In answer to your letter of June 5th referring us to your previous one dated March 17th, we include hereunder the recommendation sent us by M. Laurent Raymond, director of studies in Caughnawaga, following which recommendation and an application made by the agency superintendent, an amount of money was granted to allow this man to take a course in painting at l'Hopital Ste Anne de Bellevue:
" I have seen the applicant. He is highly handicapped, but on the recommendation of the hospital, he will profit by such a course as a means of rehabilitation. The course is intended as a therapeutic help in overcoming his handicap. The work he has already produced is good and shows sign of possible achievement. With the help of the painting he will produce he might be able to meet his personal daily expenses and become more self reliant. The course is highly recommended."

In a letter of April 27th M. Proulx, superintendent of the Oka Agency, mentioned the fact that [redacted] could take a course in painting at MacDonal College, but the problem of transportation seems to present difficulties, since we have not heard lately about the project.



With reference to the telephone conversation you exchanged with Mr. B. Dufour, from this office, on August 28, 1963, enclosed, please find a photocopy of a report received from Mr. Claude Girard, Director, La Commission d'Apprentissage de l'Industrie de la Chaussure, concerning [REDACTED]

As you will recall, this gentleman has been a patient of your Centre for quite a long time.

In 1961, [REDACTED] has indicated preference to undertake training in the shoemaking trade and was authorized by this Branch to follow his training at the above named school hoping that he would acquire the capability to work as a shoe repair man and thus become increasingly self-sufficient.

Following a request made by your Center and by the school director, Mr. Girard, [REDACTED] was granted permission to live in a boarding house near the school, during the winter months, because of the hardships imposed to him by his need to travel from Montreal [REDACTED]

The information obtained on this individual from the School does not show much interest from the part of [REDACTED] in acquiring adequate knowledge in this trade. In the light of this information, we are inclined to believe that [REDACTED] although he has made an application again this year for more educational assistance from this Branch, is either not motivated anymore toward this trade or is unable to proceed any further in it because of physical or other limitations.

This reply was delayed due to the fact that Mr. Laliberte had promised to submit us a report in writing on the interview. Unfortunately to-date nothing has yet been received.

In view of the above it is not believed that any accommodation can be found in or near Montreal, therefore, and Dr. Primeau and Mr. Laliberte's suggestion should be considered.



apparently passed most of Grade [redacted] subjects while in hospital and entered Grade [redacted] in Ontario after a rather considerable absence from school.

At the end of the fall term, or at Christmas, 1962, we had her assessed by a psychologist who estimated her intelligence in the 115 to 120 range and he felt that she should be quite capable of mastering Grade [redacted]. However, he felt [redacted]

[redacted] and had not found a very adequate substitute amongst the staff and other patients at Lyndhurst Lodge despite the fact that she is a very well liked patient.

Her objective at that time was to complete the High School programme and enter university and perhaps become a school teacher. The psychologist felt that this was a realistic goal and pointed out that the Rorschach did not indicate any deep psychic disturbances so that he felt she would develop sufficient stability to be of assistance to others.

The principal at Bishop Strachan School is willing to accept her back and has expressed the opinion that with her experience in Grade [redacted] behind her, she will very likely be able to achieve a very satisfactory standard in all subjects when she repeats her year.

I now have a communication from the Department of Health Hospital Insurance Service, Province of Quebec, Mr. Maurice Crepin, indicating the willingness of the Commission to pay for the hospitalization of [redacted] until the end of the present school year just closing. The matter was then to be brought up for consideration. However, I do not believe that she should continue to live in hospital if a suitable arrangement can be made for her to live in a private home. I feel that the environment of the hospital is unfavourable for academic work and also that if properly accommodated in a private home she might be more likely to receive the support she needs at this time in her life. It is therefore my hope that we will be able to obtain support for our project of continuing her education at Bishop Strachan School as a day student and providing accommodation for her in the community from which she will commute to and from school.

You will recognize that these suggestions are being put forth after much thought and some discussion with my associates and that they are all subject to modification and indeed I would appreciate alternate opinions as to how best to cope with this girl's problem.

I may say that I am very much impressed with her as a person and feel that her intelligence and potential for acquiring an education is of a much higher order than her record indicates. However, I also recognize that under-achievement at school is a very common experience for a variety of reasons, few of which are well understood, and that merely sending a young person to school does not in any sense of the word assure them of achieving an education and it might well be that we should lower our sights in this case. Even so, she will require a higher level of attainment than she has presently reached and I would be inclined to gamble on future success in academic pursuits for we feel that she is undoubtedly of good intelligence and is certainly a sensitive type of girl who might make a great contribution as a teacher or a social worker, or in some other field where personal relationships are very important.







The above named patient has been making good progress and should be ready for transfer to Lyndhurst Lodge in Toronto on September 5th.

Plane reservations have been made for her on this date, Economy class, on the TCA jet plane, leaving Montreal at 2.30, arriving Toronto at 3.35. Her mother, [Redacted] would like to accompany [Redacted] but reservations have not yet been made for her since we were not certain if we would be able to get money for her trip. It would reassure the patient a great deal if a well-known person would be with her, since she is quite nervous about her helplessness on a journey like this.

Another problem which has arisen is that of the wheelchair. This is counted as personal baggage, and since the chair alone weighs 44½ lbs, the patients would have to pay overweight charges on all her other personal belongings. The suggestion arose in my mind that [Redacted] fare, one way, would probably be the same as the excess baggage charge, and she could have [Redacted] bags on her ticket. Only the return ticket would have to be paid for then.

The patient could travel by air of course, but this would be difficult at a time when she has not yet learned to care for herself or to handle her wheelchair adequately. Also, it would not be advisable for her to be forced to sit up for an extended period of time after her recent skin graft for the pressure sore.

Would you let me know what your view is on these problems of transportation, companion, and baggage.

Enclosed please find the psychological report for the patient done in January of 1960. The psychologist does not feel that the situation has changed essentially since then.





I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 11th instant dealing with the case of the above named Indian girl from this Reserve.

Your letter is outlining what has been done in this case and what is proposed to be done for her. Relative to the second paragraph of page two of your letter and the questions asked, please be advised as follows:

1. [REDACTED] did not go to Lyndhurst Lodge at all but remained at Montreal.
2. She is now at the Montreal General Hospital on doctor's order.
3. According to her parents and the personnel of the hospital, [REDACTED] can only move from her wheelchair to her bed and nowhere else.
4. The family ties are fair. However her home is not believed to be suitable for her case as there is no inside plumbing and the house is not large enough to provide her with her own bed. In order that this house be made comfortable for the case of [REDACTED] an artesian well would have to be done to provide them with water, an electric pump supplied, the house would have to be enlarged ect., ect. This is not recommended as the price of these requirements would be high and would also create bad precedent with all other families having permanently sick ones.

5. If [REDACTED] was to live at home or anywhere on this Agency it would be very difficult to look after such a case. Firstly the Kateri School toilet facilities are located in the basement of that school whereas her classroom would be on the third floor, the same would also apply to other schools in Lachine. Owing to the girl's condition it is felt that it would take a person specially assigned to look after her during school hours. Also [REDACTED] would be unable to get in and out of the bus or car without any help.
6. Although we have not looked for any other homes than her own where she would board while attending school, we feel that it would be difficult to find a home with all conveniences where she could be placed as those property owners having such homes are not interested in taking boarders and more particularly any in such cripple condition.
7. [REDACTED] who has now been away from home for several months would wish to go to a boarding school equipped for a case such as hers and also be provided with facilities to further her education.

For your information I may say that the parents do not particularly want her to attend a Roman Catholic Institution and would not object to their daughter being placed in another institution. I may advise that Regional Office is submitting a report on the case as one of their official recently attended a meeting in Montreal at which Dr. Harold Elliott of Montreal was present and that this case was discussed thoroughly on that occasion.



I have read with interest your memorandum of July 12th and note that Dr. Elliot is still anxious to have [redacted] sent to Lyndhurst Lodge in Toronto.

I believe the decision in this connection should rest between Mr. Clarke and Mr. Laliberte. If the final decision is made in favour of sending her to Lyndhurst Lodge, it would be appreciated if you would indicate clearly what costs would be involved. I would anticipate that her residence in Lyndhurst Lodge would be for medical reasons and, therefore, Indian Health Services would probably expect to meet the cost while she is there. In view of this, I have forwarded a copy of the correspondence to Indian and Northern Health Services, but would suggest that you write to Dr. J. H. Wiebe, Regional Superintendent, to confirm this area of responsibility.

If it is not necessary for [redacted] to go to Lyndhurst Lodge, it would not seem that she should have to go to Toronto to attend school. Alternatively, a short period in Lyndhurst Lodge may be required, followed by transfer to a school in Montreal. Whatever plan is decided upon, please outline the details clearly along with an indication of costs.

This is further to our memorandum dated May 12 and to correspondence received from Mr. T.L. Bonnah, Acting Regional Supervisor, Toronto dated June 13 and July 6, 1961.

We have been able to meet on June 29 with Doctor Harold Elliot from the Department of Neurology and Neurosurgery, Montreal General Hospital to discuss the above mentioned case, and we have obtained a written statement from him on what he believes should be done for .

The next morning, that is to say Friday June 30, a conference was held at the same hospital with members of the Paraplegic Association and some representatives of the Social and Medical Department to enable everyone to understand the problems, and to decide on the proper measures which ought to be taken towards the rehabilitation of this young girl.

The report submitted by Doctor Elliot and the plan outlined by the Committee are attached to this letter for your information.

These meetings were called to permit our Regional Rehabilitation and Placement Officer, Mr. Bertrand Dufour to obtain a complete knowledge of all the problems which the above handicapped girl is and will be facing throughout the rehabilitation process.

The plan which is proposed for  takes into account all phases of rehabilitation, that is to say the physical, psychological, vocational and social phases.

Hereunder the most important points which were discussed during this meeting, and the suggestions which were made towards the solution of the problem:

1. [REDACTED] is presently hospitalized at the Montreal General Hospital for a pressure sore, and will have to recover completely before being sent to a school. A medical report is expected in one month's time from Doctor Elliot who believes that she should be ready for discharge in the middle of August.

2. While this is being done, a psychological assessment will be made to determine her mental and emotional capacities. This should permit us to have a better understanding of the young girl's abilities and bring the necessary assistance in meeting the various aspects of the vocational problem.

3. To facilitate [REDACTED] personal adjustment to handicap, it was recommended that she be sent to Lyndhurst Lodge, Toronto next September for a period of approximately one year. The aim for sending this girl there is two folds:

- (a) To receive psychological rehabilitation with other women paraplegic.
- (b) While receiving this, to catch up with Grade [REDACTED] schooling.

4. This girl will be brought in Montreal in July or August 1962. It is hoped that at that time, her physical and psychological rehabilitation will be completed, and that she will be able to resume Grade [REDACTED] and Grade [REDACTED] during the next two years. The educational or vocational plan would have to be followed closely to permit this girl to achieve success in her future occupation. It may be more recommendable later on to direct [REDACTED] through vocational training after she has completed Grade [REDACTED], but this, again, will have to be determined in co-operation with the School Instructor, Placement Counsellor, other specialists and the candidate in due time.

The original plan made in July and August 1960 for this girl is not completely changed. The suggested measure has become necessary, because [REDACTED] has not been able to accept her handicap and she could not look after herself as yet, even if she has been taught all what she needs to know to keep herself clean. The way to prevent pressure sore in future could also be taught to her by other persons paraplegic from Lyndhurst Lodge.

These are the three reasons why recommendations are made by Doctor Elliot, the Paraplegic Association, the Social Workers and hospital nurse to have [redacted] transferred to Lyndhurst Lodge in Toronto where she will be with other paraplegic persons who could help her to overcome these problems.

Another point which come out over the discussion is that the Bishop Strachan School in Toronto is not recommended by the Committee. This girl should complete her Grade [redacted] either at Lyndhurst Lodge or any other school even if the fees are little higher.

This is where the rehabilitation plan for this girl stands for the moment, and we are hoping that provision could be made to assist this handicapped until such time she could become self supporting again.



A firm decision regarding suitable schooling facilities for [redacted] will have to be made soon.

As I understand it, [redacted] was enrolled last September at the School for Crippled Children in Montreal but was admitted to the Montreal General Hospital on November 21, 1960. Medical authorities there recommended that on discharge she be sent to Lyndhurst Lodge in Toronto for medical rehabilitation.

It was reported to this office that [redacted] had been discharged from hospital in April, 1961, and transferred to Lyndhurst Lodge. Accordingly, the Regional Supervisor in Toronto was asked to investigate the circumstances and to ensure that adequate plans were being made for her. Mr. Bonnah reported on June 8, 1961, that the girl was not at Lyndhurst Lodge at that time, although Dr. H. Elliott, the eminent Montreal neurosurgeon who operated on her and who has continued his interest in her, had spoken to Mr. A. C. Clarke, the rehabilitation officer there, about her. Mr. Clarke had discouraged the proposal that [redacted] be sent to Lyndhurst Lodge as she is physically independent and does not need the services available there. She should, he suggests, attend an ordinary school where she can mingle with other young people who are not handicapped. He says that if it is necessary for her to be sent to Toronto, he could probably arrange for her to be enrolled in the Bishop Strachan School, a private school for girls. Besides being expensive, however, it is a Protestant school, whereas [redacted] is Roman Catholic.

Mr. Clarke wrote to Mr. J. Laliberte, at the Montreal Branch of the Canadian Paraplegic Association, to determine whether it would not be possible for this girl to attend school in her own area as he felt she would be happier there. Mr. Laliberte replied saying that he has been unable to locate a suitable school in Montreal for [REDACTED]. Accordingly, Miss Griffith, principal of Bishop Strachan School, who plans to visit Montreal soon, will interview [REDACTED] regarding her qualifications for admission to her school.

Although Miss Griffith plans to consider [REDACTED] for enrollment, Mr. Clarke points out that there are weighty arguments against the girl's being sent away from her home area. It would be appreciated, therefore, if you would obtain for me as much information as you can that would help in coming to a decision regarding future plans, including:

1. Was [REDACTED] in Lyndhurst Lodge and if so, how long?
2. Where is she now?
3. What are her physical abilities and limitations - i.e., can she move from her wheelchair to her bed, to the bath, to the toilet, into a car, etc. unaided?
4. Are there strong family ties - would it be advisable to encourage her to live at home? If so, what facilities would be needed, and what financial help would the family require to obtain these?
5. If [REDACTED]
 - (a) could she attend [REDACTED] taking a correspondence course, or
 - (b) could she attend [REDACTED]

In either case, the physical problems of ramps and bathroom facilities would have to be considered, as would transportation involvements.

6. If it would be preferable for [REDACTED] to board elsewhere than at her home, please advise me to this effect.



Since then, I have again been in touch with our Welfare Officer in Montreal urging on him the obvious advantages of finding a school in Montreal or vicinity which would be suitable for this girl. He has replied that they have not been successful in finding an accessible school for her in that area.

Consequently Miss Joan Griffith is going ahead with her plans to interview [REDACTED] in Montreal regarding her qualifications for admission to Bishop Strachan School in Toronto.

There are several things which concern me about this whole plan which should be cleared up before anyone proceeds much further with it. The concerns which come to mind are listed below.

1. Does the Indian Affairs Branch concur with the plan and if so is it willing to pay the costs involved? Fees for a resident girl at Bishop Strachan School for the past school year, 1960-61 were \$1500.00 of which \$700.00 applied to tuition and \$800.00 applied to residence. In addition to this each girl required funds for spending money, laundry, social and cultural activities, clothing, medications when needed, travelling at holiday time etc.

2. Bishop Strachan School is oriented to the Anglican religion. [redacted] is a Roman Catholic and although the school will and has admitted Roman Catholics, this should be cleared formally with [redacted] her parents and the church.

3. [redacted] being a paraplegic, may require hospitalization from time to time. Arrangements should be made in advance for payment of hospitalization and medical fees as required.

4. Will this girl want to go home for holidays at Christmas and Easter? She will certainly want to go home for summer holidays. Provision will need to be made for payment of these trips.

5. If this girl perseveres with her education to the completion of Senior Matriculation she will then have made friends here and will probably want to proceed to university or other vocational training in this area. Will it be possible to finance this for her out of the Province of Quebec?

I do not wish to be an obstructionist but it is better to assess the problem and know the worst in advance. We are quite willing to be of assistance where we can. The original impetus for this project came from Dr. Harold Elliott, eminent Montreal neurosurgeon, who takes a personal interest in his patients and therefore it merits a sincere effort.



Dear Mr. Morris:

Early in March we were asked by Dr. Harold Elliott of the Montreal General Hospital to see if we could arrange schooling in this area for a [REDACTED] year old paraplegic Indian girl, who is a patient of his. He stated that he had "exhausted all the facilities" for her schooling in her home area. Dr. Elliott is a physician who has a good deal of experience with paraplegics and takes an interest in them and so we endeavored to comply with his wish.

The information we have uncovered is that she could attend one of the Toronto secondary schools such as Central Technical or Northern Secondary each of which has an elevator. The non-resident fee for 1960-61 was \$677.00. Add to this the cost of board and room in the community and transportation by taxi and one arrives at a very high figure per school year. Consequently we approached the Principal of Bishop Strachan School, a private residential school for girls, who expressed a willingness to consider enrolling [REDACTED] if it appeared to be in the girl's best interest. She also expressed some doubts about how well this girl might fit in at the school, being disabled, far from home and likely with a different background from the other girls. There is a paraplegic girl in residence at the school now who should graduate at the end of June.

The Principal said she would call on Dr. Elliott and [REDACTED] early in July to try to assess whether the latter should be enrolled.

The above girl is not at Lyndhurst Lodge at present. Miss Martins, our social worker, called the Canadian Paraplegic Association in Toronto (WA.3-2954), and talked to Mr. Bartlett and Mr. A.C. Clark, rehabilitation officers. These men have had telephone conversations with Dr. Harold Elliott, neuro-surgeon at the Neurological Institute in Montreal; also, we presume, with the Paraplegic Association in that city.

Dr. Elliott suggested [Redacted] coming here, saying he preferred her not to attend the School for Crippled Children in Montreal. Mr. Clark suggested to Dr. Elliott and the Paraplegic Society in Montreal, that the girl be sent to a school in Quebec as she is physically independent and does not need to come to Lyndhurst Lodge. She, however, requires training for a job.

Should the decision be made for [Redacted] to come to Toronto, Mr. Clark said he had suggested that she attend Bishop Strachan School for Girls. This is a private school; tuition fees are \$1,500.00 per year, plus clothing, spending money, etc. He felt it was cheaper than sending her to public school where fees have to be paid. The girl has to be provided with room and board, also with special transportation. The Society preferred paraplegics to attend ordinary schools, where possible, in order to mingle with people early in life. Mr. Clark also said that the Director of Bishop Strachan School will be going through Montreal on her holidays and will try to see Dr. Elliott and, if possible, [Redacted] Bishop Strachan School closes for the summer, also for Christmas and Easter holidays. [Redacted] being a Roman Catholic, would probably be as happy attending a private R.C. School in the Province of Quebec, where her relatives can visit her.

In December, 1959, the above-noted girl [redacted] and, as a result, is now a permanent paraplegic.

[redacted] and had shown considerable promise. Tests indicated that she had good intelligence and it was considered that with proper instruction and training, she could be prepared for employment. Accordingly, the Branch, in co-operation with medical authorities and appropriate agencies, had [redacted] admitted to the School for Crippled Children in Montreal, with room and board, personal allowance and transportation costs being met by the Education Division. No fees were attached to her enrolment at the school.

It was intended that [redacted] attend the School for Crippled Children for a period of two years to be followed by vocational training. Unfortunately, [redacted] was hospitalized during December, 1960, and the medical authorities attending her considered that she should not be returned to the School for Crippled Children, but that it would be better if she was transferred to the Lyndhurst Lodge in Toronto where the environment and facilities would prove more satisfactory for her rehabilitation. The Regional Supervisor in Quebec has advised me that [redacted] was transferred to the Lyndhurst Lodge sometime in April and he has suggested that the matter of [redacted] rehabilitation be followed up by the Southern Ontario Region.

Would you please, therefore, look into this matter and submit a report at an early date. Your comments and recommendations with regard to [redacted] rehabilitation would be appreciated.





During my visit in Montreal, last week, I was informed by Miss Aleida Gerhardt, Social Worker of the social service department, Montreal General Hospital, that the above mentioned Indian girl has been admitted to this hospital for treatment of an abscess.

The problem of her future rehabilitation was also discussed and it seems to exist some concern in the mind of Miss Gerhardt, and other medical specialist, as to the services that this girl should receive in hospital. Miss Gerhardt told me that the medical authority was recommending that [redacted] be transferred to the Lyndhurst Lodge in Toronto, after discharge from the hospital. The environment in which the girl would evolve during her medical rehabilitation is known to be more adequate on the psychological point of view. Girls suffering from paraplegia are grouped together in Toronto, whereas in Montreal they are mostly in contact with girls which are recovering from infantile paralysis. The possibility for this girl to accept her handicap without creating too much psychological disturbance is greater in the first case and it should also facilitate her future rehabilitation.

This is a follow-up report and it is submitted, for your information.

Communication has been received from Mrs. Koster of the Social Service, of the above hospital, to the effect that they have made arrangements for [Redacted] to attend the Occupational Therapy, at the Rehabilitation Centre, 1030 Ottawa Street, Montreal, for him to follow treatments with a view of teaching him an occupation which would enable him to earn a living later on.

[Redacted] would start to go there, once a week for a certain length of time, then, he would be called upon to attend twice a week, and as his condition improves he would have to go five times a week.

As [Redacted] has no revenue except [Redacted] and the food relief that is issued him from this office, he will not be able to travel unless we supply him his transportation, from Caughnawaga to Montreal and his car fare from the bus station to the Centre. 





When they were in Ottawa last week, Dr. Elliott, Chief Neurologist at Queen Mary Veterans' Hospital and Mr. H. Ward of the Canadian Paraplegic Association raised for discussion the rehabilitation of [redacted]

[redacted] and who will, as a result, be a permanent paraplegic.

The immediate problem in this case, as indicated by Dr. Elliott, is one of having the girl transferred from the hospital at Caughnawaga to the Queen Mary Veterans' Hospital where there are adequate facilities for paraplegic patients. Dr. Proctor, Indian and Northern Health Services, has been advised of this request, and has indicated that the matter will be handled as soon as possible.

The second problem is to ascertain the best possible rehabilitation program for the girl. Mr. Ward states that tests indicate she has good intelligence and he therefore recommends she carry on with her academic education. [redacted]

[redacted]. He suggests that the ideal place for her to continue her education, while at the same time receive adequate medical attention and proper sociological and psychological orientation would be at Lyndhurst Lodge in Toronto, or in some similar establishment in Montreal. I would expect, however, that you, along with Mr. Dufour, Indian Affairs Branch Placement Officer, Mr. Doucet, Indian School Inspector, Mr. Raymond Lauzon, of the Provincial Youth Aid Service, and Mr. Ward will work out a satisfactory rehabilitation program. I would suggest that you speak with Mr. Ward about this matter as soon as possible. He can be reached at the Canadian Paraplegic Association office, Queen Mary Veterans' Hospital. I might say that Mr. Lauzon has previously advised this Branch that in connection with the rehabilitation of handicapped Indians, the Province would meet 50% of the costs.

Please discuss plans for this girl's future as soon as you can with those I have mentioned above, as well as with the girl and her parents. When this has been done, kindly outline all the facts and indicate clearly the detailed costs involved.

At the request of Mr. N. Meilleur, Office of the Civilian Rehabilitation Co-ordinator, I met with Dr. H. Elliott, neurologist at the Queen Mary Veterans' Hospital in Montreal and Mr. Harry Ward of the Paraplegic Association of Canada.

Dr. Elliott is concerned about the future of [REDACTED], resulting in her spinal cord being destroyed. Dr. Elliott operated on her on Christmas Day. He had advised the officials in the Montreal General Hospital that she was not to be removed without his permission but while he was away for a period of time, she was transferred to the hospital at Caughnawaga.

[REDACTED] had been taking her first year high school courses and she had shown considerable promise. Dr. Elliott is particularly anxious to ensure that she is given every opportunity to fit herself for employment, and would like to see her ultimately in an institution such as Lyndhurst Lodge in Toronto. Mr. Ward indicated that if a rehabilitation program is arranged for her, the Paraplegic Association would most probably be happy to provide a scholarship to pay for the fees of any course that she might undertake.

Dr. Elliott states that he has been informed that the girl is now suffering from pressure sores and would like to see her transferred to Queen Mary Veterans' Hospital where there is a paraplegic unit and she would be able ~~to get~~ to have the particular type of care that she requires.

I advised Dr. Elliott that this matter would be discussed with Dr. Procter of Indian and Northern Health Services. Unfortunately, as Dr. Elliott and Mr. Ward had an interview scheduled with the Governor-General, it was not possible to take the matter up with Dr. Procter directly.

Plans for the girls rehabilitation will be discussed with Mr. Meilleur and Mr. Ward as well as with Mr. Lauzon, Officer in charge of Vocational Rehabilitation for the Handicapped, for the Province of Quebec. His office is located in Montreal, and Mr. Ward works in very close association with him.

The immediate requirement is to discuss Dr. Elliott's request with Dr. Proctor.



Reference is made to your letter dated September 18, 1959, with which you forwarded correspondence concerning the above-mentioned boys. You also attached Voucher No. 792, on which you indicated that the expenditure of \$131.25 had been posted to vote 519, allotment 04-199. This voucher has been passed for payment but I would request that you note that it has been charged against vote 519, allotment 64-999.

Mr. Brisebois' letter to you dated July 29th, indicates that the boys were placed under the supervision of the Catholic Boys Services, as a rehabilitation measure. It has been decided that the cost of such programs, aimed at helping those either on parole or on probation to become self-supporting citizens, should ordinarily be a charge against rehabilitation funds - i.e. Vote 519, allotment 64-999. Cases of this nature when supervision is to be undertaken by professionally qualified probation or parole officers or by agencies such as the John Howard and Elizabeth Fry Societies, should be classified as rehabilitation and referred to this office for authorization before expenditures are made.



This patient was previously hospitalized at Pasteur Hospital where Dr. Ledoux performed an operation. Following this she was discharged home and finally brought in for further treatment at the Centre.

Rough goneometric reading gives me a maximum extension of 110° at the knees today.

The question of further operation was discussed with Dr. Ledoux previously and it was difficult to consider further operative procedures that would eventually give us full extension at the knees. This is due to the fact that trauma would necessarily occur to the vein arteries and particularly the nerve of the popliteal region.

The question of walking with flexed knees was discussed with Miss Colthurst and it is felt that if this patient could increase sufficiently the strength of her hip flexion and extension, and particularly the quadriceps, it might be possible for her to walk in a distorted but possibly useful fashion.

I would like her to start with the parallel bars, possibly using plastic cylinders over the bars so that her mobility is greater. She also needs strengthening exercises to the muscles of the lower extremities. She is to report to the Centre for treatment three times a week and is to be re-checked after 30 treatments.

The patient tells me that she has been suffering from arthritis since the age of _____ years and started with pains in her legs. In 1941 she was hospitalized at the Hull Sanatorium for one month. _____ has not been able to walk since the age of _____ years.

The patient complains of pain chiefly in the shoulders. There is almost full range of movement in both shoulders, except in abduction and circumduction. Flexion of the left elbow at almost 190° and normal on the right. Hands and wrist are considerably deformed but there is good grip and comprehension on both sides. There are some crepitus over the wrists. Movements are reasonably strong in the arm. Hands and wrist are considerably deformed, flexion and extension of wrist diminished about 50%.

Both knees are in flexion deformity. At present it is important to find out whether or not this is due to soft tissue retraction or a combination of articular and capsular defects. The articulations are not hot and the process of arthritis does not appear to be active.

Goneometric reading of the hips might be slightly impaired but it is sufficient to enable the patient to stand. There are good movements in the lower extremities.

Conclusions:

This is a case of arthritis with deformities of both knees in flexion and requires a lot of retraining in the upper extremities. With regard to the lower extremities, I am afraid that physiotherapy is not sufficient to complete physical rehabilitation of this young lady.

PRESCRIPTION:

I advise hospitalization at Pasteur Hospital where she is to have X-rays of both knees, followed by orthopedic consultation with Dr. Ledoux re corrective procedures. Following this and other evaluations, I would be able to make a much better prognosis.



In order to understand the treatment of this girl, I believe it would be easier just to state that Dr. Gingras, the staff at Pasteur and St. Luke Hospitals, and the Rehabilitation Institute of Montreal, treated the patient for almost two years. Medicine, therapy and surgery made ambulation possible in the case of this girl who had previously been chair fast.

Considering the treatment services she received, and the results obtained, the cost to the Government was a sound investment.

Attached you will find a copy of a letter which I have written to Dr. Gingras, requesting that you be sent a case history resume. I had requested such a report a few weeks ago, but the Physical Medicine Congress, tied up the Montreal staff, who were receiving this year.


Reference is made to Mr. Brisebois' letter dated June 7, 1955, copy of which was forwarded to your office.

Mr. Rouleau recommends that she be taken by car every day and also stated that we should rent or acquire a folding or portable wheel chair which she would use to get in and out of the car. He stated that we can rent such a chair for about \$12.00 per month. The length of her travel will depend on her response to the treatment.

Will you please advise if her travel together with the renting of a wheel chair is approved. May I say however that the Assistant Indian Agent will not be able to undertake these trips to Montreal every day but will have to hire car at least twice a week at a cost of \$10.00 per trip.







Re: Rehabilitation of Disabled Indians

The attached statement covers registrations of disabled Indians received to date, classified on the basis of the various types of disablement and also on the basis of the 'Montreal survey' now being conducted through the National Employment Service in Montreal.

The following agenda is suggested for the meeting scheduled for 2:00 P.M. in your office today:

1. Appraisal of the rehabilitation problem as revealed by registrations received to date.
2. Decision in broad terms regarding future policy, procedure and financial responsibility.
3. Appointment of an inter-departmental committee to deal with Rehabilitation of Disabled Indians. This committee should include a representative from the Education Division as well as the Welfare Service.
4. Consideration should be given to the problem of rehabilitation of disabled Indians while still in sanatoria.
5. Employment of a Rehabilitation Officer or officers should be considered. Are Rehabilitation Officers necessary? If so, how many? Where should they be stationed?
6. The problem of post sanitorium care as discussed by J.E. Labrecque, M.D., Superintendent of the Quebec Immigration Hospital in his letter of June 16, 1953, to Dr. Moore and as discussed by W.L. Falconer, M.D., Medical Superintendent of the Charles Gansell Indian Hospital in his letter of July 3rd to Dr. Moore might be discussed.



Copies of two reports received from Miss Berthe Fortin, Social Worker for the Province of Quebec, recommending examination of the two persons mentioned above by the Rehabilitation Society for Cripples in Montreal, were referred to the Director of Indian Health Services by our letter of May 9, 1953.

On May 13th, the Director of Indian Health Services informed us that the examination recommended was being authorized. On file immediately hereunder will be found two letters to Miss Fortin from the Society for the Rehabilitation of Cripples reporting the results of the examinations and stating the fees involved if treatment is undertaken.

It would appear that Departmental or inter-Departmental policy should now be determined regarding financial responsibility with respect to rehabilitation treatment.

Returns have been received from forty-seven (47) agencies with respect to the registration of disabled persons now being conducted and as suggested by Mr. Ian Campbell when I visited his office in May, the time has perhaps arrived when we should arrange for a meeting with officials of the Indian Health Services, and possibly Mr. Campbell, with a view to determining future policy, procedure and financial responsibility.

I feel that cases of this nature should be the responsibility of the Indian Health Services for the reason that we are neither competent to interpret the diagnosis and to decide if the treatment recommended is feasible nor to certify that accounts rendered for such treatment are fair and just.

In the meantime, your guidance would be appreciated as to what action is to be taken with respect to Marie-Ange Hyacinthe and [REDACTED] of the Oka Reserve.

The examination of our specialist in physical medicine revealed that there is possibility of the patient improving her walk so that she might attend to her daily work. It would be necessary for her to come to our Centre as an out patient every day for re-training in walking and treatments by physiotherapy.

The only charges for treatments at our Centre, for an out patient, are \$3.00 a day. Of course, we cannot provide transportation; the patient would possibly have to come to the clinic at the expense of the Department of Citizenship and Immigration, as you mentioned at the time of your visit to the Centre.

We have advised the patient of that possibility and told her that we must first of all obtain official authorization from your Department before beginning the treatment.







Since 8 years Marie-Ange is not able to work. She told us that month after month her physical ability decreased and her des-ability in creased.

HOME PROBLEM:

Marie-Ange is alone of her family. Her father is 82 years old and receives old age pension and of course cannot take care of her. they live in a pretty nice home. Before her sickness she rented rooms and took children as boarders. Work which gave her sufficient income to live by herself without help. Marie-Ange is a very ambitious girl and wants to save her life. She is so anxious to have her physical examinations to the Rehabilitation Society for Cripples, because if the authorities told her that they could do something for her physical rehabilitation, she would be able to retake her work of renting rooms.

TRANSPORTATION

HOME PROBLEM:

The mother is an invalid too. Suffers of arthritis and could not work for many years. The father is [redacted] years old. One of her sisters, [redacted] years old, stays at home to take care of her sister and mother. Two of her brothers are [redacted] is [redacted] and [redacted] is [redacted] years old, and [redacted] are going to school. Apparently nobody can give her financial help for her physical rehabilitation. Concerning the physical rehabilitation of [redacted] contact with the authorities of the "Rehabilitation Society For Cripples". The case was discussed with Dr. Gingras, Medical Director of this Institution and also with Mr. Real Rouleau in charge of the Social Medical Department.

When it is a public case, the first examination is free That is to say paid by the Municipal authorities. The other case is \$10. for the first examination. The Social Physical Examination consists of studying the case and see the possibility of physical rehabilitation of the patient. We obtained an appointment for the examination on May 25.

TRANSPORTATION

Possibility of transportation to the clinic was discussed with Mr. Brisebois. Mr. Sauvageau will take care of the transportation of [redacted] to the clinic if the authorities decide this case should be rehabilitated. Mr. Sauvageau will transport the patient to the clinic for the treatments twice a week. The transportation would only cost the mileage of Mr. Sauvageau.

RECOMMENDATION

[redacted] is a very bright and has the desire of being useful and not be dependent to the other members of her family. For the physical, mental and social welfare of this Indian, we recommend her psysical examination by

This [REDACTED] year old girl suffers from acute arthritis in her legs and hands. She appears to be both responsive and bright but is completely unable to walk. Her condition has been deteriorating over a period of several years. Miss Fortin is anxious to have [REDACTED] examined at the Rehabilitation Centre with a view to treatment. The diagnostic examination is approximately \$10.00 and if treatment is recommended it will undoubtedly be both extensive and expensive. Transportation to the Rehabilitation Centre is an additional factor to be considered as treatment would be on the basis of out-patient service. Miss Fortin will explore the possibility of enlisting the cooperation of Oka -to -Montreal daily commuters who operate motor cars. Otherwise taxi fare would increase costs by about \$8.00 per treatment. A complete financial estimate report has been requested of Miss Fortin prior to making arrangements for examination or treatment, the former being pointless unless the latter is economically feasible.

This arthritic woman is about [REDACTED] years of age and lives with her father. Her legs and feet primarily are affected and she manoeuvres by means of weighing against a wooden chair. Rehabilitation treatment has also been suggested for her and the same plan was recommended to Miss Fortin as in the case of [REDACTED]. If treatment was indicated for both these women, individual transportation costs could be reduced by arranging for their treatments on the same day.
