are 100 accidental injuries and 10 permanent disabilities.

Some have estimated that for every fatal accident there are 150 non-fatal ones. Of 20,902 admissions to the Hospital for Sick children in Toronto during 1956, 2006 (9.6%) were due to accidents, poisonings and violence.

Statistics from Europe and the United States also indicate a similar immense public problem, which is receiving all too little attention at present.

Teacher-No School!

Liaison is pretty poor between departments somewhere along the line in government circles.

For instance last week a teacher arrived at Rayrock just busting with enthusiasm to get at it with his young charges.

But there was no place to get at it with 'em in.

It had been decreed a school would be built at Rayrock this summer.

It wasn't.

Teacher came anyway.

Somebody may find a solution to this sort of nonsense, but it isn't the first time it's happened like this.

Re:- Your File 630/105-4-2.

[Thank you for your letter of June 10th advising us that the Federal Government has decided to pay the full cost of the teacher's salary and northern allowance, and will also pay the cost of her in-coming and out-going transportation.

This change in policy and your willingness to accept our recommendations for suitable teachers makes the whole arrangement quite acceptable to the Company. Mrs. Cartier had already accepted our offer of employment for the year 1957 - 1958 and when I discussed this change in Federal policy to her, she is quite willing to be placed on your payroll.

It is understood that under the terms of the Contract which Mrs. Cartier would sign with your Department that she will be allowed three weeks holidays per year plus an additional four weeks during one summer of the three year contract which she may use for the purpose of attending University. After entering into a contract with the Federal Department Mrs. Cartier will still have two summers' work to complete her B.Ed. Degree at the University of Alberta. She is most anxious to complete this in two consecutive years and it is hoped that some workable arrangement may be arrived at to allow her to accomplish this as it is felt that she shows a most creditable attitude and should be encouraged as much as is reasonable. Mrs. Cartier is quite willing to take the additional month's leave without pay and the Company is quite willing to grant her the leave of absence when she normally should be working on Community projects. This problem would actually not arise until the summer of 1959, but it was felt that our views on the subject should be made known at this time in anticipation that it would meet with your approval.

It should also be pointed out that for the present at least suitable facilities would not be available for enrolling Indian children at the school.



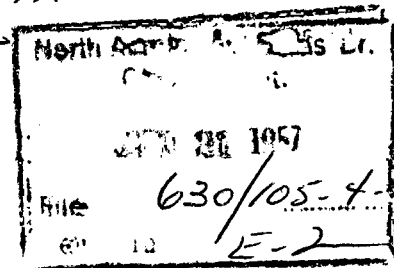

We will be looking forward to your next visit at the Property.

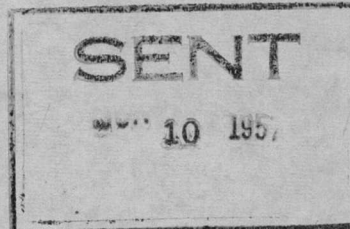

Dear Mr. Clarke:

You will recall that on August 3, 1956, the Commissioner wrote to you offering you assistance in the operation of a school at the Rayrock Mine.

I am advised by Mr. J. Cairns that the school is now operating efficiently and that you have a well qualified teacher. I understand, however, that there was an unfortunate delay in the forwarding to you of certain school supplies but I can assure you that every effort will be made to ensure that supplies this year will arrive in time. I might say that the requisition for the 1957-58 school year was processed two months ago and there should be no reason why the supplies should not arrive before the school opening.

When the Commissioner wrote to you on August 3, 1956, outlining the policy in connection with financial arrangements respecting company schools, he pointed out that with other mining companies it is the policy of the department to furnish the necessary school supplies and to pay the teacher's salary, recovering one-half the cost from the mining company. The company would be responsible for providing the school building, looking after its maintenance, providing utilities, and for making some arrangements with the teacher for either providing boarding facilities or renting accommodation to her at a nominal rate. Since the Commissioner wrote to you there has been a change in policy and it has been decided that the Federal Government will pay the full cost of the teacher's salary and northern allowance, and will also pay the cost of her incoming and out-going transportation. As pointed out in his letter, this arrangement makes it possible for the teacher to enjoy the benefits of being a federal employee and that they would be eligible for superannuation benefits, group hospital-medical insurance and other similar benefits. It was also pointed out that if the mining company is able to obtain a suitably qualified teacher with a satisfactory teaching record, the department is quite willing to employ the teacher recommended by the mining company.

I have examined the qualifications of Mrs. F.E. Cartier who is presently teaching at the Rayrock Mine School. According to our records she holds a Superior First class Certificate from the Province of Saskatchewan, a Standard B and Permanent B. and I. Certificates from the Province of Alberta, and has had over 12 years satisfactory teaching experience. Since Mrs. Cartier's qualifications and experience are satisfactory, we are prepared to employ her immediately providing, of course, you are agreeable. On the basis of our new salary schedule, Mrs. Cartier would be paid a salary of \$4,100, plus \$900 Northern Allowance, for a gross salary of \$5,000. It should be

pointed out, however, that this is for 12 months' employment since federally-employed teachers are expected to work in the community during the summer months with the exception of 3 weeks' holidays which they are allowed. As pointed out previously there would be no recovery from the mining company for the teacher's salary and northern allowance.

In the event that Mrs. Cartier leaves at the end of this, or the next school year, we would be quite prepared to accept your recommendations for a suitable replacement. It is fully realized, of course, that if a married woman is employed, whose husband is working at the mine and the man quits, or is discharged, this would necessitate the wife, who is employed as a teacher, leaving also. However, it is hoped that it will not be necessary for such a change to take place during the academic year since normally it is quite difficult to obtain a replacement in the middle of a school year.

I might mention that we have been successful in obtaining a well qualified teacher for Discovery Yellowknife Mine School.

Please advise me at an early date whether you wish Mrs. Cartier placed on our payroll on the above basis.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. JACOBSON

Rayrock School

I could not possibly sign the memorandum addressed to the Deputy Minister and have made a number of amendments to it which I would like you to look at and have the memorandum re-done. Though most of the amendments speak for themselves, I would like to explain at least some of them. Therefore, I am reviewing the whole thing in the following points:

1. There is no object in using the phrase "you will recall" unless you wish to remind the reader that he was there, in which case I think it is best to do it in a more direct way.

2. We do not need adjectives modifying the word "criticize". Unless you have a written record of exactly what the Deputy Minister said, you are running risks in accepting the criticism as directed at the Education Division. The criticism was uttered during the Education discussions, but the Deputy Minister certainly included the Engineering Division and me in his criticism.

3. Putting in the word "presumably" is a defensive act. We were criticized for the fault reported in the paper.

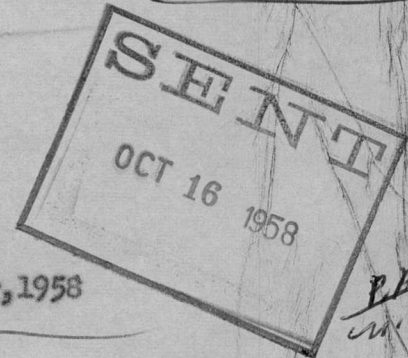

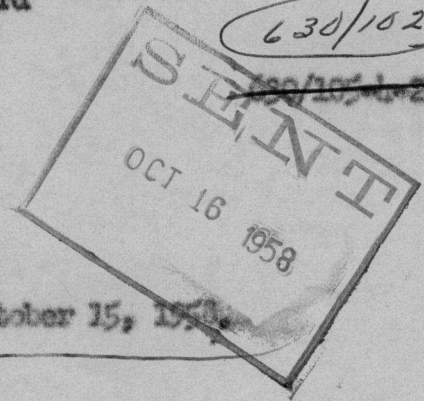

You will recall that while in Ottawa you discussed with Mr. Devitt the future of Mr. Watsyk who was scheduled to teach at Rayrock the current school year.

At that time we understood that Mr. Watsyk had been held at Fort Smith until it was determined where he would serve.

We have now been criticized severely for sending Mr. Watsyk to Rayrock knowing that no pupils or facilities were there for him. The Indian pupils had been transferred to Fort Smith when it was realized that the school would not be built at Rayrock.

Would you please inform us immediately of all the details connected with this seeming confusion over this school.

You realize, of course, that Dr. Westwater made arrangements to purchase a building from the Mine for the purpose of a classroom. This was done without consulting our field engineers who would not approve the transaction since a new school, they stated, could be built more economically. This, of course, created some considerable confusion and possibly ill feelings. However, to have the teacher proceed and without facilities was embarrassing to say the least, especially since it made headlines in the Yellowknife News of the North.

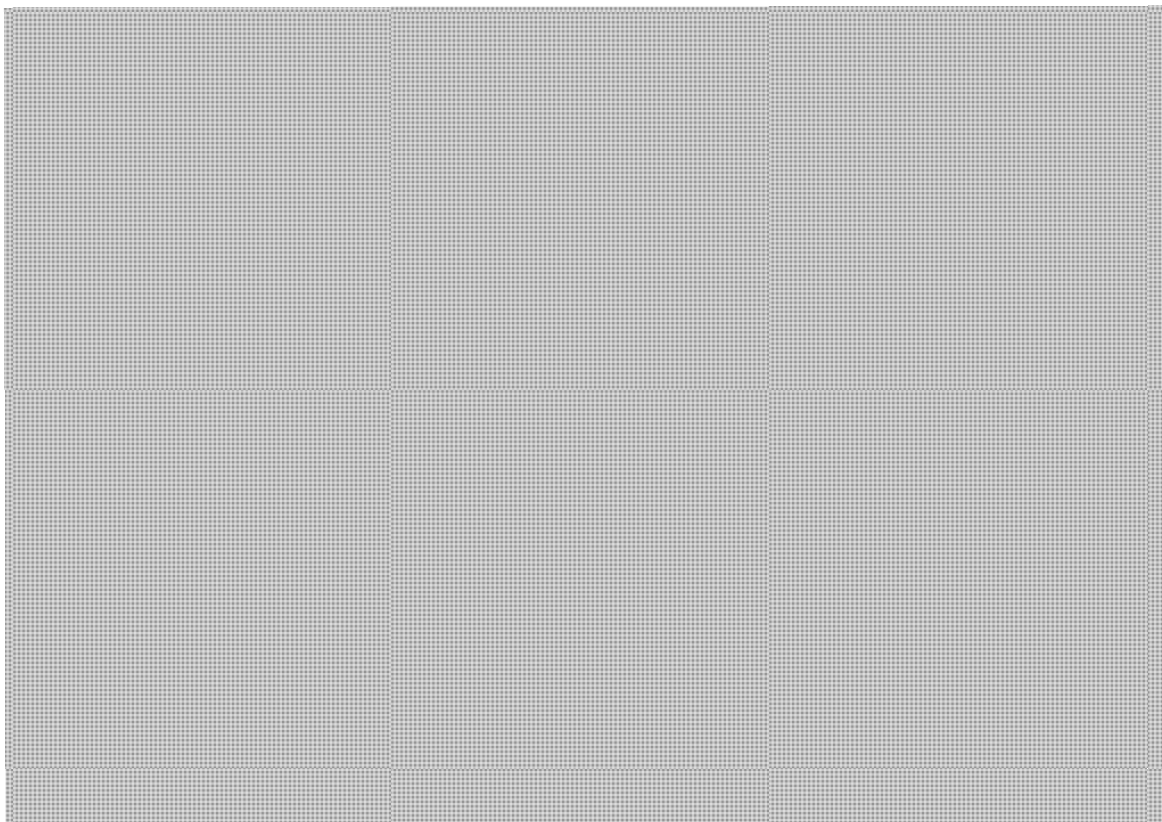

At Rayrock, N.W.T. twenty-four Indian pupils were enrolled at the summer seasonal school from May 23 until August 22, 1958. Following is a list of names of pupils who attended.

The above pupils ranged in ages from 4 to 16 years. Only three of them had had any previous schooling. The remainder were non-English speaking. My task then, was to concentrate on teaching English to the majority of the pupils. Concrete objects as illustrations for learning some English words were employed as much as possible. Later The Now Before We Read pre-primer was used to extend their vocabulary. Counting and enumerating was also attempted with some success. The use and recognition of colored crayons was also used. I was handicapped somewhat in my efforts since supplies and devices such as colored sticks, counting frames, colored cubes, silhouette cutouts, etc., did not arrive until August.

It was difficult to evaluate how much progress was accomplished since progress was slow and laborious. At times it was discouraging but there were moments of satisfaction.

No community projects were carried out except the treatment for colds, minor skin infections and dusting of privies when needed.

The building of a full-time school in Rayrock possibly depends upon the continuous operation of the uranium mine. If the mine ceases operations, the Rayrock Indians would be forced to move away since fishing in Sherman Lake would not sustain them. However, it seems likely that a full-time school in this area would prove beneficial.

If a permanent school is to be built for the Indians, it should be located as close to the village as possible. The area in front of the school could be cleared of shrubs and trees and utilized for a playground. One of Rayrock Mines' bulldozers could be employed to level the ground. Then sand could be dumped on to the playground. Otherwise, it will be too muddy after each wet spell.

No transportation problems should arise since the pupils will be within two minutes walking distance of the school.

Obtaining water from the lake could be accomplished since the lake water would only be about fifty yards away, but precautions would have to be taken since the lake is quite shallow at this point, is near the Indian village and is also subjected to pollution from the mine's sewerage system. Perhaps arrangements could be made to have the mine deliver water to the school in a 45-gallon drum from their chlorinated supply.

The native population of the school area are natives who have moved into the area from Fort Rae, Marion Lake and possibly, Lac La Martre. The mine employs anywhere from fifteen to twenty Indian men. The head of almost every family is represented. Usually there is some firing, rehiring and quitting which keeps the employment situation in a state of uncertainty. As mentioned earlier, very little fish is caught in Sherman Lake so it is a case of working to earn money to buy food from the mine's cookery, or else moving to where fishing and hunting is more plentiful.

The Indians are able to purchase such things as cigarettes, candies and mens' clothing from the mine commissary. Childrens' and women's clothes

are not sold in the commissary. The Indians have to visit Fort Rae or Yellowknife if they wish to buy women's or children's clothing.

The white women of the mine employees, from time to time, give various Indian families old clothes for the boys and girls.

The native population as a whole appears to be generally healthy. The First-Aid man for the mine (Sam Hudyma) has been unselfish in devoting his time to the health needs of the Indians. They either visited him or if the case was serious, Mr. Hudyma would visit the patient in the Indian village. I thought it best not to interfere with this arrangement although I was called upon occasionally to "diagnose and treat". Mr. Hudyma uses Indian Affairs' medicines as well as the mine's medicines. I understand that an effort is going to be made by Indian Affairs to pay Mr. Hudyma a minimum of \$15.00 per month (retroactive to April) for his services.

The mine dump is located about one-half mile from the Indian village. The Indians, usually the women, visit the dump either in the morning or in the afternoon in order to salvage wooden boxes, scraps of lumber, clothing or food for their dogs. On occasion a dump truck will dump a load of scrap lumber on the road near the village.

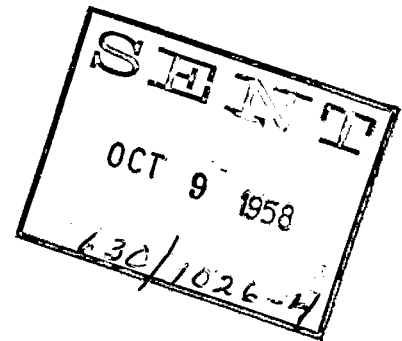
During the summer, about six Indian men improved their dwellings by using peeled logs (for three to four foot walls) or old finished lumber. In most cases, tents were then thrown over the three or four foot walls of peeled logs.

Once during the summer, a Roman Catholic priest from Yellowknife visited Rayrock. Father Beauregard held Mass in the mine school for the whites, and for the Indians in the school tent. Father Beauregard speaks Dogrib and thus had an advantage over the Anglican and United Church ministers who visited the mine earlier in the summer. To the best of my knowledge, the Protestant ministers did not hold services for the Indians - possibly due to the language barrier.

Generally speaking, the Indians appear to be doing quite well. They seem to be fairly independent. I had nothing to offer them in the way of tools, equipment, lumber, etc., so perhaps that is why I was not bothered too much. I am sure that the Indians will gradually improve their standard of living in the Rayrock area if the mine continues to operate.

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. HUNT

You have asked me to review the files dealing with Rayrock Mine School and put in chronological order all items regarding our new school building in the Indian village at Rayrock.

The following twenty-six quotations from the correspondence, which comprise all material dealing with this matter available on files, will give you a clear picture of what actually happened.

I would like, however, to draw to your attention the fact that it was most unfortunate that Mr. Clarke was left for such a long time, since our letter of the 25th of April, under the impression that we were going to buy his Northland building. Either our letter of the 25th of April should have been more cautious about our commitments or we should have waited until the Engineer's report came and answered immediately to the effect that for such and such reasons we could not accept his offer. It seems rather strange to read first our letter of the 25th of April where we show such an interest in purchasing Rayrock Mine's Northland building and then our letter of the 27th of June where, after more than two months, we suddenly realized that "we have been standardizing on various types of schools in the North and our proposal of erecting our plan NWT 133 is in accordance with our overall planning". It also took us over two months to discover that the Northland building's "materials are definite fire hazard".

Don't you agree that Mr. Clarke should have been notified earlier?



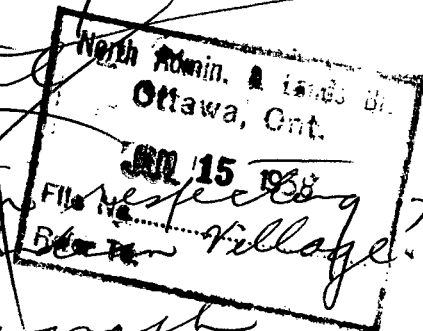

RE:- Port Radium School.

Up to March 31, 1958 we have for some years been recovering one-half the salary and northern allowance of the teachers of the Port Radium school. This practice ceased as of March 31st last.

In 1957 the Interdepartmental Committee on Federal-Territorial Financial Relations examined the practices in respect to Company Schools and approved of the policy whereby companies establishing such schools in remote areas should provide classroom facilities. However, the Committee thought that the policy relating to the hiring of teachers in such schools and the allocation of responsibility for the teacher's salary and allowance should be made uniform.

The Committee recommended "that the company provide accommodation for the classroom and living accommodation for the teachers, that the Federal Government hire the teacher and pay his salary and allowances, and that the Territorial Government reimburse the Federal Government in full".

Payments to the Federal government by the Territorial Government are now to be made instead on basis of salaries and allowances of teachers in Company schools according to the principle set forth under Allotment 105 of Territorial Appropriation Ordinance 1958-59. The Port Radium Mine School, it will be noted, is now regarded as one of this group.

Recovery from the Territorial Government should be made regularly throughout the fiscal year on whatever basis you consider best, monthly or otherwise.

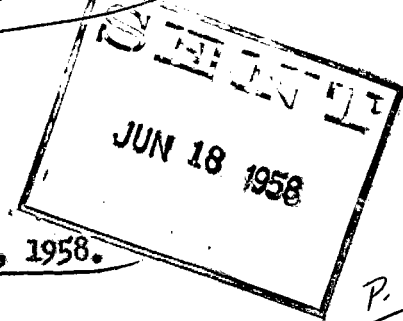

Rayrock Teacher Appointments

I have discussed with the Director the problem of the Indian school children at Rayrock as set out in Mr. Clarke's letter to you dated the 6th of June and enclosed with your memorandum to me of the 11th of June. After speaking to the Deputy Minister, because the subject touches the understandings between him and Bishop Trocellier, it was decided you should handle this matter locally, speaking first to Bishop Trocellier and ensuring he is in agreement with your action. It is necessary to do this because I understand the Indian children are all of the Roman Catholic faith. In such circumstances it is our normal policy to appoint a Roman Catholic teacher. Appointing a Protestant for the entire year without explaining our action in doing so to Bishop Trocellier would invite inquiry from the Bishop and possibly a protest.

If you believe Miss Currie should be appointed in the circumstances, - and many arguments can be adduced in favour, - speak of them to Bishop Trocellier, and it is not unlikely that he will agree. However, if he does not agree, I think it will then be necessary for you to make some other arrangement, probably the employment of a single male Roman Catholic who can board at the Mine. We will be billed \$5.00 a day and will be able to recover \$40.00 a month from the employee himself. For such an arrangement we shall have to seek Treasury Board approval, and you should therefore let me know as soon as possible so that I may take any action required here in Ottawa.

The Deputy Minister agrees that the Superintendent of Schools, Fort Smith, should handle locally as much as possible of the school business, and we are seizing this opportunity to get the new policy underway. Please bear in mind, however, that these questions of religious arrangements in the schools are very delicate and have many implications involving the Deputy Minister, both in his federal and territorial capacities. It is therefore desirable that we be kept informed rather more fully of things touching religion than of other matters, including memoranda of conversations with the Bishop.

Probably it will be necessary to undertake the appointment of a Protestant teacher to teach the group of Roman Catholic Indian children as a temporary arrangement for one year. In making such a declaration I think it is only reasonable that we be prepared to say how we are going to handle the situation next year. Subject to your recommendations after you visit Rayrock, as I believe you intend doing late this month, I think we should build a teacher's residence in 1959. Perhaps we should also build a consolidated school. This is a subject for discussion with the Mine management, and it is a delicate one since the Indians are not yet welcome to the employees of the Mine as classmates for their children. We will be looking forward to hearing from you the results of your discussion of the timing of the developing school facilities at Rayrock. In your conversations you may make statements of our intentions regarding the building of a teacher's residence and, if you see fit, a school as well at Rayrock in 1959, or partially in 1959 and partially in 1960. I have used the phrase statements of our intention rather than commitments because we can only be positive on these matters after the government has agreed to provide the funds. However, there is not much doubt of our ability to obtain approval for essential projects such as the Rayrock school requirements.

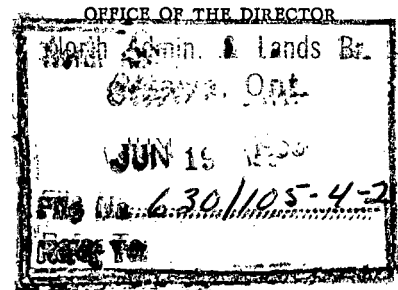

Mr. Jacobson pointed out that it would be preferable to have a teacher of the Catholic Faith to teach the Indians as they are all of that Faith. Unfortunately [REDACTED] is not a Catholic. As pointed out in previous correspondence it would be a most convenient arrangement to have [REDACTED] as the teacher of the Indian school as she expects to be [REDACTED] during the summer and would be resident at the property. It is also very possible that we will be looking for a new [REDACTED] if we are not able to supply suitable employment for his wife.

If [REDACTED] were not chosen to be the school teacher at the Indian school, we would only be able to supply accommodation for a male teacher, as all our housing units will be taken up by married personnel.

Your further views on the subject would be appreciated so that we may come to an agreement which will be mutually satisfactory.

Re: Second Teacher at Rayrock

We have already agreed to the appointment of, and have appointed, Mrs. Esterer as a teacher at Rayrock School. We have not yet appointed the second teacher but we are in favour of the arrangement which you suggest, that is, a married couple and a single male teacher. You have already told us that accommodation will be available for a single male teacher in the mine bunk house. However, since advising us of this you have made arrangements for the seasonal teacher to be boarded by the mining company at the rate of \$5 per day. We can (we hope) get approval for this to be done for a seasonal teacher, either by having him on travel status for the four months period or by having the Department pay the costs and charge him for prepared rations at the rate of \$40 per month and some small charge for living accommodation. We could not, however, obtain approval for either of these arrangements for a full year, and I am sure that no teacher would be willing to pay \$150 a month for board.

Please tell me at the soonest possible date what arrangements you are able to make for accommodation of the second teacher. This is an urgent matter since there are not many people left who are available after May 31.

I believe that in accordance with present policy one of the teachers at Rayrock should be a Roman Catholic; since [redacted] This would not make it possible for us to employ [redacted] who is not a Roman Catholic. Your views would be appreciated at an early date.

With reference to your telegram of the 22nd regarding the position at Rayrock, there are two alternatives for the full-time teacher to be appointed. The first is to continue the arrangement made for the seasonal teacher; the other is to build a teacherage at Rayrock. As the Department intends to build a Federal Day School at Rayrock two or three years from now, a school which will probably be located in a different location than that of either of the two classrooms at present in use, it would seem a rather expensive proposition to build a teacherage for such a short length of time and if, under the regulations, it is possible to continue the present arrangement, it would appear to me that a considerable sum of money could be saved. I am arranging to make an extended tour through the district early in June and if a decision regarding building a teacherage can be postponed until towards the end of June, my visit to Rayrock should help to clarify the situation.

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

This will acknowledge with thanks your letter of April 25th regarding additional classroom facilities at Rayrock and the schoolhouse to be erected at the Indian Village.

The estimate for enlarging the classroom on the Rayrock property is \$1,700.00. With reference to your proposed recommendation to the Minister, it would appear that, from the latest count of Rayrock and Indian children who will be attending the enlarged school, Rayrock would be responsible for approximately 50% of the alteration cost. The present classroom will be sufficiently large for Rayrock children expected to attend school next year. Thus the alteration program, in effect, would be entirely for the accommodation of the Indian children. It would be appreciated if this would be considered when your recommendation for payment is submitted.

As suggested in Mr. Kilgour's letter of March 31st, we would be willing to deliver one of the Northland buildings to the site in the Indian Village for \$10.00 per square foot of building. The proposed building is 20' x 36' for a cost of \$7,200.00. The preparation of the site and construction of a timber foundation set on bed rock is estimated at \$1,750.00, completely closed in and covered with white siding. Thus the total cost of the building, ready for use, but without any interior alterations would be \$8,950.00.

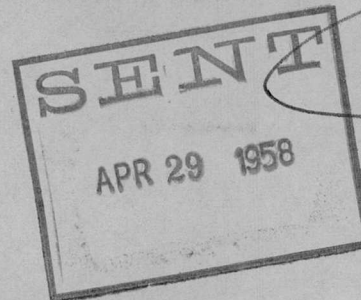

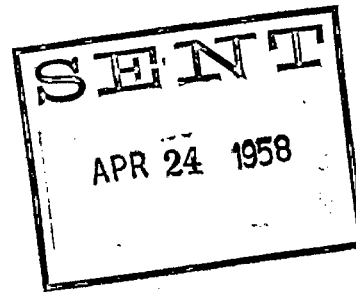

On receipt of this information from you we will be able to proceed with the hiring of teachers.

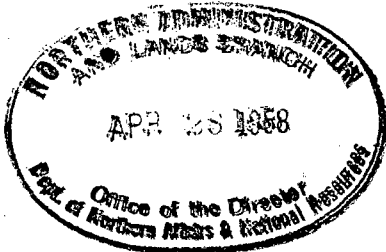



MEMORANDUM FOR MR.J.V.JACOBSON, Chief, Education Division

Yesterday I visited Rayrock and find that it is not possible to arrange accommodation for a woman teacher for the seasonal school scheduled for the Indian village near the Mine. It would be possible to run a two month school beginning July as Mrs.Cartier is moving out and her one-bedroom apartment would be available. Mr.Clark, Manager at Rayrock, suggested that he would be quite happy if a married couple, the wife being a teacher, could come to Rayrock for the school year as he would be quite willing to employ the husband in some capacity at the mine, but as far as the temporary school at the Indian village is concerned, it would have to be a male teacher who could be accommodated in the mine bunk house.

In about a month the mine authorities propose to move some six or seven buildings from a site mid-way between Rayrock and Marian Lake to the mine area at Rayrock. Amongst these buildings, which are virtually new, is one measuring 20' x 36', which might be used as a school at the Indian village. I believe Mr.Kilgour has already written to Mr.Robertson regarding this. The estimated cost of placing the building on a foundation to be established by our own Works and Maintenance Division, would be approximately \$7,200. He is also prepared to run a power line from the mine to the school. I am asking the Engineer to go to Rayrock, see the building and equate the cost against the cost of establishing a ~~133-133~~ school. Mr.Clark was most co-operative and if we can get an even break by taking over their building I think we should do so in the interest of good relationship with the company. He is also prepared to extend the present school by taking in a commissary now occupying part of the school building, but he is not prepared to pay the cost. I would suggest that the Company be asked to take out the partition and do any work necessary to make the commissary a part of the classroom and that they be reimbursed on a rental basis, that is if the alterations cost \$1000 the Department would be prepared to pay a rent of \$500 a year for a period of two years.

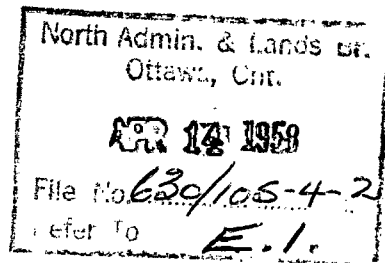

--- Will you please prepare a reply to the letter from Rayrock Mines Limited dated March 31st, copy attached. There are two points which should be dealt with, the first the proposal for the sharing of the cost of the ^{enlarging} existing class room, and the second the proposal for assisting us in providing class room facilities at the Indian village.

With regard to the first point, it seems to me that we might properly offer to pay the same proportion of the cost of enlarging the school room as the number of children expected to attend the school in September, 1958 who are the children of parents normally resident in the Territories bears to the total number of children expected to attend the school at that time. If you agree, you might state that we would be prepared to recommend to the Minister participation on this basis, and enquire of Mr. Kilgour what the anticipated cost of the enlargement is.

With reference to the second point, it seems to me that we should definitely take advantage of Mr. Kilgour's offer. If you agree, would you so state in the draft.

Thank you for your letter of March ²⁵15th concerning our
local educational problems.

We are glad to say that we concur entirely with your sug-
gestions.

There is one point mentioned in my last letter that I do
not think was referred to by you. That is, to accommodate
children of Indian employees who fall into the category
mentioned in the first paragraph, page 2, of your letter,
we must enlarge our present school. We feel that the cost
of this enlargement might be shared by your department and
would appreciate your consideration on this point.

We may be able to make a suggestion that would be of inter-
est to your proposed program. Since our last correspondence
we have purchased some buildings for employee housing. We
bought a job lot and may be able to spare one. This is a
one story building 20' x 36', partitioned into two rooms
about 18' x 19', 3 years old, in good condition, insulated,
finished inside with Ten-test, covered outside with shiplap
and "Asbestoside" siding, and with 55 lb. roofing. The in-
terior is unpainted. We plan to move these buildings to
Rayrock as soon as possible and estimate that they will cost
us about \$10.00 per square foot of floor area F.O.B. Rayrock.

If this building were of interest to your Department we would
be prepared to move it to the Indian village, but not set it
on a foundation of any kind, for the above figure. We could,
if you so wished, provide the necessary labour and materials
at cost, required to put the building on any foundation you
would prefer.

Proposed School at Rayrock Mine

I have received your memorandum of March 21st to which you attached a memorandum from Mr. Cairns. This memorandum was received here on March 28th and by that time I had already sent you a memorandum dated March 26th outlining the arrangements for the operation of two classrooms at Rayrock. This memorandum answers most of the questions raised in Mr. Cairns' memorandum.

Mr. Cairns mentions the possibility of enlarging the present mine school classroom and suggests that the cost of the alterations be borne by the Federal Government. I might mention that it is rather difficult to obtain approval for alterations for a building which is not owned by the Federal Government, but if you feel that this should be done I will make the necessary submissions to Treasury Board providing you indicate the cost which will be involved.

It is rather interesting to note that the suggestions in my memorandum of March 26th are identical with the recommendations outlined in paragraph two, page two, of Mr. Cairns' memorandum. However, this memorandum was received after I had sent you mine. Since the second teacher will live in the mining town, Mr. Sivertz was wondering if there was any problem about transportation for her. My recollection was that the Indian village was separated by water from the mining town. Would you please advise me whether this is a problem and if it is, what solution do you suggest.


Regarding accommodation for the two permanent teachers, please let me have your views regarding the suggestions in the fourth paragraph of my memorandum of March 26th. If the suite reserved by the mine management for use of the teachers should be shared by two single (female) teachers or by a married couple, both of whom are teachers, the housing accommodation would be no problem.

Should one of the teachers be Roman Catholic?

We are considering the appointment of a single female teacher for the four month seasonal school, and by wireless message of yesterday's date we are asking whether the mining company could accommodate such a teacher for a four month period, since you suggest there is a "possibility" that this could be done.

Arrangements are being made to have classroom equipment for the new school and additional supplies requisitioned.


REQUEST FOR NEW POSITION RAYROCK SCHOOL

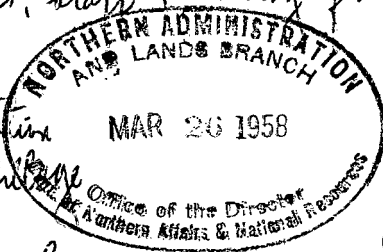

Dear Mr. Kilgour,

Thank you very much for your letter of March 15th with regard to the Rayrock school question. I have read it with great interest, and I want, at the outset, to assure you that I have every sympathy with the special problems which you face at Rayrock. Further, I think that the suggestion that you have made for a solution to the problem is workable, and I am prepared to work out something along these lines.

I therefore propose to set the machinery in motion at once for the construction of a 512 building at the Indian Village in the summer of 1958, and to use that building commencing in September 1958 as a school for children resident at that settlement. Because all - or nearly all - of the pupils will be children who have had very little, if any, previous schooling, and will, in consequence, be older than is usual for the grades they will be in, the school will be organized as an "accelerated class room" in the same manner as similar rooms are organized in other settlements where a similar problem exists.

I have noted your willingness to provide facilities for lodging and boarding the teacher at your camp, and will be most happy to take advantage of your kind offer.

The statistics which you give as your expectations of school attendance by children of employees of your company

between now and 1962 leads me to conclude that we should, for the present at least, carry on the existing school on the present basis. To be eligible for admission to this school a child would, therefore, have to be the son or daughter of an employee of your company, and his background such as to make it unnecessary for him to have the special benefits of the "accelerated class room".

For administrative purposes we would like to regard these two separated class rooms as belonging to the same school. This would enable us to achieve organizational economies in the ordering and supplying of school materials and equipment, and it would enable us also to treat one of the two teachers - whichever happens to be the most senior and experienced - as a principal, with consequent salary advantages.

I would appreciate it very much if you would let me know as quickly as you can whether you concur in the suggestions made in this letter.

RE: PROPOSED SCHOOL AT RAYROCK MINE

I enclose a memorandum submitted to me by Mr. Cairns following his visit to Rayrock. You will note that on page 2 I have deleted a sentence which I think should read as follows:-

"1. At the present mine School, which would be enlarged if the recommendation is accepted, a combined classroom would be established to include the pupils who are at present in attendance plus those Indian children who have had some schooling and whose basic English is of such quality that they could be graded. Mr. Cairn's estimate of the number involved would be between 6 and 9.


2. It might be objected that the establishment of the proposed temporary classroom adjacent to the Indian village would constitute a measure of segregation. In view of the fact that a certain number of Indian children would be admitted to the Mine School I do not think the objection would ~~develop~~, as the pupils to be admitted to the temporary classroom would be given a curriculum largely consisting of training in basic English and would all be Indians. The suggestion of locating the school near the village carries a great deal of weight.

3. The solution proposed should be regarded as merely a temporary expedient leading to the establishment of a permanent Federal Day School located on a site convenient both to the Mine and the Indian village. As Mr. Kilgour has intimated it is very likely that a number of the Indians will be absorbed into the work force of the Mine. It would be well to plan for the building of the permanent school by 1960 at the earliest when the work situation would be much clearer than it is at the present time."

MEMORANDUM FOR DR. WESTWATER, Superintendent of Schools

Rayrock Mine was visited on March 14 and the classroom was inspected. Once again I was very pleased with the general tone and apparent progress. Henman Nelson I.Q. tests and Dominion Arithmetic tests were administered during the visit. Mrs. Cartier continues to do excellent work.

By request of Mr. Kilgour discussions were held with Mr. Clark, Mine Manager, in connection with the operation of a school with both Indians and children of mine employees attending. Letters in this connection had been received from Mr. Robertson. I was very pleased with their general attitude in respect to accepting Indians on an equal basis and doing all they could to assist in their education.

They did have some concerns with which I was sympathetic. One concerned the moral aspects - both physical and mental, and comparisons were made to similar situations which existed elsewhere and where similar concerns of parents did not materialize. The size of their present classroom (approx. 19 x 14) was also mentioned. This could be doubled by removing a wall and taking in the space presently used for commissary purposes - alteration cost it was felt that should be borne by the government.

Inspection of the school indicated that in many ways the mine children would gain by additional fellow pupils - at the moment there is only one child in each of the grades three, four and five. Competition and group work is not possible with only one in a grade. From the standpoint of enrolment next year of children of mine personnel, there will be three in grade one, presently doing kindergarten work in the home of a parent, and pupils in grades 4, 5, 6 and 7. From this it will be seen that should a

combined school be organized, most of the Indian children will not be ready to associate in similar grades as most are non-English. ~~A combined classroom might include whatever grade three Indians existed and in due time those older pupils once a rudimentary knowledge of English was gained.~~ The three "grade one" mine children, having had kindergarten and also coming from homes with above-average experiences will probably be in a group by themselves for at least the next year, regardless of what ~~situation was~~ *solution* arranged.

While our discussions were held, of course, on a non-committal basis, there was evidenced a definite desire to co-operate and a willingness to have Indian students attend school along with their children. The letter from Mr. Robertson indicated a wish for immediate information and seemed to suggest that no school could be expected before 1959 or possibly 1960. Our discussions seemed to lead towards the advisability of setting up two classrooms as follows:

- (1) One classroom for all Indian children who need basic training in English and would probably include Indian children whose grade one or grade two standing was questionable.
- (2) Second classroom for all mine children and all Indian children who had had previous schooling.

Mr. Kilgour mentioned that such a split had been indicated as a possibility by Mr. Jacobson. It was pointed out that duplication of grades could not be accepted as a satisfactory situation; educationally speaking. However, this does not pose an immediate problem as it would be the best solution to congregate all non-English speaking children into one classroom for instruction and in a year or two there should be no need for a special "basic English" classroom and the students would merely be divided by virtue of total enrolments. Consequently, it was felt that the extension of the present small classroom to include the whole building (that is, adding the commissary section) would suffice for a senior class. Since it appears that the construction of a Federal School cannot be anticipated this summer, it is recommended that a 512-Building, modified for classroom use, be elected. This should be erected at the Indian village, which location would have the added value of a "community center" and a locale from which the Indian Health Nurse and others could work in programs of social betterment. Such a building would have many possible uses when a more-permanent school was erected.

Due to convenient plane arrangements Mrs. Cartier accompanied Mr. Kilgour and myself to Discovery Mine and then on into Yellowknife and as Mrs. Cartier had not met the Indian Affairs personnel, a meeting was arranged. Those present included Superintendent Kendall, Mr. J. Ward, Assistant, Indian Agency, and Miss K. Raper, Indian Health Nurse. An informal discussion was held on how efforts could best be correlated to assist the social situation

at Rayrock. Mrs. Cartier has always been interested and willing to organize welfare and adult-education programmes with the Indians and Miss Raper, a recent arrival at Yellowknife, indicated she hoped, along with the doctor from Fort Rae, to visit Rayrock at least once each month. Superintendent Kendall, although soon being transferred, said that there was every likelihood that a few houses would be built for the natives there. Mr. Kendall, however, expressed disappointment at the poor housing standards being maintained by those presently squatting near the mine and felt, that if new housing was to be constructed, through grant or band loan, a definite program toward better housekeeping patterns was needed.

It would seem that we are justified in recommending a school at this point. Sometimes it is not wise to create a school at a location where Indians would congregate, leave their natural means of subsistence and gain no satisfactory means of financial support as a substitute. At Rayrock the Mine authorities have found the Indians quite satisfactory for an increasing number of tasks and, if anything, will be employing more. At the same time the Indians and other mine employees are permitted use of the commissary and attend the same film showings. A sound basis for total social integration when similarity of interests exist has thus been laid and the mine management is to be commended for their actions in this regard.





Thank you for your letter of February 26th which I have read with much interest.

First, I think, the position of the Company and Management, in regard to education of the children of Indian employees, should be clearly defined. We are sympathetic toward any effort to improve the education of these children. We feel that education is their only hope if they are to cope with the new living conditions in the Territories. Consequently our consciences urge us to take as many of these children into our school as we can, while at the same time realities are a strong deterrent to that course of action.

The realities that deter us are those associated with any desperately poor people of race. These children unfortunately, are unclean according to our standards, their parents, at least, require a good deal of treatment for venereal disease, and from observation we believe that they are much more sophisticated sexually than we feel is desirable for our children to be. In short we fear that Gresham's Law will operate if our children and the Indian children were to mingle indiscriminately, especially if the Indian children were in such a majority as appears evident.

The last two paragraphs would seem to indicate that we have room in our school for more pupils and that we could take in Indian children if we wished which brings us to the points raised in your letter.

The figure given to Mr. Jacobson by the teacher, Mrs. Cartier, appears to have been one that was accurate last fall but since then there has been quite an influx of families into camp. This, we feel, is due partly to wood cutting operations by a contractor for us which has engaged up to as many as 30 men at times. Indians are fairly transient so the figure given in our last letter may have changed a bit but was what the R.C.M.P. reported to us in January. As regards room in the school for more children, this is really a matter of opinion. The school room is about 16' x 19'. The children sit in individual desks. After provision for a teacher's desk, some room in front of the black boards, and aisles we think there is room for one more desk. The situation is like bunkhouses. If men in bunkhouses sleep in single beds "X" men can go into "Y" square feet of floor area. With double deck bunks "2X" men can go into the same area, and with triple deckers "3X" or nearly "3X" men can be accommodated and so on. But for long usage only single beds are now considered adequate similarly with our school desks.

since we felt that there was room only for one more student and as we anticipate that our school facilities will be fully used next year for sure and possibly at anytime if we engage an employee with children of schoolage, we have not invited any Indian child to come to school so far. As you may know, Rayrock has a sizeable loan from the bank, required to bring the mine into production. Until this is paid, capital expenditures have to be kept to the absolutely essential, so we don't anticipate any addition to our school for some time. At present the school only occupies about half of the building enclosing it and at one time we considered turning the whole building into a school once the other half became available. This plan had been shelved however.

Concerning possible educational requirements at Rayrock, your information as to Rayrock's future appears reasonable. At Discovery our experience on a similar operation has been that our school population did not rise above 10 until we had 22 families resident on the property which was 6 years after production started. This is partly due to a policy of encouraging employment of both husband and wife, where we have to provide housing. As regards Northland, which is 28 miles away. I do not believe that employees of that property will find it feasible to live at Rayrock on account of the distance from their work.

Reference your request for a forecast as to educational requirements in your final paragraph. It would seem to us that from Discovery experience, there will not be over 12 white students at Rayrock until 1962 and that there will likely be 20-30 Indian children of school age resident there at anytime.

At present we employ 6 Indians steadily and 8 Indians casually. Others are employed for short periods cutting wood, unloading freight etc. We do not expect any reduction in Indian employees, rather the contrary if Mr. Taylor's plan for training Indian Miners proves successful.

Mr. Cairns, Inspector of Schools has recently paid us a visit, during which schooling was discussed with Mr. Clarke, Mine Manager, and myself.

We felt that a suggestion made by Mr. Jacobson in January might furnish a solution that would provide the needed education and at the same time diminish the objections our people have to association with the Indians. The suggestion was to operate two schools for the present. One would serve white children and Indian children who are now attending school elsewhere. The other would be for Indian children who have not previously attended school and who have little or no English.

The former would be achieved by enlarging our present school as mentioned above with government participation as soon as the remaining space in the building became available probably in June. We feel that this enlarged room would be adequate for the children in the first category.

For children who have not been to school previously we suggest that consideration be given to the erection of a type of building designated "512", located in the Indian village less than half a mile South of the Mine. This building would serve as a community centre for the village as well.

We feel that the population of the Indian village will tend to become more and more stable as time passes and that there will always be enough children to warrant two rooms. Then, as soon as it was feasible this second school might be moved so as to be closely adjacent to the present one.

We have one residence pretty well set aside for the teacher at present, so we feel that suitable accommodation for a second teacher can be arranged satisfactorily when required.

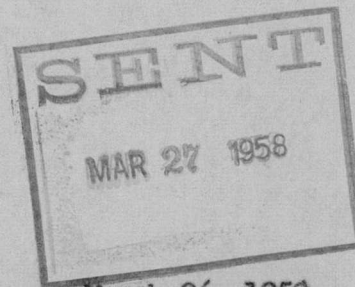

Rayrock School

Yesterday we discussed with the Assistant Deputy Minister the need for classroom accommodation at Rayrock. It was agreed that a #133 building would be erected in the Indian Village at Rayrock to accommodate Indian children of school age who had not received previous schooling. This room will be operated as an accelerated classroom.

The existing Mine school will continue in operation. It will provide accommodation for white children of school age, as well as Indian children of company employees, providing the parents of these Indian children have reached a reasonable degree of integration and the children have had some previous schooling so that they will not require the benefits of the accelerated classroom.

These two school buildings will operate as a unit with one teacher being the Principal. The Mining company has agreed to provide accommodation for both teachers. Every effort is being made to have this new school building constructed and ready for operation effective September 1, 1958.

You might wish to find out from Mr. Kilgour just what type of accommodation will be made available for the teachers. Perhaps he could let us have a house for this purpose. If this is done, either two single teachers or a married couple could be employed. I might mention that we previously agreed to employ any teacher recommended by the Mining company, providing the teacher was well qualified. The Mining company generally recommended a teacher who was the wife of one of their employees. We did not mention to the Mining company that we


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would like this procedure changed but you might wish to mention to Mr. Kilgour that this arrangement has certain disadvantages. The greatest of these is that, if the person employed by the Mining company quits, the wife who is employed as a teacher would undoubtedly also leave.

The Assistant Deputy Minister has approved the operation of a seasonal school at Rayrock. You should advise me immediately as to the physical facilities available and whether we must send in a tent classroom. Can you borrow sufficient desks for use there, or are desks required? Is Mr. Kilgour willing to board the seasonal teacher?

An early reply would be appreciated.

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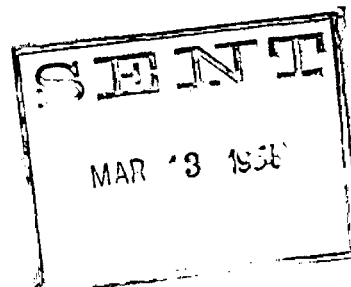

MEMORANDUM FOR DR. WESTWATER, Fort Smith, N.W.T.

I have Mr. Cairns' memorandum of March 5th regarding the education of Indian children in the Rayrock area.

We are not in favour of any proposal which would result in the Indian children being segregated in a different school, or a different classroom, from the white children. The whole policy regarding schools in company towns is being reviewed and it appears likely that approval will be given for the establishment of federal schools at centres where 50% or more of the available pupils are children of parents who have resided in the Northwest Territories before they took up employment in the mine, or are children of parents who were not employed in the mine. This policy has not as yet been approved but as soon as further information is received in connection with it, we will advise you. If this new policy is approved, it may mean that a federal school will be asked for at Rayrock and that we will be seeking your advice as to the size of the school.

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

Thank you for your letter of the 18th.

Shortly after Mr. Kilgour's discussion with Mr. Jacobson regarding Indian education at Rayrock, a census was taken of the Indian children resident here. Mr. Kilgour then wrote Mr. Robertson. I assume that you have not received a copy of that letter so am attaching same.

The company feels that the result of the census throws an entirely different light on the subject due to the influx of children since last fall.

At present there is one vacant seat in the school which will be occupied soon, the company expects, by one of the children of an employee.

In view of this and because there now appear to be several children who have had some previous schooling, no Indians have been invited to come to school yet.

I might add that while the company is officially quite sympathetic to education of the Indian children, there is very strong opposition to mixed education by the majority of the parents resident here.

It would not seem, at present at least that anything could be done for the children mentioned in your second question.

The third question would seem to be answered best by a separate school for the present, at least, for the Indian children.

We believe that there are a total of 39 children who would attend school here if such were available. Such a number is more than we feel that we can handle, of course, and puts the situation in a little different light.

The Department may be interested in building a school for this many children. If so, we would be glad to help in any way possible.





You will have received a copy of Mr. Robertson's letter to Mr. Kilgour concerning the inclusion of Indian children in the school at that settlement. I hope that either you or Mr. Cairns will visit Rayrock at an early date and that you will advise us as to the developments which have taken place regarding this matter. We would also like to have your recommendations as to whether a federal school should be established at Rayrock or not. If you feel that there is justification for constructing a federal school (with living quarters for a teacher) at Rayrock you should include this item in your draft of the estimates, accompanied by supporting material, as requested in the lengthy memorandum I sent you some time ago regarding the preparation of estimates. You should not, of course, wait until estimate time to present requests for this or other new schools which are required in the area.

I hope you are making arrangements to have either Mr. Cairns or yourself inspect the school at Discovery Yellowknife, since this was specifically requested by Mr. Kilgour when I saw him in Yellowknife in January.

I would appreciate it very much if you would tell me whether you have taken in any of these Indian children, and, if so, how many. White children would, of course, have priority, but I would hope that you would be willing to give a second preference to children, if any, of Indians employed by your company, and a third preference to other Indian children who have had previous schooling elsewhere.

This would, perhaps, be an opportune time to consider what the educational requirements at Rayrock are likely to be in the future. My present information is that we can reasonably expect that Rayrock will continue in production for another 7 years at least on a basis of some 120 tons production a day with an operating staff of about 65 men. I also understand that there is an excellent chance that Consolidated Northland will come into production soon at a rate of some 50 tons a day with a life expectancy of at least 5 years, and that it will employ some 15 to 20 men who will likely live at Rayrock.

I would appreciate it if you would let me know when a decision will be made as to whether Consolidated Northland will come into production, and whether the forecast set out above is correct.

If the situation should develop as outlined above, the result might well be that, from the families of employees of the two mines and from other families who might be attracted to the settlement, there would be at least 25 children of school age living at Rayrock. If this should transpire and if 50% or more of the available pupils should be children of parents who had resided in the Northwest Territories before they took up employment in the mines, or were children of parents who were not employed in the mines, I would be justified in recommending to my Minister the establishment of a federal day school with living quarters for the teacher at Rayrock. I would appreciate it very much, therefore, if you would give me your forecast as to how the situation will develop. I do not know how soon we should aim at establishing a federal school if one is warranted, and would very much appreciate hearing your ideas as to a target date for the school opening. 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

I was surprised to find that there were so many Indian children of school age resident at Rayrock. I would appreciate knowing whether the parents of these children are employed at the mine and are likely to be permanent residents at the settlement. If they are permanent residents, the possibility of the Federal Government constructing a school at this point may have to be considered.

When I discussed the matter with you, we talked in terms of having two or three Indian children, who had previously attended school, attend your school at Rayrock. I presume that this is being done. I realize, of course, that the classroom there can only provide accommodation for a maximum of fourteen pupils so it would not be possible to admit all the Indian children of school age who are now living in the settlement.

Thank you very much for your letter of January 25. I note that the information which the R.C.M.P. Constable at Fort Rae gave to you indicates that there are 25 Indian children of school age resident with their parents at Rayrock and that there are also an additional 14 children of these same parents who are resident elsewhere.

When Mr. Jacobson visited this school on January 17 he was told by the teacher, Mrs. F. Cartier, that there were at least 9 Indian children of school age living at Rayrock who were not attending school and that two or three of these had previously attended a school. Mr. Jacobson has told me that there are at the present time only 7 white children attending the company school at Rayrock, and that the classroom would accommodate 14 students. It would appear, therefore, physically possible to admit up to 7 of these Indian children to the company school.

When we discussed this question last month I expressed the view to you that the children who had previous schooling might be taken into the present school. I would appreciate it very much if you would tell me whether you have taken in any of these Indian children, and, if so, how many. Would you be willing to take in as many as can be reasonably accommodated, in addition to the white children? White children would, of course, have priority but I would hope that you would be willing to give a second preference to children, if any, of Indians employed by your company, and a third preference to other Indian children who have had previous schooling elsewhere.



In the meantime I have directed that a review be made of the school situation at Rayrock in order that a decision can be made as to whether or not a federal day school should be constructed at that point. My present information is that we can reasonably expect that Rayrock will continue in production for another 7 years at least on a basis of some 120 tons production a day with an operating staff of about 65 men. I also understand that there is an excellent chance that Consolidated Northland will come into production soon at a rate of some 50 tons a day with a life expectancy of at least 5 years, and that it will employ some 15 to 20 men who will likely live at Rayrock.

I would appreciate it if you would let me know when a decision will be made as to whether Consolidated Northland will come into production, and whether the forecast set out above is correct. If the expectancy of Rayrock and Northland is as good or better than my information would indicate, I would be prepared to recommend to my Minister the establishment of a federal day school with living quarters for the teacher at Rayrock. I would also be prepared to recommend the placing in the supplementary estimates of this Department of a sufficient sum to enable the stockpiling of the materials and possibly a start on construction to be made in the summer of 1958 so as to enable the school to come into use in September, 1959. I would, therefore, appreciate hearing further from you at your earliest possible convenience.

Thank you for your letter of the 25th of January.

I was surprised to find that there were so many Indian children of school age resident at Rayrock. I would appreciate knowing whether the parents of these children are employed at the mine and are likely to be permanent residents at the settlement. If they are permanent residents, the possibility of the Federal Government constructing a school at this point may have to be considered.

When I discussed the matter with you, we talked in terms of having two or three Indian children, who had previously attended school, attend your school at Rayrock. I presume that this is being done. I realize, of course, that the classroom there can only provide accommodation for a maximum of fourteen pupils so it would not be possible to admit all the Indian children of school age who are now living in the settlement.

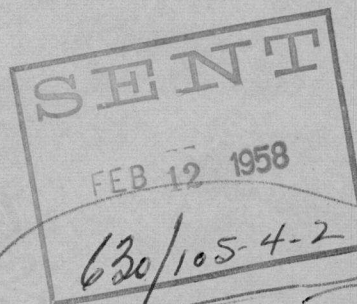

Re: Education of Indian Children at Rayrock

You asked for my comments on Mr. Kilgour's letter of the 25th of January. When Mr. Jacobson visited this school on the 17th of January there were the following children enrolled, all of white status:

Grade III	1
" IV	1
" V	1
" VI	4
Total. . .	<u>7</u>

The teacher, Mrs. F. Cartier, mentioned that there were at least nine Indian children of school age living at Rayrock who were not presently in attendance at school. She also indicated that two or three of these had previously attended school and I believe you discussed with Mr. Kilgour the possibility of having these children admitted to the school.

The room which has been supplied as a classroom by the mining company is 20' x 14' and, according to approved standards, is capable of providing accommodation for only fourteen students. It is evident, therefore, that this school cannot provide accommodation for the total number of children who are resident at Rayrock.

It would appear from the statistics which Mr. Kilgour has supplied that, since Indian children constitute the majority of the school-age population at this point, a federal school should be established at Rayrock. I think, for the present at least, a one-room school would suffice. A school similar to the one constructed at Fort Rae, with an activity room, is recommended since if the enrolment increases and there is some indication that it will do so, the activity room could be used as a second classroom. It might be possible for the mining company to continue to provide accommodation for the teacher at an economical rental.

If you agree to a federal school being constructed at Rayrock, do you think that this project should be delayed until next year, or should funds be provided in the 1958-59 Federal Supplementary Estimates for this purpose.

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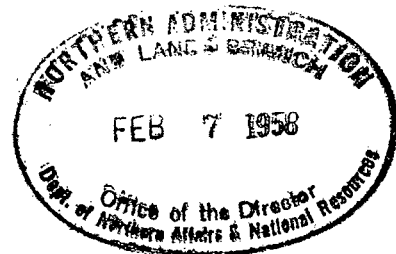

MEMORANDUM FOR MR. SIVERTZ

TEACHING OF INDIAN CHILDREN
IN THE SCHOOL AT RAYROCK



One of the questions that arose when I was in the Northwest Territories in January was about the education of Indian children in the school at Rayrock. At present seven white children are being taught in the school but no Indian children are receiving any education. If I remember rightly, there are sixteen Indian children of families working at the mine, of whom nine are of school age. Of these, two have had some previous schooling and seven have had no schooling whatever. I talked to Mr. Parker and also to Mr. Kilgour about this question. I told Mr. Kilgour that with the space limitations in the room and the problem of taking in children who had had no previous schooling, I could sympathize with objections to taking in all the Indian children immediately. I said, however, that I thought the two children who had had some previous schooling should be taken in at once. Mr. Jacobson subsequently talked to Mr. Kilgour and I understood that Mr. Kilgour was going to look into the matter at Rayrock and let us have word.

Has anything been heard on this? If not we should follow it up.

Assuming that the two Indian children are taken in, can we do anything about the others? If we cannot do anything this year what can be done next year?

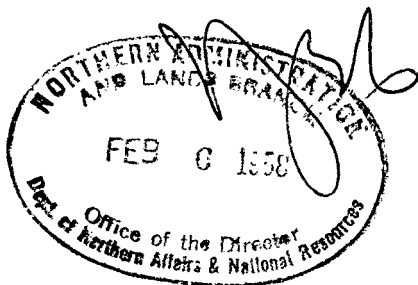

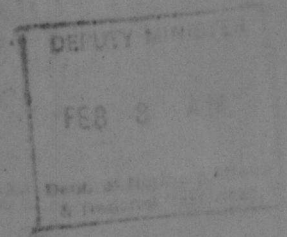

Following our recent conversation on the above subject, I conferred with Mr. W. E. Clarke, Mine Manager, on same.

At Christmas we gave the Indian children some nuts and candy and got the impression that there were quite a few resident in village. Just at the time I arrived here, the R.C.M.P. Constable from Fort Rae was in camp and kindly agreed to give us a count of the children dependent upon Indians resident here. He did so and a summary is attached to this letter.

We believe that there are a total of 39 children who would attend school here if such were available. Such a number is more than we feel that we can handle, of course, and puts the situation in a little different light.

The Department may be interested in building a school for this many children. If so, we would be glad to help in any way possible.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE DEPUTY MINISTER:

Attached is a memorandum prepared by Mr. Jacobson with regard to policy in respect of mine schools in Eskimo territory. When I read this two points occurred to me.

First, that the problem of special terms for company schools is not necessarily limited to mining companies, Eskimos or to Arctic areas, and second, that it would be wise to have some means of avoiding a capital expenditure by the federal government in respect of company schools when the long term prospects of the company continuing in operation are uncertain.

I discussed both these points with Mr. Jacobson over the telephone and as a result now suggest the following as a policy statement in respect of company schools in the Northwest Territories:

A company school is one at which the majority of the children in attendance are children of company employees not domiciled within the Territories. The federal government will engage the teacher for a company school, pay his transportation expenses and his salary and northern allowances, and will provide school supplies and equipment; the company will provide a classroom, living quarters for the teacher and utilities (light, heat, water and sanitary services). The company may charge the teacher for lodging and food at the same rate as it charges its employees. The Territorial Government will pay the Federal Government an annual sum which bears the same proportion to the Federal Government's expenditures in connection with the school as the number of children for whom the Territorial Government is responsible (non-Eskimo and non-Indian children) bears to the total number of children attending the school based on the average monthly attendance.

In settlements established primarily to serve one company, but where the majority of the children in attendance at school are the children of parents domiciled within the Territories, and where in the opinion of the Minister the prospects for continuing operation by the company are not sufficiently certain to warrant the expenditure by the Federal Government of the capital sum required to construct a school and residence for the teacher, the Minister may require the company to provide temporary quarters for the school and the teacher at an economic rental.



(e) Company Schools: The Committee has examined the practice in respect of Company Schools and approves of the policy whereby companies establishing such schools in remote areas provide classroom facilities. It thinks, however, that the policy relating to the hiring of teachers in such schools and the allocation of responsibility for the teacher's salary and allowances should be made uniform.

The Committee recommends that the company provide accommodation for the classroom and living accommodation for the teacher, that the Federal Government hire the teacher and pay his salary and allowances, and that the Territorial Government reimburse the Federal Government in full.

You requested that you be advised when teachers are appointed to new locations in order that that location may be assessed for Northern Allowance purposes. The following are the new schools which have been opened:-

- Rankin Inlet Mine School - Mr. Louis Burke
- ✓ Rayrock Mine School - Miss F. Evelyn Cartier
- Sugluk Federal School, Quebec - Miss E.M. Hinds
- Discovery Yellowknife Mine School - Miss Joan Shaxon
- Norman Wells Company School - Miss Virginia Arnold

For your information I might mention here a few points that Miss Hinds has requested be given consideration when the above locations are being assessed:

- (1) Remoteness: Should be assessed in terms of mail deliveries and transport facilities rather than in terms of geography.
e.g. Sugluk, P.Q. is more remote than Frobisher Bay.
- (2) Facilities: Settlements having no nursing station or doctor, no R.C.M.P., and no post office, should be considered for higher Northern Allowance than those where such services are available.
- (3) Quebec teachers are required to pay Quebec income tax in addition to Federal tax. They must also pay tax on all items bought from mail order stores; e.g. Eaton's store collects the tax for the Quebec Government.

Miss Hinds has also suggested that in order to encourage teachers to remain in the North, the Northern Allowance be increased each year for the first three years.

I was pleased to be advised by Mr. W.E. Clarke, Mine Manager at Rayrock Mines Limited, that you are willing to become an employee of this department for the 1957-58 fiscal year.

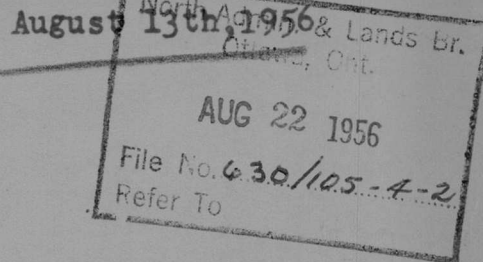

Rayrock is situated on the slope of a small mountain adjacent to Sherman Lake. It is quite a beautiful little settlement and consequently it should not be difficult to get a teacher to remain there. Plans for opening the new school there are progressing favourably. The mine manager, Mr. Clarke, conducted us around the new settlement and we visited what was to be the classroom. This we felt would be quite suitable for the time being in view of the fact that the enrollment for this year, it was expected, would not exceed 7 with one pupil in each grade up to Grade 8 excluding Grade 6. The necessary classroom equipment had arrived, I believe, at Yellowknife and was to be delivered to the mine at the earliest possible opportunity. It was expected that the school would be opened not later than the first of November. The teacher's name is Mrs. Cartier. She had 12 years teaching experience and held a Standard Elementary and Intermediate Certificate from the province of Alberta and a Superior First Class Certificate from the province of Saskatchewan.

She was to obtain a salary of \$3,100 plus free housing, though a slight charge would be made for electricity. A teacher in this settlement would be able to receive groceries on the same basis as other mine personnel, this we understand to be approximately Edmonton prices.

The matter of having a teacher employed on a Civil Service basis similar to that used in supplying a teacher to Port Radium was discussed with the mine manager. However, he still felt that they would prefer to hire the teacher with our concurrence so that they would be sure in his opinion to obtain a teacher married to a suitable mine employee. It appeared to us that this centre would develop into a thriving little community.

Dear Mr. Macdonald:

I wish to refer to previous correspondence regarding the possibility of this Department employing the teacher at Discovery. In Mr. Kilgour's letter of May 22nd, 1956, two objections were raised to this being done. One was that we might select a teacher such as a single woman, for whom you would not be able to provide accommodation, and the other that there might be complications if the husband has one employer and the wife another.

With relation to the first point, I would reiterate what I said in my letter of February 27th, 1956, that we will be pleased to employ any qualified teacher recommended by you. We fully realize that it is necessary for you to have as a teacher the wife of some person who is employed by you at the Mine, since there is only limited accommodation available. Since we are prepared to accept the teacher recommended by you, providing such teacher possesses a teaching certificate in good standing, this should allay any fears you have that we would employ as a teacher at Discovery any person for whom you do not have accommodation, or who is not otherwise suitable.

With respect to the second objection which you have raised, I do not think that the fact that the husband will be employed by one employer and the wife, as a teacher, by another would be a valid objection, since at many centres in the North such an arrangement is in effect. As you are fully aware, the provision of accommodation at northern points is quite costly and wherever possible the employment of husband-and-wife teams is put into effect.

In order to maintain a standard of education in the Northwest Territories, the Department last year established a policy of employing all teachers in full-time schools in the area, with the exception of those in Municipal Districts. As a result, all teachers in mission day and residential schools are employed by the Department. The teacher at Port Radium Mine School is also employed by the Department, and the teacher at the school to be established this Fall at Norman Wells will be employed by the Department. This arrangement has obvious advantages, insofar as the teachers, mining companies and the programmes are concerned. I would also add that, since new rental rates were put into effect on November 1st, 1956, the rents suggested in Mr. Kilgour's letter of March 5th, 1956 are reasonable rates.

Since we are at present re-examining the basis of financing assistance to mine schools, it would be greatly appreciated if a reply could be received from you at an early date as to whether you are prepared to have your teacher placed on the payroll of the Department.

As you are aware, positions have been established in the estimates to provide for the employment of teachers in the Discovery Yellowknife and Rayrock Mine Schools, with the intention that such teachers will be employed by this department and one-half of the cost of their salaries will be recovered from the mining companies concerned.

A number of letters have been written to the respective mining managers outlining the advantages to them of this department employing the teachers. The mining companies seem to feel that they need to have some measure of control over the employment of such teachers since the teacher's husband will undoubtedly be employed at the mine. We have advised them that we are quite prepared to employ any qualified teacher selected by them but we have not, as yet, received agreement from these companies.

I think that it is most important that teachers in organized areas be employed by the federal government and I think that we should "tighten up" with both mining companies. If they are not prepared to agree to this department paying the salary of the teacher and to the teachers themselves deriving the benefits that accompany employment in the federal government then I think that no further financial assistance should be given to these companies. The mine authorities at Port Radium do not experience any difficulties with us on this matter and I don't see why the mine managers at Rayrock and Discovery Yellowknife should be apprehensive that we will force teachers upon them who would not be suitable. We are more concerned with this from a measure of maintaining standards and are quite prepared to employ any teacher they wish to recommend for employment providing such teacher has a recognized teaching certificate.

I should appreciate having your views on this matter at an early date.



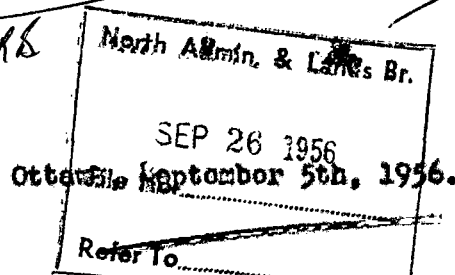

Re: Enrolment in Schools - Mackenzie District.

I have today sent you a wireless message requesting that you supply me with information regarding the enrolment in each school in the Mackenzie District, indicating a breakdown of the total by ethnic origin. This information should be relayed to me by wireless message as soon as it is obtained. Also in residential schools you should indicate the number of pupils in each racial group who are residential and who are day school pupils. Later you should obtain from each of the schools a breakdown of the ethnic origin of the pupils by grade. The above information is urgent, since it is needed for calculation of the funds which we require to place in the 1957-58 estimates. Do not forget to include the enrolment of pupils in hospitals as well.

In writing letters regarding the enrolment for these schools, it would be appreciated if you would quote File 600-6 (Statistics re Education) and the appropriate school file, for example Aklavik Anglican - 630/119-2; Aklavik Roman Catholic - 630/119-3; Aklavik Anglican Hospital - 6; Aklavik Federal School - 630/119-1, attaching an extra copy for each school referred to in your letter. This will save work in making extra copies for our files, here.

Would you also advise us by return mail as to the names of the teachers who are teaching in the following schools:

Yellowknife Public,
Yellowknife Separate,
Discovery Yellowknife,
Rayrock Mine.

We would also like to know the grades taught by each of the teachers in the above schools, as well as a listing of the grades taught by each teacher in all the federal and mission schools of the Mackenzie District.

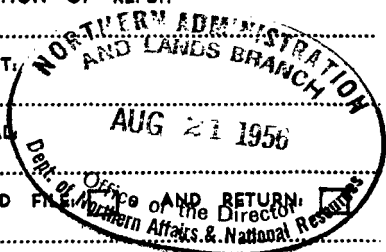



I have read the letter written to you by Mr. W. E. Clarke, the Mining Manager at Rayrock Mines, Yellowknife, and your reply to his letter. I am pleased to note that the Mining Company are planning to establish a school at their camp this Fall and I have noted that you are sending to them some working materials for Grades I to 8 inclusive. I think you should prepare a more detailed requisition for additional supplies for this school, since I am sure the mining officials would know very little about ordering the supplies necessary for the proper operation of a school. You should go over the standard list of supplies as well as the supplementary list and the list of text books which are ordinarily supplied, and prepare a requisition based on an expected enrollment of two or three pupils per grade, even though Mr. Clarke indicates that there probably will be only one pupil per grade. You might also write asking him if they need any advice as to the proper type of equipment which should be supplied for use in this school.

Since I think the Commissioner of the Northwest Territories should be brought into the picture at this time, I am attaching hereto a draft of a letter to Mr. Clarke for the Commissioner's signature and I would suggest that one of the stenographers have it typed out on the Commissioner's letter head and have it forwarded to him for signature together with copies of your correspondence with Mr. Clarke.

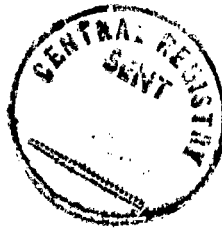

Thank you for your letter of July 8th concerning the establishment of a school at Rayrock Mines. We will be happy to assist you in any way possible regarding the organization of this school. However, due to the fact that we were not informed earlier concerning your decision on this matter, it may be difficult to provide the grant you mention during this fiscal year.

We will take immediate action to supply you with two sets of text-books and the working materials necessary for each grade, grades 1 to 8 inclusive. This will mean that one copy will be available for the student and one for the teacher. These should reach you well before September 4th, the opening date for school this year.

We are attaching a copy of our School Ordinance and Regulations under the Ordinance and, as you request, a copy of the salary scale presently in effect for teachers of the Northwest Territories. We insist, in so far as possible, on employing teachers with at least a First Class Certificate and in the Teacher Welfare category. For past experience we allow 5 years, thus a First Class teacher with 5 years experience would commence at a salary rate of \$3600 per annum. In addition to this, for a teacher whose husband is not employed by the Civil Service we pay a single northern allowance in the amount of \$900 per annum. A teacher Welfare is employed on a 12 months basis and is entitled to approximately 3 weeks holiday with pay each year. During the time when she is not on holiday and school is not in session, she is used in various community welfare activities, such as recreational supervision, librarian, or any other work which would add to the enrichment of life in such isolated communities,

Where it is necessary to supply accommodation for the teacher, under our present Regulations, she is charged 12% of her maximum salary if she is supplied with a separate house which comes up to a reasonably high standard, or if she is sharing accommodation she is charged one half of this amount.

This includes supplying all facilities such as heat, water, light, etc. She is, however, charged \$5 per month for a complete set of furniture which includes refrigerator, vacuum cleaner, besides the usual standard furnishings. She is also entitled to participate in our Health Insurance Scheme as well as in our Pension Plan.

It should be mentioned here that our salary scale is presently under revision; Consequently in setting your salary for the teacher it is suggested that you make provision for an upward revision of the attached scale, to an amount of at least \$300.
