SUBJECT: CANADIAN FORCES WARNPNG AND REPORTING SYSTEM (CFWRS)

1. THE MINISTER OF NATIONAL DEFENCE HAS APPROVED THE AMALGAMATION OF THE NATIONAL SURVIVAL ATTACK AND WARNING SYSTEM (NSAWS) AND THE NUCLEAR DETECTION AND FALLOUT REPORTING SYSTEM (NDRFS). THE AMALGAMATED SYSTEM IS TO BE KNOWN AS THE CANADIAN FORCES WARNING AND REPORTING SYSTEM (CFWRS).

2. AS THE NEW TITLE IMPLIES, THE CFWRS WILL CONTINUE TO FULFIL THE TWO FUNCTIONS OF WARNING AND REPORTING. THE PRINCIPAL ADVANTAGE OF THE AMALGAMATION IS THAT IT WILL FACILITATE THE PERIODIC TESTING OF THE OPERATIONAL ELEMENTS OF THE PORTION OF THE SYSTEM ASSOCIATED WITH REPORTING NUCLEAR DETECTION AND FALLOUT

3. IN DUE COURSE, THE RELEVANT PUBLICATIONS AND DOCUMENTS WILL BE AMENDED TO REFLECT THE NEW TITLE. MEANWHILE, USERS ARE REQUESTED TO MAKE MAXIMUM USE OF THE NEW TITLE, WHERE IT IS APPROPRIATE, IN CORRESPONDENCE, JOB TITLES, DOOR SIGNS, ETCETERA

BACKGROUND

1. Reference A contained recommendations for future Canadian Forces responsibilities, objectives and activities in the Canadian North(1). The report was discussed at CDSAC Meeting 4/70, a record of which is summarized at reference B.
2. Reference C was issued 16 Mar 70 with issue 2 dated 17 Apr 70 to implement the decision to deploy Northern Region Headquarters (NRHQ) this year.
3. Reference D notified CDS direction to carry out further in-depth studies as detailed in paragraphs 7 and 8 of reference B and requested VCDS to provide interim guidance to Commanders and to CFHQ staff agencies, leading to the promulgation of an implementation plan in the form of a CDS Directive.

NOTE: (1) The term "Canadian North" has been used without further definition in order to allow maximum flexibility for ideas which might otherwise be restricted by geographical limitations. Where geographical limitations are necessary, the land areas of Yukon Territory and the North West Territories should be used. Associated waters and air space must also be considered as part of the Canadian North. No attempt has been made to define such terms as "territorial seas", "pollution zones", the continental shelf", etc., which are under active examination by interdepartmental agencies.

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AIM

4. The aim of this paper is to:
- a. Promulgate the Canadian Forces responsibilities and objectives related to the Canadian North.
 - b. Provide direction for implementation action with respect to approved military activities.
 - c. Provide guidelines for specific in-depth studies related to the North. (1)

DEFENCE RESPONSIBILITIES

5. Defence responsibilities in respect of the Canadian North are as follows:
- a. Support of Canada's national policies by contributing to the maintenance of Canadian sovereignty.
 - b. All aspects of maritime, land and air defence. In some areas, these tasks are done in co-operation, or shared with the USA and other allies under international agreements.
 - c. Provision of search and rescue services.
 - d. Assisting other government and commercial agencies.

DEFENCE OBJECTIVES

6. In the light of current national policies and the DND responsibilities stated above, the following defence objectives are identified:
- a. Contributing to the maintenance of Canadian sovereignty in the North by:
 - (1) providing a military presence, and
 - (2) surveillance and reconnaissance of Canadian territory, air space and territorial waters as well as the air and sea approaches thereto.
 - b. Maintaining operationally ready maritime, land and air forces capable of detecting, locating and defeating illegal and forcible entry into the Canadian North.

NOTE: (1) These studies are not in any way to be considered as all inclusive. Other subjects will require examination both in conjunction with and in addition to the studies outlined in these guidelines.

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- c. Providing effective search and rescue services in Canadian territory and making co-operative contributions in international areas adjacent to Canada.
- d. Assisting other government and commercial agencies in activities which enhance the social-economic development of the Canadian North.

ACTIVITIES

7. The following military activities are being conducted in the North and must continue at present or increased levels as shown:

ACTIVITY

RESPONSIBILITY

a. Search and Rescue

DCOPSR

This activity to be expanded to include a more deliberate and comprehensive "rescue" capability. The pre-positioning of certain stores and equipment for special rescue tasks may be required.

Further to paragraphs 10-12 of reference B, DCOPSR is to prepare recommendations for "all-command" involvement in a comprehensive SAR plan to include the Canadian North.

b. Cadet Training

DCOPSR

The value of this activity as an aid to the development of character, particularly in the North, and its contribution to national unity is accepted. This training should be encouraged and expanded where and when practicable.

c. Air space surveillance (DEW Line)

DCOPSR

(No change in level indicated.)

d. Electronic Surveillance

DCIS

(No change in level indicated.)

e. Surveillance and Reconnaissance by air and surface means

DCOPSR

Maritime Command aircraft are now undertaking surveillance patrols at a rate of about 200 flying hours per month. With the planned establishment of a detachment at Frobisher Bay through which Argus aircraft will stage, a considerable increase in Northern/Arctic surveillance will be achieved. In preparation for the establishment of NRHQ, the co-ordination of all information received by the various air and surface means should be examined (aircraft, ships, rangers, etc.).

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ACTIVITY

RESPONSIBILITY

f. Training exercises and manoeuvre

DCOPSR

An increased tempo in this activity is already well in hand for 1970. The trend should continue as expertise is built up.

g. Assistance to other agencies

DCOPSR

The Canadian Forces possess a level of capability and expertise which can be used to advantage in furthering government objectives in the North. While the Nation is at peace, this should be exploited. Although Canadian Forces do assist other agencies in a number of important ways, the level and scope of these activities could be increased. This should be done in concert with government policy and must not prejudice operational commitments. DND assistance must not be, or seem to be in competition with civilian entrepreneurs. A number of interdepartmental studies have recently been completed and are being co-ordinated by the Treasury Board prior to submission to the Cabinet. The level and scope of Canadian Forces assistance to other agencies in the North must be in consonance with approved government policy resulting from these studies. A list of associated interdepartmental studies is contained at Annex A to this paper. Reference E provides direction for a study to identify areas in which Canadian Forces can contribute to National aims and is related to the list at Annex A above.

h. Canadian Ranger Activity

DCOPSR

Revitalization is essential. The possibility of associating the Rangers and Militia more closely should be examined. If appropriately organized it could:

- (1) contribute to the surveillance and reconnaissance of remote areas and the air and sea approaches, by reporting unusual incidents.
- (2) provide experienced guides for operations and manoeuvres, and
- (3) assist in search and rescue operations.

ACTIVITIES REQUIRING IMMEDIATE IMPLEMENTATION PLANNING

8. Implementation planning is to begin immediately with primary responsibilities as shown:

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ACTIVITY

RESPONSIBILITY

a. Improved Command Control Arrangements

DCPlans

A Regional HQ has been authorized which will be responsible for the direction of military activity in the Canadian North which does not fall within the purview of responsibility of functional commands and will be responsible for the co-ordination of all other military activity in the North. (reference C).

b. Assistance in the provision of ice reconnaissance

DCOPSR

This function falls within the category of assistance to other agencies. With appropriate training, it could probably be performed in conjunction with surveillance and reconnaissance patrols and would be an important contribution to maritime operations in the Canadian North. Implementation must be fully co-ordinated with other government departments and agencies (primarily DOT).

c. Orientation Training

CP

There is a need for a continuing program of orientation training for staff officers and planners as well as for personnel actively engaged in Northern activities. Guidelines for possible orientation programs should be developed by CP. However, the following are some ideas which might be considered:

- (1) the utilization of scheduled and operational CF aircraft flights in the North including:
 - (a) special orientation flights/tours,
 - (b) use of scheduled resupply flights for orientation purposes,
 - (c) use of ADC DEW Line flights, and
 - (d) MARCOM surveillance flights,
- (2) the participation in DRB and other research programs,
- (3) participation in environmental training exercises, and
- (4) familiarization programs at training schools and staff courses;

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ACTIVITY

RESPONSIBILITY

d. Guidance for Research Activities

DCFD

Consideration of defence objectives and possible activities has indicated a number of areas which require additional research support to confirm feasibility. DRB research activities in support of defence requirements in the Canadian North should be given increased emphasis. This implies the need for specific guidance on which research programs may be formulated. This must be done in co-operation with DRB and other government departments and agencies.

ACTIVITIES REQUIRING FURTHER STUDY

9. The following studies are to be undertaken immediately with responsibilities as shown:

NOTES: (1) It is conceivable that the end results of these studies could be the establishment of an arctic base, in the Resolute-Devon Island area, with all the facilities and services required, i.e. command and control, ice breaker, port, supply centre, airfield, including aircraft servicing, search and rescue, surveillance, ice reconnaissance, navigation and communication centre, medical centre, research station, weather station, and other government agencies. Whether the government decides these activities are wholly a military responsibility or not is immaterial at this time. It may be that the Canadian Forces would be tasked to develop and establish such a base for an initial period of say 20 years, when other government agencies could perhaps assume responsibilities on a phased basis.

- (2) Certain feasibility studies are being undertaken by Commander, Maritime Command.

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ACTIVITY

RESPONSIBILITY

10. A Force Development Objective (FDO) for the Canadian North is to be developed as the primary co-ordinating document for all programs and studies related to military activities in the North. The FDO will also provide the basis for on-going and future Northern studies. DCFD

INTERDEPARTMENTAL STUDIES

11. There is a need for feasibility studies to be conducted by interdepartmental agencies. A Cabinet submission is required to recommend the initiation of these studies which are described in paragraph 12 below. DCPlans

12. OPIs for DND participation will be assigned depending on primary responsibility for the subject under study. The Cabinet Submission is to include recommendations for the following studies to be conducted:

- a. the assumption of responsibility by a Canadian agency for the operation of certain DEW Line airfields;
- b. the provision of vital services now performed by the DEW Line when the DEW Line is eventually phased out;
- c. the provision of navigational aids as needed including the take over by a Canadian Agency of the Cape Christian LORAN Station; and
- d. increased assistance to other agencies.

CO-ORDINATION

13. Branches and sub-branches designated as responsible for staff action in paragraphs 7 to 11 inclusive are requested to prepare an interim report to VCDS by 22 June, 1970, showing, for each activity:

- a. a brief summary of the work required;
- b. the aim and scope of any further studies; and
- c. proposed target date for completion of the subject.

14. CDS Directive D 7/70 (reference C) authorizes the establishment of Northern Region Headquarters (NRHQ). Terms of Reference for NRHQ will be issued after consideration of the recommendations which will be presented.

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by 15 Oct 70. These recommendations will be conditioned by, and to a certain extent, are dependent upon, the findings of other parallel studies.

15. OPIs for studies are reminded that all Branches of CFHQ have a direct interest in the development of plans for Northern activities. All Branches should be represented on study groups.

16. NRHQ is to be kept informed of the progress of all studies connected with the Canadian North.

DEFENCE POLICY REVIEW - PHASE II

REPORT OF INTERDEPARTMENTAL WORKING GROUP

1. The Cabinet agreed, on the recommendation of the Cabinet Committee on external Policy and Defence, that, with regard to the capacities of the Canadian Forces to contribute to the national development of the country and to assist the civil authorities, the following additional studies, to be co-ordinated by Treasury Board, be undertaken and reported to the Cabinet as expeditiously as possible and, in any event, by the end of December, 1969:

- a. civil maritime patrol activities;
- b. aviation support for VIP passengers and government freight;
- c. extension of communications services to other federal government agencies;
- d. assistance in economic aid programme;
- e. engineering development projects;
- f. provision of government supply services by the Canadian Forces; and
- g. career integration with the public service.
