Dear Hamilton

I am writing to acknowledge your letter of the 26th November about Ewans's terms of reference as the United Kingdom J.I.C. Liaison Officer in Ottawa.

2. We recognise that the normal channel for transmitting Canadian views to J.I.C. (London) is through Black, and have no desire to introduce any change in this respect. But, as I mentioned to you in our conversation shortly before Christmas, we would like to retain in Ewans's terms of reference a form of words which would cover transmission of Canadian comments back to London when this is convenient and appropriate. In the light of our talk I suggest that this might be met by the inclusion in paragraph 2(a) of the terms of reference of some such phrase as, "and transmit to J.I.C. London J.I.C. Ottawa comments thereon," instead of the passage that you suggested for deletion.

3. May I take this opportunity of placing on record the substitution arrangement which I mentioned to you, viz. that during any absences of Ewans from Ottawa, Blaker, who is also a First Secretary on the High Commissioner's staff, will discharge Ewans's J.I.C. Liaison functions.



HCL80 FOR CHAIRMAN JIC AND SECRETARY JIC FROM BLACK. THREAT TO NORTH AMERICA. THE DAI LIAISON OFFICER HAS INFORMED ME THAT HE HAS BEEN ASKED BY DAI FOR THE LATEST AIR MINISTRY AND JIC FIGURES ON SOVIET AIRCRAFT FOR DAI'S ANNUAL THREAT ESTIMATE. HE WILL BE SENDING THE LATEST AIR MINISTRY FIGURES THROUGH HIS OWN CHANNELS.

2. INSOFAR AS THE UK JIC IS CONCERNED, I WOULD RECOMMEND FOR THE ATTENTION OF DAI AND THE REST OF THE CANADIAN JIC THE FOLLOWING PAPER:

"AN ASSESSMENT OF LIKELY SOVIET POLICY TO ACHIEVE THE MEANS OF MOUNTING FULL-SCALE ATTACKS ON THE NORTH AMERICAN CONTINENT UP TO 1962", JIC(58)60(FINAL) DATED DEC 10/58, WHICH SHOULD BE REACHING YOU THROUGH EWANS IN THE NEAR FUTURE. IN APPROVING THIS PAPER THE UK JIC STATED THAT IT WAS SPECULATIVE IN NATURE AND DESIGNED TO PROVOKE DISCUSSION. THEY WILL THEREFORE WELCOME COMMENTS PARTICULARLY FROM THE USA AND OURSELVES AND THEY SHOULD REACH THE SECRETARY, UK JIC BY FEB 27/59.

3. IN VIEW OF THE DIFFERENCES IN BOTH FIGURES AND APPROACH BETWEEN THIS PAPER AND THE CANADIAN THREAT PAPER AN SUPPLEMENT, I ASSUME THAT THE CANADIAN JIC WILL WISH TO MAKE COMMENTS. THE UK PAPER HAS TAKEN NEARLY EIGHT MONTHS TO WRITE AND HAS GONE THROUGH A NUMBER OF DRAFTS, ALL OF WHICH HAVE BEEN PREPARED ORIGINALLY BY THE AIR MINISTRY.

Dear Pat,

We had Air Vice-Marshal Buxton here this week. He attended our weekly JIC meeting on December 17 and we gave him lunch at the Rideau Club afterwards. The first thing he was questioned about at the meeting was the UK JIC paper "An Assessment of Likely Soviet Policy to Achieve the Means of Mounting Full-Scale Attacks on the North American Continent up to 1962". He gave us a most interesting account of United Kingdom thinking on this and related subjects, from which it emerged that this paper must be nearly completed. If this is the case our JIC would be most interested to see it. Do you think you could promote the idea that our comments might be invited?

It goes without saying that in return we should be delighted to let them have a copy of our own estimate of the Soviet threat to North America, when it is ready to be unveiled. As you will gather from the Minutes of our December 17 meeting, we have decided to press on with a purely Canadian estimate of the threat at the same time as we develop an agreed estimate with our American friends. The reason for this is that we think the Canadian Government will want to have an intelligence estimate of the threat by mid-February, in view of the agonizing decision they will have to take about the CF-105 in March, and it looks as though the agreed Canadian-United States paper will not be ready until April 1.

Liaison with the UK JIC

1. Reference is made to your letter of 21 Nov 58 concerning the procedures used in London to deal with current intelligence and JIC papers, including your suggestions on the part that might be played by the JICLO(L).
2. Your letter was considered at the 653rd meeting of the JIC on 3 Dec 58 and members were grateful for the clear picture you provided on the procedures used in London.
3. As you know the JIR Daily Indications Report (JIR DIR) was sent for some months to the JICLO(W) on a CANADIAN EYES ONLY basis for his personal background information only. At the time you assumed your duties in London it was suggested that this report might be sent to you on a similar basis. However, in Aug. 58 (632nd meeting - Item IV) the Committee decided that these reports would not be sent to the JICLOs in London and Washington. The main reason for this decision was that the JIR DIR was not approved by the JIC and thus could on occasions mislead JICLOs as to JIC thinking here. At the 653rd meeting the Committee decided that this reason was still valid, and therefore reaffirmed their decision not to send the JIR DIR to you or to JICLO(W). However, should the JIC during a period of crisis approve the JIR DIR daily for issue as a JIC Daily Indications Report it will then be distributed to the JICLOs in London and Washington as you request.
4. As for the second point you raised, the Committee felt that it was not practicable to prepare Canadian comments and/or amendments to the Draft UK Weekly Survey of Intelligence in time to reach you for presentation at Thursday morning meetings of the UK JIC. The Committee hoped that you would be able to make do at those meetings with the JIC Weekly Indications Report.

5. Regarding your third point the Committee agreed to ask from time to time for UK JIC views on Canadian JIC papers and suggest that if you ever feel that the UK JIC should be asked to comment on a particular Canadian JIC paper, you should so inform me, so that I can clear with the Committee a formal instruction to you to that effect.

10. The Chairman referred to Item IV of the minutes of the 649th meeting concerning the "Terms of Reference for Officer Responsible for Liaison with JIC (Ottawa)" for the UK JIC. Liaison with the UK JIC

1. I have now attended a number of UK JIC and Heads of Section meetings and had a chance to obtain a clearer idea of the procedures used in London for dealing with current intelligence and JIC papers. I should like in this letter to deal in greater detail with these procedures, as well as with the part played by CIA in contributing to current intelligence, and the routine followed in approving UK JIC papers and commenting on US NIEs and Canadian JIC papers. I should also like to make some suggestions as to the part that might be played by the JIC Liaison Officer, London.

Current Intelligence

2. Each Tuesday three Heads of Section meetings are held to discuss important items of current intelligence that have come to light during the week on the Western Sector (including the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe), the Far East and the Middle East. These meetings are attended at the desk level by all departments at Whitehall dealing with intelligence and include a CIA representative and the JICLO(L). The procedure is for each department that so wishes to contribute a draft paper and the meeting then either approves, amends, or decides not to use these drafts. The Heads of Section produce two summaries:

(a) The Weekly Review of Current Intelligence (Grey Book).

This Review is designed for a wide circulation, is fairly detailed, does not include "Special Material" intelligence, and does not require approval of the JIC. Appropriate parts of this Review are sent to NATO. Ten copies of the Review are sent to Ottawa by this office each week.

(b) The Draft Survey of Current Intelligence (Red Book).

This survey receives final approval at the JIC meetings each Thursday morning. It is designed to contain the most important items of intelligence from all sources and receives a limited distribution of fifty copies which go to the Queen, certain Cabinet Ministers, the Chiefs of Staff, and selected Permanent Under-Secretaries. It is this draft that is now signalled on the Alert net to Ottawa on Tuesday evenings.

3. Each Thursday morning the UK JIC approves the Red Book and makes any necessary additions or changes. The senior CIA representative in London and the JICLO(L) attend for this item on the UK JIC agenda. Amendments and changes are now to be wired by the UK JIC Secretariat over the Alerts net to Ottawa after this meeting.

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CIA Contributions to Current Intelligence

4. Heads of Section Meetings. The CIA representative comes to these meetings with contributions based on CIA summaries and these are treated in the same way as contributions from other departments. This means, in effect, that from time to time UK Current Intelligence Summaries will contain material from US sources.

5. JIC Meetings. The draft Survey of Current Intelligence is wired back to Washington for comments and the CIA representative comes to each JIC meeting with his own amendments or additions. These are either included in the Survey if the JIC agrees, or if it is decided that an item should not be included in the Survey then it is recorded in the minutes. The CIA representative also gives a copy of these amendments and/or additions to the Canadian JIC Liaison Officer.

UK JIC and Canadian JIC Papers and US NIEs.

6. Important UK JIC papers are discussed and approved at the JIC level and, depending on the subject, the CIA and Canadian JIC representatives are invited (a recent example was the UK Paper entitled "The Likelihood of Global War between the Sino-Soviet Bloc and the Free World"). Less important papers and reference papers are discussed and approved by the Deputy Directors, JIC, who also comment on all US NIEs and any Canadian JIC papers on which we might ask UK views.

7. The usual form insofar as UK JIC papers are concerned is for the CIA representative and presumably the Canadian representative, if they so wish, to raise any general points of agreement or disagreement or elicit the thinking behind a given paper. Comments on NIEs are made with the CIA representative present and he transmits the comments to Washington. The same procedure would apply when comments were being made on a Canadian paper.

Suggestions on the Role of the Canadian JIC Liaison Officer, London.

8. Heads of Section Meetings. I realize that the JIC Liaison Officer, London, will not be able to take part in the discussions at these meetings in the same manner as the CIA representative, that is by providing "national" contributions. However, on the basis of the Weekly Indications Report and a reading of appropriate telegrams at Canada House he should be able to play a constructive part in these meetings. One great aid to the JICLO(L) at these meetings would be the regular sending of the Daily Indications Report on the HICLON net as this would provide a more up-to-date appreciation of the views of the Canadian JIC.

9. UK JIC Meetings. While it would be difficult to produce complete Canadian JIC comments on the draft UK Weekly Survey of Intelligence in the manner of CIA, it should be possible at this meeting for the Canadian JIC Liaison Officer to put forward the Canadian JIC view when it differs or has something to add to the UK Intelligence Survey. I should like to suggest that the Canadian JIC, when it wishes to bring to the attention of the UK JIC a difference of assessment between the Draft Survey and the Weekly Indications Report, or when it has additional intelligence which it considers would be useful to the UK JIC, should instruct the JIC Liaison Officer to place these views before the UK JIC. These instructions could be sent to this office with the signal sending the Weekly Indications Report, which arrives in London each Thursday morning in time for the UK JIC

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meeting.

10. If arrangements can be made along these lines they should go a long way towards demonstrating to the UK intelligence community that the Canadians have an independent and useful contribution to make from time to time in the wider intelligence context and that the Tripartite Alerts System Agreement does not just mean a Canadian observer at most important London intelligence meetings with no contribution in return.

11. Comments on UK JIC and Canadian JIC Papers. When UK JIC papers are under discussion and the JICLO(L) is in attendance he should probably follow the same form as the CIA representative, that is to elicit the thinking behind the paper when it is not clear and put forward any differences in the Canadian view if there is a recent Canadian JIC paper on the same subject. If the UK JIC wishes to have Canadian comments on one of their own papers they will presumably make such a request through their own JIC representative in Ottawa.

12. Insofar as Canadian JIC papers are concerned I realize that in the past few years we have stopped asking the UK JIC for comments on our papers largely because we were unable, for staff reasons, to reciprocate with comments on UK papers. Now that there are JIC representatives in Ottawa and London and the two intelligence communities have closer relations than even before, it would, I suggest, be useful to the Canadian JIC to have from time to time UK JIC comments on particular papers. I see no difficulty in asking for these comments within reason and when they have been collated, I would be invited to a meeting of the Deputy Directors, JIC to receive these comments and transmit them to Ottawa. As an example, UK comments on the recent Canadian JIC paper on North Africa (JIC 293/2(58)(Final)) should prove useful to Ottawa as this is the first time the Canadian JIC have undertaken a comprehensive paper on this part of the world and I have, on my own responsibility, suggested to the JIC here that we should be interested in any comments that they might wish to make.

13. To summarize, therefore, I shall look forward to receiving in due course JIC views on whether or not

- (a) Daily Indications Reports can be sent regularly to this office;
- (b) Canadian comments and/or amendments to the Draft UK Weekly Survey of Intelligence will be sent to this office from time to time for presentation at the Thursday morning meetings of the UK JIC;
- (c) The Canadian JIC will ask from time to time for UK JIC comments on Canadian papers.

14. I shall also look forward to any other views the Committee might have on improving the liaison functions of the JICLO(L).

15. I would appreciate it if you would bring this letter to the attention of the members of the JIC.

1. The Canadian Government has received an invitation from the Australian High Commissioner on behalf of the Australian Minister for Defence to send delegates to a conference to take place in Melbourne from November 17-27, 1958. See Appendix "A" attached.

2. The object of the conference will be to discuss methods, organization, procurement, cooperation and other intelligence technique subjects of mutual interest to the participants. Invitations have been sent to the Joint Intelligence Bureaux of the Commonwealth countries, the Central Intelligence Agency and some observers from other intelligence divisions or agencies including those of the armed services. It is also understood that the intelligence element of the US State Department is sending a delegation.

3. The JIC consider that this conference will be most valuable and that its timing is most opportune. All the participants are being faced with the problem of planning the methods and techniques they will employ and the attendant organizational features to deal with an increasing diversification and intensification of Soviet activity in their subjects and areas of responsibility. On the one hand is the increasing potential of the Sino-Soviet Bloc for non-military activity of an economic nature through external trade and aid, and the increasing scientific and technical challenge. On the other hand are the technical advances in the military threat and the worsening intelligence position concerning military threats involving guided missiles. Particularly in relation to the extremely difficult problems of technique in both the DSI and JIB fields of concern with guided missiles and nuclear weapons, future progress is going to depend on the freest exchange of ideas about approaches to these subjects, and the closest cooperation on the problems of procurement and exploitation which arise therefrom.

4. The US and UK authorities attach importance to this conference and are sending large and senior delegations. The conference in Australia will be sponsored and opened by the Minister for Defence. Mr. Casey, the Australian Minister for External Affairs has been invited to give a lecture.

5. The conference differs in important respects from the other Commonwealth Conferences being held in Australia this year on Defence Science and on Clothing and General Stores. It is not exclusively a Commonwealth Conference but is jointly organized by the US. Secondly, it is not an annual or periodic conference. No similar conference has been held in the twelve

years that the organizations concerned have been in existence and there is no proposal that such conferences should be held periodically, so that there is no assurance that we shall get another equally good opportunity to pool our experiences on these subjects.

The greatest value of this conference will be in the syndicate discussions and in the personal contacts which are made. The JIG considers that to derive full benefit from this opportunity the delegation must consist of enough people with appropriate knowledge to cover all aspects of the conference and to participate in all the syndicates which will be running concurrently. The JIG also considers that the delegation should consist of three senior members, the Directors of JIB and DSI and a second senior delegate from JIB, Mr. D.A. Gamfield, Chief of the JIB Estimates and Research Division.

Distribution of JIC Papers in Washington

With reference to your Memorandum - your file CSC 1769-1 (JIC) dated 22 August, my comments on the points raised in your para. 5 are as follows:

2. The Chairman, CJS wishes to receive a copy of all JIC Papers which are sent to me, including JIC Minutes.
3. It is unnecessary for copies of the Minutes to be sent to the alternate JIC/IO(W) since this officer works in the Joint Staff and will be able to see the Chairman's copy.
4. I believe that the circulation of the JIC Minutes within the CJS, Washington, should be at the discretion of the Chairman and, within the Canadian Embassy at the discretion of the JIC/IO(W), subject to the wishes of the Ambassador.
5. I agree with Mr. Black that it is only necessary to send the Daily Indications Report in times of crisis.
6. An important additional factor to be considered in the distribution of JIC Papers to the JIC/IO(W) is the need for him to have sufficient background on which to seek information and advice useful to the JIC. In this connection finished papers are often of less value than drafts and proposals which are still in the preparatory stage. There is very little a liaison officer can do with a finished paper except present it and perhaps add some words of explanation. During the preparatory stages of a paper, however, he can often provide useful information from US sources. The JIC may therefore wish to consider the advisability of broadening the distribution of draft papers, particularly in their early stages, to take full advantage of the opportunities open to JICLO's.

Dear Hamilton,

Please excuse my omission to acknowledge earlier your letter of 25th July (50028-A-2-40) about the designation of Ewans as Liaison Officer on behalf of the J.I.C. (London) with J.I.C. (Ottawa). I have been away on leave since the 31st July and did not see your letter until yesterday.

I look forward to bringing Ewans down to call on you at an early date, and will get in touch with you to arrange a convenient time.

I have not yet received specific terms of reference, but will send these along on receipt. I confirm that he will in due course take over the function of transmission of J.I.C. (London) papers to the Secretary of the J.I.C. here.

I have informed London that the relationship with the officer on the United Kingdom Service Liaison staff who has been handling Liaison for the United Kingdom J.I.C. should be made clear. Subject to any comments from London, I think that the simplest arrangement will be for our Service Liaison staff to drop the function altogether and not resume it whenever Ewans may be away: I can make interim arrangements.

As I informed you, we should be very glad to arrange for Ewans to attend the weekly meeting of the J.I.C. for consideration of the Weekly Indications Report. I am informing the authorities in London of the procedure set out in your letter to enable any comments from London on the J.I.R. draft to be available to Ewans in the discussion. You will realize that the timetable is likely to prove a bit tight but it ought to be possible to obtain comments in cases of urgency.

Distribution of JIC Papers in London and Washington

1. At the 613th meeting the JIC considered a letter dated 9 Jun 58 from the JICLO(L) containing proposals concerning the distribution of JIC papers in London. A copy of this letter is attached for your information.
2. The Committee felt that the policy covering the distribution of JIC papers to the Chairman, CJS London, and to the JICLO(L) should, if possible, be the same as the policy covering the distribution of such papers to the Chairman, CJS Washington, and to the JICLO(W). The Committee decided that the Secretary would prepare for consideration at a future meeting recommendations covering the distribution, in future, of JIC papers and of minutes of JIC meetings to the Chairmen, CJSs London and Washington, and to the JICLOs London and Washington.
3. Attached for information is a copy of a letter dated 11 Jul 58 from the Secretary JIC to the JICLO(L) concerning the latter's proposals, and Mr. Black's reply thereto under file 15-10-1-1 dated 8 Aug 58.
4. I feel that our hurried conversation of 15 Aug on this subject did not provide for adequate consideration of it. It would, therefore, be helpful if you would let me have at your early convenience your comments on the distribution of JIC papers and of minutes of JIC meetings to the Chairman, CJS Washington, and to yourself. In this connection I note that you receive a copy of all JIC papers that are distributed to US authorities, and such other papers as the JIC may decide from time to time (Item IX of minutes of 563rd meeting). The Chairman, CJS Washington, receives a copy of all JIC papers sent to the US JIC and such other papers as the JIC may decide from time to time. I also note that the Chairman, CJS Washington, has adequate facilities to handle special material.
5. In particular I would like to receive your comments on:
 - (a) The requirement, if any, for the Chairman, CJS Washington, to receive a copy of all JIC papers sent to you.
 - (b) The requirement, if any, for a copy of the minutes of JIC meetings to be sent to the alternate JICLO(W).
 - (c) The circulation of your copy of the minutes of JIC meetings within the CJS Washington and within the Canadian Embassy, Washington.

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- (d) The requirement, if any, for you to receive the JIR Daily Indications Report (message JS 488 of 24 Sep 57 refers).
- (e) Any other aspects of this subject which you may care to raise.
6. I am sending a copy of this letter to Mr. Black for his information.
7. Kindly let me have your views on the above at an early date, please.

JIC Papers for CJS London

I refer to your letter of July 11 (CSC 1769-1 (JIC) on this subject.

Group Captain Burgess and I have again discussed this question and he has confirmed that CJS are now receiving their own copy of the Joint Intelligence Summary and Canadian JIC papers. We would hope that this arrangement would be continued and that whenever the JIC decides to distribute a copy of a paper to JICLO(L), another copy would automatically go to the CJS.

With regard to JIC Minutes, Group Captain Burgess and I consider that in view of the distance between Canada House and CJS and the fact that there are a number of senior officers in both that have occasion to read these minutes from time to time, with consequent delays, it would be a great convenience, if one copy was sent to me as JICLO(L) and one to CJS for Burgess as alternate JICLO(L).

The above suggestion would not, however, apply to JIC papers containing "Special Material" nor to annexes to JIC Minutes containing "Special Material". CJS have no facilities for storing this material and whenever a document of this type of interest to CJS arrives in London, Group Captain Burgess reads it in the office of the JICLO(L). However, it would be of great help to Burgess and myself, for the reasons explained above, if ordinary Canadian JIC papers and Minutes were sent to both of us at the same time.

With regard to the JIR Weekly Indications Report, and the Daily Indications Report in times of crisis, Group Captain Burgess sees these in this office. We have also made arrangements whereby the JICLO(L) gives an intelligence briefing to the Chairman, Joint Staff and certain of his senior officers every two weeks.

With reference to your paragraph 6, I should prefer not to receive the JIR Daily Indications Report in normal times as it is not absolutely necessary and the load on our Communications staff in London is already very heavy. If, however, there is a crisis, such as at present, and the Canadian JIR and/or the UK JIC are on an alert status, the Daily Indications Report should be sent. I would, however, like to review this question in October once the UK JIR is established and my own day-to-day relations with it are clearer than they are at present.

Informal Liaison with JIC(FE) Singapore

In March this year Mr. Arthur Menzies, lately the Head of this Department's Far Eastern Division, took up his present appointment as the first High Commissioner for Canada in Malaya. On Mr. Menzies' way through Singapore to Kuala Lumpur, he called upon Sir Robert Scott, United Kingdom Commissioner General in Southeast Asia, and later on his Deputy, Mr. Dennis Greenhill, who also acts as Chairman of the JIC(FE). With the prior agreement of this Department, Mr. Menzies told Mr. Greenhill that he would be glad to see any JIC(FE) papers which they thought would be of interest to a Canadian, and that he would like to talk informally to some of the Committee members when he visited Singapore from time to time. Mr. Menzies made it clear that he did not wish to establish a formal relationship which would imply an increased Canadian security interest in the area.

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



As a result of our recent discussions when I was in Ottawa and of the useful liaison which Mr. Black is developing with us here, it has occurred to me that it might be valuable if we were to nominate someone to act as Liaison Officer with JIC(Canada) in Ottawa.



JIC Papers for CJS London

1. I refer to your letter under file 15-10-1-1 dated 9 Jul 58 on this subject.
2. A review of the distribution list for the Joint Intelligence Summary indicates that Copy No. 82 is forwarded direct to the Chairman, CJS London, and that Copy No. 98 is sent direct to you.
3. Your request that a copy of all Canadian JIC papers and a copy of the minutes of JIC meetings be sent direct to the Chairman, CJS London, was considered at a recent meeting (613th) of the JIC. As you know, the distribution of each JIC paper is determined by the Committee when it approves the final draft of the paper. The Committee decides such distribution on the content of the paper, the distribution of previous and/or similar papers on the subject, and on a need-to-know basis. However, the Committee always ensures that a copy is sent direct to the Chairman, CJS London, of all papers released to the UK JIC. In fact the copies of JIC papers for the UK JIC were sent in the past to the Chairman, CJS London, along with a copy for his file. When you were about to assume your duties as JICLO(L) the Committee decided that you would be sent a copy of "all JIC papers which were distributed to the UK JIC and such other papers as the Committee may decide from time to time" (Item VI of the 596th meeting and para. 4(c)(vi) of CSC 1769-1 (JIC) of 22 Apr 58). At the same time the Committee decided that "copies of Canadian JIC papers for the Chairman, CJS London, would continue to be sent direct to CJS London" (Item VI of the 596th meeting and para. 4(g) of CSC 1769-1 (JIC) of 22 Apr 58). At the 613th meeting of the Committee it was not clear if the suggested arrangements in your letter under reference concerning JIC papers were to ensure that the Chairman, CJS London, receive direct a copy of all JIC papers sent to you or whether you were suggesting that, in future, a copy of all JIC papers be sent direct to the Chairman, CJS London. Presumably, if the latter applied, you would also require a copy of all JIC papers.
4. It would also be helpful if you would indicate if the copy of JIC minutes that you suggest be sent direct to CJS London would be for circulation within that Headquarters, or for G/C Burgess in his capacity as alternate JICLO(L).
5. Would you kindly advise if the Chairman, CJS London, has adequate facilities to handle special material. The Committee desires this information as your suggested arrangements might include the despatch direct to the Chairman, CJS London, of the special appendices to the minutes of JIC meetings as well as JIC Weekly Indications Reports,

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SECRET

NORACTs, Semi-Annual Review of the North, and possibly JIR Daily Indications Reports. It should be noted that in message JSL 216 of 10 Apr 57 the Chairman, CJS London, advised that there was no secure room available at CJS London to handle special material and that G/C Burgess would see the JIC Weekly Indications Report at the UK JIC.

6. Possibly you could now advise if you wish to receive in future, for your personal background information only, the JIR Daily Indications Report (Item VI of the 596th meeting and para. 4(e) of CSC 1769-1 (JIC) of 22 Apr 58). If you require these reports, kindly let me have your views on whether they should be sent in future to G/C Burgess as well.

7. The Committee felt that the policy covering the distribution of JIC papers to the Chairman, CJS London, and the JICLO(L) should, if possible, be the same as the policy covering the distribution of such papers to the Chairman, CJS Washington, and the JICLO(W). As I have been instructed to prepare recommendations covering the distribution, in future, of JIC papers and of minutes of JIC meetings to the Chairmen, CJSs London and Washington, and to the JICLOs London and Washington, it would be helpful if I could have your views on the above points at your early convenience, please.

Liaison Visits - U.K.

1. Quite frequently the various Services at this Headquarters are requested to arrange itineraries and appointments for Service and civilian members of DND to visit industry and Defence establishments in the U.K.
2. This is a normal function of the staff here but, on occasion, it has been found that unnecessary inconvenience has been occasioned by individuals altering the itinerary which has been laid on by CJS(L) without adequate notice. Further, it has been noted that on occasion civilian members of DND visiting the U.K. do not check in with Canadian Joint Staff and when it becomes necessary to contact them considerable difficulty has been experienced. Additionally, in this vein, some personnel with individual contacts in the U.K. are prone to arrange visits on a personal basis and, of course, this makes it extremely difficult for members of the staff to properly co-ordinate their visits.
3. It should be noted that when visits to U.K. industry working on defence contracts are involved, there is a certain degree of security clearance which must be arranged. This cannot always be done quickly and reasonable notice of the visit is required.
4. The individual firms to be visited normally have to make arrangements for members of the staff to meet and conduct the Canadian visitors through their firm. Any undue change in the time of visiting, therefore, puts the firm in question to inconvenience and adversely affects the relations between the Canadian Forces and the industry.
5. To prevent this type of incident occurring, it is requested that the following procedure be established for all sections of the Department of National Defence:-
 - (a) That six weeks notice of the intention to visit the U.K., with specific details as to the nature of information which is desired and the industry or government department that it is desired to visit.
 - (b) On receipt of information in (a), the appropriate Service will prepare a detailed itinerary and make the necessary arrangements for visits. It should be possible to communicate the itinerary to the respective Services well in advance of the



commencement of the tour.

- (c) The visitor should adhere strictly to the itinerary prepared by the Service at CJS(L) and last-minute changes and direct personal contacts avoided at all times.
- (d) On initial arrival in the U.K., the visitor should report to CJS(L) and, if making private arrangements for accommodation, inform the appropriate Service where he may be located at any time he is in the U.K.

If these few simple rules could be adhered to, it would certainly make it possible to ensure that visitors' tours are productive and avoid the considerable waste of time which is sometimes occasioned by trying to locate personnel on matters of important official or unofficial business.

It would be appreciated, therefore, if a system in keeping with the above requirements could be instituted.



(OSC 1769-1 (JIC) of 16 and 19 Jun 58)

38. Mr. Bowen suggested that UK JIC papers for the Canadian JIC should be released by the Commonwealth Relations Office (CRO) to Canada House in London.

39. G/C Ingalls stated that we were being considered in this matter along with the other members of the Commonwealth. He felt that we should be considered in the light of our special arrangements with the UK on the exchange of intelligence.

40. Mr. Bowen opposed the UK proposal. He felt that we were in a position to name the point at which we would wish to receive UK JIC papers. We would be better able to ensure the most rapid receipt of important papers if they were delivered in London to the JICLO(L) at Canada House. The CRO could send a copy of their papers to their High Commissioner in Ottawa. We would have no objection to passing a copy of our JIC papers to Earncliffe if this was their wish.

41. It was agreed:

- (a) to approve the despatch of the suggested reply, as amended; and
- (b) to note that further representations could be made should the proposed system for the distribution of UK JIC papers break down.

1. The JIC at a recent meeting considered a proposal, which the Under-Secretary of State had raised with the CCOS, to appoint a foreign service officer with intelligence experience at the First Secretary level to the High Commissioner's staff in London as the senior representative of the Canadian JIC in London. The CCOS had requested JIC views on this proposal.

2. The committee noted that the UK Government had recently changed the constitutional position of their JIC and had placed it within the Cabinet Committee structure. The UK JIC now reports to the Secretary to the Cabinet except that, in order to meet the special requirements of the Chiefs of Staff, it submits reports of a mainly military nature direct to them in the first instance. The reasons for this change are briefly that in present international conditions intelligence has spread into the political, economic and scientific fields, that not all these subjects concerned the Chiefs of Staff and that the broadened scope of intelligence therefore required a constitutional change.

3. The JIC agreed with the principle of having a representative of the Department of External Affairs appointed as its senior representative to the UK JIC. In this connection the committee felt that this appointment should not disturb any existing liaison arrangements between members and their opposite numbers in the UK. In order to ensure that no doubt would arise on this point it was agreed that the representative of the Department of External Affairs should be appointed as senior representative of the Canadian JIC to the UK JIC as a body. The committee noted that the proposal of the Under-Secretary of State for External Affairs was that Mr. E.P. Black, the present External Affairs member of the Joint Intelligence Staff who was being posted to London to maintain liaison on behalf of External Affairs with the UK SIS, would also be appointed senior Canadian JIC liaison officer to the UK JIC.

4. The JIC also agreed with the provision in this proposal that the Executive Staff Officer to the Chairman, Canadian Joint Staff, London who is the present JIC Liaison Officer London should continue as alternative JIC Liaison Officer since the UK JIC has maintained an important link with the UK Chiefs of Staff. The committee noted that this provision would provide continuity in its representation in London should the senior liaison officer be away from London or otherwise not available for liaison duties. The committee felt that the provision of an alternate liaison officer was necessary and desirable.

5. The JIC agreed with the proposed terms of reference for the JIC Liaison Officer London as amended in accordance with para 3 above. These terms of reference are at appendix attached.

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6. The High Commissioner in London and the Chairman, CJS London have concurred in this proposal.

7. The JIC recommends that the Chiefs of Staff approve:

- a. That a representative of the Department of External Affairs be appointed as senior representative of the Canadian JIC to the UK JIC as a body.
- b. The attached terms of reference for the JIC Liaison Officer in London.

JIC Liaison Officer London

1. The JIC at a recent meeting considered a proposal, which the Under-Secretary of State had raised with the CCOS, to appoint a foreign service officer with intelligence experience at the First Secretary level to the High Commissioner's staff in London as the senior representative of the Canadian JIC in London. The CCOS had requested JIC views on this proposal.

2. The committee noted that the UK Government had recently changed the constitutional position of their JIC and had placed it within the Cabinet Committee structure. The UK JIC now reports to the Secretary to the Cabinet except that, in order to meet the special requirements of the Chiefs of Staff, it submits reports of a mainly military nature direct to them in the first instance. The reasons for this change are briefly that in present international conditions intelligence has spread into the political, economic and scientific fields, that not all these subjects concerned the Chiefs of Staff and that the broadened scope of intelligence therefore required a constitutional change.

3. The JIC agreed with the principle of having a representative of the Department of External Affairs appointed as its senior representative to the UK JIC. In this connection the committee felt that this appointment should not disturb any existing liaison arrangements between members and their opposite numbers in the UK. In order to ensure that no doubt would arise on this point it was agreed that the representative of the Department of External Affairs should be appointed as senior representative of the Canadian JIC to the UK JIC as a body. The committee noted that the proposal of the Under-Secretary of State for External Affairs was that Mr. E.P. Black, the present External Affairs member of the Joint Intelligence Staff who was being posted to London to maintain liaison on behalf of External Affairs with the UK SIS, would also be appointed senior Canadian JIC liaison officer to the UK JIC.

4. The JIC also agreed with the provision in this proposal that the Executive Staff Officer to the Chairman, Canadian Joint Staff, London who is the present JIC Liaison Officer London should continue as alternative JIC Liaison Officer since the UK JIC has maintained an important link with the UK Chiefs of Staff. The committee noted that this provision would provide continuity in its representation in London should the senior liaison officer be away from London or otherwise not available for liaison duties. The committee felt that the provision of an alternate liaison officer was necessary and desirable.

5. The JIC agreed with the proposed terms of reference for the JIC Liaison Officer London as amended in accordance with para 3 above. These terms of reference are at appendix attached.

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

"When you were here in September, we discussed a Commonwealth-United States Intelligence Conference, to cover those aspects of intelligence methods, techniques, organisations etc. which are of particular interest to C.I.A. and the Joint Intelligence Bureaux. At that time it had not been decided where the conference would be held.

I have now heard from Harold King, that following discussions between the New Zealand Prime Minister's Department and the Australian Department of Defence, it has been agreed that Melbourne would be a more suitable venue than Wellington. Harold King has told me semi-officially that the Australian Department of Defence will be pleased to act as hosts for the conference, and official invitations will presumably follow.

As regards the dates Harold King recommends some time between the middle of November and the middle of December 1958 and has asked me to suggest the exact days.

The Australians would like to know fairly soon how many will take part in the conference. As I think you were told in September, the J.I.B. London delegation will be five, including myself, and there may be one or two observers from other United Kingdom Intelligence Agencies.

43. The Chairman welcomed G/C Burgess to the meeting and asked if he had any points which he wished to raise regarding his duties.

44. G/C Burgess asked if he could be provided with a statement of JIC requirements. This would be helpful to him since it was his understanding that intelligence work was not his primary responsibility in CJS London.

45. The Chairman remarked that the Committee did not wish to create confusion by duplicating the intelligence being forwarded through service channels on service subjects. What was required was the most current information on UK JIC activities and views. He felt that the JIC liaison officer should be in a position to maintain close contact with the UK joint intelligence officers so that he would be in a position to report on their thinking rather than simply pass to Canada their formal printed reports.

46. Mr. Bowen remarked that the signals which G/C Burgess had been forwarding had been a very good reflection of the UK weekly intelligence digest and asked if G/C Burgess knew if the UK were publishing a special material supplement.

47. The Chairman said that he had prepared a signal to Mr. Dean on this question and he hoped to be able to inform the Committee of the results in the near future.

48. G/C Burgess mentioned that Mr. Dean had told him that he would try to arrange for G/C Burgess to attend some of the UK JIC meetings.

49. The Chairman said that he did not wish to press for this because of the difficulties involved in making reciprocal arrangements in Ottawa. He asked if there were facilities in CJS London for the safe storage of special material.

50. G/C Burgess said that no arrangements had been made as yet.

51. Mr. Bowen pointed out that G/C Burgess was the only Canadian link with the UK on indications intelligence, and a general discussion ensued regarding the difficulties of the passage of special material between G/C Burgess and the Canadian JIC.

52. Mr. Bowen raised the question of G/C Burgess' responsibilities in connection with the obtaining of UK JIC views on current situations for the Canadian JIC and for the briefing of the Canadian High Commissioner.

53. The Chairman pointed out some of the problems arising from Mr. Dean's position in the Foreign Office and undertook to write to the Canadian High Commissioner asking for his views on this question.

54. The Chairman pointed out that he foresaw possible difficulties arising out of a conflict between G/C Burgess' responsibilities to the JIS and his other responsibilities in CJS London.

55. G/C Burgess said that it was his understanding that his other duties came first, and that his responsibilities to the JIC were secondary.

9. Mr. O'Neill referred to Col. Cook's impending return from London, pointing out that his successor designate, G/C Burgess, would not be indoctrinated until after the former had signed off. He suggested that this might affect our "indications channels" arrangements and that there might well be other required intelligence from special sources.

10. Mr. Bowen stressed the importance of our liaison arrangements with the UK, especially at this time.

11. Capt. Lucas suggested that, if there were to be more than a few days without an incumbent, it would be expedient to nominate another officer from CJS London to carry out the intelligence duties of G/C Burgess until such time as he was available.

12. The Chairman suggested that G/C Burgess be again invited to the JIC for briefing, especially in regard to his duties with respect to the JIR. He also suggested that the temporary terms of reference of the JIR be made available to G/C Burgess, and that he should visit the JIR.

13. W/C Gordon said that he would make enquiries concerning the expected date of arrival of G/C Burgess in London and inform the Chairman JIC accordingly.

14. The Committee agreed:

- (a) to invite G/C Burgess to the JIC for further briefing and to have him visit the JIR as well;
- (b) to provide G/C Burgess with a copy of the temporary terms of reference of the JIR; and
- (c) to arrange, if necessary, through the Secretary, Chiefs of Staff, to nominate an officer from CJS London to carry out the intelligence duties of G/C Burgess until such time as he is available.

NOTE: I am informed that G/C Burgess has an SA clearance, but has not yet been indoctrinated. This can be done in London. I am also informed that G/C Burgess is due to arrive in the UK on 8 Aug, and will report for duty shortly thereafter.

9. The Committee had for consideration a message from CJS, London requesting two amendments to the terms of reference for the Canadian Intelligence Liaison Officer:

- (a) The title of the appointment be "Canadian Joint Intelligence Liaison Officer".
- (b) The addition of item (e) "Attending such intelligence conferences as may be considered desirable from time to time".

10. The Chairman agreed with CJS, London that the title "Canadian Joint Intelligence Liaison Officer" might be more appropriate for this appointment. However, he felt that the suggested item (e) might be misinterpreted. It was for the JIC to decide which conferences the liaison officer was to attend, not CJS London, since the views expressed at these conferences would be Canadian and would be provided by the JIC.

11. It was agreed, after discussion, that the following recommendations be submitted to the CCOS for approval:

- (a) The title of the intelligence liaison officer at CJS London be "Canadian Joint Intelligence Liaison Officer".
- (b) The addition of item (e) "Attending such intelligence conferences as may be considered desirable by the JIC" to the terms of reference for this appointment. 20



Dear Pat,

Many thanks for your letter of July 15, in which you told me that your colleagues are in agreement that a close liaison is desirable between our Committee here and the J.I.C. in London, and that you intend to invite representatives of our Joint Staff in London to attend appropriate meetings from time to time. The visit which Bowen paid to you early in July was most useful from our point of view and I am glad to know that you felt his contribution was also of value from your end. I expect that we shall be sending shortly new instructions to the C.J.S. in London with a view to having an officer spend somewhat more time on J.I.C. matters than has been the case hitherto. I have discussed the question with my colleagues and our feeling here is that a specific officer should be nominated by us to deal with most of our business. This does not rule out any invitation which you might feel could be appropriately issued to the Chairman of the Joint Staff but would, I think, ensure that we had one officer who was specifically charged with day-to-day J.I.C. business. While it is true that Colonel Cook has been functioning to some degree in this role, we feel that fresh instructions are probably required. Meanwhile you should continue to regard Colonel Cook as our principal agent for J.I.C. business.

We welcome the prospect of closer liaison with Air Commodore Roberts in Ottawa and your Deputy High Commissioner has already mentioned this prospect to me. I now intend to inform him that we shall regard A/C Roberts as your J.I.C. liaison officer in Ottawa and I hope he will feel free to call on me at any time. So far as attendance at J.I.C. meetings is concerned, however, I know you will appreciate that we are in some difficulty with regard to our American colleagues. I am not anxious that it should be known that your liaison officer here is invited to J.I.C. meetings since we are not prepared to invite the C.I.A. representative in Ottawa and I think the best course would be if we asked A/C Roberts only to those meetings where we might discuss U.K. papers. I do not at the moment see when we would ever be able to invite both liaison officers to attend so long as their attendance might inhibit discussion. I hope, therefore, that you and your colleagues will understand that if we do not invite A/C Roberts very often to meetings it is not for lack of desire for a closer liaison. I think, however, the problem can be satisfactorily met by our liaison with you through our officer in London on the one hand and by more frequent discussions both

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individually and severally between the members of the Committee here and A/C Roberts. I know that you will treat the foregoing remarks as personal, though I have no objection to you passing them on orally to your colleagues. It would be most embarrassing if they got to the ears of our American friends.

As we see it, Canadian papers and comments will be passed to your Committee through our liaison officer in London, while your papers with comments will be passed to us through A/C Roberts. What I think is needed probably on both sides is better briefings for our respective officers than we have given in the past.

I do hope that these arrangements will bring us closer together and, in addition, I hope that any slack will be taken up by not too infrequent visits in both directions across the Atlantic.

You are no doubt aware that the UK JIC has nominated A/C D.N. Roberts of the UK Service Liaison Staff here as the officer to be responsible for liaison between the UK JIC and the Canadian JIC. In addition, they have suggested that it will be desirable to invite a member of CJS, London to appropriate meetings of the UK JIC from time to time. This practice has already begun.

We cannot object to the nomination of A/C Roberts to represent the UK JIC in Ottawa, but he will be invited sparingly to meet with the JIC here to discuss UK JIC papers. Neither can we object if the UK wish to present their views and opinions to our JIC through A/C Roberts, although you might suggest that it would be useful if you were to receive copies of UK papers and views at the same time as they were sent to A/C Roberts here. We propose to continue to pass Canadian views on JIC matters to the UK JIC through CJS, London. However, in order to expedite the flow of information between the UK and Canadian JICs, and to ensure that Canadian views are adequately expressed at UK JIC meetings, I consider that it would be desirable to appoint a specific officer from the staff of CJS, London to act as Canadian JIC liaison officer between the two Committees. Terms of reference for this appointment have been prepared by the JIC and are given below. I should be grateful if you would arrange for a member of your staff (possibly Col. Cook) to undertake these duties in order to maintain between the two Committees that close relationship which we consider essential to our intelligence organization.

In addition, I hope that it will be possible to arrange for Col. Cook, or the officer you appoint, to attend SHAPE and other intelligence conferences when the Canadian JIC is represented, and I propose to arrange that members of the JIC in London on JIC duties will make contact with this officer.

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In order to expedite the exchange of views between the two Committees, you should authorize the Canadian JIC liaison officer on your staff to deal directly with Secretary JIC, Ottawa, either by letter or telegram. This arrangement should expedite the handling of JIC business at this end. This arrangement does not, of course, preclude you from raising any questions of vital importance with me directly, but for the sake of speed I believe this channel should be used sparingly.

TERMS OF REFERENCE FOR CANADIAN INTELLIGENCE LIAISON OFFICER ON STAFF OF CJS, LONDON

The Canadian intelligence liaison officer in London will be responsible for:

- (a) Arranging for the rapid flow of documents from the Canadian JIC to the UK JIC Secretariat.
- (b) Attending meetings of the UK JIC when invited and expressing the views of the Canadian JIC at these meetings.
- (c) Taking all other such measures as may be necessary to maintain and encourage a close relationship between the work of the two JICs.
- (d) Communicating directly with the Secretary, JIC, Ottawa on JIC matters.

During my visit to Ottawa we discussed ways of strengthening the links between your JIC organization and ours. My colleagues are unanimous in agreeing that very close liaison is desirable, and JIC (London) will invite representatives of your Joint Staff in London to attend appropriate meetings from time to time. As you know, we had a good first meeting on July 8 at which Ivor Bowen contributed useful ideas to the discussion. I hope he found it as worthwhile as we did.

You may think there would also be advantage in our nominating an officer in Ottawa to be at the call of your JIC on suitable occasions. We have therefore consulted General Nye. He is much in favour of closer liaison, and has named Air Commodore D.N. Roberts, of the UK Services Liaison Staff, as the officer for liaison in Ottawa if you wish to take advantage of this possibility.

DISCUSSION WITH REAR ADMIRAL SIR ANTHONY BUZZARD
DIRECTOR OF NAVAL INTELLIGENCE, ADMIRALTY

(SECRET)

1. Cdr. Pratt introduced Rear Admiral Buzzard and suggested an informal exchange of views on current intelligence problems.
2. Rear Admiral Buzzard outlined the present UK JIC views of the likelihood of war and the estimate of Soviet capabilities. He spoke also of the need to arrive at an estimate of probable Soviet strategic intentions.
3. The Committee expressed appreciation for Rear Admiral Buzzard's visit and the discussions that it had made possible.

DISCUSSION WITH MAJOR-GENERAL A.C. SHORTT
DIRECTOR OF MILITARY INTELLIGENCE, WAR OFFICE

(SECRET)

1. Mr. Glazebrook welcomed Maj.-Gen. Shortt and mentioned the value of the informal exchange of views that such a visit afforded. Mr. Glazebrook explained the aims, the responsibilities and the normal functions of the JIC, and the way in which JIC views are brought to the attention of the Chiefs of Staff and government officials and advisers.

2. Maj.-Gen. Shortt observed that the Canadian JIC operated in a manner similar to that of the UK JIC. He then explained the operation of the Standing Group ad hoc intelligence working group, of which he had been chairman at the meeting in Oct 52. This group had prepared the two estimates SG 161/3 and SG 161/4.

Maj.-Gen. Shortt also expressed views on a number of points which were raised.

3. The Committee noted Maj.-Gen. Shortt's remarks and expressed appreciation for his attendance at the meeting.

1. Your letter 22/CS/1 of 14 July, 1952 dealing with liaison arrangements between your Ministry of Supply and the National Research Council has been discussed with the Chairman of the Joint Intelligence Committee (Mr. G. de T. Glazebrook, Department of External Affairs).

2. It is considered that as the National Research Council is a government agency for which the Department of National Defence has no responsibility, it would appear inappropriate for the Joint Intelligence Committee to pass judgment on the adequacy of the security arrangements and channels involved.

3. It has, therefore, been suggested that you refer the matter to the office of your High Commissioner in Ottawa. Consultation with the appropriate government departments could then be arranged through the Department of External Affairs.

1. It has been the practice of the Ministry of Supply when dealing with requests from the National Research Council of Canada for classified documents, to send the documents through the Chief Scientific Liaison Officer at Canada House in London (at present Dr. J.G. Malloch), from whom the requests are usually received and who has been of great assistance to the Ministry of Supply. This procedure is a survival of a wartime practice.

2. It is understood that the National Research Council is not a Canadian Government Department in the normally accepted sense. I have been asked to confirm with you that this procedure is adequately covered by Canadian security arrangements and that our Ministry of Supply is correct in using this channel. I am directed to state that the UK JIC are checking the security of their own arrangements and not those of CANADA.

MEMORANDUM FOR CDRE. RAYNER:

Liaison Arrangements NRC-UK Establishments

1. On 25 Jul Mr. P. Bridle of Mr. Glazebrook's office informed me of a letter from Dr. Steacie, President, NRC, addressed to Mr. Glazebrook (in his capacity as Chairman, JIC). The letter stated that an arrangement whereby NRC has been receiving reports from UK defence establishments has been questioned and referred to the JIC (presumably the UK JIC). NRC has also been informed by the UK Ministry of Supply that reports are no longer available direct from previous sources.
2. Dr. Steacie's letter indicates great concern over this matter, and I assured Mr. Bridle that if and when any communication is received from the UK by DND, no decision would be made without consulting NRC, provided of course the communication comes through channels through which the Joint Staff has some control.
3. It is presumed that as the matter has been referred to the UK JIC, the UK authorities are examining the channels through which their various reports are being disseminated, and that, eventually, we should receive some word on this from GJS, London.
