MÉMOIRE AU MINISTRE/MEMORANDUM FOR THE MINISTER

PURPOSES

1. Your approval is sought for a \$ 3,065,000 contribution to Phase III of the Government of Saskatchewan Rural Development Project in Lesotho.
2. If you approve the project, you are requested to sign the attached submission to the Governor General in Council requesting authority for CIDA to enter into an agreement with the Department of Agriculture of the Province of Saskatchewan regarding the project.

BACKGROUND

The project was first brought to your attention on January 26, 1987. However, it is being re-submitted now to provide you with additional information on a proposed method of implementation of the water well drilling component (well drilling in previous phases utilized significant purchases of South African goods and services) and to obtain your concurrence to the necessary approval for the CIDA/Saskatchewan project agreement.

Project Description

Phases I and II of this project spanned 8 years and utilized a CIDA contribution of \$2.2 million and a Saskatchewan allocation of about \$.48 million. Lesotho provided some local staff and facilities.

140 villages in the Mohale's Hoek District of Lesotho have been assisted with water wells or other projects such as community gardens, spring-fed water supplies, roads, handicrafts, poultry units, health centres and construction of schools. The new phase would see a continuation of the same kind of work in about 140 additional villages over the next 5 years.

It may be possible to eliminate expenditure on South African well drilling services by hiring a firm registered in Lesotho which is not owned by South Africans. Also pumps not supplied by the Government of Lesotho could be bought in Canada.

JUDGMENT

MATHESON, J.

The Plaintiff has alleged that certain enactments of the Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan (the "Legislature"), which authorize the Government of Saskatchewan to expend a total of \$1,000,000.00 during the fiscal year 1983-1984 for 'matching grants for international aid', are ultra vires.

The Defendant has conceded that the Plaintiff, as a Canadian citizen, a resident of the Province of Saskatchewan and a taxpayer, has status to assert this claim. The Plaintiff has acknowledged that the impugned legislation was duly enacted by the Legislature, and it is therefore not necessary to refer to the legislation in detail. Both parties have agreed that the purpose of 'matching grants for international aid' is to provide

groups in Saskatchewan, who have raised money in Saskatchewan, with matching funds to assist persons in countries other than Canada to improve their social and economic conditions.

I

The essence of the submission of the Plaintiff is that provincial spending power is confined to those classes of subjects with respect to which the Legislature is granted exclusive power to make laws by the Constitution Act, 1867 (the "Act"). Although there is no express provision in the Act relating to the spending powers of governments, nevertheless it is submitted that because the taxing power of the Legislature is limited to raising taxes, in the manner expressed, for the legislative objects of the Province, and for no other purpose, then the spending power of the Legislature must implicitly be also so limited. It has not been suggested that a tax was levied solely for the purpose of providing funds for matching grants for international aid, but it has been submitted that the taxing power cannot be utilized for expenditures on subjects with respect to which the Legislature is not empowered to enact legislation.

There is no provision in the Act which empowers the Legislature of a province to exercise legislative authority over external affairs. Conversely, there is no provision in the Act which granted to the federal government power to deal with external affairs, because in 1867 Canada lacked the requisite international legal personality.

The common law accorded to the Crown full power to conduct external affairs and it was not until 1947 that Letters Patent Constituting the Office of Governor General of Canada, effective October 1, 1947, issued: R.S.C. 1970, App. II, No. 35. The Letters Patent permitted the Governor General with the advice of the Privy Council of Canada "... to exercise all powers and authorities lawfully belonging to Us in respect of Canada,"

The Defendant has acknowledged that the Legislature possesses no power to enact legislation, nor to permit regulations to be passed, with a view to exercising control over the external affairs of Canada. However, the Defendant insists that the authorizing of grants, whether unconditional or conditional, to be expended with respect to undertakings falling largely or entirely within federal regulatory control does not necessitate a conclusion that the Legislature has thereby encroached on the federal jurisdiction. The Plaintiff's position is that, even in the absence of controls which might be construed as an attempt to regulate with respect to matters within the jurisdiction of the federal government, the mere fact of allocating money for the activity necessarily results in some measure of control.

II

In The Allocation of Taxing Power Under The Canadian Constitution, 2nd ed., G. V. LaForest, it is noted at p. 46 that

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the exercise by Parliament of its power to legislate respecting its 'public property' under s. 91(1A) of the Act has been construed in the broadest sense (Reference Re Employment and Social Insurance Act (1976) S.C.R. 427, per Duff, C.J. @ 431) and that Parliament's spending activities may also be justified under the 'peace, order and good government' clause (Munro v. National Capital Commission (1966) S.C.R. 663). It is suggested that, of even greater significance in the development of national policies, are the many grants by the federal government for the purpose of promoting various schemes, even although falling within the provincial regulatory sphere. It is acknowledged that by attaching conditions to the grants the federal government can strongly influence the scope and direction of the activities assisted.

In Constitutional Law of Canada, Peter W. Hogg, the question of the extent to which Parliament may attach conditions to any grant, even conditions which it could not directly legislate, is carried much further. At p. 71 it is stated:

"There is a distinction, in my view, between compulsory regulation, which can obviously be accomplished only by legislation enacted within the limits of legislative power, and spending or lending or contracting which either imposes no obligations on the recipient (as in the case of family allowances) or obligations which are voluntarily assumed by the recipient (as in the case of a conditional grant, a loan or a commercial contract). There is no compelling reason to confine spending or lending or contracting within the limits of legislative power, because in those functions the government is not purporting to exercise any peculiarly governmental authority over its subjects."

Professor Hogg then suggests that the distinction between compulsory regulation, on the one hand, and spending or lending or contracting, on the other hand, is surely as valid for the provinces as it is for the federal government.

It is difficult to argue with this proposition, because it is almost impossible to envisage a grant, voluntarily accepted, imposing conditions which would be synonymous with regulation of the activity in which the recipient is involved, unless the activity was proscribed if the grant was not accepted. In the latter instance the regulation would be indirect but nevertheless compulsory.

The impugned appropriation legislation providing for 'matching grants for international aid' is presumably subject to the same conditions prescribed when the grants were initially authorized in 1975. The conditions were set out in O/C 315/75, the most important of which were that the grants must be utilized for international projects approved by the Canadian International Development Agency and to which C.I.D.A. will contribute; the Saskatchewan Council of International Agencies, to whom the grants are payable, must make a contribution of an equivalent amount; and the administrative component must be confined to the amount or percentage specified. These conditions are far removed from conditions which could possibly be construed as constituting compulsory regulation of the activities of the grantee by the Legislature.

In The Constitutional Background of Taxation Agreements, F.R. Scott, (1955) 2 McGill L.J. 1, it is stated, at p. 7, "that making a gift is not the same as making a law". Similarly, E.A. Driedger, in an article entitled The Spending Power 1981 Queen's L.J. 124, suggested, at p. 128, that appropriations of money by Parliament, for purposes the subject matter of which is one in relation to which the provincial legislatures have exclusive power to make laws, are not laws in relation to those subject matters.

These statements have equal application to appropriations by provincial legislatures, with the result that the mere appropriation of money for matching grants for international aid does not justify the conclusion that the Legislature has thereupon encroached upon a field of activity beyond its legislative competence.

III

In a more general vein, the Plaintiff has submitted that the Legislature should confine its deliberations, and spending activities, to matters which are solely within its jurisdiction. The Plaintiff therefore rejects, as being without substance, the theory propounded by F. R. Scott in The Constitutional Background of Taxation Agreements (1955) 2 McGill L.J. 1 @ 6, that although 'spending power' is not mentioned in the Act, nor any amendments thereto, the 'spending power' of the federal and provincial governments is derived from doctrines of the Royal Perogative and the common law.

The Plaintiff has contended that it is not proper to automatically correlate the spending power of Parliament with that of the provincial legislatures, because the provinces are not vested with the greater jurisdiction possessed by Parliament, as evidenced by, for example, the residual 'peace, order and good government' powers. Thus, the Plaintiff has asserted that although the spending power of the federal government can be justified in many areas involving activities the subject matter of which falls within the exclusive legislative jurisdiction of the provincial legislatures - hospital care, university grants, housing - the more restrictive powers granted to provincial legislatures, and the restriction on the raising of revenue for 'provincial purposes', necessitates the conclusion that spending be confined to those objects clearly enumerated as being exclusively within the jurisdiction of the provincial legislatures.

In Dow v. Black (1875) L.R. 6 P.C. 272, the Judicial Committee upheld a New Brunswick statute empowering the majority of inhabitants of a district of a parish to raise by local taxation a subsidy to assist the building of a railway from a point in Maine to a point in New Brunswick. The railway was not, of course, geographically confined to an area 'in the Province'.

The Plaintiff has suggested that Dow v. Black is a 'hard' case and therefore bad law. However, one can only speculate as to the long term effect on the development of each province within the federal framework if the Judicial Committee had been possessed of tunnel vision and had confined the term 'provincial purposes' to geographical boundaries.

The only other judicial decision directly relating to the extent of provincial spending power is McMillan v. City of Winnipeg (1919) 45 D.L.R. 351, where a grant by the City to the Mercantile Sailors Relief Fund was challenged. The beneficiaries of the Fund were largely families of British sailors. It was argued that s. ⁹²⁽²⁾~~91(2)~~ of the Act only authorized direct taxation within the province for provincial purposes and that the legislature therefore had no power to authorize taxation if the revenue therefrom was to be spent outside the province. Mathers, C.J.K.B. stated that this assertion placed an unacceptably narrow interpretation on the words 'for provincial purposes', and he concluded, at p. 360:

"If it is competent for a province to empower a municipality to bonus a railway company to build a line of railway from a point within to a point without the province, as was decided in Dow v. Black, I can see no reason for thinking that it is not equally competent for the province to empower the city to make the grant in question".

Various constitutional scholars have referred to expenditures by provinces on enterprises which would appear to entail activities beyond their legislative jurisdiction, such as the maintenance in London, England by nearly every province of an office for the purpose of promoting international trade; the ownership by British Columbia of a ferry service, by Alberta of an airline operating in several provinces, and by Ontario of a T.V. station; and specific grants by Quebec to the University of Toronto after it had suffered a bad fire and for flood relief in Europe in 1953.

The fact that the purpose of a particular legislative appropriation has never been legally challenged does not necessarily mean that it can be legally justified. Nevertheless, it is interesting to note that Professor Hogg has suggested (p. 72, supra) that "the provinces have never recognized any limits on their spending power", and Professor Driedger, when relating the power granted to Parliament to appropriate 'for the public service of Canada' (s. 102 of the Act) to spending power, stated at p. 129 (supra):

".... [I]t is submitted that it is for Parliament to determine what 'for the public service' is and not for the courts. This is a political judgment."

With reference to provincial spending power, Professor Driedger suggested, at p. 132, that provincial legislatures have been given authority to appropriate money for the public service of the province "and, as with Parliament, it is for the Legislature to determine what is 'the public service'".

To the extent that the Legislature does not purport, in approving an appropriation of money as a grant, to exercise control of or to regulate an activity beyond its legislative competence, the adjudication as to the wisdom of the legislative approval is a political, and not a judicial, function (Union Colliery v. Bryden, (1899) A.C. 580 @ 585). It would indeed be presumptuous for the courts to assume, in each and every instance when the question may arise, to make a pronouncement as to whether



appropriations of money were, or were not, ultimately in the best interests of those whom the legislators represent and "for the public service of the Province". This is one of the principal functions which the legislators were elected to perform, and unless the Legislature clearly exceeds its legislative jurisdiction its decisions in this respect should not be the subject of judicial scrutiny.

It must therefore be concluded that the appropriation bills passed by the Legislature, which include the authorization for expenditures for 'matching grants for international aid', are not ultra vires, and the claim of the Plaintiff must therefore be dismissed.

The Plaintiff was not seeking any personal benefit - he sought a declaration which would have the effect of placing restraints on government spending power. Because the source of government spending power, and the extent thereof, is by no means certain, it cannot seriously be suggested that the claim was frivolous. Consequently, there will be no costs to either party.

Development Assistance - Western Provinces

Western provinces' attitude toward development assistance is different from one to another. Among those provinces, Manitoba seems by far the least interested. A résumé of the activities and points of interest of each province will illustrate the situation.

British Columbia:

Prior to 1975, the provincial Department of Agriculture had spent several million dollars for agricultural development in Pacific, as well as in some Asian countries. Since that time, the budget has been reduced dramatically and for 1980-1981, the Agriculture Aid Program budget is \$390,000.

At present, pressure on the government to increase the amount of money for international aid, particularly from the British Columbia Federation of International Agencies (BCFIA), is very strong.

British Columbia shares with other western provinces concerns, that it may not be deriving its "share" of business opportunities available through the aid program. In order to correct that situation, CIDA, in collaboration with the Ministry of Economic Development, organised a "business-oriented" seminar in March 1979, in Vancouver.

This province is very active in VADA and two officials of the Ministry of Agriculture are members of the steering committee of this organism.

Alberta:

This province is one of the most active provinces in development assistance, mainly through NGOs, and has a budget of \$6.5 million allocated for 1980-1981.

As in British Columbia, "business-oriented" seminars were held in February 1979, in Edmonton and Calgary.

Alberta has been present at all VADA meetings to date and its representatives delivered a very interesting report at the last VADA meeting held in Regina, last October. It showed very clearly that Alberta is taking a great interest in increasing and diversifying its activities especially in the international education field. A budget of approximately \$700,000 a year could be administered by the International Development Office, in order to set in place a technical assistance program.

Saskatchewan:

This province has also showed a very keen interest in international development as is indicated by the fact that in 1980-1981, the NGOs funding is near 1.3 million.

VADA was created in 1975 under very strong support from Saskatchewan. Until now, it has remained a very consistent supporter of the program.

A few years ago, (1978) the Agricultural Development Corporation was created. This organisation, which has a substantial "overseas orientation", is currently responsible for the management of several CIDA projects in Kenya, Lesotho and Zambia.

In mid October 1980, the "Gentles Report" concerning the involvement of the province in international activities was presented to the provincial authorities.

The principal items of the report are the following:

- a) The creation of a crown corporation (Saskatchewan Overseas Development Corporation);
- b) The main objective of the corporation would be to coordinate all provincial international activities including aid, emergency initiatives, trade and industrial cooperation;
- c) the SCDC would also act as "manager" of all CIDA projects;
- d) It is also recommended that a budget of about \$10 million be available.

As in the other western provinces, and for the same reasons, a "business" seminar was organised in Regina, in October 1980.

Manitoba:

Manitoba's opinion is that international aid is a federal responsibility and has shown very little interest in this area. Nevertheless, in 1980-1981, a small budget of \$250,000 is used for funding of NGOs.

If normally a representative of Manitoba's Department of Agriculture is present at the VADA meetings, it was not the case at the last one where nobody from Manitoba attended.

With the help of the Market Development Office (Ministry of Economic Development) and again in order to increase the awareness of Canadian international development assistance ventures, a "business" seminar was organised in Winnipeg, in October 1980.


CHINA: Collaboration with Saskatchewan

M. Jay, representative of Saskatchewan Ministry of Intergovernmental Affairs informed me at IDO China conference in Regina that his Minister/DM would probably approach their Cabinet in the next month proposing:

- a formal twinning with Jilin Province
- a policy of active collaboration with CIDA in programming (in agriculture and education largely)

Their approach would involve a sector mission in June, followed by a visit to China by Premier Blakeney in the fall. He suggested that his DM, perhaps Minister, would wish to discuss a joint approach with CIDA management in the next month or two.

I indicated a sympathetic attitude, noting that a joint approach would be more coherent and visible to Chinese. I indicated sensitivities would exist in such a venture with a single province and we would need to review the method of project development. I also indicated we would probably expect them - or an agency such as AGDEVCO - to provide the project management function.

Dear Mr. Itadi:

I recently had the pleasure of meeting Mr. Boniface Alexis Mouaya of your Ministry during a recent visit to Mexico. During discussions with Mr. Mouaya, he mentioned that the People's Republic of Congo have an interest in developing a plan for the storage and conservation of agricultural products intended for industry and local consumption.

As I understand the project, it would be, on a national level, for the purpose of supplying larger urban centres and, at the international level, to obtain benefits through the improved conservation of coffee and cacao intended for export.

My purpose in writing is to advise you that Agdevco would be most interested in offering its services to your Ministry in the design and supply of suitable storage facilities for this program.

If you wish to involve Agdevco in the study of this program and the later supply of storage buildings and equipment, I would appreciate receiving from you all of the relevant documents and details. I would also suggest that a letter from your Ministry be sent to Agdevco asking that an Agdevco representative visit your country to discuss the project and develop plans for future action. With such a letter in our possession, we would approach the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) for financial assistance to undertake a study of your requirements, to prepare a report and a proposal for implementation.

To assure you of our capabilities in the area of overseas development, I should point out that as a Corporation owned by the Government of Saskatchewan, we are at present managing agricultural and rural development projects in Zambia and Lesotho on behalf of CIDA and are negotiating with government agencies of Nigeria, Mexico and Zambia on the design and supply of crop storage and handling systems in those countries.

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

I must thank you most sincerely for your letter of 9th June and for the Report on the Proposed Zimbabwe Development Corporation. At the same time I must seek your indulgence for the long delay on my part in acknowledging receipt. This has been due mainly to pressure of work. Not only is my Ministry still struggling to complete the first National Development Plan, but I am also at the same time still Acting Minister of Trade and Commerce in addition to my own Economic Planning and Development portfolio. Furthermore, I had wanted to get the considered reaction of certain of my Cabinet colleagues, which I now have, before writing.

Although we have not yet reached final agreement on the scope, specific functions and structure of the Z.D.C., I am happy to say that your report has provided the needed basis and has proved most useful in the inter-Ministerial discussions. It raises the right questions and key issues. It puts forward a realistic "compromise" approach in the light of the particular circumstances of Zimbabwe and against the background of the two alternatives which it summarized.

I hope soon to be in a position to convey to you the decision of our Cabinet on the model we would follow and in the light of that the type of additional assistance we might request of you. In the meantime let me express our sincerest appreciation of your ready offer of continued support and assure you at the same time that the contribution which you have already made is greatly appreciated by all of us here, including Prime Minister Mugabe who has personally studied the report.





Enclosed please find a copy of the summary report on the visit to Zimbabwe of the Honourable G. R. Bowerman and the officials of the Crown Investments Corporation of Saskatchewan. The report lists the officials with whom the group met, presents some of their general observations and notes some possible areas of further involvement by the Crown Investments Corporation.

You will probably be aware that the Government of Zimbabwe intends to move ahead with the establishment of a Zimbabwe Development Corporation as quickly as it can. If they wish further more detailed assistance from CIC, in the legal and accounting areas for example, they will want a quick reaction by us to any request. If the appropriate response is to send a small team of CIC specialists to Salisbury, presumably for about a two-week stay, it would seem likely that they may wish this to be as soon as July.

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I don't want to presume that they will be calling upon us, but, should they do so, I believe we should be prepared to respond immediately. To pave the way for such a response, there may be some matters we can address in advance. One is the question of the financial support which may be available from the federal government or its agencies to cover the expenses of CIC on this project. This subject was briefly discussed with Mr. Hladik of CIDA and Mr. MacLean and Mr. Davis of CIC in Ottawa on May 8th, 1981. That Division of CIDA may be the appropriate spot and they do seem to have both funding and flexibility. However, as we understand it, their sphere deals with the private sector and the Crown Investments Corporation, as a provincial Crown corporation, may not fit their categories. It would be inappropriate for it not to be clearly recognized in this project that CIC is a Crown corporation and is operating on behalf of the Saskatchewan Government.

We would appreciate your advice on the appropriate contact point in Ottawa on this financing issue. We will be forwarding a copy of the summary report to Mr. Hladik to bring him up to date and to inform him of the possibility of further involvement by CIC in Zimbabwe. However, we will not directly broach the matter of financial support from CIDA until there is an opportunity for External Affairs to advise on the proper channels.

If there are other contacts which should be made on matters other than the financing question or other steps which can be taken to facilitate a quick response to any request from Zimbabwe, we would also appreciate your advice on this. We will also forward a copy of the summary report to Mr. Weidman of the Federal-Provincial Co-ordination Division of the Department of External Affairs and also to Mr. McLaren, the Canadian High Commissioner in Zimbabwe.

I might note here that the Minister and the CIC officials were most appreciative of the informed and encouraging support of Mr. McLaren and his gracious hospitality while they were in Zimbabwe.

We also appreciate the very helpful briefing given the CIC officials by External Affairs and by CIDA. Should this project move on to a second stage, we will continue to value very highly the support and guidance of your department and of other federal officials. Although this is not a usual area of activity for CIC, I must say that the group which visited Zimbabwe was positively impressed with the thoughtful approach being taken by the government there to both the massive difficulties and the promising opportunities which they face. If there is a contribution that CIC can make through its personnel, we are willing to do so.

SUMMARY REPORT ON VISIT TO ZIMBABWE

1. INTRODUCTION

This report follows a visit to Zimbabwe by a team headed by the Honourable Ted Bowerman, Saskatchewan Minister of the Environment and member of the Crown Investments Corporation Board, and including Gordon MacLean, Director of the Capital Plans Department of CIC and Keith Davis, Special Assistant to the Honourable Elwood Cowley, Saskatchewan Minister of Economic Development and Chairman of CIC. The group was in Zimbabwe from May 13th to May 24th, 1981.

The visit was in response to a request from Dr. B. T. G. Chidzero, the Zimbabwe Minister of Economic Planning and Development, for advice on the formation of a Zimbabwe Development Corporation. Dr. Chidzero had visited Saskatchewan in February and was particularly interested in the manner in which Crown corporations are organized in Saskatchewan and the role of the Crown Investments Corporation.

The purpose of the initial trip was to become more familiar with the situation in Zimbabwe, make a preliminary offering of advice based on our experience with public enterprises in Saskatchewan and determine the additional areas in which Saskatchewan may be able to provide more detailed assistance through specialists from CIC or through officials of other Saskatchewan Crown corporations.

During the visit the Saskatchewan group was able to meet with several ministers, the chief executive officers of the key parastatal corporations and with many of the senior public servants of related ministries (see list of meetings in Appendix I). There were also three extended sessions with Dr. Chidzero and officials of his ministry.

2. OVERVIEW

(a) Intention to Establish a Zimbabwe Development Corporation

The Government of Zimbabwe has announced, in its economic policy statement Growth with Equity that it will establish a Zimbabwe development Corporation which:

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"Will be a state holding company and a development arm of the nation operating in all sectors of the economy and serving particularly as the Government channel of participation in the economy either on its own initiative or in collaboration with domestic private, or foreign public/private investors. It will also be free to act through any existing development institutions in the public sector."

The Government has also expressed its intention to establish a Mining Development Corporation, as a subsidiary of the ZDC.

(b) Similarities with Saskatchewan:

Although there are obvious vast differences between the new country of Zimbabwe and the province of Saskatchewan, there are some similarities that suggest that the approach taken in Saskatchewan to the administration of public enterprises may have some relevance to the situation in Zimbabwe. One similarity is the fact that both governments have evolved from the British Parliamentary system and thus the form of legislation and other features of government administration are somewhat familiar.

Secondly, the economic policy stance taken by the Zimbabwe Government, particularly in its approach to the use of parastatal corporations, holds some parallels with Saskatchewan's pragmatic use of Crown corporations. The economic policy statement notes that, "In general, Government will seek to participate in strategic industries. However, the level and rate of Government participation will be examined on a case by case basis through mutual agreement and in the light of national objectives and priorities". The commitment to a mixed economy, with the government prepared to participate directly in the economy where it feels this is necessary and it can be effective, also is similar to the Saskatchewan situation.

Thirdly, there is a range of existing parastatal corporations in Zimbabwe that is not completely dissimilar to the list of Saskatchewan Crown corporations.

The parastatal corporations in Zimbabwe are each established by an Act of Parliament and the boards of directors are appointed either by Cabinet or by the minister. The minister to which the corporation reports is, by law or practice, the minister of the related department. Public servants in these departments usually oversee the corporations but would not be members of the boards of directors, except in an ex-officio capacity or as observers.

The annual reports of the parastatal corporations are tabled in the House and the capital budgets are reviewed, first by the related ministry, and now by the Ministry of Economic Planning and Development and subsequently by Treasury.

(e) Cabinet Committees Dealing with Economic Matters:

There are two Committees of Cabinet which deal with economic matters. The Cabinet Committee on Development is chaired by the Minister of Economic Planning and Development and is concerned mainly with the examination of the Public Sector Investment Programme; that is, the capital budgets of the parastatal bodies and government ministries. This committee was primarily responsible for preparing the government's economic policy statement, Growth with Equity.

The Ministerial Economic Co-ordinating Committee is chaired by the Minister of Finance and is concerned with issues such as the pricing of agricultural and other products, marketing policy and other policy matters such as the allocation of foreign exchange.

Each meeting of each of these cabinet committees is preceded by a meeting of a Cabinet Committee Working Party which is composed of senior officials of the ministries concerned.

(f) Other observations:

It is well recognized that the economy of Zimbabwe is much more highly developed in many sectors than are the economies of most other recently independent countries in the region. In part because of the period of sanctions over the previous fifteen years, there is a high level of manufacturing which provides many goods which would otherwise be imported. The economy also has been a highly controlled and centralized one, especially in the allocation of foreign currency. The inequities in the distribution of wealth and income within the country are also very stark.

A prime emphasis of the present government is the theme of reconciliation. There is a very serious attempt to secure the co-operation of all segments of the society in rebuilding the country. In the economic realm, this entails an effort to retain the expertise of the business, commercial farming and other groups that had been very successful previously. A variety of forms of organization of economic enterprise are being encouraged, rather than any one single approach.

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3. ZIMBABWE DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION

Extensive discussions were held on the structure of a Zimbabwe Development Corporation and the extent to which the Saskatchewan model may be appropriate. Amongst the matters considered were the following:

Purpose of ZDC - A range of possible purposes could be undertaken by an institution such as the ZDC. These include the economic development functions of being a vehicle for responding to proposals from outside companies for joint operations, for undertaking development in areas where private companies are not now investing and for establishing a presence in certain industries or sectors. As well, there is a possible range of functions for such an institution as a mechanism for restructuring and reorganizing the public sector, for overseeing the public sector and providing a degree of co-ordination and consistency, for providing to the Cabinet level information on the public sector in aggregate, and for approving capital expansion plans of the public sector and allocating capital.

Scope of ZDC - The question was considered of which of the other parastatal corporations should relate, as formal or informal subsidiaries, to the Zimbabwe Development Corporation and the extent to which ZDC should be an umbrella corporation.

Role of Ministers and Departments: - There is a minister responsible for each of the existing parastatal corporations, a responsibility which he acquires as part of his departmental portfolio. The minister's contact with the corporation may not be all that direct, with his senior public servants often playing an intermediary role. In the Saskatchewan system, the minister is much more directly involved, serving as he does as an active chairman of the board of the corporation. His appointment to that position is not necessarily tied to his departmental portfolio. In the case of the Crown Investments Corporation Board, it consists primarily of cabinet ministers and in effect serves as a cabinet committee on Crown corporations.

The question of the role of the minister responsible for each corporation, and the matter of the involvement of ministers on the board of a holding corporation such as the ZDC needs to be resolved on the basis of the manner in which the Cabinet wishes to allocate its responsibilities for overseeing and directing the whole of the business of government, which includes the ministries and the government-owned corporations.

Capital Financing - The Government intends to establish a Government Participation Fund which will make funds available, pending the creation of the ZDC, for the purchase of shares or other forms of participation in industry. The magnitude of such a fund, and the future resources required by ZDC, have not yet been determined. The ZDC will also have the capacity to borrow funds on the market, but an anticipated scale of operation or assessment of sources has not yet been determined. The relationship of the ZDC and its activities to international aid funds and arrangements has also not yet been detailed.

Alternative Models - Various alternative models for a Zimbabwe Development Corporation were considered, ranging from one that would use existing structures as much as possible and would require minimal change to one that would adopt more of the features of the Saskatchewan CIC model. The elements that require the most attention in selecting the appropriate model include the extent of the financial holding corporation role, the role of ministers and departmental officials, the number of corporations reporting to the ZDC and the relationship with the central government agencies of Economic Planning and Development and Treasury.

Structure of ZDC - The staff requirements of a Zimbabwe Development Corporation will obviously depend upon the range of its activities. Outlined below is a suggested minimal complement for an ZDC.

- (1) President: The senior staff person. Requires a thorough knowledge of business practice and must be able to earn the respect of the business community both nationally and internationally. Must also understand the functioning of government and the policy priorities of the present government. Must have the confidence of the Cabinet.
- (2) Assistant to the President: Able to stand in for the President at more routine functions, carry out communication with the staff, handle less contentious correspondence.
- (3) Legal: One full-time lawyer will likely be required with particular abilities in legislative matters and in corporate and commercial law including joint venture arrangements.

- (4) Accounting: At least one full-time chartered accountant to oversee the financial arrangements with subsidiaries and establishing the accounts of new ventures.
- (5) Senior Officers: About two senior individuals will probably be required to undertake the following activities (both would do some of each):
- (i) Sit on Boards of Directors of subsidiary corporations as the representative of the parent company.
 - (ii) Negotiate deals with outside interests for new enterprises.
- (6) Financial Analysts: Up to about 5 individuals, under a director, who can undertake the more detailed assessment of expansion proposals of the subsidiary companies and the external investment opportunities.

In addition to the above positions and the necessary support staff, additional personnel would be required if the ZDC were to undertake additional tasks (such as industrial relations, management training, public relations, corporate secretarial services) or become more directly involved in operating any enterprises.

4. POSSIBLE AREAS OF ASSISTANCE BY CIC

In addition to providing our observations and suggestions during the visit, the Crown Investments Corporation of Saskatchewan could consider offering additional advice along the following lines, should some additional involvement be requested. The financial arrangements covering any such further package of assistance will need to be worked out with the appropriate authorities.

- (i) Legal: CIC could provide advice or recommendations on drafting an Act for the ZDC, including advice on specific provisions to be included, advice on amendments to legislation governing existing statutory bodies, and upon incorporating existing statutory bodies and investments in ZDC.

- (ii) Accounting: CIC could provide advice on structuring the financial relationship between ZDC and its subsidiary companies; the existing assets and funds available in corporations which could become part of the ZDC.
- (iii) Experience in Saskatchewan: Possible exchanges could be arranged for personnel from Zimbabwe to work, for example, for 6 months with the Saskatchewan Mining Development Corporation to observe first hand the making of joint venture arrangements or to work within CIC itself.
- (iv) Visit to Saskatchewan: Certain key personnel who will be operating the ZDC may wish to visit CIC and examine more closely how it works.
- (v) On-going general consultative advice as the concept and implementation of the ZDC proceeds. This could include a designated individual or team which could become more closely involved in the process, including the co-ordination of additional CIC input.
- (vi) Continuing contact or exchange between Saskatchewan and Zimbabwe in other areas where Zimbabwe may find useful models in Saskatchewan, for example, in public insurance or in co-operatives.



We appreciated and read with interest your memorandum under reference reporting on the views of Leslie Johnston (Johnston, Lowe Associates) regarding potential follow-up to the recent visit of Minister Chidzero. We would appreciate being kept apprised of any further developments that may come to your attention. This Department should, as your memo suggests, be kept informed of progress with a view to ensuring coherent management of Canada's relations with Zimbabwe. If any written arrangements involving Saskatchewan and Zimbabwe are ever contemplated, this Department's concurrence would be a precondition to their conclusion.

2. In addition to the various Saskatchewan contacts mentioned by Mr. Johnston, we would suggest that Michael Jay, International Affairs Division, Department of Intergovernmental Affairs, be considered a central contact in respect of follow-up to this visit. Mr. Jay's division was, in fact, quite involved in the Chidzero visit and has ongoing responsibility for the coordination of international activities of the Saskatchewan government and for keeping us informed thereof as appropriate. Jay's telephone number is 121-9-565-6322.

3. One further point of clarification: Jack Messer, recently retired Minister of Mineral Resources, is Vice-president of CANPOTEX, a non-governmental producer's association responsible for off-shore marketing of potash (outside N. America). He is no longer a government representative although he remains a very influential figure in Saskatchewan.

Accompanied by the CIDA Counsellor, Mr. B. E. MacDonald I spent the day of March 10 at Siloe, an area about an hour and a half from Maseru to visit a rural development project undertaken by the Government of Saskatchewan through VADA. The project leader is now Mr. Reno Schalm who with his wife arrived in the area in January. The project began in January 1979 and its principal accomplishments to date have been the sinking of a couple of boreholes in the area to provide safe drinking water in an area much in need of it. I believe about \$200,000 has been spent so far with additional several hundred thousands anticipated for the next few years.

2. We called on the local District Coordinator (or Commissioner) and met him and the heads of various ministries in Mohale's Hoek, the local administrative centre. They all came to a most pleasant lunch laid on by Mrs. Schalm. I do not intend to comment on substance of/project as it has been the subject of a recent comprehensive and favourable evaluation. At the moment there is aside from some pipes, a borehole, pump and a small reservoir not a great deal to show for a couple of years of hard work, but doubtless much more is envisaged. Certainly without the project and the funds and particularly the energy of its first director, the local inhabitants would not even have enjoyed what has now been done. As a layman I did wonder whether this project enjoyed the experience gained by CIDA in the huge well drilling programme in Northern Ghana and the research on pumps which it had stimulated. We shall send material on this subject to Mr. Schalm.


3. We enjoyed our day and believe that through it we reflected your interest in the work of the provinces and our wish to be kept in the picture about it. Incidentally we were told in Maseru that two officials of the development office in the/Ministry of Agriculture had visited Lesotho recently to look into its needs in the cooperative field. We had not known about it. Had you? If not perhaps provincial

officials would like to notify us when they are coming. We welcome their interest and their visits, but feel a little embarrassed as Canadians that the Basutu government knows more about their activities than we do however useful they are. With hindsight I suppose the visit to Siloe was partly designed to underline Ottawa's interest in and support for the interest of the provinces in development work.

Mr. Tom Gentles, Deputy Minister, Department of Highways, Saskatchewan has been assigned to do a study on Saskatchewan's "international development assistance" programmes.

2. The study seeks to make an inventory of current Saskatchewan programmes (various provincial departments- education, agriculture, industry-have their own small projects) and to make recommendations for future orientation and rationalization.

3. Mr. Gentles will be visiting various provinces and has made appointments to visit CIDA and IT&C on February 26. He will be returning to Edmonton through Ottawa (from Quebec) on March 6. We have tentatively invited him to visit us at 10:00 a.m. on the 6th. Would you be willing to see him at about 10:30 to 11:00?

4. Indeed, we would welcome your ideas as to other appointments we might usefully seek for Mr. Gentles. Within the Department, L.H. Smith comes to mind and outside, IRDC. The job is not made easier by the fact that he does not yet have precise ideas as to what sort of information he is seeking. We shall be in contact with Mr. Gentles again and shall pass on any additional information we obtain.

5. In parallel with the above contact, Bob Weiss, Executive Director for Constitutional and International Affairs in the Saskatchewan Department of Intergovernmental Affairs, spoke with this Division on February 14 and gave us some background to the study. He pointed out that the perception in Regina was that most CIDA contracts were awarded in Quebec and Ontario. Saskatchewan wanted to obtain more of this business. Mr. Weiss said that the

Agricultural Development Corporation, a Saskatchewan crown corporation, could be strengthened in order to be in a position to offer complete development packages. The Corporation would work in conjunction with the private sector whose services it would engage. Mr. Weiss concluded by saying that billions of dollars for development were "floating about" in the world, and Saskatchewan would like to be able to secure some of them for themselves. This perhaps explains the generally enthusiastic attitude of the Saskatchewan government towards development assistance. The attached memorandum on a recent discussion with Ken Johns of the Saskatchewan Department of Agriculture is indicative.

2. We met with Mr. Ken Johns, Executive Director, Extension and Rural Development Division, Department of Agriculture, who explained Saskatchewan's recent participation and ambitions for VADA. Saskatchewan has taken a high profile vis-à-vis VADA and is an activist in giving it a greater role than its already increasing one. Premier Blakeney has advocated and proposed to the other provinces cost-sharing (per capita) for VADA, but at present only Saskatchewan has agreed to this. There is a strong commitment from the Premier on down, to these activities. The amount of money presently allocated, is felt to be inadequate. Saskatchewan recently provided \$2.5 million in the form of chemicals for locust control to Tanzania, Ethiopia, and the drought-stricken Sahara countries. Transportation costs on this alone were \$800,000. In view of this, the present VADA budget of \$600,000 appears to be insufficient. Saskatchewan aims for \$12 million federal contribution to be matched by the provinces.

3. VADA is viewed as an avenue for providing technical and capital resources, particularly in rural development. It is now an effective mechanism after some "growing pains". It plays a valuable information exchange role. He described projects in Lesotho and Zambia in wheat research (the latter), water supply systems, and reforestation. Saskatchewan also participated with Quebec and PEI in a "family farm" joint project (35 LDC representatives visited Canadian farms to view four rural development problems) at a cost of \$200,000. The formation of an International Family Farm Secretariat has been proposed. Saskatchewan also provides \$1.3 million in matching grants for NGO projects.



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Dear Jim,

I don't know whether I should be chastised for showing an Escott ~~Raid~~ tenacity in pursuing a particular problem or praised for holding together the confederation but I would like the satisfaction that the story I am about to tell has been heard out at an appropriate level in External. I will of course be embarrassed if the players in the piece have been paid off by you and gone away happy, but to judge from CIDA they have not been.

Earlier this year Don Faris, the Saskatchewan Minister of Education, indicated that he would like to attend the opening in May of a vocational school in Kumasi as Saskatchewan under contract with CIDA had provided its initial staff. As a CIDA telegram put it he would head the Saskatchewan delegation and Noble Power, the CIDA delegation or some such language. In answer to Saskatchewan's enquiry CIDA made clear that there was no provision in its contract with them that would allow it to pay his travel expenses. As I thought it important that Canada be well represented on this occasion (which was to be graced by a member of the Ghana inner cabinet) I replied that Faris should be seen and described as the head of one Canadian delegation with the rest of us as its members. I had understood this was the formula used when Canada participates in international gatherings or occasions in the educational field (e.g. Commonwealth Education Conferences).

... CIDA agreed with my recommendation but still would not pay for his ticket. If the attached telegram 2570 of July 25 is correct they consulted External who "arranged for an invitation to be extended to him (to be head of the Canadian delegation) on assumption that he was going anyway" at Saskatchewan's expense. In a letter to Mr. Reiderer of July 26, Peter Harkness of Commonwealth Africa Division of CIDA added "that if it had been necessary to pay for travel costs the procedure for arranging the invitation would have been quite different. I also discovered that an attempt to change the basis of the invitation after the fact would be extremely awkward". I am not sure what this means, but perhaps it does in some way suggest an External involvement. Anyway I do not fault CIDA for not paying as the principle which I think is at stake is not of their immediate concern.

When they were here in May Lou Reiderer raised with me the question of expenses and I referred him back to CIDA and to FCO. Obviously he did not persuade CIDA to change its mind as the letter I have just quoted makes clear. Whether or not he has approached you you may wish to look at it again and perhaps to keep in mind a very similar set of circumstances that also happened in March involving Quebec's attendance at the opening of a vocational school. As you know Mr. Goyer came for it, but I understand from Ted Arcand that at one point J.Y. Morin was thinking about attending. Doubtless you would have required him to be part of the Canadian delegation and I have it on good authority that as a matter of policy you would have insisted on paying his expenses. He didn't come, but Mr. D. Gervais of MAIQ came instead and he was made part of our delegation. I do not admittedly know who paid his travel costs, but as he has broad responsibility for the project and was visiting Cotonou for ten days my guess is that CIDA's contract with MAIQ covered them. Perhaps for that matter it rather than External's funds would have also covered those of Morin, but the point would still have been made as federal funds are involved in both cases.

There is the story. I hope I have got my doctrine right. If so, perhaps someone after consulting with CIDA, will pick up the phone and speak to Reiderer. Whether he has raised the matter

or not with you I think Saskatchewan should get what is due to it - if it is due - as one more indication that Ottawa does treat its provinces equally in such matters. Besides you may not wish Quebec to hear of a precedent whereby Ottawa allowed, indeed insisted, that a provincial minister pay his way in circumstances like this.

Whatever the answer please drop me a line and let me know the outcome. I promise then that I'll drop the case.

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The "Handing over" of the Kumasi Technical Institute took the centre ring for several days last week in Ghana with the news media providing prominent coverage of the arrival of the Saskatchewan Minister of Education, as well as the actual ceremony in Kumasi two days later and clippings are attached from the "Graphic" and the "Times", the Head of State's speech. Photographs of the ceremony are being sent separately to N.E.C. Power, Vice President of CIDA, Bilateral.

2. Dr. Faris' time was more fully booked with Ghanaian formal activities than he probably expected but he was able to meet the Canadians at a reception arranged by the High Commission and again at their Compound the next day. Activities in Kumasi began with a hurried call on the Regional Commissioner for the Ashanti Region, in whose residence most of the delegation were billeted, followed by a call on the Asantehene.

3. The importance given to the Technical Institute in the Ashanti Region was underlined by the presence of the Asantehene at the Handing-Over ceremony, as well as by the large reception he held at the Palace for the Canadian delegation. Several hundred were invited to the Ceremony at the school including numerous headmasters and Ghana Education Service Directors from the regions, as well as citizens of Kumasi. The occasion was quite well organized without any awkward delays. Speeches of limited length were made on behalf of the Head of State by Major General Boakye, Commander of the Air Force, the head of the Canadian delegation, Dr. Faris, and the Commissioner for Education. The Asantehene then led the large throng of guests on a somewhat congested tour of the workshops, where staff and students had put together imaginative shop demonstrations of the trade skills taught at the Institute. Later, the school was open for public inspection and, characteristically, this was followed by public dances both afternoon and evening. The decision by the Ghanaians to make the ceremony a public occasion was a sound one as it afforded thousands a somewhat glamorized glimpse into the nature of trades, which is only slowly becoming a respectable option for education among Ghanaians.

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4. Through Dr. Faris' speech and subsequent references, Lou Riederer underlined the importance Saskatchewan has attached to CIDA's Instructor Training assistance to KTTI as an essential element in the maintenance of the technical education system which Ghana is constructing. Several hopeful references were made informally by the Education Commissioner and Ghana Education Service officials to the needs of Northern Ghana in technical education. However, these received polite but non-committal reactions from the Canadians.

5. Undoubtedly Dr. Faris carries back to Saskatchewan a clearer sense of the extent to which his Province has become involved in technical education in Ghana and will likely, therefore, support a continuing though limited servicing role for the Province, with or without CIDA funding.

6. There is no doubt that the Ghana Education Service view Canada as the most logical source of continuing assistance to technical education given the continuous and extensive support we have provided to the sector for more than a decade.





With respect to our telephone conversation concerning the invitation of the Minister of Education of Saskatchewan to head the Canadian delegation to the Official Opening of the Kumasi Trades Training Institute (KTTI), I would first like to apologize for the delay in sending you the information that you had requested. You will find hereafter both a brief description of the project and of the Saskatchewan involvement in Ghana.

1. Project Description

The overall objective of this project, which was approved originally in January 1971 and effectively started in 1973, was to provide skilled craftsmen ranging from carpenters to master mechanics in order to upgrade the labour force of the northern half of Ghana and to reduce its reliance on outside technical assistance. This distribution of graduates was to complement a similar training institute that had been implemented in Accra, also with CIDA assistance and which was providing craftsmen for the southern part of Ghana.

The financial contribution of the Government of Canada is amounting to \$6.7 million of which \$3.7 million will be in grant funds and \$3.0 million in loan funds and was to provide for the design and construction supervision services required for the construction of the school, the preparation

of tenders, the assessment of bids and purchasing of equipment and materials, the training of Ghanaian staff and the provision of Canadian advisers in the formative years of the school.

The school has been designed for an enrolment of 360 full-time students per year, as well as evening students for a total annual output of approximately 1,200 students. Courses started effectively in January 1977 despite some buildings had not been yet completed. Construction is almost completed now, and most of the equipment is on site.

2. Saskatchewan Involvement

The Government of Saskatchewan has been involved in education in Ghana since 1965. Before being involved as the implementing agent for the current project in Kumasi, they had been first involved in vocational education through the Accra Technical Training Centre. Built about 13 years ago and operated exclusively by Saskatchewan teachers (30 teachers on staff) for its first five years, the school continues as one of the most important educational institutions in the country. Canadian involvement was phased out in 1972 when the Centre was turned over to Ghanaian teachers who had been trained in Saskatchewan to replace the Canadians.

Given the experience with the Accra institution, the Department of Continuing Education in Saskatchewan was also assigned the responsibility of providing the professional and technical personnel and training associated with the implementation of the KTTI. Saskatchewan provided up to 12 teachers to this project including a Project Adviser who acted as Vice-Principal of the school. The Department of Continuing Education is considering now the possibility of "twinning" arrangements with the Department of Education of Ghana.

I hope the above information is sufficient. If you have any further questions, please do not hesitate to contact me.

16 PROJECTS APPROVED

Health Minister Wes Robbins today announced approval of 16 projects under the Matching Grants Program for International Aid. The Government of Saskatchewan has contributed a total of \$136,925 ✓ to these projects.

Under the program, the Government of Saskatchewan matches every dollar contributed by Saskatchewan residents to approved development projects undertaken by member agencies of the Saskatchewan Council for International Co-operation. The combined Saskatchewan donation is then matched by the Canadian International Development Agency.

Of the \$136,925 contribution, \$73,940 was provided for four projects sponsored by Foster Parents Plan, \$16,000 was provided for two projects sponsored by OXFAM, \$23,875 was provided for three projects sponsored by Canadian Lutheran World Relief, and the remainder went toward seven projects sponsored by the Canadian Catholic Organization for Development and Peace.

RE: GUATEMALA

The purpose of this letter is to bring you up to date regarding the Canadian Red Cross progress in dealing with the Guatemala relief action and to advise you of how we plan to disburse our remaining contributions.

To date, we have remitted to you the sum of \$620,000 Canadian, for use in the emergency phases of the operation. In addition, we have responded to your appeal for building materials (your telex # 773) to the extent of providing lumber and sheet metal for the construction of 2000 shelters. This material has been contracted for as per our telex #1264 of July 8, copy attached, and has a value, delivered to Guatemala City, of approximately \$650,000 Canadian. This material is part of our relief contribution, although it is being shipped directly, so as to minimize costs and transportation delays.

After paying for the materials and their transport, a balance of about \$135,000 will remain, and we will remit this amount to you by July 15. Any small balances remaining will be remitted when our books are closed on the Guatemala Special Appeal.

A financial summary of Canadian support for the Guatemalan relief action follows. It should be noted that the direct contribution of the Canadian government was on a bilateral basis and included both funds and goods.

RE: PURCHASES - GUATEMALA HOUSING PROJECT

Further to our conversation of today regarding the prices of materials for the Guatemala Housing Project.

The prices of lumber quoted within Guatemala and in the immediate vicinity area are cheaper, naturally, than the prices for Canadian lumber. According to our information, however, the availability is very limited and the quality is not as good as ours. CIDA has assured us that the prices we are quoted by Canadian suppliers are compatible with other sources and it is very difficult to compare prices with foreign suppliers without specific material comparisons. Many foreign sources are producing inferior materials in comparison to our own.

With respect to the metal lamina, we are cheaper in this area than other and our product is better.

Other factors to be considered are the ability to deliver within a reasonable time frame, these large quantities of materials, that they are of good quality, and that they are actually delivered to destinations without theft or pilferage.

Our sources are priced competitively, they can produce and deliver these materials, and the agent who will arrange transportation from place of purchase to destination is experienced and can efficiently perform the functions of assured delivery. Apparently in this part of the world assured delivery can be a greater factor than price.

On the basis of the foregoing, and because our sources of supply are large reputable companies with competitive pricing, and because the forwarding company has had considerable experience in shipping materials safely to Guatemala (they have just finished a large shipment for INCO), I recommend that the purchases of lamina and lumber be purchased from Canadian sources and shipped to Guatemala as outlined in the telex attached.



Dear Mr. Haider:

Your letter of September 24th addressed to the Honourable Mitchell Sharp has been passed to me for handling.

In your letter you expressed the desire of your hospital to ship three pieces of anaesthetic equipment to the Central Hospital in Surinam.

It is certainly possible that some assistance in shipping the equipment can be granted through this Voluntary Agencies Division of the Canadian International Development Agency.

We do, however, have to know a few more details before any firm commitment can be made. Is your hospital able to send us the following information?

1. Have you confirmation, in writing, that the Central Hospital, Surinam is willing to accept the equipment?
2. Has the Central Hospital, Surinam, the necessary electric power and correct wattage and voltage to properly operate the equipment?
3. Has the Central Hospital, Surinam, the available electrical mechanics to install the equipment and then the necessary technicians to put the equipment into effective use?
4. Will the equipment be permitted entry into Surinam on a duty free basis? and will the authorities of the Central Hospital, Surinam, meet the shipment at the port of entry, ensure its safe unloading and convey it to their hospital?

These are questions which should be answered to you, by the authorities at the Central Hospital.

Other points which come to mind are:

1. Can you obtain a firm estimate of the cost of creating the equipment and shipping it to Surinam from the office of one of your large shipping companies in Saskatoon, and let us know the cost.

You will probably consider that these points seem to be unnecessarily bureaucratic. For this I apologize. However, there have been numerous cases, in other countries, where aid monies have been wasted, due to insufficient checking before implementation. If we therefore appear to be overly cautious we ask your patience as I am sure that you wish public monies expended as effectively as possible.

Please do not hesitate to contact the writer if we can be of any more assistance.




