

Dear Mr. MacKinnon:

I regret that because of further enquiries having had to be made into the question of maintenance of Indian children in reformatory institutions, I was unable to reply earlier to your letter of March 20th, in which you asked for further information about the payment of the per diem allowance.

Under the general scheme for the administration of justice and costs relating thereto established by the British North America Act, the provinces are responsible for the establishment, maintenance, and management of public and reformatory prisons. It is my understanding that this would include the maintenance of all persons lawfully committed. The fact that the offence is one under the Indian Act, or that the person convicted is an Indian would not appear to have any particular bearing. On the other hand, the federal authority has a definite responsibility for the establishment, maintenance and management of penitentiaries.

Because of the provinces' responsibility for the maintenance of reform institutions, this Department cannot, strictly speaking, be held responsible for the maintenance of the Indian children committed to such institutions, where the charges are under the Juvenile Delinquents' Act or the Criminal Code. The Department has, however, as a matter of policy, for the past several years accepted the maintenance costs where convictions were under the Juvenile Delinquents' Act.

This is the situation as it relates to the Province of Ontario, as well as your Province. As mentioned in your letter, a 90-cent per diem allowance is paid for certain Indian children placed in training schools conducted by the Province of Ontario. The conditions under which this allowance is paid are that the children concerned were charged under the Juvenile Delinquents' Act, that arrangements for their confinement in the schools were made by this Department, and, finally, that they had been resident on an Indian reserve at the time of conviction.

In my letter of October 24th, I referred in particular to the cases of [REDACTED] and [REDACTED]. You will recall that these children were placed in the St. Patrick's home at Halifax in 1948, and payment for their maintenance was made at your rate, since they had originally been placed in one of your institutions at our request. The other cases to which I referred at that time were cases of children who were convicted under the Criminal Code and sentenced to terms of two and three years on various charges. As these convictions were under the Criminal Code, the Department could not assume responsibility for their maintenance.

I trust that the foregoing will answer your enquiry about the payment of the per diem allowance and clear up any misunderstanding which may have arisen with respect to the maintenance of Indian children in reform institutions.



Dear Mr. MacNeil:

I am finally returning correspondence which you left with me a couple of months ago. Please excuse my delay in returning this material. I had held it as I wanted to see [REDACTED] before returning it so that I could give you some comments on him.

Due to some staff problems in our Agency, it took much longer to establish this contact than I had originally planned.

I saw [REDACTED] on a few occasions and he is quite anxious to continue seeing me on a regular basis. He seems to be getting along quite well but certainly needs an opportunity to discuss a lot of his feelings around the many negative experiences he has had during his life. He appears rather depressed at times, however, our contact should help him work out a lot of his problems. [REDACTED] seems happy in this home although there is still a slight feeling of distance present as there is with most children who are not with their own parents. The last time I visited, [REDACTED] complained that she found it difficult to care for [REDACTED] on the amount of board she is receiving. On this matter I merely referred her to you as I am not too clear on your board rates. As far as I know, [REDACTED] does receive as much as, or more than our foster parents.

I will continue to see [REDACTED] and will keep you informed from time to time on his progress.

If any problems arise in regard to [REDACTED] or any other



I acknowledge your letter of November 28th and wish to bring you up to date on the above-noted case.

This boy has been the subject of considerable correspondence and telephone calls between Montreal and this office.

I finally arranged to have him sent to this area and he arrived in Amherst on Tuesday, November 28th. I planned to leave that afternoon for your Agency, taking him with me, for on-the-spot discussions with Father Collins and yourself about his future.

I had arranged for him to drop off here so that we could interview him and discuss his case in detail. After our interview, we reached the conclusion that the Residential School would not be the best place for this boy and on Wednesday morning I took him to [redacted] to the home of his aunt, [redacted]

I had known [redacted] years ago and after discussing case with her and investigating the home, I felt that this is where [redacted] should be placed and left him there.

I proceeded to Halifax and intended calling on you on the return trip but I was plagued by a heavy cold and came home earlier than expected.

Although it might be argued that we are not responsible for this boy's maintenance, I feel that under the circumstances we are nevertheless justified in assuming it. Left in the Montreal area, he would obviously become seriously delinquent and turn into nothing but a hood.



Although his record does not read well, [redacted] appears to be a bright, intelligent and likeable child who, if given a chance, might make something of himself. He claims he is anxious to return to school and [redacted] says that she will see to this.

I would suggest that you complete a foster home placement application for this boy at the same rate paid by Children's Aid Societies in [redacted] (our Indian rate is somewhat lower I believe because we take into consideration the fact that Indian foster parents do not pay rent, taxes, medical expenses, etc. In this case I feel we should pay the prevalent rate for non-Indians).

Will you please forward such an application at your earliest convenience?



Dear Sir:

With reference to the above-named boy, he was referred to our Agency on March 7, 1961, by [REDACTED] as she found him unmanageable at home. Since the time of his referral the boy has appeared in Social Welfare Court on a charge of willfully damaging private property. The following is a brief summary of the social history of the family.

[REDACTED] the boy's sister, [REDACTED] and has a [REDACTED] old daughter. She accepted the responsibility of looking after [REDACTED]. However, at that time she was unable to support him so [REDACTED] was sent to live with some relatives in Nova Scotia.

Last year her financial situation being more secure she decided to bring the boy to live with her. He was placed in St. Patrick's School for approximately one month and did quite well. Since that time, there has been a slow deterioration both in his behavior and in his school performance. The boy was then referred to our Agency for placement.

We hope to place [REDACTED] in our St. John Berchmans' Boys' Home if there is a vacancy. This institution is under the auspices of the Federation of Catholic Charities which is a recognized institution under the laws of the Province of Quebec. The fee is \$50 per month plus clothing, medical, educational and other expenses. However, we are prepared to

accept the Q.P.C.A. rate of \$66 per month and all his expenses would be looked after by our Agency.

In regard to [redacted] birth certificate, [redacted] [redacted] has been unable to produce it, however, she has promised to contact the place of his birth.



I realize that Indian Affairs personnel need not enter the picture in Family Allowance matters relating to Indians, and this letter is being sent to you for purposes of clarification only.

[redacted] born [redacted] is the son of [redacted] and [redacted]. His father deserted the family and [redacted] was living and working [redacted]. A few years ago she died of cancer, and the boy, [redacted] returned to [redacted]. I believe Family Allowances were being paid to her on his behalf.

[redacted] sister [redacted] subsequently married and wished to assume responsibility for her younger brother. I understand Family Allowances were transferred from [redacted]

[redacted] apparently experienced some difficulty adjusting to his brother-in-law and because of home difficulties gradually became involved in a series of minor delinquent acts such as truancy, loitering on the streets, etc. I arranged for him to be returned to this area and on November 29th, 1961 I placed him back with [redacted] at the address given above.



You will probably be interested in the disposition made of the [redacted] case.

He arrived here Tuesday afternoon and we had a lengthy interview. I felt, after considerable discussion, that it would not be fair to the boy or to the Residential School to arrange for his admittance there. While I liked the boy and found nothing bad or evil about him, I felt nevertheless that he would have difficulty conforming to the routines of the Residential School.

With the boy I interviewed [redacted] N.S. This is the relative he stayed with previously and I have known this person for the last [redacted] years.

It was obvious that she operates a very respectable home; her husband is a very good provider and her own children are doing very well in the local schools. I made arrangements with [redacted] to pay for his maintenance and feel that this boy is now in the best environment at this time.

The above is being submitted for the conclusion of your records.





An interesting project that seems to be meeting with a fair degree of success is being conducted on Sechelt Reserve No. 2 in an effort to curb juvenile delinquency.

As it is realized that this is a problem of concern in many Agencies, a report of the Sechelt project has been prepared and is attached hereto for your information.

You will note that in this instance the Judge of the Juvenile Court was influential in sparking the interest of the members of the Band Council in establishing the Youth Guidance Committee. It is suggested that other magistrates dealing with Indian juvenile and young adult offenders may be interested in the methods used and the results achieved at Sechelt and may be encouraged to take somewhat similar action where conditions warrant.

Report of the
YOUTH GUIDANCE COMMITTEE
Sechelt Indian Reserve No. 2
Sechelt, British Columbia

ANDREW JOHNSTON

Background:

Up to the year 1956 the number of delinquencies committed by Juvenile members of the Sechelt Indian Band were relatively few and consisted chiefly of petty shoplifting and other misdemeanors for which release of the child to its parents with suitable probationary restrictions and a few added chores, appeared adequate punishment and sufficient deterrent.

However, from 1956 on, the situation rapidly went out of hand. Not only was an alarming increase in the number of delinquencies committed experienced, but the nature of delinquencies took the form of offences creating a definite peril to persons and property in neighbouring Communities. Indian children, ranging in age from 10 to 17 years of age, formed themselves into gangs terrorizing other children, white and Indian, committing assaults, B & E and thefts, and wilful damage to property. In one instance a 14-year-old white girl was dragged into an old shed on the Reserve and gang raped by boys 14 to 17 years of age.

Causes:

The upsurge of delinquencies among Indian children may be attributed to various causes, the chief contributory factors being, in my opinion:

- a) The opening of beer parlours to Indians. Parents frequenting these establishments, located several miles from the Reserve, usually stay until they close about midnight, leaving their children to their own devices without supervision or control of any kind.
- b) The increased use of alcohol and attendant intoxication increased friction in the homes between parents with resultant deterioration of home environment and discipline.
- c) The general prosperity of the past few years enabled many families on the Reserve to obtain automobiles and T.V. sets. The former enabled youngsters to roam far from the confines of the Reserve, and the latter, with its many pictures depicting crime, undoubtedly inspired gangsterism in the immature minds of the children resulting in the commitment of the many serious offences.
- d) Expansion of stores in the neighbouring Village of Sechelt, displaying a wide variety of items desirable to any underprivileged child, may account for the increase in B & E and theft from shops and stores.
- e) The Chief and the Band Council ignored the deterioration of morale among members of the Band and exhibited no responsibility whatsoever in the discharge of their duties in regard to the Band in general or the Juvenile Delinquency problem in particular.

I urged upon the Chief time and again to co-ordinate the efforts of parents who earnestly desired to curb the rising tide of delinquencies, but to no avail.

Finally in January 1960, shortly after the election of a new Chief and Band Council and at a time when, a short time prior, I had occasion to commit a gang of 6 Indian children to Brannan Lake Industrial School for Boys, I was able through the co-operation of the Indian Superintendent to lay my proposals before the Band, its Chief and Council. The suggestions I made were well received and as a result, after several meetings with the new Chief and Council, a committee was formed to deal specifically with the problem of Juvenile Delinquency. For your information I enclose a copy of the initial suggestions submitted to this committee, which were adopted as its "Constitution" and which forms the basis of the Committee's work. Since its inception, this Committee has been known as the "YOUTH GUIDANCE COMMITTEE".

The Modus Operandi of the Committee is as follows:

- a) The Committee meets weekly in the Indian Hall on the Reserve at which time complaints in regards to Juveniles are discussed and decisions reached as to what action the Committee will adopt in each case. Reports of work done by the various Committee members in the week previous are submitted and dealt with. The Committee's secretary takes notes during the meeting and a copy of the minutes is forwarded to me for my records.
- b) If a juvenile fails to heed directions given him by a Committee member, he is brought before the weekly meeting of the Committee, or he may be brought before me unofficially at my office for admonition. One of the child's parents is also present at such times.
- c) Curfew at 8:00 o'clock P.M. during the Winter months and 9:00 o'clock P.M. during the Summer months for all children under 16 years of age is strictly enforced. The bell in the Indian Church is rung and the Committee checks the grounds to see that all children return to their respective homes.
- d) Periodical checks are made by Committee members of the Pool Hall and Bowling Alleys in the Village of Sechelt to prevent loitering and breach of Curfew.
- e) With the co-operation of parents, youngsters are from time to time checked as to the contents of their pockets, and knives, chains, slingshots etc. found are confiscated by the Committee.
- f) Conditions of release on probation of any child committed by my Court as a delinquent to the care of its parents is supervised by the Committee to ensure that the conditions are carried out.
- g) Where parents are allegedly criminally negligent in the care of their children such conduct is reported and if, after investigation by the R.C.M.P. sufficient cause is established, charges are preferred against the offenders. One example of such conduct on the part of parents was a case reported to me by the Committee where it was found that the parents had left 6 children, aged 11 months to 12 years old, without food in the house, and had taken off to Vancouver for a 4-day drinking spree.

Assessment:

The project may be termed most successful. During the first 10 months of the Committee's operation only one case of Juvenile Delinquency among Indian children was dealt with officially by my Juvenile Court as compared with conditions existing prior to the formation of the Committee, outlined on page 1 of this report under "Background".

Further, a noticeable measure of personal pride and family responsibility has been evidenced as a result of the Committee's work. I attribute this to the opportunity given the Band in general to cope with this problem by exercising its own jurisdiction and autonomy in this matter through its Youth Guidance Committee, in the spotlight of the Court and other authorities.

The assistance given this experiment by Rev. Frs. Bernardo and McWade of the Sechelt Indian Residential School has been invaluable. There are strong clanish feelings between the different larger families on the Reserve which at times creates difficult situations for the Committee to overcome. Independent advice by someone capable of viewing an incident objectively and impartially is often a "must" in resolving such difficulties and in reaching a decision compatible with justice.

The present work of the Committee must be considered as being in an initial stage only. It has proven itself to be an effective deterrent to Juvenile Delinquency by constant vigilance on the part of the Committee in respect to the behaviour of the younger members of the Band. However, the goal must be to create a constructive program within the means and capabilities of the Band members themselves, that will provide incentive to the juveniles to occupy their leisure hours with organized sports and workshops. As the Committee, through the passing of time, becomes more firmly established as an integral part of community life on the Reserve, this may be possible to achieve through the formation of Auxilliaris.

The task of bringing any organized form of self-reliance into being among the Indian people is one that calls for time, patience, understanding and a willingness to work with the Band without appearing officious or dictatorial. The Indians must be made to feel that they are accomplishing something worth-while and that every decision made is theirs and theirs alone in the exercise of their duties on the Committee. It requires prodding, praise and perseverance while maintaining yourself the dignity you are hoping to impart to all with whom you are dealing.

The compactness of most Reserves, where Band families live close to one another, separate from neighbouring white Communities, and bound together with bonds of identical interests as to race, creed and economic status, lends itself to the system of autonomy and control of the juvenile members of the Band as adopted by Sechelt Reserve No. 2. It is perhaps not unreasonable to assume that such a system would meet with equal success on other Reserves.

Surely the rewards are there in the satisfaction of accomplishment and the knowledge that the Indian youth of today, with proper guidance, will become a useful, law abiding citizen who on reaching maturity will assume his responsibilities to the Band and enhance his peoples desires for cultural advancement.

Further to our discussions re the m/n, I am pleased to submit the following suggestions as a guide for your Council to form a Committee to deal specifically with the prevention of Juvenile delinquency:

1. Name YOUTH GUIDANCE COMMITTEE
2. Auth- The Committee shall be appointed by and be responsible to the Chief
 ority and Council of the Sechelt Indian Band. Representation on the :
 Committee with full privileges of voice and vote shall be invited from
 the resident Rev. Frs. Bernardo and McWade, O.M.I.
3. Purpose To promote respect for Law and Authority among all juveniles residing
 on the Reserve and to discourage acts and behaviour contributing to any
 child being or becoming a Juvenile Delinquent.
4. Duties To assist the Juvenile Court by supervising delinquents residing on the
 of Reserve and to assure that the probationary conditions imposed by the
 Committee's Court are strictly adhered to.

To maintain close liaison with the Juvenile Court and local law Enforcement Officers with a view to dealing informally with cases that, in the best interest of the child and the community, can so be dealt with.

To assist any family living on the Reserve that requests the Committee's help in regard to control, discipline, conduct or behaviour of any juvenile that the parents or guardians find themselves unable to deal with.

To report to the Band Council any conduct on the part of a Parent or Guardian of a child, that in the opinion of the Committee may constitute neglect of such child which may directly or indirectly contribute to the child being or becoming a juvenile delinquent.

To recommend to the Chief and Council of the Band the enactment and enforcement of such Band Rules as in the opinion of the Committee would tend to prevent or act as a deterrent to the committing of delinquencies.

To maintain close liaison with Religions, Recreational, Arts and Crafts and other groups whose aims and objects concern the welfare and proper training of children.

To make the Committee's purpose and duties known to all families on the Reserve and at all times solicit the full support of every member of the Band in the Committee's efforts to aid and guide the younger members of the Band towards a better understanding of their duties and obligations towards their Parents, the Band and Society in general.

Your letter of Mary 2nd to Superintendent E. J. Blakey regarding the above noted has been passed to this office for necessary action.

I have contacted Rev. Father Collins at the Shubenacadie Residential School who informed me that [REDACTED] was accepted into the School on December 21, 1960 and was expelled and returned to her mother of January 16, 1961.

During her short period at the Shubenacadie Residential School she was found to be unmanageable and after several attempts to get her adjusted to her new environment, it was found that she was unmanageable and she was provided with transportation to Boston. Father Collins said there was no indication then that she might be pregnant.

I should explain here that the Shubenacadie Indian Residential School is a Boarding School for Indian children in the Maritime Provinces, who are orphans or come from broken families. It is not intended that the School be used for delinquents, as there are no facilities for the retention of students who are the cause of trouble in the school, or those who do not wish to stay. After careful consideration, it was decided that [REDACTED] should be returned to her mother.



The above-named girl is the youngest of the [redacted] children of [redacted] and [redacted], an Indian family that has been known to your agency.


[redacted] came before this court on 6/18/60 on a runaway complaint. On 12/2/60 sentence to the Massachusetts Youth Service Board was suspended on condition that girl return to the Indian Reservation, and remain there in school until she becomes 16.

According to girl's mother, [redacted] went to the Shubenodice Residential School in Shubenodice, Nova Scotia about December 20th, 1960, remained about a month, borrowed money from the chaplain there (Father Collins is the name girl gave me) and returned to Boston towards the end of January of 1961. On February 26th girl was admitted Boston City Hospital for emergency treatment for lacerated wrists, and psychiatric evaluation was recommended. Mother refused the psychiatric referral, but continued to worry about girl's depressed condition, and finally came to court to ask my advice.

On 3/20/61 girl was committed to the Metropolitan State Hospital for 35 days psychiatric observation. Here it was learned that girl is at least three months pregnant, and that her suicide attempt was made because of anxiety about her condition.

Will you kindly verify for the court (1) whether [redacted] was ever at the Shubenodice Residential School; (2) if she was there, during what interval; and (3) whether there was any indication during that interval that she was pregnant?

I would refer to your attention Voucher No. 127 dated January 14, 1959, in the amount of \$90.00, submitted from the Shubenacadie Indian Agency, which I am returning herewith.

This amount, covered by accounts from the Children's Aid Society of Hants County, is for probation services rendered in connection with Indians on the reserve. This is the first account of its kind that has, to my knowledge, been submitted for payment.

No provision has been made in the Estimates to meet costs of probation services, for it has been anticipated that such costs would be met by provincial government departments concerned. If an agreement is reached whereby Children's Aid Societies will extend their regular services to Indians on reserves, the cost of probation services might be considered at that time. In the meanwhile, however, I would appreciate your discussing this matter with the Children's Aid Society and the provincial authorities, and endeavour to have probation services continued on the reserves as required. Please advise me of the results of your consultations.

During the recent Easter School Vacation, Indian children
and youths, [redacted] ranging from [redacted] years to [redacted] years of age,
broke into our summer homes and caused damage in varying degrees.

The breaks were investigated by the New Glasgow De-
tachment of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, who apprehended and rec-
eived confessions from all concerned, except the [redacted] year old youth,
who took off across the border.

The R. C. M. P. can testify to the damage inflicted.
In the case of the property of the first named cottager, [redacted]
the Police stated that they had never witnessed such malicious and
devastating havoc inside a house. It consisted of smashing windows,
furniture, cutlery and dishes, lighting fires, smearing multi-coloured
paint over varnished floors, walls and upholstered furniture, tracking
the paint all through the house and stairs, fouling mattresses and
other destructive procedures too numerous to mention.

It is estimated that in the case of the first named
cottager, it will cost over \$1000 to repair the damage. The damage
to the second named cottager would be \$700-800, while the damage to
the others was in the \$100-200 range.

The Indian Agent, at Shubenacadie, Mr. McPherson, was
contacted. He came over and inspected the damage. You may obtain
more specific information from him.

From preliminary enquiries it appears that there is
no recognized avenue of redress for us. As you may be aware the
malicious damage clause in fire insurance policies is not applicable
if occupancy has not been in effect within 30 days prior to the
damage.

It is the opinion of the cottagers that the Department of Indian Affairs should provide method of recompense for the sufferers in this regrettable affair.

Firstly, we are convinced that the parents of these children and youths were certainly aware of what was going on. The damage to [redacted] would require several days to inflict and the children would be returning home covered with paint. Therefore, if the parents did not enquire and dissuade them from their wrongdoing, they encouraged them by their silent consent. Therefore, the parents of these children should be held responsible as the parents of white children would be and as it appears to be within the power of the Department of Indian Affairs to render these people aid, such as building homes, buying fishing boats, purchasing lumbering gear, etc., so it must be possible to render aid to them to meet their legal obligations.

It occurs to us also, that if the Government persists in maintaining a reserve in this area, that some provision should be made for control of this reserve. Depradations have been occurring all along but to a lesser degree.

[redacted] and he is persistently victimized throughout the winter, when he is not about to protect the place. His good timber is cut down for firewood, and last spring he even had to replace the telephone post nearest his house, which they cut down for wood, as it was nice and dry. Each spring he must go down and measure the panes of glass that need replacement and sometimes the whole sashes are smashed and must be renewed. Numerous times have there been narrow escapes from burning as it is a favorite trick to light piles of newspapers on the floor for illumination.

It is strange, but the Indians rarely steal anything but wood, unless it happens to be a very brightly painted object. Theft of household articles would be much easier to endure than destruction and defacement of the house interior and furnishings.

Finally, we believe that just as Municipal Law lays down how a town, village or rural municipality should be governed, so should the Department of Indian Affairs lay down the organization of a reserve. As it stands now on [redacted] Reserve, there is no one in authority at all. Policemen or other individuals have no person to whom to go when there is trouble near or in the Reserve. In this respect we believe your Department have been very remiss as far as the Reserve [redacted] is concerned and for this reason again we believe compensation is due us.

Contractors' estimates of the damage can readily be obtained and we urge your immediate attention to this matter, as these places must be cleaned up for early summer occupancy.



I would refer to your letter dated May 2 directed to the Superintendent of Welfare.

The Director received letters from [REDACTED] concerning this matter, and I attach hereto copy of the Director's reply dated May 5.

In regard to your final paragraph it is not understood why the Court awaits an opinion from the Branch in respect to this case. Indians are subject to the Criminal Code and other laws of general application in the same manner as other citizens. However, it is customary for the Indian Superintendent concerned to attend in such cases to ensure that the Indians being tried have an opportunity to present their case; to provide character references or any other information the Court may require.

Your action in advising the parents to assist in righting this wrong is sound and no doubt the Court will take any such efforts into account in arriving at a decision.

Dear [REDACTED]:

I was very sorry to learn of the unfortunate occurrence resulting in damage to your summer cottage and those of your friends terminating with the arrest and conviction of a group of Indian children.

Needless to say any such reflection on the character and conduct of Indian children is grievous to this Administration and action will be taken in the schools and with the parents in an endeavour to prevent recurrence of such conduct. However, I must point out that, as reprehensible as such conduct is, it is, unfortunately, not confined to Indian children and I am sure you are aware that such things happen in many non-Indian Canadian communities from time to time.

Respecting legal action to recover damages I can only inform you that Indians are subject to the general laws of the country and may sue or be sued in the courts in the same manner as other Canadian citizens.

In regard to your suggestion that the Indian community should assume an obligation respecting unlawful acts of individuals I am afraid that no community, Indian or non-Indian, is called upon to or would assume such obligations.

You have my assurance that our field officers will do all in their power to discourage further activity of this kind and meanwhile should you seek damages against the parents through the courts you are of course at liberty to do so.

On April 23, 1958 I paid a visit to the Fisher's Grant Reserve. While in the area I was contacted by a [redacted] N. S., regarding damage that was done to his summer bungalow by boys from the Reserve. The damage to the bungalow was extensive, paint was smeared over the walls and floors, glass, windows, dishes and furniture was broken, a fire was started on the floor upstairs and the place was ransacked. Complaints were also received from other parties in the area regarding damage to summer homes to a lesser degree.

[redacted] was wondering if there was any compensation that could be received from the Branch. I advised him that I did not think that this was possible, that Indians were required to make restitution the same as non-Indians.

An investigation was carried out by the R. C. N. P. and the following were apprehended: [redacted]

[redacted] left the Reserve some two weeks ago for parts unknown.

The boys concerned were brought before a Juvenile Court Judge in Trenton, N. S. today. The sentence has been adjourned until a final opinion has been received from the Branch. Could you please advise what stand the Branch takes in matters of this nature. I have interviewed the parents of these boys and have advised them to contact the owners of these cottages and try and clean up the mess and try to make some restitution.

on the Micmac Reserve. He was a bully, always causing trouble,
and a truant. In 1955 he received 1 years suspended sentence.

During the summer vacation last year he ran away
from home, spent a week in the City of Halifax and two weeks on the
Pictou Landing Indian Reserve and from there he went to Maine, U. S.
A., to pick potatoes. He spent approximately four weeks in the
U. S. A., he returned to the Micmac Reserve on or about the 15th
of October and did not return to school. When he attended school
he was interested in sports and Manual Training. He lied a great
deal and has been suspected of petty stealing from the school here.

His home conditions here on the reserve were


