
Reference is made to your letter of August 19, 1966 on the above mentioned persons:

Both girls have the same problem to my mind and family circumstances parallel each other in that there is considerable laxity in parental supervision. In the case of [REDACTED], this girl has a mind of her own and only attended school when she decided she would. If it were possible, she should be placed under stricter supervision away from her home environment.

In the case of [REDACTED], this girl has been given every opportunity to make something of herself and lets everyone down who has ever tried to help her. She was given the opportunity to attend grade [REDACTED] classes in an Integrated school at White River and only attended, I think, one week and quit. She then returned to the Reserve school with the explanation that she wanted to take Grade [REDACTED] over. This the teacher agreed to but here again her attendance was very poor.

I could not see where returning to their families would help them too much before they have had some sense of responsibility and discipline instilled into them and I am sure that neither of these girls will attend school again if they do return to the Reserve as they are both [REDACTED] years of age.





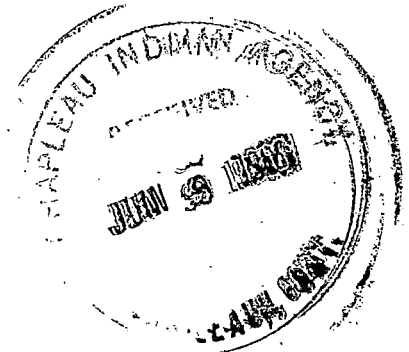

Juvenile Delinquency - Vandalism C.P.R.

Our Mr. Weston was visited at his home at 10:25 p.m. last evening by a Mr. W.N. Olson, an investigator of the Canadian Pacific Railway's Investigation Department.

The following is a resumé of the visit: Following the report of numerous damage claims to automobiles and trucks being transported on the 3-level car transporters on the C.P.R. main line, Mr. Olson paid a visit to Moberg Indian Reserve and interrogated a number of pupils at the school.

All pupils who were questioned admitted throwing stones at the car transporters and considered it a mark of excellence when the sound of breaking glass was heard.

Three names seemed to stand out repeatedly in Mr. Olson's notes and these could be considered the ringleaders on the reserve.

Mr. Olson has provided us with one very interesting facet of the thoroughness of the Investigation Department, in that a geologist was called in for consultation in the examination of rock fragments found in one of the cars and it was proved that that particular type of granite was only found in the rock cuts on the right-of-way between Regan and Moberg.

Mr. Olson has promised to supply us with a full report of his activities on the reserve and will supply names and statements by children questioned. This report will be forwarded as soon as it is received.

This situation points up the great necessity for the completion of the Moberg road project and the sooner the road is completed and the railway right-of-way isolated by a chain link fence the less danger to Moberg residents and C.P.R. property damage will be the result.

Mr. Eric Mulligan, Construction Supervisor, is expected to visit this office early next week and this matter will be discussed with him at that time.

This will refer to your letter concerning rehabilitation of the above boy.

Our branch does not have any specific facilities for the rehabilitation of delinquents. In most cases where we are responsible for the individual we pay the necessary cost for some other organization to supply a specific service. As an example we may accept the cost incurred in keeping a delinquent in a training school.

In connection with [REDACTED] there would appear to be three specific possibilities with which we could assist. (1) As he is under sixteen years of age he could possibly be considered a neglected child and could be taken into the care of the Children's Aid Society. This is a service Children's Aid Societies in Ontario provide to Indians on an agreement basis. (2) He could be sent to another Indian Residential School where he could continue his education in a supervised environment. It is a little late in the year for him to start in another school, however this is a possibility. (3) Our branch provides educational assistance so that persons can attend school away from the reserve. In these cases we pay the cost of tuition, room and board, school supplies etc. The branch does not provide this sort of assistance where the child can attend school from his own home. It might be possible



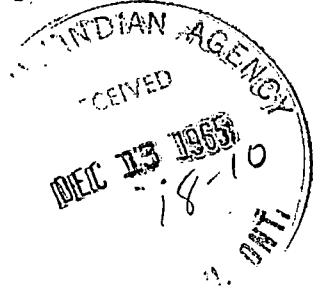

The above boy appeared in Juvenile and Family Court in Wawa on December 7th, 1965, and was found to be Delinquent. Judge Carter who presided over the Court, suspended sentence and placed [REDACTED] Probation, withholding any further action until more information can be obtained and some report can be received from your office.

[REDACTED] was born out-of-wedlock to Miss [REDACTED] of [REDACTED]. Miss [REDACTED] later married [REDACTED] also of [REDACTED], and has subsequently borne Mr. [REDACTED]. [REDACTED] lives with his mother and step-father in [REDACTED] under the most atrocious conditions. He uses the name [REDACTED] at present.

The boy is in [REDACTED] at St. Basil's Separate School in White River. The school reports that his ability is well-above average but that he does not apply himself and as a result failed last year. His teachers are very worried about the boy since they feel his talents and abilities are being wasted because of his limiting environment.

In the home, [REDACTED] is badly abused. I have known the family for over one year and can vouch for this. His step-father has never accepted [REDACTED] as a member of the family and picks on him continually. Evidence was given in Court that the father makes [REDACTED] go out at night as he does not want the boy at home when he is at home. Evidence was also given that Mr. [REDACTED] drinks heavily and abuses his family but Mrs. [REDACTED] is too terrified to lay any charges. At the present time, investigation is being carried on to see if action can be taken against the father.

In a number of cases, we receive Initial Child Placement Application and Authority Forms (IA 3-114) on behalf of Indian juveniles who have been committed to various institutions by the Juvenile Courts.

In cases where these Indian juveniles are resident on reserves, the costs for maintenance are clearly the responsibility of Indian Affairs Branch.

However, in the case of persons of Indian status resident off reserve, the decision has to be made in this office whether maintenance costs are the responsibility of Indian Affairs Branch, the Province, or the municipality. In order that we may make a proper decision as to who is responsible for maintenance costs in cases of this nature, when submitting the Form IA 3-114 would you please provide a covering memorandum supplying the following information:

- (1) The length of residence off a reserve.
- (2) The exact location of residence, including the name of the village, town, city, municipality, or unorganized territory if such is the case.
- (3) If assistance has been granted to the person or family by the Indian Affairs Branch, and the last date on which assistance was issued.
- (4) Your recommendation based on the points indicated in Items 1 to 3 as to who you feel should accept responsibility for maintenance costs.

I am in receipt of your letter of March 18th., concerning the a/m boy. In this letter you ask why [REDACTED] was paroled to Hornepayne rather than Peterbell. First I must state that this decision was made by the Parole Board on our recommendation for the following reasons:

- (1) There is no employment in Peterbell.
- (2) [REDACTED] has been charged with an number of offences which have all occured in Peterbell.
- (3) [REDACTED] have problems with their drinking habits.
[REDACTED] we have answered a number of calls to Peterbell re: their drinking habits.
- (4) There is no supervision or police protection in Peterbell.

As to [REDACTED]'s innocence or guilt in this latest escapade. [REDACTED] was charged by the Township of Wicksteed Police Department and if he is not guilty I am sure he will not be "railroaded". To our knowledge [REDACTED] does have some knowledge of driving. We had several complaints from [REDACTED] in Peterbell that [REDACTED] had been moving their trucks and other equipment.



I am [redacted] yrs of age & was born on [redacted] at [redacted] Ontario, where I resided or lived until up to a year ago. I have been convicted of; Breaking and Entering, Arson, which I did 6 months for. I was out on Parole (Ontario) up to now. I was released on Parole on February 20, 1964. A.D. I was doing my Parole at [redacted] place or home [redacted]

& is [redacted]

married to [redacted] I don't know of any reason why they would not let me do my parole at home in Peterbell, Ontario. I would have liked to do it there because my Mother and Dad, both common-law and living together, needed me there most.

My Father is getting old and has not any work, except for his trapping. The both of them are living rather poor.

and are low on⁽¹⁾ money and food. The only money he does get is from his fur sales. So they both need me at home.

Now to get to the main point of this letter.

On March 7, 1964

[redacted] going under the name of Ray Father [redacted] was convicted of Car theft in the District of [redacted] township of [redacted] here at Hornepayne Ontario, by Constable Watts of the Municipal Police Detachment or town police. I was said to have stolen a car. I was also with another fellow by the name of [redacted] also of Hornepayne.

He wanted me to steal a car for him. I said no. So I finally got in with him. I had the Idea of making him drive to the police station and turn him over to the police. But as we were both in the car, as it started to move, some wheres up to 1000 yards from where it was parked someone yelled and he got scared and jumped out of the car. It was only doing about 15 M. P. H. So I didn't want it to smash up somewhere or let it run into a snow bank so I took the wheel

and steered it ⁽¹¹⁾ into a driveway. I got out turned the engine off and started to run which was my mistake. I knew at the time that I didn't want to get caught and blamed for car theft. But later I did get caught and was blamed for stealing the car. I gave a false statement and was going to plead "not guilty" in court to delay things so I could get this letter off to you, but in court I found that I did have enough time, because the Judge remanded my trial until March Monday 23rd 1964. A.D. So then I did have enough time to write to you.

If I had been in Peterbell I wouldn't have gotten into any kind of trouble at all, such as drinking intoxicating liquors and any other trouble. I was willing to go do my Parole at Peterbell and I wanted to. I could have helped my Father a great deal in his trapping and other work, such as hauling firewood and such. But, The Ontario Provincial Police told the Parole Officers I could do my Parole at Hornepayne, where I never wanted to go. I could have had lots of friends in Peterbell

and could have done my ~~best~~
there and kept out of trouble ~~there~~,
also there were lot lesser chances of me
getting into trouble there at Peterbell.

I ask your help, if you can help
me, run this case and a lawyer ~~(or)~~ R.C.M.P
officer to help me in this case. I ask
your help, because I don't want to go
back to jail again.

I am here at the Ontario
Provincial Police Jail in Horne Pagny with
\$200.00 - two hundred dollars bail set for
me. So please help me to get out,



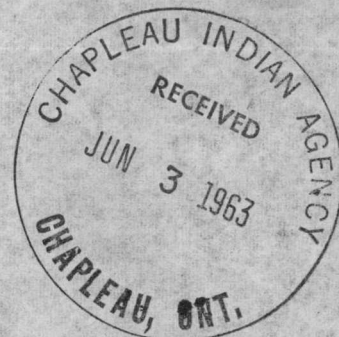
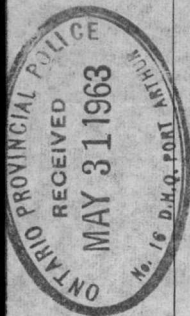

1. With reference to the captionally noted subject, the following report is submitted for your information.

2. On April 19th, 1963, [redacted] of [redacted], Ontario, reported to this Detachment that his house and woodshed had been entered during his absence from [redacted] between the 15th and 18th of April, 1963.

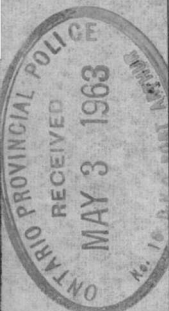
3. Investigation at [redacted] revealed that the residence of [redacted] was entered through a smashed window on north side of the house. The culprit(s) smashed the window to gain entry and once inside the house scattered a quantity of sugar, flour and spaghetti about the kitchen floor. [redacted] stated that nothing was stolen from the house. His woodshed adjacent to the house was also entered and two axes were missing. During my investigation at the residence of [redacted], I searched the immediate area and in doing so found the two axes, approximately 100 feet from the house in a patch of long grass, and returned them to [redacted]. The total assessment of the damage caused by the culprits was given by [redacted] as \$15.00 which included the groceries destroyed.

4. Enquiries were conducted at [redacted] regarding this offence and as a result [redacted] yrs., (treaty name [redacted] Chapleau Agency) was questioned in the presence of his mother [redacted] at [redacted]. During the questioning [redacted] admitted that he, with [redacted] and [redacted] and [redacted] yrs., respectively, were responsible for breaking into [redacted] house and woodshed. [redacted] had smashed the window at the side of the house and with the assistance of [redacted] and [redacted], entered the house through the window. Once inside he opened the front door and [redacted] and [redacted] entered. They scattered the food previously mentioned, about the kitchen floor, and while in the house [redacted] found a file. He went out to the woodshed and filed the padlock off the door, removed the two axes from within with the intentions of stealing them. Later he thought better of this and threw them into the long grass near the house. They later left the premises locking the premises by pulling the front door shut behind them. This occurred sometime in the late afternoon of April 15th or 16th. The exact date could not be established by any of the children, nor could anyone be found that would say that they saw them in the vicinity of the residence. These events were corroborated by [redacted] and [redacted] interviewed the same date in the presence of their mother [redacted] at [redacted].

5. [redacted] and [redacted] were subsequently charged with Breaking and Entering, Section 292-1-a of the Criminal Code, and Summoned to appear at Juvenile and Family Court April 25th, 1963, to be held at Marathon, Ontario. On April 25th, 1963, the accused, accompanied by their parents [redacted] and [redacted], appeared before his Honour Judge W.W. CREIGHTON at Marathon Juvenile and Family Court. They entered a plea of guilty to the charge and a summary of evidence was presented to Court. (CONTINUED)

[redacted] was remanded in the custody of the Children's Aid Society Fort Arthur, Ontario, to be arraigned at Juvenile and Family Court at Marathon, on May 23rd, 1963. While in their custody the Society will take a physical and mental assessment of the child. The Society is considering applying for Wardship in this case.

7. During [redacted]'s early childhood he [redacted] During the trial it was brought out that this child is unmanageable. 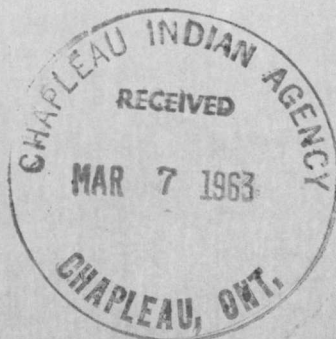
Transcript of Evidence Costs.

From time to time accounts have been submitted covering transcript of evidence taken on the committal of juvenile delinquents.

In most cases, these transcripts are not necessary, un-
less there is some doubt regarding residency. If some doubt does exist concerning residence, the transcript of evidence is required and if it indicates that the juvenile in question is the responsibility of our department, it will be necessary to insert "plus transcript of evidence costs" after the rate to be charged. In this way the cost involved would be charged to the relevant authority number.

To avoid the necessity of establishing an authority for the sole purpose of paying for a transcript of evidence, in the event the evidence confirms that Indian Affairs is not financially responsible, submission of such accounts as a charge against 'Sundries', (Vote 519-Primary 22) will be in order. Explanatory correspondence should accompany the voucher.

Please advise Agency Superintendents regarding the above instructions.



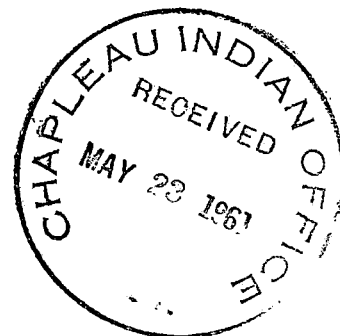

As it is realized that this is a problem of concern in many Agencies, a report of the Sechelt project has been prepared and is attached hereto for your information.

You will note that in this instance the Judge of the Juvenile Court was influential in sparking the interest of the members of the Band Council in establishing the Youth Guidance Committee. It is suggested that other magistrates dealing with Indian juvenile and young adult offenders may be interested in the methods used and the results achieved at Sechelt and may be encouraged to take somewhat similar action where conditions warrant.

Background:

Up to the year 1956 the number of delinquencies committed by Juvenile members of the Sechelt Indian Band were relatively few and consisted chiefly of petty shoplifting and other misdemeanors for which release of the child to its parents with suitable probationary restrictions and a few added chores, appeared adequate punishment and sufficient deterrent.

However, from 1956 on, the situation rapidly went out of hand. Not only was an alarming increase in the number of delinquencies committed experienced, but the nature of delinquencies took the form of offences creating a definite peril to persons and property in neighbouring Communities. Indian children, ranging in age from 10 to 17 years of age, formed themselves into gangs terrorizing other children, white and Indian, committing assaults, B & E and thefts, and wilful damage to property. In one instance a 14-year-old white girl was dragged into an old shed on the Reserve and gang raped by boys 14 to 17 years of age.

Causes:

The upsurge of delinquencies among Indian children may be attributed to various causes, the chief contributory factors being, in my opinion:

- a) The opening of beer parlours to Indians. Parents frequenting these establishments, located several miles from the Reserve, usually stay until they close about midnight, leaving their children to their own devices without supervision or control of any kind.
- b) The increased use of alcohol and attendant intoxication increased friction in the homes between parents with resultant deterioration of home environment and discipline.
- c) The general prosperity of the past few years enabled many families on the Reserve to obtain automobiles and T.V. sets. The former enabled youngsters to roam far from the confines of the Reserve, and the latter, with its many pictures depicting crime, undoubtedly inspired gangsterism in the immature minds of the children resulting in the commitment of the many serious offences.
- d) Expansion of stores in the neighbouring Village of Sechelt, displaying a wide variety of items desirable to any underprivileged child, may account for the increase in B & E and theft from shops and stores.
- e) The Chief and the Band Council ignored the deterioration of morale among members of the Band and exhibited no responsibility whatsoever in the discharge of their duties in regard to the Band in general or the Juvenile Delinquency problem in particular.

- 2 -

I urged upon the Chief time and again to co-ordinate the efforts of parents who earnestly desired to curb the rising tide of delinquencies, but to no avail.

Finally in January 1960, shortly after the election of a new Chief and Band Council and at a time when, a short time prior, I had occasion to commit a gang of 6 Indian children to Brannan Lake Industrial School for Boys, I was able through the co-operation of the Indian Superintendent to lay my proposals before the Band, its Chief and Council. The suggestions I made were well received and as a result, after several meetings with the new Chief and Council, a committee was formed to deal specifically with the problem of Juvenile Delinquency. For your information I enclose a copy of the initial suggestions submitted to this committee, which were adopted as its "Constitution" and which forms the basis of the Committee's work. Since its inception, this Committee has been known as the "YOUTH GUIDANCE COMMITTEE".

The Modus Operandi of the Committee is as follows:

- a) The Committee meets weekly in the Indian Hall on the Reserve at which time complaints in regards to Juveniles are discussed and decisions reached as to what action the Committee will adopt in each case. Reports of work done by the various Committee members in the week previous are submitted and dealt with. The Committee's secretary takes notes during the meeting and a copy of the minutes is forwarded to me for my records.
- b) If a juvenile fails to heed directions given him by a Committee member, he is brought before the weekly meeting of the Committee, or he may be brought before me unofficially at my office for admonition. One of the child's parents is also present at such times.
- c) Curfew at 8:00 o'clock P.M. during the Winter months and 9:00 o'clock P.M. during the Summer months for all children under 16 years of age is strictly enforced. The bell in the Indian Church is rung and the Committee checks the grounds to see that all children return to their respective homes.
- d) Periodical checks are made by Committee members of the Pool Hall and Bowling Alleys in the Village of Sechelt to prevent loitering and breach of Curfew.
- e) With the co-operation of parents, youngsters are from time to time checked as to the contents of their pockets, and knives, chains, slingshots etc. found are confiscated by the Committee.
- f) Conditions of release on probation of any child committed by my Court as a delinquent to the care of its parents is supervised by the Committee to ensure that the conditions are carried out.
- g) Where parents are allegedly criminally negligent in the care of their children such conduct is reported and if, after investigation by the R.C.M.P. sufficient cause is established, charges are preferred against the offenders. One example of such conduct on the part of parents was a case reported to me by the Committee where it was found that the parents had left 6 children, aged 11 months to 12 years old, without food in the house, and had taken off to Vancouver for a 4-day drinking spree.

Assessment:

The project may be termed most successful. During the first 10 months of the Committee's operation only one case of Juvenile Delinquency among Indian children was dealt with officially by my Juvenile Court as compared with conditions existing prior to the formation of the Committee, outlined on page 1 of this report under "Background".

Further, a noticeable measure of personal pride and family responsibility has been evidenced as a result of the Committee's work. I attribute this to the opportunity given the Band in general to cope with this problem by exercising its own jurisdiction and autonomy in this matter through its Youth Guidance Committee, in the spotlight of the Court and other authorities.

The assistance given this experiment by Rev. Frs. Bernardo and McWade of the Sechelt Indian Residential School has been invaluable. There are strong clanish feelings between the different larger families on the Reserve which at times creates difficult situations for the Committee to overcome. Independent advice by someone capable of viewing an incident objectively and impartially is often a "must" in resolving such difficulties and in reaching a decision compatible with justice.

The present work of the Committee must be considered as being in an initial stage only. It has proven itself to be an effective deterrent to Juvenile Delinquency by constant vigilance on the part of the Committee in respect to the behaviour of the younger members of the Band. However, the goal must be to create a constructive program within the means and capabilities of the Band members themselves, that will provide incentive to the juveniles to occupy their leisure hours with organized sports and workshops. As the Committee, through the passing of time, becomes more firmly established as an integral part of community life on the Reserve, this may be possible to achieve through the formation of Auxilliaries.

The task of bringing any organized form of self-reliance into being among the Indian people is one that calls for time, patience, understanding and a willingness to work with the Band without appearing officious or dictatorial. The Indians must be made to feel that they are accomplishing something worth-while and that every decision made is theirs and theirs alone in the exercise of their duties on the Committee. It requires prodding, praise and perseverance while maintaining yourself the dignity you are hoping to impart to all with whom you are dealing.

The compactness of most Reserves, where Band families live close to one another, separate from neighbouring white Communities, and bound together with bonds of identical interests as to race, creed and economic status, lends itself to the system of autonomy and control of the juvenile members of the Band as adopted by Sechelt Reserve No. 2. It is perhaps not unreasonable to assume that such a system would meet with equal success on other Reserves.

Surely the rewards are there in the satisfaction of accomplishment and the knowledge that the Indian youth of today, with proper guidance, will become a useful, law abiding citizen who on reaching maturity will assume his responsibilities to the Band and enhance his peoples desires for cultural advancement.

To assist any family living on the Reserve that requests the Committee's help in regard to control, discipline, conduct or behaviour of any juvenile that the parents or guardians find themselves unable to deal with.

To report to the Band Council any conduct on the part of a Parent or Guardian of a child, that in the opinion of the Committee may constitute neglect of such child which may directly or indirectly contribute to the child being or becoming a juvenile delinquent.

To recommend to the Chief and Council of the Band the enactment and enforcement of such Band Rules as in the opinion of the Committee would tend to prevent or act as a deterrent to the committing of delinquencies.

To maintain close liaison with Religions, Recreational, Arts and Crafts and other groups whose aims and objects concern the welfare and proper training of children.

To make the Committee's purpose and duties known to all families on the Reserve and at all times solicit the full support of every member of the Band in the Committee's efforts to aid and guide the younger members of the Band towards a better understanding of their duties and obligations towards their Parents, the Band and Society in general.

As you know, this is a very serious offence and I am asking you to send \$4.00 to this office immediately so that we can right the wrong caused by [redacted]. I do not wish to carry this matter further because I feel that you can see the seriousness of this matter and would like to settle it without any delay.

[redacted] needs no further medical treatments. She should have plenty of good food, milk, green vegetables and plenty of rest.

Since we had heard nothing previously about his returning to school we rather suspected it was just a scheme to get clothing, so we wrote [REDACTED] for more information on September 1st, to which he has not replied.

As the case is being referred back to the Court on September 14th, it is no doubt that [REDACTED] expects to be sent to St. Johns' Training School at Uxbridge, which, according to Mr. Angus, [REDACTED] has requested himself.

We regret that we have no personal knowledge of [REDACTED], however, we are under the impression that he has ability to learn as he was apparently admitted to Grade [REDACTED] at Scollard Hall at [REDACTED] years of age.

We understand there were two other boys from the Reserve left Scollard Hall at the same time [REDACTED] left and suspect this was another case of difficulty in integration the High School level.



At that time, he entered a plea of guilty to a charge of Attempted Breaking and Entering, and was given suspended sentence with Probation until his birthday([REDACTED]). It was felt by the Court, at that time, that this boy should continue his education.

On interviewing the youth at a later date, at his home in [REDACTED], he intimated that he had attended Scollard Hall, in North Bay, about two years ago for a period of about two weeks. He said that he left the school because the other boys in attendance there were much older than he, and that he felt out of place.

He is living with his maternal grandparents, [REDACTED], having been with them since babyhood. His mother died in the Sanatorium at [REDACTED] and his father is unknown. [REDACTED] are quite elderly, and admit they are unable to manage this boy. Also, conditions in the [REDACTED] home are quite congested, in that [REDACTED] are living there, and one has four illegitimate children. The home consists of two bedrooms, and a combination living room and kitchen.

It is [REDACTED]'s request that he be sent to St. John's Training School in Uxbridge, and it is felt by the writer that this might be best for the boy. He is primarily interested in furthering his education, and would also like to learn a trade. He has not attended school for the past two years, there being no continuation school in his immediate locality.



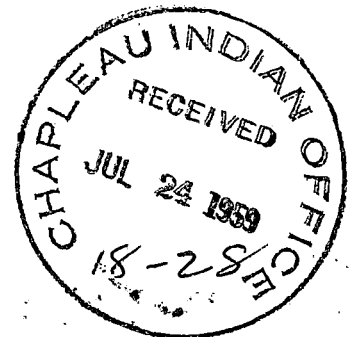

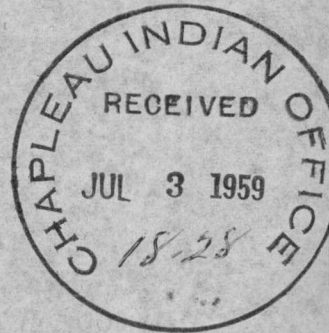

I regret to report that we have lost the services of the above-named staff member, and under very unhappy circumstances.

A week ago last Sunday, she was in a boat crossing from Sugar Island, on the U.S. side of the River, to the Reserve, with four men, when the boat sank under them. They had been warned not to have more than three in the boat, but it appears that two of the older men forced their way in. This lowered the boat to a point where water was able to get in through a hole, and they were about 100 feet from the Canadian shore when the boat sank. Luckily, helped by one of the younger men, a former pupil of Shingwauk, got ashore. The two older men were drowned. The shock gave her hysterics, and she was brought to hospital, where she was given a sedative and sent back here. She was put to bed, and had just got there when I saw her. I am sorry to say that she had been drinking.

From this occurrence came the knowledge that she had been going to frequently late at night, and returning in the small hours, and that she had been associating with the most undesirable people on the reserve. About Wednesday, when she had somewhat recovered, she told me she wanted to leave. She had had a row with her roommate, Miss , who sought to keep her from going out late that night. Finally she had to let go. I tried to show what she was throwing away, but she was most resentful of any interference by me, by other staff members, including who had been a staunch friend of hers. She left on Thursday morning for a at

Incidentally, on the advice of Miss Jane Bartlett, Social Worker from Regional Office, North Bay, whom I telephoned about it, I informed the probation officer, and he had a talk with her, but, as he said, he had no official standing unless she ran foul of the law. seems determined to lead the kind of life indicated, and we can do nothing to stop her. We had hoped that she would settle down here until her Nursing Assistant Course opens in September. In view of this, I must withdraw my recommendation to the Haileybury Hospital, and, in fact, she has now no intention of entering the course. I gave her her June cheque yesterday, plus the vacation pay to which she is entitled. Today I forwarded her Hospital Insurance Certificate. Will you send the usual employer's certificate showing paid-up date, and I'll send it along to her?

This leaves us a staff member short, for the summer, but I have been fortunate in being able to engage Mrs. Violet Penny, who helped us out last summer.



On March 24th, 1959 a one [redacted] age of [redacted], Ontario was sentenced to 4 months imprisonment at Marathon Police Court for "Common Assault" Section 231-1-b of the Criminal Code of Canada. for assaulting a one [redacted], age [redacted] also of [redacted], Ontario. As a result of the writer's investigation it was learned that [redacted] is the daughter of a one [redacted] age of [redacted], Ontario further that [redacted] goes to the Indian Mission School, [redacted] attends school when she feels like it. A check with Mr. D. RADECKI, the school principal at the Indian Mission reveals that [redacted] attended school this term as follows; out of a possible 21 school days in September 1958 was absent 4 full days and 5, 1/2 days; out of a possible 21 school days in October 1958, was absent 6 full days and 8, 1/2 days; out of a possible 19 school days in November 1958, was absent 3 full days and 10, 1/2 days; out of a possible 14 school days in December 1958, was absent 8 full days; out of a possible 19 school days in January 1959, was absent 12 full days and 1, 1/2 day, and since January 15th, 1959 has not attended school at all up to date.

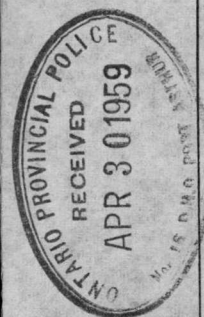


Regardless of what you may think, I have no authority whatever in such circumstances.

In the first place [redacted] was committed to a Girls Training School by a Court Order and from there she was committed to the Institution at Smiths Falls by the medical authority and believe, me, it was only with [redacted]'s best interest in mind that these steps were taken.

In regard to making your wife return home, I do not, of course, know anything of the circumstances which brought about your separation. A court of law is the only authority that could possibly pass judgement for her to return home, however, in order to have the matter brought before a Court, someone must lay a charge and you, as her husband and father of her children are the logical person to lay the charge. No one else can do it.

We regret that you take this attitude as we are entirely in sympathy with you but we actually have no more authority in this respect than anyone else you might choose to name. It is a matter that only the courts can deal with and as stated above to start proceedings there must be a charge laid as this is what may be termed a Civil case not a Criminal case.

This office has been advised by Superintendent Mr. Johnston, of the Chapleau Indian Agency, that you have requested your daughter's discharge from the Hospital to return home. I am very sorry to hear you feel that way, as you know, ,  presented a very difficult behaviour problem while at the Shingwauk Residential School. Reverend Phillips referred her case to the Algoma Children's Aid Society and she was seen several times by one of their Social Workers, who is familiar with the behaviour of problem children. However, the Social Worker was unable to assist . Their next move was to have her committed to a girls' training school. After being there for a short time, she was referred to specialists, (Doctors for problem children), who recommended her admission to the Ontario Hospital at Smith Falls, which is also a training school for boys and girls who are slow at learning and difficult to manage.

 was committed to this school and, therefore, will have to remain there for at least one year. I would strongly recommend that you keep in touch with  during her stay at the Hospital so that she will be happy and respond to treatment. You would have a difficult time with her, if she were to return home now, especially when her mother is not at home. The time will pass quickly and meanwhile  will have an opportunity to prepare herself for her return home to assist you in looking after the family.



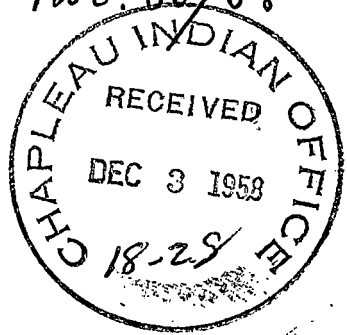

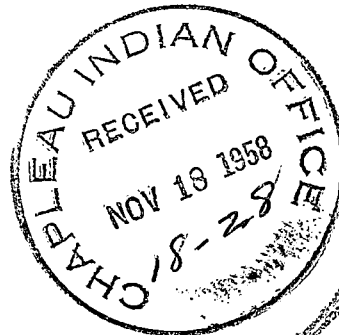

Copy of Departmental letter dated October 20th, 1958, file number 9/18-28(WB) addressed to Superintendent Port Arthur Agency has been forwarded to this office for attention and reply.

We find it rather difficult to make an intelligent reply to this letter. There has been a great volume of correspondence on the above noted student involving Sault Ste. Marie, Port Arthur and Chapleau Agencies as well as the Regional office and Headquarters with several different file numbers. This office started out on file 65/25-5 and continued to use this number until we were reminded by the Regional office under date of August 15th, 1958 that this file was obsolete. North Bay Regional office also used this file during May and June while we note that Headquarters quite consistently used file 18-28 with one letter dated June 3rd, 1958 on file 18-6.

I can find no letter from Headquarters concerning [redacted] dated June 12th, 1958 and we are under the impression Superintendent Acquin was referring to a letter from this office bearing date of June 12th when he wrote the Regional office on October 1st, on File #9/18-35. Our letter of June 12th, 1958 to Superintendent Acquin was written as a result of Department letter dated June 3rd, 1958, file #65/18-6(W6) directed to the Regional Supervisor at North Bay, a copy of which was forwarded to this office advising us to have [redacted] interviewed at the earliest convenience in regard to his responsibility and ability to pay for his daughters maintenance while at the training school.

In reply to your letter of the 26th inst., when [REDACTED] came to our School we discovered that she could not keep up with her academic work and could not fit into our vocational programme. We therefore had her tested on May 15th, 1958 and her I.Q. rating was only 64. It was then recommended by our consultant Psychiatrist that the girl would derive no benefit from being at the School here, and it was his recommendation that she be sent to one of the Ontario Hospitals for further training. Two doctors certified her as being a mental defective. On the 11th inst. [REDACTED] was taken by one of our workers to the Ontario Hospital, Smiths Falls for further training. We notified her father of the change of her address.

If necessary, you could most likely obtain further information of the case from the Superintendent at Smiths Falls.

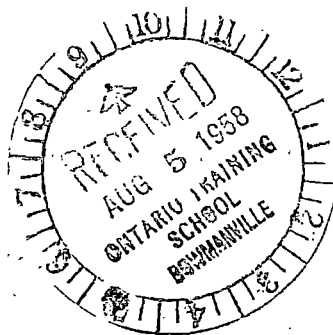

6. Collections, when received at zone offices, should be deposited in the Transfer account. Where no transfer account exists, collections should be forwarded with a Receiver General return. Code to Revenue Vote 14 and the appropriate revenue primary.

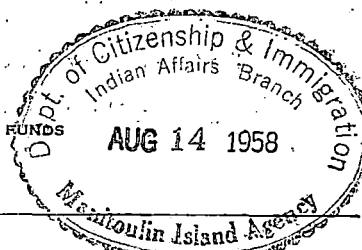

I regret not having mentioned this previously, but I feel as Mr. Johnston does, that [REDACTED] cannot assume this responsibility.

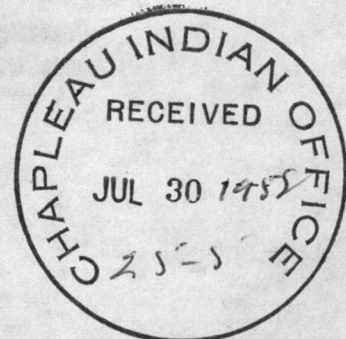
Although this man is a good worker and a good provider when given the chance, I feel that keeping [REDACTED] will be just about all he can do, and still remain solvent.

I have been advised by Miss Bartlett from the Regional Office in North Bay that your Society has been receiving complaints regarding this girl. Miss Bartlett has asked me to give you a little family history which may help you in this case.

First of all, this child was born on the [REDACTED]
[REDACTED] She is # [REDACTED] and as far as we know now is being cared for by [REDACTED] who herself has two illegitimate children. The [REDACTED] family is probably one of the poorest we have in the Chapleau Agency.

In order to assist them and perhaps make life a little better for the children we brought these people from [REDACTED] (paid their fares, and freight on the household goods) to the [REDACTED], Ontario. There we gave the family a new house and assisted them in every way we could to get them settled. However the constant drinking, mainly of the women of the family [REDACTED] and [REDACTED], caused us to have them arrested several times, and eventually [REDACTED] was sent to jail. As soon as she came out of jail she talked the rest of the family into moving away from the reserve. They did this of their own free will and without my knowledge and returned to [REDACTED].

I know from police reports that the are consistantly in trouble over drinking and it is small wonder to me that this unfortunate girl is turning out the way she is.

I do not think that this girl would be suitable material to send to an Indian Residential school. I know from past and unpleasant experience that the usual outcome of this sort of thing is that such a child only drags other girls down with her at the school. I feel it would be wiser if she were admitted to a Training School.

I am wondering just how the other two girls are making out, that is and daughters of . is the same age as and was born in . I will be only too pleased to help and co-operate in any way I can in any action which you deem advisable in this regard.

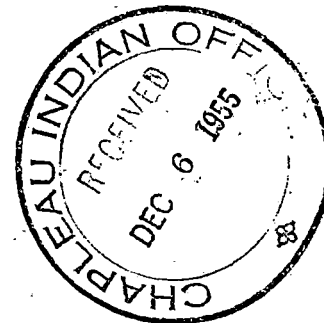

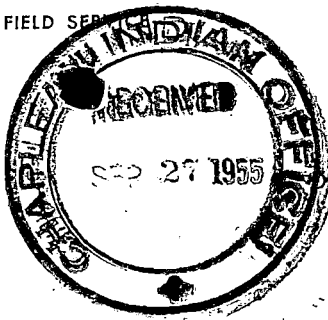

Attached is a letter from Mr. Whitney regarding conditions at Mobert, also a copy of a letter from Mr. White of Port Arthur.

Regarding the latter letter, I think Mr. Whitney should ask Mr. White to turn the matter of supervision over to the Provincial Police constable stationed at Regan about one mile from the reserve.

The matter of damage to [REDACTED]'s belongings was reported on August 9th and as Mr. Whitney mentioned at that time there was little hope of finding out who did the damage. Unprotected dwellings in our cities receive the same treatment.

Appointment of an Indian constable would not improve the situation regarding making an arrest as mentioned in the last paragraph of Mr. Whitney's letter. There is no lock up, and I very, very seldom hear of any Indian constable making an arrest.

The only solution I see is for more frequent patrols to the reserve by the R.C.M.P. and they should request the active co-operation of the Provincial Police constable stationed at Regan to help keep order on the reserve.



Re: Conditions of the Mobert Indian Reserve

The situation with regard to adult drinking and juvenile delinquency on the Mobert Indian Reserve has changed very little since my report on the matter on July 13th, 1955. I might say that since my interview with C.P.R. police inspector Mr. Riddle, the bootlegging on number 17 and number 18 has stopped and this has been a great benefit in changing the situation for the better. Although the Indians still arrive home in a drunken condition from White River, they do not have any further supply with which to continue their drinking and therefore in this phase of it there is some improvement. Of course as you know practically every able bodied male Indian has been away from the reserve almost continually this summer on fire fighting duty and this has helped to make the reserve quieter.

On the other hand juvenile delinquency has not improved at all. Several more fires have been set out on the Mobert reserve by children, many windows both in the school, in the church and in private homes have been smashed this summer and two instances which are outstanding I wish to relate briefly here.

The day after Treaty pay on Mobert Reserve, July 21st, several Indian boys broke into the school after smashing a number of windows and went into the teacher's quarters and through all the personal effects of [redacted] in wild confusion around the floor. [redacted] told me that as far as he can tell nothing was taken and nothing was destroyed. The only damage was to his personal type writer which was thrown down stairs. However he was able to get the type writer repaired without charge therefore he is not asking cont'd...

for any reimbursement in this regard. We have checked into this matter and although we are fairly certain who did the damage we have no definite proof. Another instance of this kind of think is the fact that three times this summer a group of boys and we believe they are the same boys who broke into the school are set the forest fires, have stoned passing C.P.R. passenger trains. In the first instance no one was hurt. In the second instance glass was broken and one of the trainmen was hurt. In the third instance however, either a stone or a piece of glass struck the conductor in the eye and he had to be removed from the train in White River and rushed back to Port Arthur for a specialist treatment. I have not had a report yet from Mr. Riddle as to his condition but have had a report from him that he went up to Mobert to investigate the matters and arrested two boys the leader of whom was son of and took them to court in Marathon.

We have today recieved a letter from Mr. White Probation officer in Port Arthur in connection with the outcome of this court. A copy of the letter is attached herewith for your information. As you can see it is just as difficult and expensive for me to visit the reserve as it is for Mr. White and I certainly do not know of any way we can keep a check on this except on our regular visits which are approximately five to six weeks apart.

I might say that is certainly the ring leader of the boys who are causing all the trouble on the reserve.


I have discussed this matter with both the Mounted Police Cpl., in Nipigon and the Provincial Police Const. at Regan and, without any prompting from me they both pointed out that we will never have any success in lessening our difficulties on the reserve until there is some better type of policing facilities than there are at the present time. The Mounted Police Cpl., pointed out quite strongly that he was convinced that the work of Const. Nabigon has a very great part in the smooth running of the Heron Bay reserve, and he thinks that this should be duplicated at Mobert. I myself certainly agree with this idea.

At the present time because of the many other duties I have not had an opportunity to see the Provincial police Const. at White River although I have twice stopped over for about an hour for the purpose. However, I shall certainly try to get in touch with him and discuss the situation to see what can be done cont'd..

at the White River end as far as drinking is concerned. I do not put too much hope in this particular phase of the situation because like all small northern Ontario towns White River has more than it's share of bootleggers. It is my opinion that the only place we can really take drastic action is to be in a position to arrest the Indians while they are drunk and raising commotion of their own reserve and at the present time we have absolutely no way of doing this.

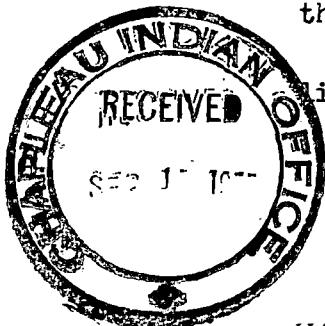



I have forwarded copies of this report to both North Bay and Ottawa and pointed out that this is one of the big reasons why we do need an Indian Constable.

I am now asking you if it is possible for you to do a patrol of the Reserve at Mobert to investigate this matter. I might say here that I plan to be at Heron Bay on August 23rd and 24th and Mobert on the 25th, so that it is possible you might want to make the patrol at that time. In any event you will undoubtedly make a report on such a patrol or in the event that you do not make a patrol, let me know the reason why and I can forward that on to Ottawa to help bolster our position with regard to the difficulties at Mobert. Perhaps you can let me know what you plan to do in this regard.



I wish to advise that I have today reported this matter to the Mounted Police at Nipigon and have asked that they investigate. I do not think they will be able to do very much about it.

I intend to be in Moberg before the end of the month and will send a further report concerning damage at that time. To my mind this incident is one of many which points to the need of an Indian Constable on the Reserve at Moberg.

kept on the Indians if when they began to show signs of drunkenness in the bar, they were put outside and told that they had had enough for that particular time. I know this method of curbing the drinking can work because it is working at Ogama where the Provincial Police makes a periodic check up on the beverage room and puts out Indians whom he considers have had enough. Also the hotel keeper at Ogama co-operates in the same way. The result is that the drinking problem at Ogama, Mattagami Reserve is practically negligible.

I spoke to the C.P.R. police inspector about the White River situation as well as several train crews who work number 17 through to Fort William. They all claimed that the Indians got the train in a very drunken condition and invariably several fights occurred between White River and Moberg and conditions on the train are in an up-roar while the Indian are on board. However, I found out something which I have believed to be true for sometime and that is that the new agents on number 17 were bootlegging to the Indians. This was told to me by the Indians at the band meeting held at Moberg and was substantiated by the Ontario Provincial Police at Regan. I passed this information on to Mr. V. Riddel, the inspector in this area at the present time for the C.P.R. police and he admitted that he had just been advised that what we had found out was probably true. He promised that immediate steps would be taken to stop this source of liquor. I know Mr. Riddel quite well personally and I feel quite sure that we will have his co-operation one hundred per cent. On the other hand I think that something drastic has got to be done at White River to curb the amount of liquor the Indians are getting at this point.

The reason I am taking such a serious view of the situation is that the results of all this drinking are beginning to show up in a most unsatisfactory manner on the reserve. Besides the fighting among the adults and the smashing up of property, the children there are becoming very delinquent. On both my visits to the Reserve I personally had to stop a gang of boys who had set a large fire in the bush on the Reserve and I have been advised by the parents that this sort of thing is going on all the time and they cannot do anything to stop it. Besides setting fires, there is considerable vandalism going on on the reserve with the resultant property damage and lately not satisfied with the damage they can do on the reserve, a group of boys headed by [redacted] and [redacted], age [redacted] and [redacted] respectively, stoned a C.P.R. passenger train about a week before my visit, smashed several windows in it and cut the conductor

During the week of June 13th - 18th I made my second trip to the Mobart and Heron Bay Reserves. I found Heron Bay to be a fairly peaceful and law abiding reserve, this mainly because there is a part time policeman employed there. Mobart on the other hand presents an entirely different picture. I was absolutely amazed at the amount of drunkenness which is going on there and also the large amount of juvenile delinquency.

On doing some investigating privately and in talking the matter over at a Band meeting, I wish to report as follows.

On Monday, Wednesday and Friday each week when the way-freight stops at Mobart and then goes on to White River late in the afternoon, a large number of the people from the Reserve sometimes as many as 50 -60 get on board the way-freight and go to White River where they spend the evening in the beverage room which is run by a [redacted] and then they get on number 17 about 11 o'clock at night and come back to the Reserve roaring drunk where they proceed to fight and brawl and smash windows, doors, and furniture at will around the Reserve. I myself witnessed just such a scene and I can assure you that I make no attempt to interfere because I felt at the moment that discretion was the better part of valour. The people who got off the train that night were all drunk in various degrees, this included women and some young people whom I consider were minors.

My investigation showed that [redacted] allowed the Indians to stay in the beverage room no matter how intoxicated they get. It also showed that there did not seem to be much of a check kept on the drinking in the beverage room by the Ontario Provincial Police stationed at White River. I have talked to several people about this and they agree with me that far better control could be

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In spite of anything we may do to cut down the drinking and other troubles on the reserve, I am afraid that we are not going to get anywhere until we get a Constable appointed, at least for parttime work on this reserve. I know that the Indian themselves have been asking for a Constable for some time and last year a man was appointed for a month's trial but nothing further happened. I urgently request that you consider making arrangements for a Constable to be appointed on the Pic Reserve at Robert with as little delay as possible. I think it will relieve the situation there in a very large degree provided we are able to get a man who carries out his work as conscientiously as the Constable at Heron Bay. At the Band meeting held at Robert everyone present requested that some action be taken in this direction. I feel that unless something is done soon we are going to be faced with a very serious problem on this reserve.

I realize that this is a rather long-winded report but since I feel the matter is of first urgency I felt that you should have as much of the picture as possible in order to come to a decision.

This affair was looked into by the C.P.R. police and the Provincial police and I have not yet had any word as to the outcome. This kind of action on the part of the children is reflecting itself very strongly in the classroom at school, making a very difficult job even worse for the teacher. Several of the parents came to me about this matter saying that they did not know what to do with their children because they were getting into so much trouble. Besides the other things which I have noted, the parents claim that there was a considerable amount of stealing going on in the Hudson Bay Company store and the children headles of the parents wishes would not come in the house often until two and three a.m. in the morning when they should have been in bed many hours before if they were to carry on properly at school.

I feel that this situation is the result of excessive drinking which is being done at White River and I sincerely hope that there is some way that the pressure can be put on [redacted] perhaps through the Ontario Provincial Police to put a curb on this. I think it would be a wise move on the part of our Branch to approach the Ontario Provincial Police with a request that better supervision be given the beverage room at White River than it is now getting. That along with the cutting off of the bootlegging on the C.P.R. train number 17 should materially decrease our problem at Robert.

With regard to the stealing which is going on in the [redacted] store I am quite sure that this is a fact but I am not surprised. I have been to the reserve at Robert twice and each time I have been there I have several times tried to contact the manager of the store and I feel that he purposely avoids meeting me. I was in the store four times on my last trip and the only people inside besides the Indians themselves, were two young Indian men from the reserve acting as clerks. Each time there were perhaps ten or twelve of the Indian children roaming around the store and there was nothing in the world to stop them from stealing almost anything they wanted. On taking over Pic Reserve at Robert Mr. Aquin, advised me that there was a strong suspicion that the manager of the [redacted] store was in some way implicated with bootlegging to the Indians on the reserve and that the matter was being investigated. He told me that he did not think I would find the manager in any way co-operative. I have not even been able to meet him.

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
