There has been an interruption in the publication of Net & Twine due to much travelling on the part of your editor and the moving of our establishment. However, and please note, our mailing address remains the same so as not to confuse anyone.

Since our last issue many items of interest have passed over our desk and we should like to touch on several of them at this time.

An article appearing in the Ann Arbor News recently quotes DNR Fisheries Chief Wayne H. Tody as saying Lake Huron is reaching the turning point in fish restoration. The U.S. Congress approved and passed a Bill increasing the money expenditures on Lamprey Control by \$200,000 which should enable ample work to be carried out on Lake Huron, more on Lakes Superior and Michigan, and allow monies to commence work on the U.S. side of Lake Ontario. Good news indeed for all concerned. Tody stated that this year will be the first year the full capacity of rearing facilities will be used for Splake which is 1,000,000. The eggs will be taken from fifth generation splake and lake trout and deposited at the Jordan River Hatchery.

Lake Michigan, according to Messrs. Schelske and Stoermer of the U. M. Institute of Science and Technology Great Lakes Research Division, is not without its serious pollution problems. These men have authored an article in "Science", "Eutrophication (aging) Silica Depletion and Predicted Changes in Algal Quality in Lake Michigan". The article points out the accelerated ageing of L. Michigan stimulated by pollution input is causing silica depletion in surface waters during summer stagnation periods. Limitation of the reproduction of the presently dominant phytoplankton organisms, which require silica, may lead to drastic undesirable changes in the ecosystem, they write. These men lay the blame on the continued heavy influx of phosphorus and express doubt that limitation of phosphorus by present limits would reverse the present trend. They feel this process will not show up as it does in Lakes Erie and Ontario in the very near future, but will if left unchecked for too long.

We find that in Ontario, the O.W.R.C. has introduced a program to curb excessive algal growth in our waterways while stimulating recovery in existing problem areas. The program, incorporating a timetable requires the installation of facilities capable of removing a minimum of 80% of phosphorus from sewage at municipal and institutional treatment plants. Excessive algae leads to a deterioration in the quality of aquatic life by draining oxygen from the water. These facilities are to be installed by the end of 1973 for plants in Lake Erie drainage basin and at many points in the upper Great Lakes, inland recreational waters and the Ottawa River system. The end of 1975 is the final date for commencement of operation of these facilities in the Lake Ontario basin.

Remember the Sulphuric Acid Spill at the Pickering River last December? The O.W.R.C. advise that after spending \$250,000 to neutralize the acid over a 5½ month program the exercise has been successful. We will again state our view as we did earlier this year, that there should be and must be regulations set-up controlling Provincial, Inter-Provincial highway and waterways and our sea shore navigation companies containers to carry any substance that could present harmful effects to our citizens and environment. One doesn't have to look very far to see how flimsy our highway truck tankers are for the carrying of dangerous liquids, the same holds true of our railroads, and of course our tankers on our inland waterways and oceans. How many more incidents such as the 'Arrow', the

C.P.R. tank car spill at Pickerel River, and highway accidents must we sure before someone in authority finally "feels there is such a need."

Fish Destroyals due to Mercury, we trust all of our fishermen who have had fish ordered destroyed by the Department of Fisheries & Forestry, Fish Inspection Branch have made their claims to this Department. If not, you are losing money that you can ill afford to lose. If you have any questions, contact the Federal Department of Fisheries & Forestry, Mr. D. Moulton, 1 Front St., Toronto, Ontario for further particulars.

Ever wonder about the Alewife and why you see so many deadsones in early summer? A short but interesting article by Lands & Forests describes the situation very clearly. "The alewife, related to the sardine, was first reported in Lake Ontario in 1873 and since has blossomed forth abundantly. Large die-offs began the latter part of the 19th century. Farmers at that time used them as fertilizer by the wagon load much the same as gardeners living near the lake do today. Way back when, the alewife constituted the major portion of the food of the lake trout. Today it is the main item in the diet of rainbow and the coho. The alewife feeds largely on animal plankton such as small crustaceans. In shallow waters, insects of various kinds are eaten. In examining the stomach contents of dead alewives biologists discovered the presence of rapidly digestible animal plankton indicating these fish feed just before death. Most of the dead alewives are three and four years old. Normally, these dying alewives appear healthy, but a fungus called saprolegnia, is a common secondary infection on dying and dead fish. This 'hairy' growth, however, does not cause death. Saprolegnia is common in fresh water where it often is seen on eggs or adults damaged in the act of spawning. Floating alewives that have been dead for long periods are usually matted with the fungus. The life of the alewife is for much of the year spent in deep water, from 150 to 300 feet, but in April an inshore spawning movement begins. The greatest numbers arrive along the shore in mid-June and the migration may last until mid-July. Spawning takes place at night during this period. When spawning is over, the fish return to deep water. During the winter in the deeper water the alewife is accustomed to a constant low level of temperature from 37 to 41 degrees f. As it proceeds inshore to spawn it enters water with fluctuating temperatures often reaching 68 degrees f and is unable to acclimatize itself to such a high temperature and dies.

We are now approaching that time of year when most member Associations hold their annual meetings. At these meetings the years business and problems are discussed at length and resolutions to be submitted to the Council are formulated. We in the commercial fishing industry have been passing through one of the most difficult periods in our history and it is the hope of your Council that very deep deliberations are had and that resolutions submitted are based on these deliberations. Your Council is organizing the annual meeting and the dates will be announced just as soon as we hear from our invited guests as to the best possible time to hold it. It is the hope of your President and Manager that every member association be fully represented.

Your editor belatedly announces the death of Dr. 'Andy' Pritchard, a wonderful friend to the Council over the years.

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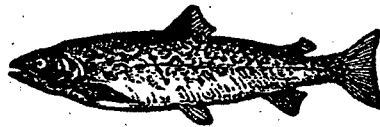

Since our last issue of Net & Twine your Editor has travelled to many areas of the Province talking with members of local Associations and with members of Executives of these Associations in regard to their present situation re marketing stemming from Mercury. Much has taken place with regard to events that in some instances our membership has been helped and of course many others harmed.

It will be recalled your Council discussed at the annual meeting in January the institution of a Monitoring system for analyzing our fish for Mercury should be put into effect without delay in order that our membership not be unduly harmed by lowered prices due to a poor quality of fish offered for sale account of their being held for daily inspection. A program of monitoring is being put into effect throughout the Province by the Federal Department of the Environment throughout the Province as quickly as possible. To achieve a monitoring operation in a Lake or area of a Lake many samples are taken, 100 is the desired number and each is tested individually. Each sample is categorized by ppm of Mercury, length, and weight. This information is then computerized. The results could show that all fish of a specie are clear of Mercury, and this would O.K. an area; or it would indicate if every sample was below the tolerance level the fish would be monitored; or it could show that fish of a specie were to be monitored up to a certain size and above that size the fish would have to be detained for sampling every shipment.

Sampling of fishes from Lakes and areas of Lakes is performed in two ways. Either from Commercial catches by you the fisherman, or by teams of men from Ontario Lands & Forests. When the entire Province has been sampled and classified the Laboratories of the Federal Department of the Environment both in Toronto and Winnipeg should then be sorted out and should be able to give the service a fresh product such as our fish requires.

Your Council has been seeking compensation for those fishes ordered destroyed and to the moment we feel success to a degree has been achieved. For those of you who had fish destroyed during 1970 and have not been reimbursed for them I would suggest you make claim by letter substantiated by your destroyal notices or dates to the Department of the Environment, Fisheries Branch, Toronto, Ontario for the attention of Mr. D. Moulton. A cost sharing program has been reached between Ontario and Ottawa for fish destroyal during 1971. This program provides for a continuation of fishing in those waters where the rejection rate of fish due to mercury does not exceed 20% of the landed value of the fish.

What the Sampling Program is uncovering are some Lakes or areas of Lakes that contain fish consistently above the tolerance level of .5 ppm of Mercury. What our Ontario Government is doing here is, upon finding this information it is attaching an amendment to the individuals license stating simply that the fishing for and the taking of certain species is hereby rescinded. Here is where we shall have to sort out the wording of pronouncements, announcements, etc. on Loan Programs, Assistances, etc. so that those fishermen being prevented from taking their major catches, or only catch they can exist on will receive honest assistance and not merely words. A form letter has been set out to most commercial

fishermen by your respective District Foresters explaining the latest pronouncement on this. This letter outlines much of the information already given you in this edition and explains further that payments will be made for destroyed fish you have shipped while survey results are being obtained, but will cease once it is known definitely that any species or size of fish is unsaleable. This letter also points out that those fishermen fishing during 1969 in areas where mercury levels were so high that fishing was prohibited by regulation and, who have not found other means of employment since, are eligible for loans under the Fisheries Loan Act 1971 equal to 70 percent of a licensee's net income from fishing in 1969 plus certain fixed costs such as maintenance or mortgage payments, etc. What perplexes your Editor, and I am sure yourselves, is the fact that "amendments" are being attached to licenses, these men are not being "prohibited" by regulation, their Lakes or areas of Lakes are not being "closed". We even have an instance where licenses have not been issued to date but the Lake is not "closed". What our present worry is, "Will these men be eligible for Loan Assistance under the Fisheries Loan Act of 1971"? or are they to be just written off like just so much excess baggage.

If there is a fisherman reading this edition who does not fully understand what is being outlined to them, we would suggest you contact your local District Forester for a clear-cut explanation of how you can be helped and under what scheme.

We were disappointed to have to find out on the eve of the Great Lakes Pollution Conference just held in Michigan, through our local newspaper, that included on the agenda was a "Hopeful resolving of Ontario's policy of allowing commercial fishermen to net Michigan planted Coho Salmon in Lake Huron". Your Manager has telegraphed and written the Premier, the Hon. William G. Davis, hopefully in time for the Conference, of assurances that such a proposal would not be contented and that Canadian Fishermen fishing in Ontario waters would not be restricted from taking this specie. We fishermen of Ontario did not wish these Coho dumped into the Great Lakes, these Coho move into our Canadian waters, supplant our Yellow Pickerel, eat our feed and also Yellow Pickerel, and do not command the price of Yellow Pickerel. There are areas also on the Canadian side that Coho are incidental catch. Are Canadian fishermen in these areas to be penalized? Are they to throw back dead or dying Coho just because they are Coho? We certainly hope not.

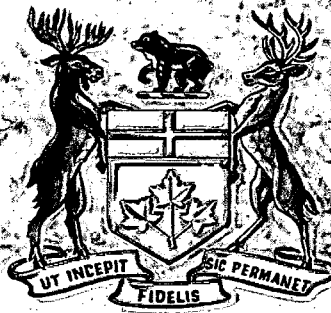



ANNUAL MEETING JANUARY 14, 1970

ONTARIO COUNCIL OF COMMERCIAL FISHERIES

Mr. Chairman,

With your permission, before touching on the subject listed on the agenda, I think it is only fitting to say a few words about the Freshwater Fish Industry as a whole. It certainly had over the years some unusual and distinctive characteristics. Some were biological such as, the disappearance of the blue pickerel - the near extinction of lake trout because of the predacious lamprey - the displacement of some species by others such as experienced in the Lake Erie fishery - the sturgeons and the goldeyes attractive species to the gourmet gave glamour to the industry but, being more vulnerable to depletion, were important for relatively short periods, and you have the problems of *Tripterygion crassus* and pollution.

Other characteristics were not biological ... from the early 20's until the last decade there was a total reliance on a single export market - that of the United States. With rare exceptions, there has been little change in product forms or innovation of the forms - serious problems in certain regions brought about government intervention and in 1969 the industry witnessed the establishment of the Freshwater Fish Marketing Corporation.

However, WHAT HAS BEEN DONE - OR WHAT COULD HAVE BEEN DONE is now in the past - WHAT ABOUT THE FUTURE? The future of the Canadian fishing industry as a whole in the context of the world picture is bright. There is little surplus or no surplus and shortages of some species without indications of an increasing world catch in relation to demand.

Is the future of the Freshwater Fish Industry as bright? I believe one should think so - first we are practically the sole supplier - second - we have a limited and rather static production versus a very large market of many ethnic groups desirous of buying freshwater species - plus small alternative markets - third - the proximity of the main market - and fourth - the regional purchasing habits are sometimes slow to follow national trends.

The United States will certainly remain the principal market for years to come, but there are a number of changing conditions worth watching fairly closely in order for the industry to readjust quickly if need be. In my opinion, they could have some effect on our exports of freshwater species. What are these trends?

The phenomenal growth in the last decade of the frozen convenience seafood industry - the retail, the institutional and the fast food service chains - - - the tariff reductions under the Kennedy Rounds are inducing not only Canadian fish producers to process more prepared items but producers of other countries as well - - - more countries from the underdeveloped world are emerging as new fishing nations with their sights on the U.S. market - - - commercial fish farming, relatively new in Canada, is growing rapidly in many regions of the U.S., bringing sourcing closer to the fish buyer and giving him a much higher degree of assurance of quality.

There is also a growing reluctance at the store level of large chains of supermarkets to handle raw fish, even at times in the fillet form - they prefer the prepared items - the consumer is getting more and more price and quality conscious.

It may take some time but these factors will certainly have an effect on our exports to the U.S. - The five main high priced species (except 'B' whitefish) cannot be utilized for prepared convenience foods - and will our under-utilized species like, marias, suckers, herring and others, even processed in prepared forms, be accepted and competitive with seafish items.? If fresh or frozen dressed species become more readily available from regional fish farms, will we be able to maintain our position, although we are presently enjoying special status?

Do we have alternative markets? I think at another time we might discuss the domestic market, but I understand, Mr. Chairman, that you are more interested in other foreign markets. I might say right at the outset that there are very little possibilities of export business at prevailing prices to nearly all countries except some European countries. Perhaps I should add here that I am referring, of course, to the main species. We hope in the fairly near future to undertake a world study of the market possibilities for the under-utilized species.

In Europe a few countries are buying Canadian freshwater fish. But the pioneering work has been done and there are good indications that sales can be increased and new markets developed or new species introduced with the proper approach.

Exporting to Europe appears to be an insurmountable task to many Canadian freshwater fish producers. They wonder about the language, the currency, the customs regulations, the credit risks, etc.

Most of the difficulties can be solved with systematic and proper planning. Nearly all the required information is readily available from Ottawa through the services of our Department or in co-operation with our Trade Commissioner Service abroad. At least the groundwork can be done for you and, if prospects appear encouraging, the appointment of an aggressive representative is then a prerequisite to effecting sales.

Many of the species are unknown to the buyer and even less to the consumer. Your agent will need advertising support to reach the housewife, he will need free samples and arrange receptions or do an in-store promotion. In some cases the receptions can be made with the support of the Canadian Embassy.

In 1969, there were two CANADA-WEEK food festivals held in Swiss high-class restaurants featuring Canadian fish gourmet products, resulting in the items being placed permanently on the menu and creating a demand in retail stores.

After completing a few sales, it would be highly desirable for the Canadian exporter to visit the market, discuss problems at first-hand with his agent and give him some assurance of continuity of supplies.

What are we presently selling to Europe? France is buying close to a million pounds of pike and small quantities of pickerel. Despite a few trade promotions by our Department and various attempts by the French trade, whitefish has not been successfully accepted and most buyers have given up hope.

The French buyers do not want frozen dressed pike in less than four-pound and not more than nine-pound sizes. In a large shipment they are sometimes obliged to accept two to three thousand pounds of sizes they do not wish to have, but in those cases they will pay two cents per pound less on the weight of the undesired sizes.

French producers of "QUENELLES" (fish balls) are the major users of the pike blocks. The size of the blocks or the size of the fillets in the block are not important. So far Canadian exporters have been shipping regular size blocks which are readily accepted by the trade. For both product forms the French buyers are paying equal and even better prices than obtainable on the United States market.

Whitefish is exported mainly to Finland to the smokers. In 1967, 653,000 pounds were sold. In 1968, because of the uncertainties in the industry, exports dropped to 200,000 pounds, but a recovery was made in 1969 as close to 500,000 pounds were shipped between the period January-September. Prices are also equal to those obtainable in the United States for that particular product - - - that is if the fish were filleted and blocked.

A recent development in our exports of freshwater species is the growing interest in Switzerland and Belgium for lake perch. A few thousand pounds were shipped in 1969 and if we can produce the skinless fillets, the buyers will increase their purchases.

Europe is also a fairly lucrative market for both live and frozen eels, especially for silver eels, particularly in Germany, England, Scandinavian and other Continental European countries.

Except for small quantities of pike and pickerel to Holland and Belgium, this is the extent of our performance in freshwater species in Europe at present, but with good indications that sales can be increased.

In summary, I believe the future of the freshwater fish industry will be very good for those who will readjust to changing conditions at all levels - catching methods - processing - product innovation - sales and distributions patterns - last, but not least, "QUALITY" and I emphasize "QUALITY" - for the others I might ask you to think about the ad on T.V. of the Construction Safety Association " WE WORRY" WE WORRY FOR THOSE WHO DON'T AND FOR THOSE WHO DON'T KNOW WHETHER THEY SHOULD.

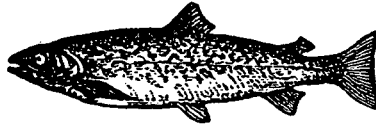

The Honourable, René Brunelle, Minister of Lands and Forests in the opening address complimented the Ontario Council of Commercial Fisheries for the guidance and assistance it provides to Ontario commercial fishermen in all phases of their activities and congratulated the International Great Lakes Commission for its outstanding achievements in the control of the most fearful fish predator the "Sea Lamprey" and for the restoration of the lake trout fishery in Lake Superior and parts of other Great Lakes.

The Minister reaffirmed his department's interest and offer of assistance to the commercial fisheries and that his officials were doing everything possible within the limit of the budget for fisheries to give the fisherman a bigger piece of the economic pie.

Dr. Pritchard while concerned somewhat with cuts in the Great Lakes Fisheries Commission's budget said he was hopeful to carry out the various programs of the Commission. The control of the sea lamprey by lampricides has given far better results than anticipated and coupled with the successful plantings of cokane and coho salmon, and splake trout fingerlings, it is now possible to predict higher pre-lamprey production of salmonides in Lake Superior and an increased production in Lakes Huron and Michigan.

Dr. Clarke outlined the work of the Fish and Wildlife Branch and mentioned in particular the gratifying results of the "splake" trout program. The splake trout (hybrid) is a cross-breed experiment between speckled and lake trout carried out by the Department of Lands and Forests, over a period of years. The mature fish have produced fingerlings which in the opinion of scientists will mature at 2 or 3 years compared to the 6 or 7 years normally taken by ordinary lake trout. It is also assumed that the splake trout can better defend itself from sea-lamprey attacks. Many thousands of fingerlings are ready to be planted in Ontario lakes.

Mr. Hopson, outlined some of the operations of the Fisheries Price Support Board and explained how, why and when the Board decides recommendations of support or non-support of fish prices.

Mr. Kinsella, enumerated the services available from the Department and gave a summary of demand for fish in foreign markets, the United States inventory positions for the different species and product forms. He also gave an account of recent market studies for freshwater fish in the United States discussed the best areas of demand and stressed the factor of quality in exporting Canadian fish.

Mr. Bedard gave a statistical summary of the export of freshwater fish for the past five years and indicated the upward and downward trends in consumption, forms of utilization and prices. He also pointed out the strong demand for pike in France, the interest of British and French buyers for lake trout with a red flesh (for smoking) and our first shipment of perch fillets to Switzerland. A copy of the speech is attached herewith.

Messrs. Kinsella and Bedard answered questions from the floor on transportation, U. S. tariff, average export price of various species of fish, foreign import restrictions and other related questions.

The meeting was attended by representatives from all the twelve associations affiliated with the Ontario Council, officials of Lands and Forests and over 150 persons were present at the meeting. All the executive officers of the Council were reelected for the year 1968.

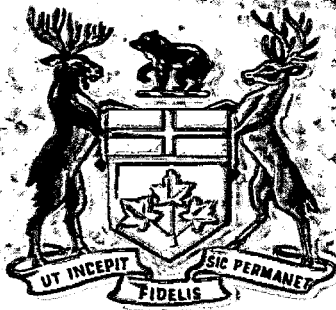

Dear Roger:

I am enclosing the summary of the statistics of the Ontario Commercial Fishery which we spoke about in our telephone conversation on January 24, 1968.

We do differentiate between lake herring and chub. The production shown for chub or tullibee in Lake Huron, Georgian Bay and Lake Superior is probably quite authentic. I mean by this that these fish were, in all likelihood, the deep-water, fresh-water herring, relatively small in size, with a fat content, making them desirable for smoking. In the trade, they are generally sold on the Chicago or New York markets, but a few are processed, I believe, in the Toronto smoking-processing houses, such as, Harbord Fish. In this same classification, the chub or tullibee reported from northern inland waters are probably not the deep-water variety nor do they likely go into the smoke-trade market.

The lake herring classification on the other hand is probably also quite reliable for Lake Ontario, Lake Erie, Lake Huron, Georgian Bay and Lake Superior. These are generally the lake herring which are taken in shallow water in the fall of the



year, October, November and December when they school up in these shoal waters for spawning. These fish taken in the lower lakes are generally sold as ciscoes and used to command a relatively good price on the market. They tend to be larger in size than the chubs. The lake herring taken in Lake Superior, on the other hand, while also the shallow-water variety have for many years been unable to find a satisfactory U.S. market because of triaenophorus infestation. They have been taken in large numbers near Port Arthur for many years in gill nets and more recently in trawl nets and sold for animal food at \$45.00 to \$50.00 per ton in the Duluth market. We believe that they used to be and probably still are marked with some kind of dye to assure that they did not go into the human food market. As far as we know, they are good quality fish and the level of triaenophorus infestation is probably not very high, certainly no higher than in many whitefish. These fish have, incidentally, been finding more acceptance as fillets or as ~~dress~~ fish, either fresh or frozen, on the Canadian markets. The lake herring shown under "northern inland" are probably the same as the chub or tullibee shown under the northern inland classification.

If you are interested in the biology of these fishes and the various species, you might get some assistance from Dr. W.B. Scott, Curator of Fishes for the Royal Ontario Museum, or Dr. Stan Smith, Bureau of Commercial Fisheries, Ann Arbor, Michigan. Dr. Smith has been doing considerable work on chub and herring populations of the Great Lakes during the last year or two.

These thoughts are for your information. The comments with respect to triaenophorus infestation should be used rather confidentially.

RAINY LAKE COMMERCIAL FISHERMEN'S ASSOCIATION

We, the Rainy Lake Commercial Fishermen's Association at our Annual General Meeting held in Fort Frances on Dec. 16th 1966, voted to again present the following Resolution.

- 1. Whereas The fish population of Rainy Lake has shown such a marked decline both in the commercial fisherman and the angler in the past six years*

And

Whereas Six years of a biological experiment of five years duration, on the part of the biologists of the Department of Fish and Wildlife, relative to the effectiveness of fish hatcheries on our fish population has passed, sufficient data should have been compiled by now, proving that fish hatcheries in the area are essential,

And

Whereas The fluctuation of the water level in Rainy Lake is so great due to Rainy Lake being a reservoir for holding purposes of water for power production that our lake no longer is a natural breeding grounds for our fish life,

Be it Resolved

The Department of Fish and Wildlife begin to study a suitable location for the erection of a fish hatchery, somewhere within the area to serve Rainy Lake and tributary waters immediately and discontinue this biological study which up to the present has been a failure.

RAINY LAKE COMMERCIAL FISHERMEN'S ASSOCIATION (cont'd)

2. Re: Beacon Lights on Rainy Lake

Under the present operation these lights are removed from the Lake long before navigation closes in the Fall. Since the Winter travel on the lake has increased in such proportions, not only by commercial fishermen, but by winter anglers and cottage owners, our beacons would be a guide to winter travellers and a warning of places where currents and ice are dangerous to life and property.

We, the Rainy Lake Commercial Fishermen's Association request that all beacons lights on Rainy Lake be left operative on a year round basis.

- ✓ 3. The members having heard a discussion on the McIvor Report agree that this subject has merit and is interesting, but the members present would like to have more information, and, after examination will then decide to either support or reject same by a resolution forwarded to you.
4. Be it resolved that the Rainy Lake Commercial Fishermen Association objects to industrial waste, pleasure boats and commercial boat human waste, oil and refuse entering our waters, thereby endangering the fish life and the future of the fishing industry.

We firmly request that the Government take steps to assure that the agencies involved take direct action to stop this pollution of our waters.

*EASTERN ONTARIO ASSOCIATION OF COMMERCIAL

5. *The Ontario Council of Commercial Fisheries be requested to press for immediate work to correct the intolerable conditions of the polluted waters of Lake Ontario in general, and the Bay of Quinte in particular.*
- ✓ 6. *The Ontario Council of Commercial Fisheries is requested to ask the Department of Trade and Commerce for further particulars of the Fish Marketing scheme suggested by the McIvor Commission. The members of the Eastern Ontario Association of Commercial Fishermen having only a very superficial knowledge of the scheme or the report feel, however, there might be beneficial effects from the application of such a scheme to the waters of Lake Ontario.*
7. *The Ontario Council of Commercial Fisheries be requested to ask the Fisheries Price Support Board to investigate the necessity of the application of such a scheme as at present exists for Yellow perch be extended or modified to include White perch from the waters of Lake Ontario.*
8. *The Ontario Council of Commercial Fisheries be instructed to enquire from the appropriate authority for support of a scheme to institute experimental fishing by trawls for the purposes of harvesting the Smelt crop.*
- 8A. *Whereas the Association of Commercial Fishermen of Eastern Ontario requests that the Bay of Quinte licenses be permitted to operate 4½" mesh nets in Bay of Quinte waters, west of Glenora Ferry from October 15th to January 31st of each year; for a 2 to 3 year period, or until such time the populations of the small Whitefish and Yellow pickerel that have appeared in the small mesh nets of commercial fishermen can be saved.*

PARRY SOUND DISTRICT

9. That we forward a resolution to be placed before this Ontario Council of Commercial Fishermen. To ask the Department of Transport to decide upon a standard system of marking of underwater trap nets for the fishermen, that the nets do not become a navigational hazard and to have same published in all aids to navigation.

ASSOCIATION OF COMMERCIAL FISHERMEN OF
THUNDER BAY DISTRICT

10. This Association of Commercial Fishermen asks that the Ontario Council of Commercial Fisheries take the strongest steps at its command to bring about the cessation of pollution in N. W. Ontario with the Governmental agencies charged to rid our waters of this waste under the Fisheries Act of Canada and - more specific - in those waters of Nipigon Bay and Thunder Bay.

The pollution of Nipigon Bay by a Paper Mill (Domtar) at Red Rock - complaints about this condition have been made by this Association for six years, and instead of the situation improving or remaining status quo, the area of water has become non-productive due to excessive amounts of Phenol from this mill, which imparts a fuel oil taste to the flesh of the fish and makes them un-saleable, has now increased in area to a point 15 miles long by 6 miles wide in one area and also is leeching out in other directions. This all in the most productive Pickerel and Whitefish grounds of this Bay. Ontario Water Resources Commission samplings last year showed a Phenol content as high as 500 parts per billion whereas the O.W.R.C. allowable standards are for no greater than 5 parts per billion. Conservative estimates of losses to the commercial fishermen in this area over the past years is in excess of one million Dollars.

With this resolution this Association recommends that the Government institute a regular water sampling programme of Nipigon Bay, Thunder Bay, and the Kaministiquia River throughout the navigable months either by themselves or some other qualified agency and that the Commercial Fishermen could assist this programme by furnishing water transportation to these groups because all waters affected are on Lake Superior and tend to be rough.

11. This Association requests the Fish Prices Support Board to examine the possibility of applying the activities of the Board to Lake Superior Herring.

- ✓ 12. The Thunder Bay Association of Commercial Fishermen having heard the general principles of the Fish Marketing Board appreciates the importance of such a scheme which is interesting but would like to have further information before making any commitment.

Duck hides stakes left in the navigable areas offer as much hazard as do the pound stakes. Be it, therefore, resolved that the pound net stakes be permitted to remain during the summer months.

21. HOOK LICENSE

300 Hook License - \$25.00 - should be increased to 900 hooks for the same cost.

✓ 22. MARKETING BOARD

The Fishermen of Lake St. Clair feel because of their unusual methods of disposing of their catches, do not wish the Fish Marketing Board to disturb this arrangement and therefore request that all Lake St. Clair fishermen be exempted.

23. LICENSING

The Association wishes to bring to the attention of the Dept. of Lands and Forests, the many inequalities existing in the issuing of pound net licenses. 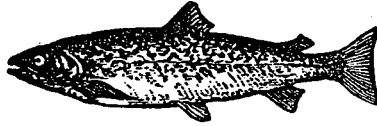

TWENTY-SECOND ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE ONTARIO COUNCIL
OF COMMERCIAL FISHERIES, JANUARY 18 - 19, 1967.

The Honourable R. Brunelle, Minister of Lands and Forests for the Province of Ontario, in the opening address referred to the importance of the fisheries in the economy of the province. He said preliminary estimates from 22 district offices show that overall landings in Ontario during 1966 were running about the same as in 1965 when they reached 52.5 million pounds worth some \$6.4 million. Preliminary figures for the first nine months of 1966 indicate that the catch amounted to 40.2 million pounds with a landed value of nearly \$4 million. Mr. Brunelle indicated that steps were being taken to expand both the commercial and sports fisheries on a sound and biological basis. The Minister said that Mr. John Brubacher had been appointed to the position of Chief, Commercial Fisheries, previously held by Mr. Reginald Werner who has retired. Additional Fisheries officers were being added to the staff as well. Reference was made to the joint Canada-United States efforts to control the sea lamprey in the Great Lakes. The officials of International Great Lakes Fisheries Commission were quite pleased with the progress being achieved in reducing this menace to the lake trout and whitefish fisheries. They pointed to the increasing catch of lake trout in Lake Superior during the past few years.

Over 150 persons were in attendance at the meeting, one of the largest in the history of the Association. Mr. H. F. Gauthier was re-elected as President with Dr. Arthur Blackhurst being confirmed as Manager. In addition to the Honourable R. Brunelle others who addressed the conference at the opening session included the Honourable Reverend A. W. Downer, M.L.A.; Dr. A. L. Pritchard, Chairman, International Great Lakes Fisheries Commission; Dr. C.H.D. Clarke, Chief, Fish and Wildlife Service, Department of Lands and Forests; Mr. J.N. Lewis, Chairman, Fisheries Prices Support Board; Mr. R.L. Beatty, Director-General, Unemployment Insurance Commission; Mr. Frank Maher, Resident Director, United States Fish and Wildlife Service, Ann Arbor, Michigan; Mr. D. Wilson, President, Northern Ontario Tourist Organization; and Mr. J. Perry, Director, Canadian Mining Association; Mr. H. V. Dempsey, Director, Inspection Service, Department of Fisheries.

I spoke briefly and outlined the services being provided by the Department of Trade and Commerce. I commented on the current market situation - and suggested that any fishermen or firms requiring assistance in selling their products should get in touch with us. I referred to the growing market in France for jack pike - and also mentioned our Trade Missions and Trade Fair programmes.

Mr. A. Kelso Roberts, M.L.A., former Minister of Lands and Forests, acted as Chairman during the closed session. Mr. Bedard and I were called upon to clarify the recommendations of the Royal Commission of Inquiry into Freshwater Fish Marketing - and to answer any queries with respect to the report. Mr. Bedard conducted himself very favourably. I reviewed the background leading up to the establishment of the Royal Commission of Inquiry - and indicated that a model depicting the various recommendations was being prepared for the information of the Federal-Provincial Fisheries Committee Meeting next month. I mentioned that if any of the members of the Association has any specific views, suggestions, or recommendations with respect to the proposed freshwater fish marketing board that these should be presented to the Ontario government officials, who will be representing the interests of the fishermen at the meeting. I was informed that during a private session several resolutions had been passed by the Association members concerning the McIvor report - and that copies would be forwarded to me.

Dr. Blackhurst advised me in confidence that only a few dealers in Northwestern Ontario were opposing the proposed board. However, based on the comments at the meeting it would appear that Ontario will most likely hold a plebiscite in Northwestern Ontario before concurring in any recommendations that a Freshwater Fish Marketing Board be established, which would include administering the fisheries in that area. This would, no doubt, take place after the model is considered at the Federal-Provincial Prairie Fisheries Committee meeting on February 10th.

During our brief stay in Toronto, Mr. Bedard and I took advantage of the opportunity to call on members of the local trade and the Regional Office of the Department of Fisheries. We were also able to discuss trade matters with fishermen and exporters. An interesting note was that Omstead Fisheries Ltd. increased its overall export sales during 1966 from \$4 million to \$5 million. Mr. Leonard Omstead Sr. was anxious to know whether any headway had been made in lowering the United States 30 per cent ad valorem duty on imports of cooked fish. I indicated our progress to date.

As a closing observation, may I suggest that the time has come when we should consider changing the titles of our senior positions in the Agriculture and Fisheries Branch in order to give a little more prominence to Fisheries. Possibly, the position of the Director of the Branch should be changed to Director-General and the Assistant Directors to Director or Associate Director (Agriculture) and Director or Associate Director (Fisheries). This seems to be the trend in other Departments.

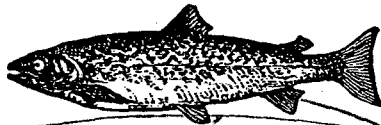

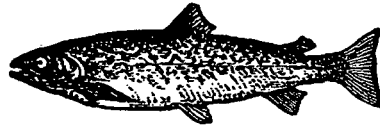

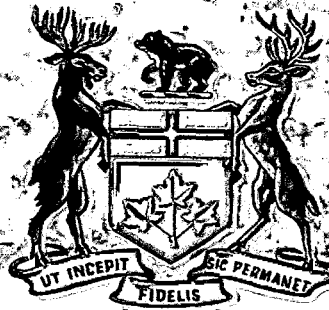

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE ONTARIO COUNCIL OF COMMERCIAL FISHERIES
JANUARY 13, 1966.

I attended the Annual General Meeting of the Ontario Council of Commercial Fisheries on January 13th, which was presided over by Mr. H. F. Gauthier, President, and Dr. Arthur Blackhurst, Manager of the Association. I was called upon to address the Council on the general market position for Canadian fisheries products. During my talk I pointed out that any member firms or fishermen interested in new outlets, either in the United States or Europe, should let me know. I also referred to the terms of reference of the Royal Commission of Inquiry into Freshwater Fish Marketing problems and indicated that the Commissioner, Mr. G. McIvor, would welcome any suggestions or recommendations which they would care to make.

There were some 100 persons in attendance including the Honourable Reverend A.W. Downer, M.L.A.; Honourable George E. Gomme, M.L.A., representing the Honourable A. Kelso Roberts, Minister of Lands and Forests (who was absent in Washington on government business); Dr. A.L. Pritchard, Chairman, International Great Lakes Fisheries Commission and Director, Conservation and Development Service, Department of Fisheries; Dr. A.W. Lantz, Fisheries Research Board, London, Ontario; Dr. C.H.D. Clarke, Chief, Fish and Wildlife Branch, Department of Lands and Forests; Mr. J.D. Roseborough, Department of Lands and Forests; and Mr. M. John Brubacher, Department of Lands and Forests; Mr. N.R. Payne, District Biologist, Department of Lands and Forests, Sault Ste. Marie.

Dr. Clarke, in commenting on the Ontario fisheries, mentioned that preliminary estimates of commercial fish landings during the first nine months of 1965 show 32.3 million pounds of fish worth 4.1 million dollars. This represents an increase over the same period in 1964 in catch up 27 per cent and the value up 31 per cent. Most of the major species showed gains.

Dr. Pritchard reported on the success and efforts to control the sea lamprey in the Great Lakes. The chemical treatment of streams which began on Lake Superior in 1958 and extended to Lake Michigan in 1960 may be extended to Lake Huron in 1966 with Lakes Erie and Ontario to follow. Dr. Lantz spoke on the subject "The Potentials of Freshwater

Fish for Food and Feeds" and showed slides depicting the Department's experimental programme of preparing specialty packs of inland fish for possible commercial sales.

While my stay in Toronto was brief, I feel that such visits are necessary. They help to cement good public relations with both the industry and provincial government fisheries officials. The Council thanked me for taking time out to be present.

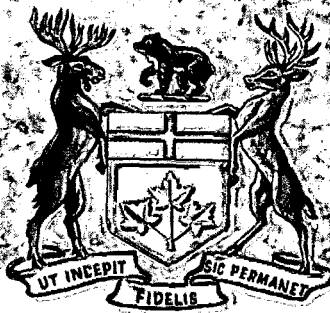

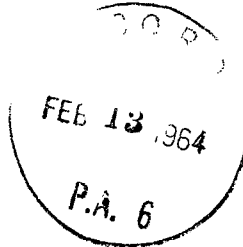

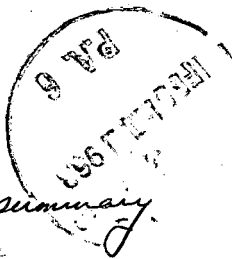

"Mr. Ray Kinsella, Chief, Fisheries Division, Agriculture and Fisheries Branch, Department of Trade and Commerce, reviewed the overall market position and outlook for Canadian fisheries products. He indicated preliminary figures show that the total value of exports of Canadian fisheries products in 1962 reached an all-time high record at \$156,613,000, an increase of about 10% compared with the 1961 returns. Mr. Kinsella said that current stocks of frozen fish in Canada and the United States were not excessive, but that if any of the members of the Ontario Council of Commercial Fisheries were encountering any market problems to let him know. The Canadian Trade Commissioners in New York City, Detroit, and Chicago, the principal areas in which fresh water fish is sold, would be glad to be of assistance.

Mr. Kinsella made reference to the Canadian salt and frozen fish Trade Missions which travelled to Latin America, the Caribbean area, and Europe during the past year. He mentioned that, if any members of the Ontario Council of Commercial Fisheries were interested in receiving a copy of the fairly detailed report of the Canadian Frozen Fish Trade Mission to Europe, he would be pleased to forward it on request."

We are in receipt of an enquiry from Mr. Kinsella, of the Fisheries Division, enquiring as to our possibility and interest in exporting Catfish.

At the present time, our main interest in Catfish sales are governed by the prices paid by Cincinnati and other large mid-west towns for live Catfish, to which points they are exported, from Ontario by huge trucks carrying water reservoirs with aeration devices attached.

The prices paid today in the Lake St. Clair (Windsor-Detroit area) vary from 27¢ to 31¢ a lb. live weight, the prices paid to fishermen in the Prince Edward County (Bellville) vary from 26¢ to 30¢ a lb. live weight.

I thought I would put those figures before you, and perhaps they might be taken as a guide whilst you are discussing the subject with your friends in Japan.

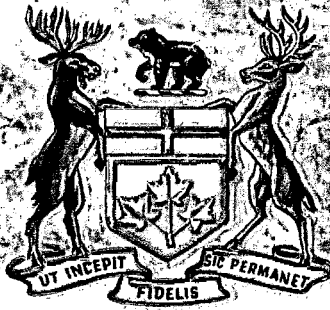
Secondly, Mr. Kinsella's telegram is not quite clear as to whether you want dressed, skinned and dressed, headless and dressed, or frozen or chilled or salted, and it would be quite necessary that we have this information before asking the fishermen to give us a price, which however, as will be realized, must be quite substantial in order to compete with the live fish trade.

I am most interested in and grateful for the several Fisheries Reviews you have sent, and having been trained in reading statistical tables, read most of the reports through.

I was interested in reading page 2, para. 3 (To enrich, etc.) Greece, series 1958, #53, June 10th.

I was the Manager of the T. A. Canelly Estate in North Greece on the (then) Serbian frontier, part of our land went down to Lake Ostrovo.

The three main rivers running through the Estate, two flowed north and one south to the River Vardar, were all thought worthwhile attempting to re-habilitate with trout. Eyed eggs were imported from Norway and Russia. I do not think the total failure to hatch had anything to do with the eggs, it was the inability of the men who superintended the hatching. They knew nothing about it. Furthermore, had they hatched and were subsequently planted, the fry or fingerlings would have been gobbled up by the very dense population of fresh water cray-fish that inhabit all of the northern Greek Rivers.

It is said that cray-fish populations increased enormously after (or during) the 1910 - 1913 Balkan wars when the disposal of dead people was solved by putting the bodies in the streams.

This is all for your private information.

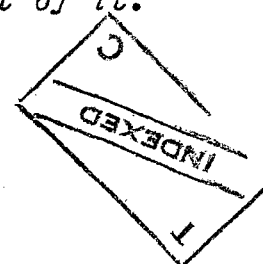

Annual Meeting of Ontario Council of Commercial Fisheries

The Twelfth Annual Meeting of the Ontario Council of Commercial Fisheries was held in the Parliament Buildings, Toronto Jan. 22-23 - and was well attended by representatives of the fourteen member fishermen associations across Ontario. A considerable number of senior federal and provincial government officials were also present, as well as officers of the United States Fish and Wildlife Service and the Manager, Fisheries Council of Canada. It was interesting to note that many of the Ontario fisheries biologists made it a point to be at these informative sessions. In all, the attendance exceeded 100 persons. Mr. Frank Bowman, Hudson, Ontario, is the newly elected President.

The meeting was officially opened by the Hon. Clare B. Macleodoran, Minister of Lands and Forests. The Rev. A. W. Downer, Speaker of the provincial parliament, also addressed the group - and the Hon. H. R. Scott, former Minister of Lands and Forests, attended one of the other sessions.

Mr. George Clark, Deputy Minister of Fisheries, Dr. V.J.K. Harkness, Chief, Ontario Fish and Wildlife Service, and Dr. A. L. Pritchard, Vice-chairman, International Great Lakes Fisheries Commission, were the principal speakers, although round table discussions were also held on (a) Smolt, its significance, uses, and dangers to the Great Lakes fishing; and (b) Trap nets, Pound nets, Gill nets, and other types of fishing gear.

It was indicated that good progress is being made in the elimination of the sea lamprey from Lake Superior, with over 90 per cent of the barriers to be erected in the various rivers and streams leading into the Lake having already been placed. The work of the International Commission commences, officially, this year, although considerable preliminary work has been done. The budget for 1957-58 is approximately \$1.5 million, with the United States assuming 60 per cent of the cost and Canada the remaining 40 per cent. These appear to be the respective shares of the commercial fisheries in Lake Superior in normal times.

The discussions on smolt and fishing nets and gear were extremely interesting. One fisherman expressed the view that more efficient methods should be devised to catch the fish, since it is quite apparent that costs of material will remain quite high despite lower returns for the inland fish. It was mentioned that, while trawling had been done on a small scale in some lakes, there was divided opinion on whether or not it was an economical way to land the fish.

I learned that Messrs. Onstead Fisheries Ltd., Whontley, Ont. grossed some \$3 million in sales of fish in 1956 - and have taken out the patent rights in both Canada and the United States on a process to cook fish by the infra-red method. The Whontley firm and



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several fishermen present at the meeting mentioned they were anxious to expand outlets in the United States - and I said that I would refer any future enquiries for inland fish directly to them. One fisherman expressed appreciation for the work done by our office in Detroit in helping to settle a claim.

As you know, the annual visit to the association meeting also affords me an opportunity to call on leading wholesale fish firms in order to gain an insight into current domestic market trends. The firms visited included the following:

White's Fish Co., (Division of National Sea Products)

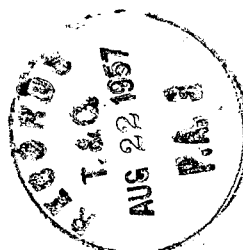

Deliveries of acronized fillets were being made to the Toronto area for the first time - and dealers were confident that the treating of fillets with this particular preservative would help to increase domestic sales. Lunenburg Sea Products Ltd. was the supplying firm - and the individual fillet packages were labelled accordingly.

It appears that market conditions for all types of fish are presently firm - and two of the local wholesalers have seen fit to expand their facilities with a view to taking advantage of the increasing population in greater Toronto. Lobster ponds with artificial sea water, similar to the one in operation in Detroit, have been profitable additions. In checking with the federal fisheries inspectors, I noted that small lots of canned salmon from Japan were now being cleared through the port of Toronto - in line with the recent relaxation mentioned at the last meeting of the Interdepartmental Fisheries Trade Committee.

The Toronto Macaroni Co., prior to this year, had been importing substantial quantities of Norwegian stockfish put up in 250 pound wooden bales. However, Mr. Pavia of the local firm advised that he is now purchasing Atlantic Coast dried salt cod in preference to the Norwegian product - and particularly since the price of the Canadian cod was only half as much as Norwegian stockfish. He said the sale is fairly limited with the Italian and Finnish residents being the major consumers.

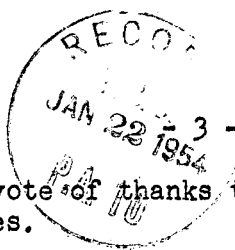
After a general discussion on Mr. Bate's address and general explanation of a proposed treaty between the Governments of Canada and United States, it was-

RESOLVED

1. This meeting warmly approves a treaty between the Government of Canada and the Government of United States of America in order to facilitate research in, and management of the whole or as much as possible of the Great Lakes fisheries.
2. Any question which the Ministry of Fisheries or the Department of Lands and Forests may refer to the Ontario Council of Commercial Fisheries shall be referred to, and acted upon by the Executive Committee of the Council.
3. To adjourn until Wednesday morning, January 20th.

On the meeting reconvening Wednesday morning, January 21st, the Secretary read a telegram from Mr. J. W. Barrie, Drummondville Cottons Limited, explaining it would be impossible for him to address the meeting that afternoon.

4. To approve of the minutes of the Annual General Meeting held January, 1952.
5. To receive and approve the report of the Secretary on the work of the Federation during the year 1952.
6. To receive and approve the report of the Treasurer, certified by the auditor, for the year 1952.
7. To receive the report of Dr. A. G. Huntsman supplemented by Dr. F. E. J. Fry on the work of the South Bay Committee.
8. To receive the reports and addresses by Dr. Ralph Hile, President of the American Fisheries Society, and Dr. J. Eschmeyer, Biologist, Fish and Wildlife Commission, U. S. Government.



9. To record a very hearty vote of thanks to Dr. Hile and Dr. Eschmeyer for their most informative addresses.
10. To receive the report of Dr. A. G. Huntsman, Chairman Lake of the Woods Committee.
11. To receive the report of the Finance Committee as presented by Mr. F. Bowman, Chairman.
12. To adopt the report of the Finance Committee, wherein it is recommended that each Association affiliated to the Ontario Fisheries Council be assessed with the sum of \$30.00 annually, as a contribution to the Fisheries Council annual fee.
13. That Article I of the Articles of Association of the Federation be changed to read - The name shall be the Ontario Council of Commercial Fisheries.
14. Article 4, Section III - MEMBERSHIP - shall be amended and read as under:-

Any Association, organization, group or individual engaged in any business, trade or work connected with
 - (a) the manufacture, distribution or transport of any material, product, or substance used in commercial fishing, and/or
 - (b) the packing or transporting of any product or by product of any fresh water fishery; on the payment of a fee fixed at the discretion of the Directors and payable annually be eligible for election as a sustaining member. No sustaining member shall be entitled to vote, but the sustaining members may organize or form a committee and any resolution adopted by such a committee shall be received, considered, and acted upon by the directors at their sole discretion.
15. To support the Long Point District Commercial Fishermen in requesting the Dept. Lands and Forests to allow commercial fishermen, fishing in Long Point Bay to keep pike of twenty inches and over during the Fall fishing.
16. To refer back to the Association of Commercial Fishermen of Eastern Ontario a request asking for support in applying to the Dept. of Lands and Forests to open the Bay of Quinte for special gill net fishing from Glenora to Deseronto (in Bay Reach) from October 1st of any year to the succeeding March 15th next following, instead of the present period which is from Oct. 1st to Dec. 31st.
17. To support the Association of Commercial Fishermen of Eastern Ontario in asking the Dept. of Lands and Forests to charge each commercial fisherman paying the sum of \$20.00 a year or more for licenses, the sum of \$5.00, and the said sum of \$5.00 to be given to the Ontario Council of Commercial Fisheries in support of their work. In the event of the sums so collected amounting to more than the levy made by the Ontario Council of Commercial Fisheries for the district, such sum shall be returned to the fishermen members of the district from which it was originally collected.
18. To support the Association of Commercial Fishermen of Eastern Ontario who request that the strongest possible representations be made to the proper authorities to reduce the pollution of the waters in the Bay of Quinte.
19. To support the Commercial Fishermen of Killarney in requesting the Dept. of Lands and Forests to reduce pound net license fees and at the same time to impose a uniform fee on pound net licenses throughout the province.

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20. To support the commercial fishermen of Killarney in asking the Department of Lands and Forests to permit commercial fishing by gill nets and/or pound nets in Georgian Bay from the first of January to November 30th each year.
21. To support the Parry Sound Commercial Fishermen in requesting the Department of Lands and Forests to notify every fisheries organization of any changes in fishing districts or any concessions given to any commercial fishermen in any part of the Province. In other words, if a particular fisherman is permitted to temporarily operate in any manner whatever outside the rules and regulations governing commercial fishing, such permission and indulgence should be advertised by the Secretary of the Ontario Council of Commercial Fisheries to all associated and member groups of the Council.
22. To support the Commercial Fishermen of Thunder Bay District in requesting the Department of Lands and Forests to agree to suspend any pound net or gill net fishing license for one year should a fisherman desire such procedure, and that no fee should be payable in that year for which the license is not exercised but at the same time to request the Department to re-issue the license at the option of the fisherman. It is recommended that such procedure or determination of a fisherman should be communicated to the Department of Lands and Forest at the earliest possible date.
23. To support the Commercial Fishermen of Thunder Bay District in their request to the effect that it should be unnecessary to take out licenses at the beginning of the year but only when the licenses are required by the fisherman, in other words, just before fishing operations commence.
24. To support the Commercial Fishermen of Lake St. Clair in their request to the Dept. of Lands and Forests to advertise both on anglers' fishing licenses and on posters which set forth angling regulations and licenses do not permit an angler to fish within twenty-five yards of a commercial fishing net.
25. To instruct the Secretary to take any action he may deem necessary in order to facilitate the payment of claims made by Rainy Lake Commercial Fishermen for compensation payable for flood damage to their properties during the year 1950.
26. To support the Rainy Lake Commercial Fishermen's Association in their request for protection from damage due to the overburden from Steep Rock Lake finding its way into Rainy Lake. It appears that four fishermen are very vitally affected and that action taken so far by the Steep Rock Mines management and the apparently well known contemplated action, will not check the menace.
27. To support the request of the Commercial Fishermen of Algoma-Manitoulin that each and any pound net license in their district should be exchanged for a trap net license at the option of the license holder.
28. To support the Kenora and Patricia District Fisheries Association in their request that Whitefish Bay should be opened to summer fishing for whitefish on the same terms and conditions as those now governing the fishing of this bay in winter.

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29. To support the Kenora and Patricia District Fisheries Association in their request for help from the Ontario Provincial Police authorities to check the common stealing of commercial fishing gear, particularly in or about the waters of the Lake of the Woods.
30. To support the West Erie Commercial Fishermen in their request to the Government of Canada to amend the tariff items dealing with rope, either imported or domestic, and of any size of rope in such a way that will permit rope to be imported or purchased free of duty and sales tax, provided that rope is used for the purpose of commercial fishing.
31. To support the West Erie Commercial Fishermen in their request for further discussion with the Department of Lands and Forests into the subject of reduction of pound net and trap net license fees.
32. To support the request of the West Erie Commercial Fishermen and on their behalf and on behalf of all the fishermen of the Province of Ontario to make overtures to the Municipal Board of Ontario, and/or the Ontario Government that as commercial fishing is a primary industry, therefore, any building or twine fields used in connection with the production of fish or the manipulation and management of gear should be exempt from local business tax.
33. To appoint a committee comprising the President, Mr. Carl Kolbe, Mr. H. F. Gauthier, Mr. R. F. Matthews, and the Secretary, to deal with the foregoing subject (that is business tax on building and twine fields) in all its aspects.
34. To support the West Erie Commercial Fishermen in their request to the Dept. of Lands and Forests to give at least ten days notice of any possible extension of fishing times, or periods; in other words, in the case of Lake Erie where fishing is supposed to close on Dec. 20th, the fishermen should be advised, at least by December 10th, that the season may be extended until the end of the month.
35. To record a very hearty vote of thanks to Dr. W. B. Scott for his most interesting address on methods of determining the age of some of the fresh water fishes.
36. To record a very hearty vote of thanks to Mr. Ken Clark, President of the Ont. Federation of Anglers and Hunters for his friendly and interesting address.
37. To record a very hearty vote of thanks to Mr. Fred Richardson, General Manager of the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters for his address.
38. To record a very hearty vote of thanks to Mr. Gordon O'Brien, Manager of the Fisheries Council of Canada for his address.
39. To record a very hearty vote of thanks to Dr. W.J.K. Harkness for his able help and cooperation in arranging for the annual general meeting and for his interesting address.
40. To record a very hearty vote of thanks to Mr. Dexter Goodison for his excellent help and counsel and advice during his eight years of activities with the Ontario Federation of Commercial Fishermen, both as Director and Chairman of the Board of Directors.
41. To adjourn.

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On Reassembly.

42. To support the Commercial Fishermen of Eastern Lake Superior in their request to the Dept. of Lands and Forests to take and adopt measures to deal with the Lamprey situation now existing in Lake Superior, to the great detriment of the Lake Superior fisheries.
43. To associate with the Commercial Fishermen of Eastern Lake Superior in endorsing and expressing approval of the biological studies being carried out by the Dept. of Lands and Forests in Lake Superior, and other Great Lakes waters, and request that such efforts be continued, and extended especially as regards the tagging of Lake trout. It is felt that tagging activities should be extended to all trout spawning rivers flowing into Lake Superior as well as sections of the open lake.
44. To support the Commercial Fishermen of Eastern Lake Superior who approve of the efforts of the Department of Lands and Forests in regulating and improving the conditions caused by towing pulpwood and logs of every kind in Lake Superior. However, the Ontario Council of Commercial Fisheries should seek to convince the Department of Lands and Forests that it is very necessary to further regulate the floating log and/or pulpwood traffic on all lakes as much damage is caused to fishing nets, particularly by bark slivers, and other incidental debris, apart from the damage caused, the fishing efficiency of the nets is very greatly reduced. It is believed the damage to nets in Lake Superior alone amounts to many thousands of dollars annually.
45. To support the Commercial Fishermen of Eastern Lake Superior in their request to the Dept. of Lands and Forests to conduct investigations as to damage caused to the respiratory organs of fishes (during and just after storms, as well as from strong water current action) by the debris from ground pulp, which accumulates on the bottom of the lakes.
46. To support the Commercial Fishermen of Eastern Lake Superior in requesting the Dept. of Lands and Forests to give all commercial fishermen operating in any district an opportunity to state their views and objections to the closing of any commercially fished waters, before such waters are closed.
47. To support the Commercial Fishermen in Eastern Lake Superior to request the Department of Lands and Forests not to make any order closing to commercial fishing any area, until all parties such as Anglers and Hunters, Tourist Outfitters, Tourist Camp Operators, as well as commercial fisheries have had an opportunity of examining the subject.
48. To warmly support the Commercial Fishermen of Eastern Lake Superior as well as the twenty petitioners in asking for the reopening for commercial fishing the area in and around Michipicoten Island, Quebec Harbour, and vicinity, recently closed to commercial fishing at the request of U. S. tourists who apparently, exploit these waters and who illegally export their catches to the U.S.A.
49. To support the Commercial Fishermen of Eastern Lake Superior in their request that the office of the District Whitefish Inspector in Sault Ste Marie should be kept open all year.
50. To adjourn.

NOTES FOR MEETING OF
ONTARIO FEDERATION OF COMMERCIAL FISHERMEN
JANUARY 19 - 21, 1953
TORONTO, ONTARIO

It is a great pleasure to have been invited to attend the Annual Meeting of the Ontario Federation of Commercial Fishermen - and to have the opportunity to speak to you briefly on the market position for Canadian fisheries products in general.

Full or complete details on exports of inland fish have not yet been compiled, but export figures usually prove to be a fairly accurate indication of how the market outlook is progressing. In the case of Ontario, landings and marketed values for the first ten months of 1952 show increases - and the prospects for future months appear good. Manitoba fishermen to the end of October landed up to 21 million pounds, but sold it for only 2.7 million dollars. These were down slightly in comparison with the corresponding figures in 1951. However, as you know, the chief Manitoba species are in the lower-priced group. I believe only negligible quantities were landed in that province in November.

It also seems that fishing operations at Great Slave Lake have been rather disappointing. The quotas for whitefish and trout were not filled for either last winter's season or in the past summer. In the latter case, slightly over four million pounds of whitefish and trout were taken against a quota of over 5 million pounds.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service quarterly outlook for the period January - March, 1953, relative to fresh water fish, indicates that active markets are predicted for catfish and bullheads and firm markets for lake trout and yellow perch. Fairly steady markets are forecasted for lake herring, whitefish, and yellow pike or pickerel.

It may be of interest to you to present a short review of market possibilities for all forms of Canadian fish - and I shall make this as brief as possible, since I realize you have a full agenda.

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Fresh and Frozen Fish

According to advice from our Trade Commissioners in New York, Chicago, and Detroit, the current outlook for fresh and frozen fish is good. Stocks are fairly high in the United States, but with the coming of the Lenten season the position should improve. Much, of course, will depend on the situation in Iceland. However, I am hopeful that the dispute between Iceland and the United Kingdom will be settled soon, so that normal shipments of frozen cod fillets may be resumed to the latter destination.

Salted Fish

The world production of salted groundfish was below normal in 1952 - and prospects for Canadian exports of dried, salted, and pickled fish are good. As you are probably aware, the Department was instrumental in reopening the European markets of Italy, Spain, and Portugal for payment in dollars for our salt cod.

Canned Fish

Early in 1952, the packers of canned salmon and sardines were faced with large surplus stocks of their products. However, at this date, the situation is much improved - and the market problem should resolve itself by spring. Belgium and the United States, as well as the Canadian domestic market, have taken fairly large quantities of salmon, while the British West Indies, Belgian Congo, and Cuba have purchased considerable supplies of sardines.

By-Products

Fish meal prices in the United States are good, but the outlook for fish and marine mammal oils is still poor. An over production of oils in general have had a weakening effect on the market. It would seem that little herring oil will be produced in British Columbia this winter, since the strike of herring fishermen in that province is still dead-locked.

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In summary, the overall position for Canadian fisheries products is good. Nevertheless, our Trade Commissioners around the

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globe are continuing to report trends in their respective territories, so that our exporters may be constantly aware of the current situation in all world fish producing and consuming countries. You may rest assured that the Department of Trade and Commerce, in particular the Fisheries Section of the Agriculture and Fisheries Branch, is ready at all times to be of assistance to you.
